

I beg to report that acting upon an order of the Sanitary Board I inspected the premises at the rear of two houses at fourtown Harbour with the object of suggesting the best means for the removal of the Nuisance complained of (see S Officer's Report). In the yard of Mr Fitzsimons house there is a covered Well with a Force Pump attached - the water taken from this pump was of the colour of beer, had a sickly odour & was manifestly impure. Within a few feet of the pump I found a black stream of liquid manure oozing from under the wall which divides the yard from that of Mr Joseph Redmond's house, it required but a little exploration to trace this filthy stream pouring directly into the well & polluting the water - In visiting the adjoining yard I found it very clean & not containing more than about a cart load of manure, but being higher & with an incline to Mr Fitzsimons yard the fluid part of the manure was washed down by the rain & collected under the wall to where I have described it as issuing out in a black stream - I recommend that an intercepting sewer be made in Mr Redmond's yard which will carry any fluid matter from the manure heap into the covered sewer which runs through the yard. I pointed out this recommendation to Mr Redmond & he promised to have it carried out at once, but I trust the San'y Board will give such instructions to the Sub S Officer as will ensure its being done, for independent of the contamination of the well, the liquid manure percolates through the ground of Mr Fitzsimons yard & evaporating there causes a dangerous Nuisance - As to Mr Fitzsimons well I find that as well as being ever liable to pollution from the cause described it is in dangerous proximity to two closets & I am convinced no device can ever make the well a safe one to take drinking water from, & I recommend that it be closed up. The house of Mr Fitzsimons stands so close to the Village pump (the water of which by a very late analysis has been found to be pure & good) there can be no great difficulty in procuring a supply of pure water for his house.
