Chaplain's Report

July 16th. Both Schoolmaster & Schoolmistress appear to me to have given due attention to the children. It has been uphill work with both but now that a good foundation is being laid, I trust I will in a short time be able to report real progress in the education of the children. There is a want of Prayer books, Beads & Catechisms. I would recommend to be procured. 6 doz Prayer books, $\frac{1}{2}$ of large print, the other $\frac{1}{2}$ of smaller for the young, all plain but strongly bound, one gross of beads & one hundred Catechisms. These should be given in charge to some officer of the house; say Schoolmaster with directions to him, in order to prevent, as far as possible loss or injury, to look occasionally after those in actual use & to keep an account of those in stock & under lock & key.

A good supply of moral & religious books was more than once generously supplied by the Guardians. They proved very useful & instructive to the inmates & particularly consoling to the aged, amongst whom one was generally found capable of reading for the rest. These books from length of time & other causes have now dwindled down to a few. Such books are at present comparatively cheap & should due provision be made for their custody. I would recommend the Guardians to allocate a few pounds for a similar supply.
