COUNTY SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

MR. FOREMAN, MY LORDS, AND GENTLEMEN—I beg to submit my report on the works under my supervision. Edermine bridge is now practically completed, and the works have been very creditably carried out by the contractor, Mr. M. Kenny. A couple of months ago I instituted proceedings against three road contractors for neglect of their roads, but owing to the neglect of the Attorney-General to fiat the application the prosecutions at the Quarter Sessions had to fall through; but I hope to be more successful at the April Sessions. I have been asked by the Board of Trade to report on the level crossings as shown on the plans deposited this year for the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Bill. I find that it is proposed to have sixteen level crossings in this county, and I have raised objections to ten of them. Some of the proposed level crossings are on very important roads, such as the roads between Wexford and Killinick, Wexford and Kilmore, Baldwinstown and Kilmore Quay, Wexford and Wellington Bridge (the Duncannon line), Wellington Bridge and Rosegarland and Foulksmills, New Ross and Arthurstown, and roads in the neighbourhood of Bridgetown and of Campile, etc. I think the bill should be watched in committee on your behalf. A couple of road contractors have introduced mechanical stone-breakers in the neighbourhood of New Ross, with marked improvement in the roads. I hope other contractors will follow suit. The special works that will come before you for presentments are of the ordinary kind, and call for no special remarks. A new bridge is to be built at Croghan, in Gorey Barony, to take the place of an old one which is in danger of falling.

ANALYST'S REPORT.

MR. FOREMAN AND GENTLEMEN.—I beg to report that I have made the following analyses during the period which elapsed between the 1st day of June and the 31st day of December, 1897. For the sergeants of the Royal Irish Constabulary, acting as the inspectors of food, the following articles were analysed:—June 24th.—For Sergeant Lewis, Wexford, five specimens of buttermilk were analysed; they were free from adulteration. June 26th.—Five specimens of buttermilk were analysed for Sergeant Lewis, Wexford; four were poor and one of fairly good quality. July 5th.—Two specimens of whiskey analysed for Sergeant Doherty, Enniscorthy, were pure. August 13th.—For Sergeant B. Kelly, Ferns, two specimens of whiskey, two of porter and two of milk were analysed. One specimen of milk was deprived of at least 22 per cent of its fats and was, therefore, a debased article. The remaining articles were pure. August 16th.—For Sergeant Donovan, Wexford, four specimens of whiskey and 3 of buttermilk were analysed. They were free from adulteration. August 18th.—Two specimens of whiskey and one of milk analysed for Sergeant B. Kelly, Ferns, were pure. September 17th.—For Sergeant Farrell, Newtownbarry, three specimens of whiskey were analysed. One was adulterated with 13.87 per cent of added water, being 35.4 degrees under proof. September 30th.—For Sergeant Doherty, Enniscorthy, three specimens of whiskey and two of milk were analysed. One specimen of whiskey was 28 degrees under proof, and was, therefore, adulterated with 4 per cent. of added water. The milks were free from adulteration. October 28th.—For Sergeant D. Donovan, Wexford, seven specimens of whiskey were analysed. One was adulterated 6.67 per cent of added water, being 30 degrees under proof. December 20th.—Three specimens of whiskey were analysed for Sergeant P. Craughwell, Gorey. One was grossly adulterated, being 55.5 degrees under proof representing 40.2 per cent. of added water. December 23rd.—For Sergeant M. J. Lewis, Taghmon, 4 specimens of whiskey were analysed. Two were adulterated with 4.13 and 4.67 per cent. of added water, being 28.1 and 28.5 degrees under proof respectively. June 1st.—A specimen of milk analysed for the guardians of New Ross Union was of good quality. June 24th.—For the guardians of Enniscorthy Union two specimens of milk and a specimen of buttermilk were analysed. They were free from adulteration. August 16th.—Two bottles of human vomit received from Dr. Hadden, Infirmary House, Wexford, were carefully examined for poison, with negative result. August 21st.—For Dr. Pierse, Wexford dispensary, four drugs were analysed. They were—compound tincture of Cardamums, compound infusion of

