24<sup>th</sup> November 1840.

The Master begs to report that an Inquest was held in the Workhouse on Tuesday last in consequence of the death of Catherine Sullivan, a School girl aged 11 years, who had been admitted to the Workhouse on the 16<sup>th</sup> Instant. The Jury returned a Verdict that she died "from Natural Causes" with further remarks, which he believes the Coroner will submit to the Board.

The Master also begs to report that in August last, he advanced money (by order of the Board) for the conveyance of William Hanley to St. Mark's Hospital, and that he has long since furnished his bill for it and other sums paid for the carriage of goods, and request the Board will direct the Clerk to pay over the money, as he believes it to have been long since paid by the Board. He (the Master) has received  $\text{£}7$  as part of the above sum, from the Clerk.

### Medical Officer's Report

26<sup>th</sup> November 1840.

The Temporary Medical Officer reports that he has been in attendance on the Clerk, since Monday 21<sup>st</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>, who has been suffering from severe cold, accompanied with influenza and Sore throat, and would recommend him for sick leave of absence for a few days.

The Temporary Medical Officer reports that he was called upon to attend Catherine Sullivan, aged 11 years, who was admitted to the Infirmary, in a dying state and died shortly afterwards. An Inquest was held the day following.

The following letter was read,

District Lunatic Asylum,  
Ennisorthy 21<sup>st</sup> Nov. 1840.

Gentlemen, The Governor of this Asylum having requested me to write to you in reference to the case of John Murphy, who was denied admission into your Poor House. I beg to bring before your notice the circumstances under which he was forwarded to your Establishment.

On the 18<sup>th</sup> August the Board, at a meeting of which the Earl of which the Earl of Courtown was Chairman

directed me to call the attention of the Inspectors General of Lunatic Asylums, to some imbecile and harmless inmates, with a view to their removal to their respective Unions; and an Inspector having attended before the following day of Monthly meeting, five males amongst whom was the man alluded to above and six females were reported as fit to be transferred, from the character of their malady and their quietude.

Accordingly on the 15<sup>th</sup> September, an order was made for the discharge of the patients, and those belonging to the New Ross and Wexford Unions were received without any demur on the part of the Guardians.

Apart altogether from the consideration of expense, which must of necessity be proportionately high, in hospitals intended for the treatment of Insanity, it must appear obvious that Guardians, refusing to admit harmless demented and imbecile patients, must limit the usefulness of an Institution such as this, and cause future inconvenience to themselves by rendering us unable to relieve them, of the more excitable classes.

Ordered - The patient referred to was forwarded upon the certificate of the Medical Officer, of this Workhouse, the Guardians have further investigated the case, and find from his previous history and acts of violence committed here, that he is not a fit case for this House.

A letter from Dr. Allen Coroner was read, with which the following verdict of an Inquest, held at the Workhouse on Friday last, was attached, Copy.

We find that said Catherine Sullivan, died at Gorey Union Infirmary, Parish of Kilmichaelogue and County of Wexford, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1870 from "Natural Causes" to wit Effusion of the Brain & we desire to add, we regret there was not a better understanding amongst the Workhouse Officers, as to the charge of the school children, during the absence of the Schoolmistress on this occasion -

A Circular from E. M. Grath Michaelstown was read, having reference to the Apothecary Order.

A letter was read from Dr. Metge stating that he would not pay the cost incurred in the vaccination cases which failed in the prosecution as the cause of the failure, for reasons stated could not be attributed to him.

The Clerk was granted leave of absence for one week on Medical Certificate Mr. J. O'Hull to perform his duties.

Ordered = The Guardians request that the Poor Law Inspector be directed, to give a few days notice previous to holding the Investigation, and they further request the immediate attention of the Commissioners to the order made last Board day, with a view of having the Investigation asked for, held without delay, as they consider that the circumstances of the case urgently demand a speedy settlement.



### Roman Catholic Chaplain's Report

<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub>th Sawy<sup>r</sup> Having from a report in Goroy, that an attempt at proselytism had been made in the house here, by two Protestant Officials in endeavouring to abstract a Catholic infant from its dying mother in order to have it reared a Protestant and that this was done under the pretext of saving the rates, I felt it my duty to try to ascertain how far such report was true. I came up anxiously wishing to see the poor woman, but find she died this morning. Her name was Eliza Keef, and it appears from the neighbourhood of Castle Do Keral, she came to Goroy, was confined in a lodging house, they and the Child baptized by the priest, she became very ill, her money exhausted and being destitute was with her infant removed to this house. It appears also that like many of our Catholic virtuous females, she had fallen by a Protestant. I have ascertained beyond all possible doubt from Mrs. Fitzgerald who has care of the ward and from others present that on last Saturday night about ten o'clock when all were in bed, the master of the house and James Palmer a Relg. Officer entered their room, the latter demanding of her such explicit information as led him to believe the intent evidently was to have the Child conveyed away, in the event of her death and reared a Protestant. I need not say the effect such an effect

interview has on me so extremely ill and that the apprehensions for the salvation of my child haunted me to the last and felt up the Cup of her sorrows.

