Report of the Labour Committee

We inspected the new portion of the boundary wall & find the work well executed, except the coping which is defective inside next the farm. It has been built from the road & finished with too much mortar and too little stone inside.

We recommend the Board to hold the master responsible for getting the Nursery windows and roofs, referred to in the visitors reports of March 24 and April 16, properly repaired and secured. Also to get the screen wall in the yard of the Infirmary done as recommended in the report of March 24.

Report of School Committee

We called the Schoolmaster's attention to the above report this day. He expressed his regret at the Chaplain's dissatisfaction and explained with regard to the want of occupations upon to in the junior classes that it has been his practice to allow them to remain so after he has given them their lesson and gone to attend to other classes. We do not consider this practice a good one, and think he might give them occupation in alphabet tables and picture boards or something similar. We enquire in the Chaplain's remarks as to the more advanced boys requiring to have their understandings more addressed, and though we are not in a position to judge of the general progress we think there are indications that the education might be more efficient with proper attention. We found an idiot boy of 13 or 14 learning alphabet with a class of little boys which we think not objectionable





Certificate of Disallowance

I find that during the half year ended the 25th March 1869, James Palmer Relieving officer, being authorized by the board of guardians of the above Union paid out of monies advanced to him from the poor rates, a sum of £4.4. as out door Relief under the first section of Vic. Cap. 31 to Michael Alford of Tara Hill, Alford being at the time in occupation of more than a quarter of an acre of land.

It appears that Alford was admitted to the Workhouse on the 2nd Sept. 1868 and remained there until the 26th October following when he took his discharge. On the 24th Oct. '68 his case was brought before the Board of Guardians as that of an applicant for out door Relief, it being stated on the Application and report back of the Relieving Officer, that the Medical Officer had recommended him to return to his home with a view to benefit his health, and on that occasion, Alford being in the Workhouse, 4/- a week for two weeks was ordered to be paid, which sum the Relieving Officer paid to Alford's wife. Alford left the Workhouse as above stated on the 26th October. On the 4th Nov. the case was again brought forward, Alford being at his own house, and 2/- was ordered for one week. The case was again brought up on the 21st November, and the Relieving Officer having visited the house of the applicant in the meantime, stated verbally to the Board when the case was under consideration (see Declaration annexed) that Alford was in occupation of more than half an acre of land, which he held under Lord Countown, but notwithstanding this statement out door Relief was again ordered. The case was brought forward on several subsequent occasions, and the Relieving Officer declared that on each occasion of his bringing the case before the Board of Guardians for consideration he stated to the guardians and to the Chairman presiding that Alford

occupied more than half an acre of land.

The second section of the act 25 and 26. Cap. 83. expressly provides that persons occupying more than a quarter of an acre of land shall not be relieved by the Guardians otherwise than in the Workhouse. The Poor Law Commissioners have more than once explained to Boards of Guardians the provisions of the law in regard to such cases (see Annual Report for 1864 page 21, and Annual Report for 1865 page 25.) they have pointed out that if the case of an occupier of more than a quarter of an acre of land be one of sudden and urgent necessity, the Relieving Officer can exercise his powers under the 4th Section of vic. Cap. 31. and relieve him provisionally so long as the case continues to be one of urgent necessity; and they have explained that if such an occupier, being destitute and disabled, is admitted to the Workhouse, the Guardians can while he is in the Workhouse, if they see fit, afford out door Relief to his family.

I do not propose to disallow the relief ordered whilst Alford was an inmate of the Workhouse, but with regard to the out door relief authorized under the 7th Section of 10 vic. Cap. 31 to Alford whilst he was at his own home, it was manifestly illegal, and I have no alternative but to disallow it; and in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the Irish Poor Relief acts, I hereby disallow the sum of £3. 16. 0 of the sum of £4. 4. 0 paid to Michael Alford (or to his wife for his use) as out door relief under the first Sec: of vic. Cap. 31 during the half year ended the 25th March 1869, as being an illegal payment, and not chargeable on the Poor Rates,

Returns a copy of Mr. Newsome's Countercharge, against the Clerk together with a copy of a communication received from the latter returning a sealed communication which the Commissioners did not at first open, owing to its having been directed to the Presiding Chairman, Board of Guardians.

The Commissioners are requested by the Board, to sanction the payment of £6. to a nurse who attended a woman named Fitzgerald at Riverchapel for eight weeks at 15/- per week - A certificate from Dr. Meldon is attached to this Bill stating that this woman during this period was ill suffering from pauperal mania, and unable to be removed to the Infirmary, and that she required the constant care of a skilled nurse. Dr. Meldon engaged one whom he could depend upon, at 15/- a week, and the circumstance was spoken of at the Board on the 28th August, on which occasion Mr. Robinson P.L.C. who was present stated that it could be given on Dr. Meldon's certificate. The Relieving Officer not being present, the matter did not come under his notice, and no steps were taken then to put it on his book.

Messrs. Rowe and Binnions accepted the responsibility of acting as a Committee to see the coal in store weighed next week, that being the only article of which no accurate stock was taken on 29th September. The clerk is authorized to employ and pay men to do the work.

The Clerk's Report.

October the 9th 1869.

My Lord and Gentlemen, Though I did not intend to bring to light circumstances connected with Mr. Newsome's dealings in regard to the article of straw supplied to the Workhouse, until I had fully refuted the countercharge he has thought proper to make against me, yet taking into consideration the duties which devolve on me both as regards the Board of Guardians and the Poor Law Commissioners, I feel that I cannot hold back serious charges which have very lately come to my knowledge, and which if postponed might be found highly prejudicial to the interest of the Guardians and the Rate-payers of the Union.