Gentian, compound tincture of Camphor, and Hippo Wine. The compound tincture of Cardamums contained more than the average amount of extract; the proof spirit was 67.8 per cent. instead of 93 per cent. The Hippo Wine extract was somewhat below the usual amount, and the flavour of the wine was quite unlike that of ordinary Hippo Wine, the hippo being deficient. September 27th—For the guardians of Wexford Union three drugs were analysed. They were compound tincture of Camphor, compound tincture of Cinchona, and Hippo Wine. The compound tincture of Camphor was correct, containing 0.44 per cent of Camphor, and 90.23 per cent of proof spirit. The compound tincture of Cinchona was fully up to the average quality of the article, as to spirit, and amount and quality of extract. The Hippo Wine had not the usual flavour of that article, nor had its extract; therefore, the hippo must have been of very poor quality. October 19th—On this date for the guardians of Wexford Union a specimen each of tincture of Rhubarb and tincture of Senega were analysed. The tincture of Rhubarb was slightly deficient in spirit and extract. The tincture of Senega had full alcoholic strength, but was slightly deficient in extract. November 15th. Total, 135 children. Blackrock school, for boys, has furnished no account. There was an account for two boys at last assizes. With reference to Artane No 4119, Martin Murphy was licensed, but no explanation given as to when or where. As to St Michael's no reason is given why 448, Mary Dempsey, was re-admitted from license on the 28th Sept. to 30th Nov., 64 days, but 141 were

presented for. 482, Anastasia Lambert, was discharged but the column of discharge, not filled in. 502, Mary Anne Murphy, is retained on the expiration of period of detention. St Aidan's—285, Frances Aspel, no mention made as to what became of this child, discharged. A letter accompanies the account but managers have been requested to enter such information in the column of remarks. Meath and Waterford forms are not in accordance with that laid down by the grand jury, at the St Dominick's Waterford, the grand jury at last Summer Assizes ordered a contract to be entered into with the manager, to receive girls at 1s per week. This contract has been undertaken by the manager. Spring, 1872.

Ordered—That the following gentlemen be appointed a committee to inquire into the advisability of adopting the provisions of the Industrial Schools Act in this county:—Richard Donovan, Esq., Edward Tottenham Irvine, Esq., Captain P. L. Harvey, William Archer Redmond, Esq., S. T. Harman, Esq., M. A. Maher, Esq., and John Talbot Power, Esq., M.P.

Report of Committee appointed to consider the desirability of placing the County of Wexford under the working of the Industrial Schools (Ireland) Act.

Your committee have assembled and heard Messrs. Kennedy and Corcoran's statement, and having carefully enquired into the expected working of the above Act, and having taken into their best consideration the advantages likely to accrue to this county from bringing it under the working of the Act, beg unanimously to recommend the grand jury to appoint a committee to take such steps as the Act requires, and also recommend that the attention of the magistrates of the county be drawn to the necessity of making strict inquiry into each case through the constabulary. They append a list of schools with which they recommend a contract to be made. They are informed that each child will cost the county 2s 6d per week, to which the Treasury will add 5s.

For Roman Catholics.

St. Michael's schools for girls in Wexford; St. Aidan's schools for girls in New Ross; Artane school for boys, Artane, co. Dublin.

Ordered—The following be added: That the names of children sent to Industrial Schools between each assizes be laid before the grand jury at every assizes.

Ordered—We appoint Richard Donovan, Esq., E. T. Irvine, Esq., Captain P. L. Harvey, William A. Redmond, Esq., Matthias A. Maher, Esq., John Talbot Power, Esq., M.P., and Samuel T. Harman, Esq., a committee to enter into agreement with the managers of certain Certified Industrial Schools for the reception, maintenance, and keeping in such Industrial School from time to time of such children as are ordered by justices or magistrates to be sent there from the county of Wexford, in consideration of such periodical payments as may be agreed on with such managers, pursuant to the 31st Vic., cap. 23, sec. 9.

Ordered—The following was adopted by the committee:—

To the Secretary of the Grand Jury of the County Wexford.

SIR—On the part of the Managers of the ——— School, I hereby undertake to receive such number of girls or boys into this school, not exceeding ———, as may be committed to my charge under the provision of the Industrial Schools (Ireland) Act, by magistrates of the county Wexford, for the sum of two shillings and sixpence per child per week for every week such child may be in my custody from and after the 14th day of March, 1872, to be presented by your grand jury. I further agree to furnish you with a copy of the committal under which each child may be entrusted to me, and I also promise to supply an abstract of the history of each child's case as far as it may be possible for me to ascertain it.

