13th April 1867. The Master's Report

The Master reports that the Porter is ill and unable to do duty. On Wednesday last 2 school boys named Peter Gibson, and Thomas Roseau, absconded from the Workhouse taking with them the Union Clothes. They were apprehended yesterday in Enniscorthy under a Warrant, and brought back to Gorey in charge of the police."

Agreeable to your order I attended Petty Sessions on yesterday, with Fanny Patchell, Margt. Malone, Anne Butler Margt. Doyle, & Anne Kriban, who swore informations against the putative fathers of their children. There are four other women, who would not go, viz. Johanna Parle, Mary Kilty, Sally Kinsella, and Alicia Green.

I would feel obliged if the Guardians would allow a pair of horses for a day or two, to sow the potatoes and Turnips. I would feel obliged if the Guardians would allow my wife to spend the Easter with me." (Allowed.) "On the recommendation of the Labour Committee, I purchased hay seeds to sow down a portion of the Workhouse farm." (Approved.) Required a Cheque of £3.10.0 to buy seed Potatoes" (Ordered). The stock of coals at present will not supply the House, until the usual time for accepting tenders.

No. 14,846

Encloses the original letter purporting to have been written by Mr. Thomas Doyle, Monamolin, and request to have same returned. Also states that the Commissioners have directed the preparation and issue of their sealed consent to the proposed superannuation allowance to Mr. Middleton of £20 a year.

No. 14,266 - June 7th, 1867.

Refers to a report from W. J. Hamilton Esq. F. L. S. relating to his recent inspection of the Workhouse, to the effect, that the earthen floor No. 1 ward, on the women's side of the Workhouse is in bad order and that the galleries, in the upper ward might advantageously be removed and applied in boarding the floor in question. Mr. Hamilton also states that he has called attention to some of the chimney shafts, which require to be cemented and to have the coping stones reset; that grates require repairing, and that in his opinion it would be an improvement to substitute open fireplaces for the stoves in some of the wards. A small portion of the wall between the women's yard, and the additional buildings ought to be either rebuilt, or secured with buttresses. The Commissioners

request the Guardians attention to this matter.

A circular from the Annual Revision Department enclosing the abstract of corrected valuation for the current year.

No. 60. M/67, Requiring a Return of Rates.—Furnished.

No. 14, 256. 1st June 1867, States that the Commissioners have received from their Inspector Mr. Hamilton his half yearly report relating to the Union, in which he states that the several departments of the Workhouse are in creditable order, that there is an efficient staff of Officers and that their duties are performed to his entire satisfaction. Mr. Hamilton observes that the only matter calling for attention is as regards the quality of some of the Workhouse supplies, particularly the milk, the tea, and the stimulants; he states that the milk he saw on the day of his inspection was of a very indifferent quality, and so far as he could ascertain, formed no exception to the general supply of late, and that he was informed by the Medical Officer that he considered that serious injury resulted in two or three cases recently, where pure milk was essential for the patients. Mr. Hamilton states that the Guardians have recently ordered porter of the best quality and he thinks it advisable that the Guardians should confer with the Medical Officer, as to the quality of the wine, and spirits to be contracted for.

The Commissioners inform the Guardians that any failure to supply pure new milk (which forms one of the most important ingredients in the dietary of the inmates) would deprive them of part of the nourishment to which they are entitled. The Commissioners refer the Guardians to their circular of the 31st October 1857 enclosing extracts from a work by Dr. Hassell, London, having reference to tests by Lactometer and Galactometer.

Ordered—The Board have given the contract for sweetmilk fresh from the cows on the morning delivered—They have a Galactometer and lactometer, and have given stringent directions to the Master to report any default.

The Board observing that the expense of Patients

in the Infirmary, and more especially in the Fever Hospital has greatly increased latterly, appoint the following Guardians as a Committee, to investigate the causes leading thereto, and report thereon to the Board. Viz— Messrs. Richards, Wylants, Murphy, Warren, Foley, Dunn and Roe.

The Labour Committee having inspected the House in consequence of Mr. Hamilton's report, recommend as follows.