My charge against Mr. Newsome (which I can fully prove today, both by witnesses and the books of the Workhouse) is to the effect that he knowingly and wilfully falsified certain entries in his accounts, thereby deluding both the Finance Committee, and myself, with the ulterior view of obtaining money under false pretences for himself.

On the 28th September last I found on looking through the Clothing account in the Ledger for the half year just closed, that Mr. Newsome had caused to be paid for straw much more than the requirements of the Workhouse would at all seem to justify, from a comparison with other corresponding half years.

In consequence of some circumstances attendant on the transaction involving Mr. Newsome's resignation, I thought that the Porter's Books might throw some light on the subject. I accordingly took charge of two books which lay in his desk and were not heretofore in my possession, and carefully compared his entries of loads of straw delivered with the large amounts entered on the Master's "Clothing Materials Book". I next in two cases compared the entries of Mr. Peaney Wighmaster to the Town Commissioners, with those of Mr. Byrne the Porter, and the result was such as to justify me in my opinion of the complete accuracy of the entries of Mr. Byrne. Both are in attendance and Mr. Peaney has his weigh Books with him.

I give the annexed table showing the actual supply of straw by Mr. Keegan as per Wighmaster's Books

I next compared in a similar manner the entries in Keegan to the supply of straw by a Mr. Liddall and I found all to be correct in this case as the Books of both Porter and Weighmaster fully proved.

The next case I looked into was that of a Mr. S. Dowling. I found that this straw was not weighed on the Public Scales, but I allowed a high average of weight for each load delivered, as per Porter's Book, as the following table will show, and one conclusion can only be arrived at namely, that in this case also not more than half the straw paid for by the Board was actually delivered.

My last case is that of a Mr. John Butler, the amount paid him was £4.1.0 but in this instance I am unable to give a table, inasmuch as there was not

a single load of straw supplied by him. These contractors can best explain what became in each case of the surplus money - Gentlemen, I now leave this matter in your hands with the assurance that every single fact brought forward by me can be fully substantiated in any Court of Justice, as both witnesses are fully prepared to swear to the accuracy of their entries.

The Master begs report that it appears a minute was made by the Board on last Saturday authorising the Clerk to employ men and horses to weigh the Coals in the Workhouse Store and appointing Messrs P. R. Rowe, & H. Binions as a Committee for that purpose, that he knew nothing of such order until Wednesday morning when the Clerk and Mr. Binions came to the Workhouse.

The following day men and horses came and when eight loads were weighed on the Workhouse scale it was ascertained by the Police to be incorrect, the coals were then drawn down to Gaey weigh bridge to be weighed.

It is almost needless to remark that serious losses were sustained in its removal, as some of the cars employed were without top boards, and more of them merely dung carts without even back boards to keep the coals in - to prevent this waste the Committee sent school boys with two barrows to pick up the Coals as it would fall off, and it will be shown that several women gathered the Coals off the road and brought it home.

He wishes to add that the cars employed by the Committee were discontinued on yesterday evening but the men kept on and that scales having been erected the Clerk on this day placed workmen to weigh it in hand barrows, and appointed a pauper boy named Patrick Staranagh to keep an account of the weight. Under these circumstances the Master will not hold himself responsible for any losses or deficiencies there may be in the weight of the Coals, and he trusts the Board will kindly agree with him on this point.



Clerks Report—

My Lord & Gentlemen,

In company with Mr Simms I finished the weighing of the coal in the Workhouse stoves. Scales were erected in each yard for the purpose. The Master's report of last week contains some allusions which are in a great measure untrue. In the first place he states "that he knew nothing of that order until Wednesday morning, when the Clerk and Mr Binions came to the Workhouse" There is a witness who can prove that Mr Newson was aware of this order on Tuesday evening at least. The next statement requiring notice is to the effect that when eight loads were weighed on the Workhouse Ouncel it was ascertained by the Police to be incorrect. The Master omits to mention that before commencing to weigh the coal the Ouncel was tested by me in presence of Mr Binions and found to be perfectly correct, but after three or four loads were weighed, from the great increase in the average weight of the loads, my suspicions were aroused. I may add that nearly all this time the Master was at the Ouncel, and part of the time was then alone, about this period the Police sergeant came to test the machine and found it to be grossly incorrect. In regard to the serious losses complained of— it is only necessary to remark that the Committee sent trustworthy messengers to take charge of the coal on its way to the Ouncel at Groy and back; the Board can examine them if necessary. The Master absented himself for the remainder of the day after the second testing of the Ouncel. There were only Tons 23. 19. 2 qrs weighed on the fancy Ouncel—the remainder was carefully weighed by hand barrows in the yards in presence of Mr Binions. The total amount weighed was Tons 80. 18. 2 1/2 qrs, and allowing the late Master the benefit of three days additional consumption from the date when the weighing commenced the deficiency is found to be Tons 16. 4 cwt. It is only just to state that last June Mr Newson was allowed 30 tons of coal for waste during the late Mr Middleton's time

When his allowance was made the Coal houses were empty, and the surplus stock wanted off the books since which time all the present coal has been received. I found on inquiring from several ward maids in the Infirmary and Laundry, that no fires were lighted in either of the wards during the whole Summer, and only about one fire weekly in the Laundry, though Mr. Newsome had been taking credit in his "Provision Check" nearly all the Summer for the supply of Coal to the wards in question -

Mr Newsome has absented himself since Wednesday last at one o'clock; as he has not since returned the Clerk requests that some person maybe put in immediate charge of the books which have remained unposted during the entire week (Ordered "The Schoolmaster to take charge of the books and the Masters work generally, to be paid at the same rate as the late Master")