Resolved—That on the Secretary of the grand jury receiving such a form of contract as the above from the manager of any of the five schools named in the report of the committee appointed by the grand jury to consider this question to-day, he be empowered to agree to the terms named in the foregoing form of contract.

Spring, 1873.

Ordered—That Mr. Dundas and Mr. Harman be requested to check the lists of children in Industrial Schools, and also the letter received from St. Michael's Schools be referred to them.

Ordered—That there shall be no more admissions into Industrial Schools sanctioned and paid for by the county Wexford at Large, until after January, 1874.

Summer, 1873.

Ordered—That a committee composed of the following gentlemen be requested to take into consideration the question of payments to Industrial Schools by the grand jury, and to report thereon:—Captain the Hon. F. A. J. Chichester, Mr. LeHunte, Mr. Harman, Major Harvey, Mr. Cookman, and Mr. Hall-Dare.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to consider the case of presentments for Industrial Schools, report that the presentments ordered at last Spring assizes amounted to £468 13s 8d; at this assizes to £318 13s 7½d—total, £787 7s 3½d. The first arrangement with Industrial Schools took place at Spring Assizes, 1872. An order to stop admissions was passed at the Spring Assizes, 1873, so that the charge for Industrial Schools is for admissions within the first year. It will require great caution to prevent the schools from being glutted to the injury of necessitous cases in the future, and to prevent undue burdens upon the ratepayers. We recommend that, in the first place, the order made at last assizes be rescinded, and that a committee be appointed from the Grand Jury Panel to investigate the cases of children in the Industrial Schools, and from time to time investigate the cases of future admissions; the committee to report at each assizes to the Grand Jury. Grand Juries can, if necessary, make representations to the Chief Secretary for Ireland, who has power under the Act of Parliament to remove children from the schools. The committee recommend that a copy of this order be sent to each Petty Sessions Court in the county, the following gentlemen to compose the committee:—Hon. Captain Chichester, Lieut.-Colonel Tottenham, Sir John Esmonde, Bart.; R. W. Hall-Dare, E. S. Flood, George LeHunte, N. N. Cookman, and M. A. Maher, Esqrs.

Spring, 1874.

Ordered—That a committee be appointed to report to this grand jury on the best system to be pursued in future with a view to enquiring into the great amount of taxation now incurred by the county for the maintenance of children in industrial schools, consisting of the following members:—George LeHunte, S. T. Harman, S. D. Goff, R. W. Hall-Dare, Esqrs., Hon. Capt. Chichester, and Lieut.-Col. Alcock.

Report of the Committee on Industrial Schools.

Your committee report that the amount of the presentments for maintenance of children in industrial schools at 2s 6d per week (that being the sum allowed at present by the grand jury in addition to the 5s per week allowed by the government), according to the annexed list, reached £298 13s 11d at the last and £653 19s 4d at the present assizes, making a total in the past year of £952 13s 4d, and that unless a change of system is made a considerably larger amount will be required for the ensuing year:—

Summer, 1873.

St. Martha, Monaghan, £22 19s 4d; Artane, co. Dublin, £16 2s 10d; St. Michael's, Wexford, £141 5s 9d; St. Aidan's, New Ross, £118 6s—£298 13s 11d.

Spring, 1874.

St. Martha, Monaghan, £9 17s 2d; Artane, co. Dublin, £32 7s 6d; St. Michael's, Wexford, £369 13s 11d; St. George, Limerick, £4 7s 6d;

St. Aidan's, New Ross, £236 7s; Cappoquin, co. Waterford, £1 6s 3d—£653 19s 4d.

We recommend the grand jury not to make the county responsible for any portion of the maintenance of children in industrial schools beyond the numbers in schedule annexed and in the schools therein specified (twih which agreements have already been entered into) viz.—Artane, for Roman Catholic boys, 25; St. Michael's, Wexford, for Roman Catholic girls, 20; St. Aidan's, New Ross, for do. 15; Meath Industrial Schools for Protestant boys, 5; Heytesbury street, for Protestant girls, 5—Total, 70.