In calling the attention of the Board to this case I must candidly own that I do not so placing reliance on the impartiality of the Board, when there is question of Protestant and Catholic, or in the expectation that if punishment be merited, punishment would be inflicted - so long as I see the palpable injustice being done to the boys in this school, by the denial of their right of being daily taught their Catechism & receiving religious instruction from a master competent to give it.







R. C. Chaplain's Report

St. Michael's Gorey, Jan 31<sup>st</sup>

My Lords

To fulfil the promise I have made to comply with the desire of the Board, I now proceed to give my observations touching my report of the 7<sup>th</sup> of January - the facts that originated it - the subsequent investigation, and the reply of the Poor Law Commissioners. -

From the meagre information elicited at that investigation and from the one-sided account of it which appeared in "The Freeman's Journal" I feel a debt is due unconsciously perhaps, to the Guardians for the opportunity now afforded me of giving a full and true statement of the whole occurrence.

On the 21<sup>st</sup> of last December, one of my efficient and zealous curates, the Rev James Waddick, when about to enter a Baptism in the Parochial Registry, kept in my house, remarked to me that another of those disgraceful instances had just occurred in the case of Eliza Keefe a Catholic girl and Henry Hutton the reputed father, a Protestant, both from the Parish of Balindaggin.

He complained bitterly, that M<sup>r</sup>. Kennedy, the wife of Thomas Kennedy Schoolmaster, was the guilty person who had given the lodgings, in violation of the public prohibition, issued by me, against any of my Parishioners admitting such characters into their houses; it is not out of place, here to mention, why this rule had been made - Gorey had been inundated with innumerable cases precisely such as this. Numbers of these poor fallen girls had been sent in, from the surrounding districts, the greatest influx of all being, from the neighbourhood of Ballycanew which stands preeminent, from Monamolin, Boyra and Hollyfort, swelled by those from - though last not least, Gorey itself and its immediate vicinity. To prevent exposure and publicity, especially when the reputed fathers, happened to be opulent, married or Guardians of the poor, it was deemed by them expedient, for the most part

not to send these females to the Workhouse, those however, who were obliged to have recourse to it for their confinement, were generally adroitly removed, previous to the time for proving paternity and liability - Unlike however the women of England of this and higher classes, we can take pride, that these poor creatures, thus degraded, never for a moment dreamt of murdering their offspring - nevertheless it was not, unfrequent, in their dire distress and sorely against their conscience, to give them up sometimes with, and sometimes without stipulation to the fathers.

The Faith of these children was invariably exposed to danger, some of them, were delivered up at once to Protestant nurses - others, were bandied about, to prevent future identification from one woman to another, and finally left at the Hospital, the gate of the Workhouse, or in some contiguous place; they were taken up, the Protestant clergyman, immediately sent for, and without further inquiry rebaptized and registered as Protestants - It was to obviate this well known scandal and danger, I made and published some years ago, the rule, forbidding all those subject to me in my Parish, to give lodgings to any unmarried female about to be confined - This prohibition effectually checked the evil - a few cases since occurred, but by treating them with rigour, the number became still diminished and the last violation of it occurred by M<sup>rs</sup> Kennedy culpably admitting Eliza Keeffe into her house.

I heard nothing of this girl until Thursday evening, the 5<sup>th</sup> of January, the night but one before she died. Father Waddick, for a reason I shall hereafter mention, had kept a close eye after the child and on the efforts of the reputed father to gain possession of it, came to me that night and told me in the course of

conversation, that there was a child in the Workhouse Infirmary that ought to be looked after, and that much apprehension was felt there, lest it would be, by some sinister means, taken away, and given to the Father, and as a matter of course, reared a Protestant - He gave me the name of the Mother, and reminded me that she was the girl that had been confined at Kennedys that great alarm was created, by the visit of two of the officers of the Establishment, at an unseasonable hour of the night, and told me all he then knew about it, I asked him to obtain for me, whatever information he could, and said, I would go up myself and see about it. Being not then aware but that Eliza Keeffe was recovering, my intention was to go up to her, as soon as I conveniently could, hear her statements, and then as a matter of course, have an interview with the Master. The next morning being the Feast of the Epiphany I was much occupied and I did not leave the precincts of my own house or the church during the entire day. In the meantime, the thought about the child made me uneasy, and the following morning I took the earliest opportunity of seeing Father Waddick, in the Sacristy, I told him I was very unhappy at not having been sooner able to visit Eliza Keeffe and asked him had he obtained any further information. He told me he had a great deal, but said, I need not be unhappy because, from the time he mentioned it to me, she was totally unable to speak; he added, that from the state she was in the night before, it was probable, she was now dead - He gave me the additional information he had since acquired which, in every way, confirmed his former statement - ~~the~~ substance of which, and the particulars, as far as my recollection goes. I will now detail, -