- No. 1. The Schoolmistress's room to be ceiled with the planks at present boarding off the upper portion from the ward - Approved.
- No. 2. The stages in No. 6 & 7 female dormitories, to be removed, with all fittings. Approved.
- No. 3. No. 1. female dormitory to be boarded, with the flooring of the above stages, and the wooden joists in this, and No 2 wards to be removed - Approved. No. 4. The damp affecting the angle of the above No 1 dormitory, to be remedied by slating and pointing in cement, the tops of the adjoining wall over the doorways. Approved.
- No. 5. The Chimney shaft of Girls' Schoolroom, to be taken down (being in a most dangerous state) and rebuilt. The shaft of the Schoolmistress's room chimney to be pointed, and coped with granite - Same to chimney shaft of boys' schoolroom. On yesterday the Master was obliged to have an inmate named John Ryan brought before the Magistrate for assaulting him, whilst enforcing the Workhouse rules.

He was remanded till next Court Day.

Commissioners Letters.

No. 16587 - 27th June 1867.

Having reference to an order of the Board to discharge a man from Tipperary out of the Infirmary, when the Doctor thought him fit to travel, and stating that assuming the man to be still destitute, the Guardians were not justified in ordering his discharge.

A letter from Mr. William Green, praying to be continued as Auctioneer to the Board was read, but the consideration of it was ordered to be postponed, until previously to next Auction.

J. Kavanaugh an inmate was granted 30/- to enable himself and his family to leave the Workhouse, for a situation.

A letter from Messrs Woodroffe and Hogan, with reference to Mr. O'Shoughnessy's occupation of the Fever Hospital was read, in which it was stated that they hoped Mr. O'Shoughnessy would be induced to consider his position and recommending the Board to be summoned to consider Mr. Sergeant Armstrong's opinion.

The following is a copy of the opinion of Sergeant Armstrong, regarding the old Fever Hospital case which was received this day.

Copy

It appears that the Fever Hospital formerly supported by private subscription, aided by Grand Jury Presented, was transferred to the Guardians of the Poor and has been since maintained by the Union, and that a suitable building has now been provided elsewhere for fever patients at the expense of the Union. It seems to follow that the old Fever Hospital is no longer required, and I think it reasonable if no public Annuity exists, for its continued use, that the old Fever Hospital should be disposed of, so that it may be no longer in any way a charge to the Union. As the ancestor of Lord Courtown granted the site, I think the Guardians might lawfully surrender it to the present Earl, making some reasonable arrangement as to the materials of the Hospital building, which in the event of a surrender would I presume, be either taken down or converted to some other purpose. I think the sense of the Guardians should be taken, as to the propriety of surrendering it to Lord Courtown subject to the consideration above suggested. Mr. O'Shaughnessy's conduct in affecting to take possession of the Hospital, and holding it against the will, and without the authority, of the Board of Guardians, is very extraordinary, and he may find himself in a serious difficulty by persevering in this course. For the present, let the Board consider what I have written, and if possession be still withheld by Mr. O'Shaughnessy, Lord Courtown can, if so advised bring an ejectment on the title, and if counsel shall consider it necessary, that the Board shall join in the proceedings, I think they should consent to do so on being indemnified against Costs, or without any such indemnity, if a Board meeting shall resolve not to require it.

 Hospital and Infirmary of late, was drawn up, and
 read by the Chairman, J. A. Richards Esq, having met
 the full approval of all the members of the Committee.

The Committee appointed to investigate the increased average cost
 of maintenance of patients in the Workhouse Infirmary and
 Fever Hospital, met on the 11th & 18th Inst. and submit to
 the Board the following report.

Having compared the average
 cost in both Hospitals during one week in Summer, and
 one week in Winter, for every year 1851, we observed generally
 in the Fever Hospital, an increase in the average cost, pro-
 portional to the fewness of the patients.