We recommend that a sum of 1s 6d be granted from the grand jury cess for the maintenance of each child, which will reduce the total taxation possible to £273 per annum.

And we recommend that payment at this rate be made on new committals, and for one year certain from this assizes; and we recommend that a committee of the following gentlemen be appointed to consider the question of whether the sum allowed by the government of 5s a week is not sufficient for the maintenance of children of the classes usually committed in industrial schools, and whether the grand jury ought to be called on to make any payment in respect of them—Committee:—George LeHunte, S. T. Harman, and R. W. Hall-Dare, Esqrs.

That until the children chargeable to the cess have been reduced to the numbers allocated by us to the respective schools in which those numbers are exceeded, the annual number of admissions be limited as follows, viz.: St. Michael's, 3; St. Aidan's, 2.

That after 1st July next 1s 6d per week be allowed by us for children now in industrial schools, under an agreement with the grand jury for half a year certain, at the expiry of which time a new arrangement may be proposed on the report of the committee.

That all applications for payment be made up to the 1st January and 1st July in each year.

Directions to Secretary of Grand Jury.

First—The Secretary is requested to report to the various Clerks of Petty Sessions throughout the county, that they will be required to report to him from time to time the committals to industrial schools from their respective Sessions Courts, stating the names of the committing Justices and the peculiar circumstances of each case.

Second—When the number of committals to any school reaches the limit, the Secretary of the Grand Jury is to apprise all the Clerks of Petty Sessions that the number of places to be paid for by the county has been filled up in that school.

Third That notices of these resolutions be communicated by the Secretary to the industrial schools which they affect.

Summer, 1874.

Ordered—That we adhere to the decision of the grand jury at last assizes on the industrial schools question.

Your committee appointed at the last assizes to consider the question of whether the sum allowed by the government of 5s per week is not sufficient for the maintenance of children of the class usually committed in industrial schools, and whether the grand jury ought to be called on to make any payment in respect of them, beg to make the following report:—

We are of opinion that 5s a week is quite sufficient for the maintenance of each child, but in consequence of the expense attending the first starting of the schools, we recommend that the payments up to June 30 last be made at the rate of 2s 6d a week for each child. It has been decided at the last assizes that 1s 6d per week for each child should be paid from the above date till January 1, 1875. We recommend that 1s 6d a week should be paid from the 1st January, 1875,

January 1, 1876, by which time the industrial schools will have received aid from the grand jury for a period of three years and a half, and that the grand jury should then reconsider whether the government allowance of 5s a week ought not to be sufficient for the maintenance of each child, having regard to the principle that the grand jury allowance is made mainly in respect of building and other charges incurred at the outset of the schools. That in pursuance of the recommendation contained in the Lord Lieutenant's letter of the 26th ult., a committee be appointed consisting of the following gentlemen, viz.:—Lieut.-Colonel Tottenham, Sir J. Esmonde, S. T. Harman, George LeHunte, and R. W. Hall Dare—to inquire into the cases of children now in the industrial schools who are chargeable to the county with a view to a removal from the schools of any cases which do not appear to be within the Industrial Schools Act, and also to draw up a list of inmates for whom they consider part payment ought to be made by their relatives, and also to make a careful supervision of future admissions and to report to the next grand jury. We recommend that the boys now in Artane be paid for at the rate of 2s 6d per week until January, 1875, as it appears impossible for this school to admit children at a less cost and that the Secretary be requested to apply to other industrial schools, for Roman Catholic boys prepared to receive them on the terms offered by the grand jury from that date.

Spring, 1875.

Report of the Industrial Schools Committee:—

Your Committee since the last Assizes have used their best exertions to carry out the instructions of the last Grand Jury. They have found it impracticable to examine each individual case closely, but have come to the conclusion that in most of those cases where children have been committed to the Industrial Schools, whose parents or guardians were in a position to support them. This took place at the outset of the system, and, therefore that the term of detention of such children have either actually expired, or are so close to expiration that interference would not be of any practical use. Your Committee, however, recommend that the Secretary be directed to report to the Inspector of Industrial Schools the names of the following children, as being those whose parents are in a position to contribute towards their maintenance, and to take the necessary steps to have such parents compelled accordingly:—

In St. Aidan's Industrial School.

