The Labor Committee have inspected the Building with the view of ascertaining whether the internal wood & metal work requires painting. They considered that it is not required for the preservation of the work but it would certainly improve the appearance of the House.

They recommended that the Building now used as a spinning room be appointed for a place of worship for the Roman Catholics, and that a doorway be made in the north wall for an entrance for the men, the door opening into the passage connecting the two yards being appropriated to the women. April 25th 1862.

I have had often to regret the imperfect knowledge of the Catechism and the want of religious training on the part of the Boys since they lost the advantages of a Roman Catholic Schoolmaster. The Schoolmasters for the last few years being Protestant, could not of course, supply this defect, and experience here now unfortunately shows, that grown Boys will not sufficiently submit to a female to be taught and trained by her. I have sometimes expressed my disapprobation at the want of progress of the Boys on this subject and I would have done so more frequently only that the post of Schoolmaster being occupied, by a Protestant, I looked upon a remedy as hopeless till a vacancy would occur. The Roman Catholic Chaplain's Report,

May 16th 1863

I have observed in the last published report, of the meeting of the Guardians, that it was remarked as an omission on my part, that I did not volunteer an Opinion with regard to the proposed sites of the contemplated Chapel. My Opinion I now freely give, Abstracting from the convenience of the inmates, and the Discipline of the house, I would say that the spinning apartment, or some other detached building, would be preferable, as it could be entirely set apart for that purpose, and thus better suited for prayer, and for the august mysteries of the Roman Catholic Church, every Catholic knowing, that during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, our Divine Redeemer is pleased to Descend, and to be present, as long as the Blessed Sacrament remains on the Altar. It would be meet therefore, that not only its interior would be suitably decorated, but also its exterior appearance such, that those for whose use it is, to be constructed, would be at once reminded of His infinite condescension, and abiding Love; on the other hand such proposed Situation would be in the midst of the women's Department, and without passing through their yard the men could not approach it. In such case I conceive it difficult, if not impossible, that the discipline and morality would not suffer. The ill-disposed would abuse the privilege, or, to prevent which, the good would be debared of its chief advantages. Taking into account therefore the house, as at present constructed. I would say, the only suitable place would be where the temporary Chapel is at present - but that the portion of the hall intended for that purpose be exclusively set apart and becomingly furnished, such has been done in all the other Workhouses of the County and the arrangement I believe has afforded universal satisfaction. A small Committee of two or three persons could, under the control of the Board, enquire into the necessary expenses, and adopt the mode by which the Guardians in the other Unions effected this desirable Object. At present any stranger, who may visit this house, will seldom fail to observe, at all times of the day some of the aged men, or the Old women kneeling at their bed-sides, and fervently offering their homages to The Almighty, though frequently amidst the noise and interruptions created by less thoughtful companions. But by supplying a permanent Chapel, to which all, at all seasonable times, could have recourse, these laudable and devout practices would be increased, and whilst a considerate act of deferential respect would be made to Religion herself, the feelings of the vast majority of the poor inmates, "made to the image and likeness of God," would be duly cultivated and a sacred boon, deeply cherished, by them, would be bestowed upon them,