In the Infirmary it has
 not been so, but in both departments there was a rapid in-
 crease in average cost, between July 1853, and Jan'y. 1854,
 and again between July 1855, and Jan'y. 1856. The sudden rise in
 Jan'y. 1854 continued, with only slight fluctuations in the
 Infirmary average, and with a pretty steady advance in that
 of the Fever Hospital, until Jan'y. 1856, when the second
 sudden rise already mentioned took place, in both departments.

One great reason for this increased cost, now, compared with
 former years, is the advance in the price of most of the articles
 in greatest consumption. For instance to go back to

But besides the increased contract prices as regards the Infirmary, the extra allowances have increased, in the different years, we have taken into consideration.

Taking the figures in the columns of bread, milk, and meat for the year ending the 5th instant, and proportioning them to the scale of other years, we find as follows -

It will be observed that the allowance of milk has not varied materially - That of Bread has steadily increased, while that of meat has risen up most rapidly. There is also an item of (22 glasses of) whiskey, given in the Infirmary in the week ending the 18th instant, which did not appear in any previous return, which came into calculation.

In the Fever Hospital as before mentioned the average cost is generally found to increase in proportion to the fewness of patients. This is accounted for by having to divide the rations, of unpaid nurses and necessaries as coals and candles among a smaller number. The higher contract price of necessities naturally effects the average cost in the Fever Hospital as well as in the Infirmary. As regards the allowances in the Fever Hospital, the items have been in the following ratio, in different years,

Thus the present treatment is higher in milk and meat, and lower in bread than that of previous years.

The item of spirits is added, which did not appear in the previous average weeks, except in 1853.

The exceptionally high average cost (10/-) of the week ending May 18th 1857, is partly accounted for, by the unusually small number of patients (average number daily, 5.) among whom had to be divided 28 cwt. of coal, rendered necessary by the recent occupation of the new Hospital. The amount of coals weekly is now reduced to 10 cwt. and can never apparently be much less. The quantity charged against the Old Hospital used to be much lower - from 4 cwt. per week.

The Committee observe that the amount of coals charged against the Infirmary, has been much higher during the past Spring, than in any previous period examined into, yet it does not appear to exceed the allowance fixed as necessary by the Committee, which went into the question of the consumption of coal in 1853.

The percentage of deaths has increased gradually but very slightly since 1851. It was then 4.1 per cent. and is now about 4.6.

We recommend that the Board insist on the production of the Medical Return every Board day, and that individual Guardians pay particular attention to the Orders therein, in order that the Medical Officer may have every opportunity of explaining any circumstances that may appear unusual.

Also that the Board examine the Provision Check Book, in which are entered weekly all provisions and necessaries consumed.

Gentlemen,

In submitting the Estimate of Rate for the year ending 29th September 1868, I beg to make a few remarks with a view of explaining the cause of the increased assessment on each Electoral Division, as compared with the previous year.

You will observe that columns 2, 3 & 4, in the Estimate before you shew the total expenditure for three successive half years, immediately preceding the current half year, the total in column 5, forms the basis on which the Estimate of Rate is prepared.

On comparing the total amount of column 5, with the corresponding total in the Estimate for the last year we obtain the following result viz.

It will be seen that the balance in favor of Elec: Division, including the value of clothing stock on hand, for half year ended 25th. 1866 amounted to £ 1814, whilst the balance in favor for half year ended 25th. March 1867, was only £ 1041, and as the balance in favor for these respective half years, should in each case be deducted from the total expenditure for the three preceding half years, with the view of arriving more closely at the probable amount of expenditure for the ensuing year you will perceive on reference being made to the estimates, for the corresponding years

that £773, the difference between the balances in favour above referred to may be considered, as an additional debit, as compared with the previous year, - and thereby makes the excess in the gross expenditure referred to £1876 instead of £1183, as would appear from a first view of the estimate.

Out of the sum of £7063 credit is taken for the value of clothing stock on hands, in addition to the actual amount of cash on cash on hands, so that at the same rate of expenditure for the next year the Union would be in debt to the Treasurer, on the 29th. September 1858, to the amount of the value of clothing on hands, which as you will see forms an item of £101,

This deduction reduces the expenditure to £6022, and by adding the sum of £100. to pay off the debt contracted for building the new Fever Hospital to this sum we arrive at the total amount to be estimated for viz. £6122.