We believe that the adherence to the system laid down by the grand jury at spring assizes, 1874, and, after renewed discussion, ratified by the grand jury at the summer assizes, 1874, the only practicable method whereby the taxation on the county in this half year, £570 7s., being applied for, can be reduced within reasonable dimensions, while at the same time the county is not deprived of the undoubted advantages arising from the Industrial Schools Act, when used with discretion.

It appearing that the support of boys in Artane and the other schools for boys cannot be provided for without a subscription of 2s. 6d. per week by the Grand Jury we recommend that they be allowed that sum for the limited number sanctioned by the Grand Jury.

We feel that notwithstanding the representations made in the letters to the Foreman from St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Schools, the circumstances of which have been fully considered by the two previous Grand Juries, we must again express our resolution to adhere to the system and scale laid down by those two Grand Juries.

It appearing that St. Aidan's school have charged for six children admitted during last year contrary to the regulations of the Grand Jury, which provides that only two should become chargeable on the cess till the limited number fixed by the Grand Jury should be reached, and that in like manner one child

more than the proper number was charged for by St. Michael's, we recommend that no payment be made in respect of the said five children. We recommend that in future the Grand Jury do not consider any applications for payment which are not made up according to the regulations of the Grand Jury, and the Secretary should notify this to the schools, and also particularly call their attention to the regulation of the Grand Jury—that accounts are to be made up January 1.

Summer Assizes, 1875.

Ordered—That we return to the original agreement made with certain Industrial Schools for the receptions of the numbers then fixed of children committed by the magistrates of this county that the allowance from the county be restricted to 1s. 6d. per week for each child. Artane being excepted, supplemental to the government grant of 5s.; and that the committee on Industrial Schools be reappointed, with a request that they will obtain from the different Petty Sessions Clerks an accurate account of the circumstances under which each new committal shall be made, and also that they will watch the gradual liquidation of the debts incurred for the reception of the children.

Spring Assizes, 1876.

Ordered—That the name of J. C. Pounden, Esq., be added to the committee on Industrial Schools.

The Industrial Schools Committee have endeavored to carry out the instructions of the Grand Jury by enquiring into the cases of children committed from the different Petty Sessions since the Summer Assizes, 1875; and also obtaining a statement of debt due by each Industrial School.

The lists of children returned for Presentments were made up to December 31st, 1875. In future the Committee recommend they should be furnished to a later date, as nearly to ten days before each Assizes as possible. (If the Gaol accounts were made up to the same period, and the outstanding bills were paid previously, the real financial position of the Gaol would be more satisfactorily shown than at present).

There appear by the returns to have been five committals to Industrial Schools between the Summer Assizes and the end of 1875.

SAMUEL T. HARMAN.

I agree with the above report, except so far as altering the date to which the bills should be made up, as I am of opinion that a fixed date, such as December 31st, is less likely to lead to confusion than a varying one, dependent on the date of the Assizes. I am also of opinion that the Grand Jury should be asked to re-impose the limit to the number of admissions, adopted at Spring Assizes, 1874, and recommended by the Committee at the Spring Assizes, 1875, but rejected by a very narrow majority.

Summer Assizes, 1876.

Ordered—That the conductors of the several Industrial Schools be informed that inasmuch as the allowance of 1s. 6d. agreed to be paid by the grand jury for children up to January, 1876, and the same allowance has now been paid to July 1st, '76, payment will for the next half year be at the rate of 1s., except for Artane, when 2s 6d be paid.

Spring Assizes, 1877

The Committee upon Industrial Schools report that between the 1st January, 1876, and June 30th, 1876, the date at which the returns for the Summer Assizes were made out, the number of admissions, which were in part chargeable to the county, is small, and does not give the number of discharges and deaths. Into St. Michael's School there were three admissions and nine discharges and deaths. Into St. Aidan's three admissions and seven discharges; two of these admissions were by committal in 1875, but were not charged to the county until January, 1876. Into Artane there has been no admission and three discharges; one of these last was, however, by transference of Philip Reilly to Drogheda on account of health. Returns have been received from the Petty Sessions' Clerks of the different committals:—Eliza M'Grath, sent from Taghmon to St. Michael's School, Catherine Stamp, from Enniscorthy, and Margaret Dunphy, from Wexford. There seems to be nothing to remark on these cases, except that an independent authority states that Catherine Stamp is the illegitimate child of a man who was processed at the Enniscorthy Quarter Sessions of Spring, 1875, for the maintenance of the child, and that he compromised the case by a payment of six pounds to the claimant in full of all demand. The child, when committed, seems to have been in a condition which made her a fit subject for admission into some institution.