Great apprehensions, it appears, had been entertained in the Infirmary, from causes, then, unknown to us, but which, I will subsequently mention, - on Saturday night about ten o'clock I have reason to believe the clock had struck ten, M<sup>rs</sup>. Flemming, the universally esteemed nurse, being in her room and hearing the steps of men passing in the corridor outside, went out and learning from them, they were going to see Eliza Keeffe became alarmed and resolved to accompany them hoping by her presence to frustrate any sinister ~~object~~ should such be attempted - After the Master had made some kind enquiries of Eliza Keeffe about her health, M<sup>r</sup>. Palmer put some questions to her, which were identical with those, to which he had previously received answers and which answers, he had duly noted down in his book, - The answers, were again correctly given, then came the question,

whether Henry Hutton Jun<sup>r</sup> or Henry Hutton Sen<sup>r</sup> was the Father of the child? There are two of the same name, the Father & the son, some further question was then put about the child immediately on hearing which, the kind hearted nurse, indignant at seeing the poor sick woman thus annoyed, turning away from them, or giving some other significant expression of her feeling, they at once left the room.

The day Eliza Keefe had entered the House, she was so ill, that the Curator duty was sent for. He attended her that day and also on the following, when he administered to her, the last rites of the Church - on this occasion, in the presence of persons called in to witness her dying declaration and in the presence of the Rev W<sup>m</sup> O'Neill, she made the solemn request "that her child, then with her, should not be given to the reputed Father; but that it should remain in the house after her death" - She frequently repeated the same desire and asked to be buried in the Chapel yard, and that if the child should die, it would be buried with her. - She dread that the child would, in some manner, fall into the ~~into the~~ hands of the Father, had thus early taken possession of her mind, she frequently gave expression to it, in the presence of the women of the ward and others, and in the presence of the woman, sent by the father with money and a message, that he would send a covered car for them, and that a nurse was prepared to receive the child. - The untimely visit naturally aggravated her state of mind, and increased her suspicions, and she never ceased, as long as she was able, to repeat imploringly her dying request. There were 9 beds in the ward, - The rumour as a matter of course spread, through the house, and it extended beyond it not as may be supposed in a mitigated form, so much so, that few could be found, even the most charitable, not to believe, that the object of the visit was, in some way, ancillary to the promotion of the well known designs of the putative father. - There is now little reason to doubt, but Eliza Keefe, after her confinement and before her removal to the Infirmary, being annoyed by frequent solicitations of the father, who often visited her,

yielded in some measure, her consent, for, immediately after one of those angry interviews, she said, in the presence of others "I wish he had taken it away in the tail of his coat."

There is cause also for apprehending, that in some of the letters she addressed to him, she may have sanctioned, in writing her verbal consent, It is now certain, that the nurse he had engaged to receive the child was, M<sup>rs</sup>. Rapple a Protestant, With this ample information, a few details excepted, from a source on which I could thoroughly rely, from one so conscientious and truthful, as the Rev James Waddick - so prudent, and so shrewd, as not to be easily led away by hasty or exaggerated statements, I dreaded the possible fate of the child and determined, nothing should be wanting on my part to secure it, - There was no time to be lost, and without a moment's delay, I proceeded to the Workhouse, On my arrival at the Infirmary, finding I could obtain no information from Eliza Keeffe, she had just departed, I told the nurse the only fact I wanted to ascertain from some one who had been present, was, whether the officers were in the room on the night in question, and I sent for the wardswoman for the purpose, - The Board was then sitting and whilst fearing it would be too late, I wrote my report, -

Had I less anxiety for the fate of the child or a little more time for deliberation, I certainly would not have shaped it as I did, so far as regarded the source from which I derived my information, - The mistake I made, in no manner, however, affecting the substantive facts, I did not discover, until in the printed report, it was pointed out to me, - and it was this precisely that rendered ineffective the investigation which subsequently took place.