With regard to the cause of the increased expenditure, I beg to remark, that the cost of repairs and improvements alone for the last year exceeded that of the former year by no less than £199; 2s. 7d. Again, the money paid to the Cattle Plague Fund

Mr. Richard Sterne who is a convalescent from Hospital, must have his allowance continued till strong enough to leave the House and earn his own living. The 3 others - David Smith, Matty Murphy and Jackey Bennett, are paupers of very weak intellect, the former was never found capable of earning his living, and the two latter are nearly returned as insane. They are allowed to remain out of Hospital, and all 3 require the extra Bread.

He frequently showed the milk to the visiting Committee, who found no fault with it, though the quality was equal to that which Captain Hamilton complains of.

The Master further begs to state that he will be more cautious for the future to return inferior milk, and the only way he can account for the milk in question is the extreme heat of the weather, for which he has ordered Contractors to supply it in the evening, as well as in the morning, and his report of this day will show, that they have twice failed to comply with his order.

reference to the manner in which the Medical Officer's books are kept, to the effect that he (the Med Officer) in whose charge the stimulants are, merely makes a memorandum of gross receipt occasionally in his "Weekly Return", in consequence of which the average cost is sometimes as high as £10/- or 11/- per week, while at others it is not half the amount. Mr. Sims observes that in other Unions the practice pursued by the Medical Officers, is to order the quantity required daily for each patient, and for the Master to take credit for the entire quantity at the end of the week, and that in Gorey Union the Medical Officer refuses to adopt this practice, although provided with an extra Diet Book, for that purpose which renders it plain that there is no party responsible for this important item of expenditure, and that if the door of the Medical Officers' store should happen to be left open, any quantity of wine, whisky, or porter might be carried away, without the usual mode of detection by means of the accounts.

Mr. Sims reports that the "Record of sickness & Mortality," in the Medical Officer's department is in a very unsatisfactory condition, and that it contains the names of many persons as receiving Medical treatment, who are not in Hospital.

The Commissioners point out that the stimulants should be in charge of the Master, the orders for its consumption to be given by the Medical Officer, and they refer him to the Ord. No. 1, which points out his duty in this respect.

The Commissioners state that Mr. Hamilton P. J. pointed out the extra bread ordered by the Medical ^{Officer} & the Clerk, pointing out to him some of the irregularities referred to by the Auditor, and his responsibility in respect to checking them, and they request to be furnished by him with an explanation on the subject.

This arose from the unsatisfactory working of the former system, which had long been the custom in both Hospitals, and of which it was only the natural development.

(2) When the question of a new book was first proposed, and the plan of one submitted for approval, the Medical Officer made some suggestions which he believes have been carried out, but one thing was wanting to bring it into working order — The then existing Dietary was very faulty, and after a fruitless attempt to assimilate it with the books in question, as a reference to them will prove the Medical Officer was obliged to fall back on the old system, and the old dietary, till he saw his way more clearly and till matters were more matured, for at that time he had no reason to think that the Board did not favour a fixed dietary for extras, as on one occasion, when asking to have an order passed for a tea extractor

press should be handed over to the Master, as more in accordance with the Regulations, or words to that effect. But on being asked by the Chairman (which was agreed to by all present) to do so, and to make the trial for a month to see how it would work - he assented - and this ended the discussion, and is the only instance bordering on a refusal, that the Medical Officer can call to mind, had it been made in the spirit of a refusal the Chairman would no doubt have taken some notice of it, at the time and the conversation would not have ended as it did.

The Medical Officer regrets that the omissions in his record of sickness and Mortality, should have brought the Clerk to any blame, they are all either rectified or in the course of being so, for as most of them occur in the early months of 1864, one year and a half prior to his appointment it must of necessity be a tedious process.

It is as easy to keep up a good practice as to continue a bad one, and he trusts it will not occur again.






