That Mr Tyrrell also on two occasions supplied very bad mixed milk & that on yesterday - the second occasion he returned the whole of it about 18 fallons & issued Tea & Sugar instead to the Inmates order. The contractors attended & explained the chief cause was mixing hot & cold milk & would not boil on that acc<sup>t</sup>.



## REPORT ON THE FORD PUMPS.

HAVING BEEN INFORMED THAT THE PUMPS AT THE FORD OF KILMUCKRIDGE WERE COMPLETED, AT THE REQUEST OF THE CLERK OF THE UNION, WE VISITED THEM THIS DAY, AND REPORT AS FOLLOWS-

THE DRAIN WHICH THE CONTRACTOR WAS TO PUT IN UPTON FOR THE PURPOSE OF PREVENTING THE BACK WATER FROM ENTERING THE WELL HAS BEEN WELL DONE, IN OUR OPINION; BUT THE OPENS COMPLAINED OF BY MR. VESEY HAVE NOT BEEN PROPERLY FILLED UP; GRATINGS HAVE BEEN SET IN THEM, BUT THERE IS NOTHING IN THE WAY OF MORTAR AT THE BACK AND AT THE ROAD-SIDE THEY ARE CONFINED BY A FEW BRICKS PLASTERED OVER WITH SOMETHING LIKE ROADSCRAPINGS. THEY ARE IN FACT NOT SET AT ALL, AND A VERY SLIGHT KICK DISPLACED THEM, WHILE THE GRATING AT THE FOOT OF THE PUMP ITSELF HAS NOT BEEN SET AT ALL, BUT SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN SIMPLY THROWN DOWN AND IT IS IN A VERY DANGEROUS WAY, IF A MAN OR BEAST STEPPED ON IT.

THE TROUGHS ARE OF GOOD APPEARANCE, BEING 3 FEET 6 INCHES IN LENGTH AND 2 FEET 3 INCHES IN WIDTH. THE THICKNESS OF THE GRANITE SIDES IS ABOUT 4 INCHES. THERE IS NO PLUG OR COCK PROVIDED. THEY ARE SET ON BRICK FACED WITH SOME SOFT STUFF WHICH WAS SAID TO BE "PORTLAND CEMENT" BUT IT WAS DARK IN COLOUR, AND HAD NOT SET AFTER THREE DAYS. THE TROUGH AT THE UPPER PUMP SHOULD BE SET SIDEWAYS, AS ORDERED TO CATCH THE WATER BLOWN FROM THE SPOUT IN THAT EXPOSED PLACE.