It is not difficult for a person, in their confidence, to quietly ascertain the genuine truth, from the poor in Workhouses, many of them are, indeed, untruthful, passionate and revengeful when excited by anger, but all of them are by no means such, and, by making due allowance, mere matters of fact are easily found out, - but the case is far different, when there is question of their being brought before the Board still more when they are required to substantiate on oath before a commissioner, statements affecting officers placed

they for the most part seem literally to know nothing of them, or per chance, deny them on oath. - It was the saying of a great man, "If you want to conceal anything, hide it in 'The Dublin Gazette'." - With almost equal point, it might be asserted, by those of experience - If you wish to confound and embarrass the truth, hold a Poor Law investigation upon it,

Though it may perhaps, be out of place. I cannot refrain from bearing willing testimony, to the urbanity, fairness, and patience of Captain Robinson, the gentleman who presided at the investigation, limited as it was by the Commissioners to one solitary question. The best results however followed, my sole object has been attained, the Religion of the Child is now secure, and the motive, though not the act, of the officers justified, -

I now come to what have been termed, aspersions on the Board, Had I reason to believe that my remarks were unmerited and uncalled for, I would be the first to retract, and offer an apology, but I cannot view them in such light. - For example, if those gentlemen who constitute the most influential portion of the Board, had been in the habit of placing over Protestant boys in schools under their own control Roman Catholic Schoolmasters, I could then admit, they might prefer some claim to consistency and impartiality, I know of no such instances, - If I am in error in this respect, I would be happy to be corrected - If not, what is to be seen but this glaring fact, that one measure has been meted out to Protestant children, and another, relentlessly and persistently applied, to poor children, who can have no hope for redress, save in that which may be obtained, by bringing, from time to time, their pitiable case, before the Board and the Public,

In what manner the unfortunate mothers broken hearted in learning the sad fate of their children, who had been inveigled into the House, were received by the Board is well known, and requires no commentary from me, Having ascertained the fact, from some kind neighbour, or by the vigilance of their clergy, they betook themselves to the Workhouse and imploringly besought the possession of them Being first told by underlings, that they were imposters and about to practice their impositions on the Guardians, their

formal application before the Board was, as a matter of course promptly and indignantly rejected. Though thus deterred, it did not prevent them from appearing again and again, each time with additional testimony, until at length by overwhelming evidence, their children were tardily and ungraciously restored - Witness the case of the Child Anne Doyle, the mother being from the neighbourhood of Killena, and the reputed father, being a man of the name of John Bass. - The Mother was confined in this Down, and the child baptized by Father Waddick my Curate, the same fate as that of others, in a short time attended the child: It was brought to the Workhouse, duly baptized again, and entered a Protestant, by the name of Eliza Black. The statements made by the poor Mother to the Board were as usual, disbelieved, and her application refused until, by much trouble and a great deal of exertions and loss of time, the unwilling witnesses had to be produced, and the identity of the child proved by a chain of evidence, some of the witnesses resided in other parishes and one at least in this. Father Waddick laboured much to bring in the former, and I remember going twice myself, to a woman, residing within the precincts of this parish who had the child in possession for some time whose name is Connors, the wife of a Cotter of Mr. Hurney. I select this case, because the anxiety and trouble Father Waddick had to encounter regarding it -

was the cause, he had assigned to me, why he looked so closely after Eliza Keffe and her infant - I have been in connection with this institution for the long space of three and twenty years. -

I know its workings well, and I am, intimately acquainted with the feeling of its inmates - It would be well that both should <sup>be</sup> harmonious,

Considerable progress has been already made, but it can be rendered perfect, only by all endeavoring to act and to do towards others, as they themselves would wish to be done by,

I have a deep esteem for the many good qualities of the members of this Board, and no feelings save those of genuine best wishes, for each: and with this sincere expression of them,

Medical Weekly returns

The name of Disease and Register number have not been inserted opposite the name of the patient as entered on this book, the Medical Officer is requested to be good enough to cause this to be done in future.

A practice prevails in the Hospital of this Workhouse which is not in existence to my knowledge, in any other Union in my District, it is that of giving dry tea, and raw meat in the form of an extra to patients in Hospital - the majority of the persons to whom these extras are given, are on a fixed diet - but it appears that in addition to this tea diet, on an average about 60 oz of Tea, and 14 to 16 lbs of Sugar, and about

36 or 40 lbs of meat are issued to the patients weekly, in a raw form. During the week ended the 28 Jan<sup>y</sup>. the quantities issued in this way were 69 lb of mutton, 48 oz of tea and 19 1/2 lbs of sugar - The Master states that he sends the articles issued in this way to the Hospital on Tuesday or Wednesday of each week, and the Hospital nurse states that when she receives them she weighs the articles out generally in allowances of 2oz of tea 1/2 lb sugar and 2 lbs of meat to each patient - as may be ordered by the Doctor - The patients are provided with small Tea extractors, and are allowed to cook the articles so issued to them when and how they think fit - they may barter them with each other; she can't say whether they do or not, or they may give the tea to friends who come to see them, but she thinks they do not. She thinks that as a rule they use what they get.