The presentments paid to the St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Schools after Spring Assizes are returned by the Managers as having been applied to the reduction of debts:—

Summer Assizes, 1877.

The Committee on Industrial Schools report to the grand jury that they have inquired into the cases of children sent to Industrial Schools up to the period at which the lists furnished were closed. The number of children chargeable to the county decreases. Into St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Schools there have been three admissions, while the discharges by death and otherwise amount to nine. The admissions into St. Michael's were Mary Kelly, from Wexford, and Margaret Quinn, from Enniscorthy. Into St. Aidan's, Mary Murphy, from New Ross. Into Artane there was one admission, Nicholas Walsh, sent from Duncormick Sessions. Reports from the Petty Sessions Clerks accompany this. The debt upon St. Michael's School was, in July, 1875, £2,150, reduced by £450 to £1700. Debt upon St. Aidan's Industrial School, June, 1875, £1010 13s 2½d, reduced, June, 1877, to £757 2s 6½d.

Spring Assizes, 1878.

Report of the Committee on Industrial Schools.

The duty of the Committee being to check the charges falling upon the County for children in Industrial Schools, but not to throw any difficulty in the way of the wholesome intention of the law to cut off crime at its roots by the compulsory detention in these Schools of very young persons likely to become criminals, they now report that in the last half year thirteen children have been taken off the list of those chargeable to the county, some being discharged, and some placed on license; while ten children have been committed from the Petty Sessions Courts of Wexford, Enniscorthy, and New Ross. The Reports from the Clerks show that in the majority of cases the children were eligible for

these schools, and for these only, as their parents were in gaol, or undergoing penal servitude. Three cases—Mary Anne Barker, from Enniscorthy; Eliza and Christine Reilly, from Wexford—are merely described as destitute orphans. It is quite clear that the law includes "destitute orphans," but following the expressed opinion of the Grand Jury, the Committee consider that such cases, unless attended by special circumstances, such as frequenting the company of reputed thieves, &c., ought not to be a charge on the County Cess. In these three cases such circumstances were not mentioned by the Clerk. It is, therefore, possible that they might, in the opinion of the Grand Jury, be sent to a workhouse. The building debt on St. Aidan's at the time of the last report was returned at £1184 16s 3d. It is now returned at £1078 18s. The debt of St. Michael's in the last report was returned as £1969 0s 1½d; is now returned as £1600.

Summer Assizes, 1878.

The Committee appointed to check the charge upon this county for children committed to Industrial schools have kept the object for which the committee was appointed in view—namely, to see that no improper committals were made, while the good intentions of the law were not interfered with. The endeavours of the Committee have been for the first time interfered with by the absence of any reports upon the cases sent from Petty Sessions. The Clerks of Petty Sessions have failed to answer the letters which asked for the circumstances attending each committal. At the Spring Assizes of 1874 the Grand Jury resolved—"That the various Clerks of Petty sessions throughout the county be required to report from time to time the committals to Schools from their respective sessions Courts." Having called the attention of the Grand Jury to this, the Committee report that the discharges since the last report appear to amount to 13. The number of admissions 7.

From Artane—1 discharged, 2 admitted.

„ St. Michael's—6 discharged, 3 admitted.

„ St. Aidan's—6 discharged, 3 admitted.

The debt on St. Michael's is returned at £1511 6s. 4d.

The debt on St. Aidan's is returned at £1079 18s. 7d.

These differ little from the returns of the last half year. The Manager of St. Michael's wishes the Grand Jury to be informed that £1,000 have been expended in building a laundry and poultry house, and on farm buildings, which sum is not charged to the cesspayers. The new committals in the half-year were from New Ross, Enniscorthy, and Wexford Petty Sessions.