It is obvious that this practice leads to irregularity, that it must more or less disturb order in the Hospital, and that it is open to abuse; and there is no means of ensuring so long as it continues that the articles of food ordered are used by the persons to whom they are ordered - I remarked upon this practice upon a former occasion, and I believe that the Medical officer concurred with me in thinking that it would be wise to do away with it. - and with that view he recommended that the Hospital nurse should be furnished with such assistance as would enable her to issue the Tea and meat extras in a cooked form; but nothing has since been done in the matter. I now bring the matter specially under the notice of the Board of Guardians



With reference to the Auditor's report the Medical Officer considers that the tea & meat must still be issued in the dry & uncooked form, unless a responsible person be appointed to take charge of the cooking & issue of provisions in the Infirmary at stated and regular times. —

The present plan of issuing the provisions at one time in the day, & the extra tea & meat on one day in the week to each patient is very objectionable — but — with a daily average of ninety (90) patients and upwards to look after. The Infirmary nurse already overworked in trying to perform both duties conscientiously cannot be expected to have more duties imposed upon her which the carrying out of the Auditor's remarks would involve —

A responsible person to cook & look after the regular issue of provisions is urgently required for the Infirmary, as the health of the nurse will sooner or later break down under the present double duty which the Medical Officer feels it his duty to say is beginning to tell on her already. 



The Medical Officer begs to report a 2<sup>d</sup> outbreak of Scarlatina of a virulent type - It was thought that the 1<sup>st</sup>, which was of a mild form, and confined to the children, had been completely stamped out, as every precaution had been used and no fresh case had occurred for some days - however, it appears that the woman over the children had unfortunately contracted it, and gave it, first to her own children, and then to one or two others - One case has already occurred amongst the boys - Should the epidemic spread it will be necessary to remove the Convalescents to a separate house before allowing them to mix with the healthy children again as the New Fever Hospital will be found too small to detain them in till all danger of infection shall have passed away -



States, in reply to the request of the Guardians that they are not in a position to send down a person to correct the errors in the Ledger apportionments, and recommends them to obtain the assistance of the Clerk of some adjoining Union.

Ordered, — The Clerk to consider by this day week, what competent person he will get to correct the errors in the Ledger apportionments, and report same to the Board.

N<sup>o</sup>. 7047, 16 March 1841

Refers to Mr. Robinson's periodical Report, dated 15<sup>th</sup> Instant, relating to the Union, in which he states he found the Workhouse on the whole in fair order, the Infirmary in its usual cleanly and creditable condition, and the Fever Hospital in fair order, but not quite so well kept by the present nurse as the Infirmary.

Mr. Robinson states that on examining the provisions in store, he found the white bread to be of inferior quality, and not as good as that supplied to other Workhouses. It appears that the Guardians take monthly contracts for bread, and that the advertisement requires that it shall be "best white bread, well baked" but that the tender accepted for the present supply did not specify "best white bread" but merely "white bread according to sample".

The Master cannot always determine in an article like bread, whether what is delivered is or is not inferior to the sample, and it appears that the Contractor has not been required to execute a formal Contract, and Bond.

The Commissioners request that the Guardians will be good enough to require the Bread Contractors in future to execute the usual contract and bond, and to agree to supply "best white bread" without reference to his sample, the Master will then have no difficulty in determining whether the bread sent in ought or ought not to be received.

Mr. Robinson also adverts to a practice adopted in this Workhouse of issuing "a week's supply" of meat and Tea to Hospital and Infirmary patients, when those articles are ordered for them by the Medical Officer as "Extras".

This course is quite at variance with the Workhouse Rules, respecting the issue of diets; and the Commissioners request that the Board of Guardians will be so good as to give directions that it may be at once

discontinued,

The Medical Officer, Mr. Robinson states, informed him that he could order the extra meat on four days in the week; and the Commissioners request that the Medical Officer may be requested not to order for each patient more than is required of the articles of referred to, for each day's consumption,

The Master should also be directed to issue those articles daily to the nurses, and not to send to the Fever Hospital or Infirmary more than one day's supply at a time. The meat might be cut up and weighed into rations before it is issued by the master to the nurses, if the Guardians think such an arrangement desirable.