In addition to the foregoing, we would remark that the Manager of St. Aidan's Industrial schools returns the debt due on that establishment £1 0s. 7d. of an increase on the amount due last half-year, but it appears that she was entitled to £67 6s. 1d., which was ordered at last Summer Assizes, but, through an error, was not paid, consequently the debt now may be estimated at £1012 12s. 6d.

It appears that certain girls who have been discharged have been returned as charged for the full half-year; but the Manager wrote to Mr. Wynns for the return, in order to correct it, but as it had been forwarded to Mr. LeHunte it could not be sent to her. We propose that the amount now claimed, £61 8s 0½d be paid, and if it should appear on further investigation that this is in excess of the amount she is entitled to receive, such excess should be deducted from the amount to be paid next Assizes.

We regret to find that the Petty Sessions Clerks have neglected to report the committals as required by the resolution of the Grand Jury, 1874; and we recommend that the Secretary be requested to direct them to comply with the order of the Grand Jury.

Summer Assizes, 1879.

REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

That since the lists were furnished at the last Spring Assizes there appears to have been sixteen admissions and twelve discharges. Letters from the Petty Sessions Clerks, explaining the different cases of admission, accompanied this report, from which it appears that seven were committed by the Wexford Bench, four by the Enniscorthy Bench

three by the New Ross Bench, and two by the Ferns Bench. The number of admissions and discharges fluctuate; but there seems to be a gradual decrease in the amount presented. Taking the abstract of presentments, the amount passed for Industrial Schools at our Assizes was

The Committee appointed to report upon Industrial Schools have to state that since the lists furnished at last Spring Assizes, there appear to have been 16 admissions and 12 discharges: Reformatories not included. Letters from the Petty Sessions Clerks explaining the different cases of admission accompany this report. The number of admissions and of discharges fluctuate, but there seems to be a gradual decrease in the Presentments. Taking an abstract of Presentments passed at one Assizes in 1876, the amount for Industrial Schools was £289 4s. 5d. In 1878, £250 9s 9d. At Spring Assizes, in this year, £238 3s 10d. At this Assizes, £227 11s 4d. This decrease occurs without checking the wise operation of the Law which transfers children who had before them no resource but crime, to Institutions admirably conducted, from whence they issue in course of time useful members of society.

Spring Assizes, 1880.

The Committee on Industrial Schools have shortly to report that the admissions into St. Michael's Industrial school slightly exceeded the discharged during the half year ending December 20, 1879. The discharged from St. Aidan's have slightly exceeded the admissions in the half year ending Dec. 30, 1879. The building debt of St. Michael's last Assizes was £1343 19s 2d; this Assizes, £1253 12s 2d; of St. Aidan's last Assizes, £951 4s 6d; this Assizes, £896 1s 2d.

Ordered—Resolved—That the Secretary be ordered to inform the Cesspayers and Magistrates at Presentment Sessions that all costs in cases of malicious injuries be included in the sum (if any) allowed.

Ordered—That after the new presentments in each barony have been gone through, and the application for works of maintenance arrived at, the Foreman shall ask in open court if any person have any objection to make to or on any of these applications, and that all such applications not specially objected to shall be taken as presented in the form in which they have been passed at Road Sessions, without the endorsement of the Foreman on each of them.

Summer Assizes, 1880.

Ordered—The committee appointed to report on Industrial Schools, state that since the lists furnished before last Spring Assizes, there appears to have been ten admissions, chargeable to the County, and eleven discharges.

These amounts seem to require explanation.

The presentments are expected to go to reduce debt, as the five shillings a head contributed by Government is sufficient for the ordinary outlay.

Debts were necessarily incurred at first starting. If now any interference takes place in the application of the presentment to the extinguishing of these debts, and still more, if addition be made to the debts, it appears right that the Managers should give explanation. At the last Assizes an order was made that the names of children, chargeable to the County, and the expense of their maintenance, should be printed. The lists in summer Assizes are required to be made up to a date which makes their appearance in the printed list of applications impossible. They may appear in the Abstract of "Presentments granted."

The expenses of maintenance will be best gathered from the Annual Report upon Industrial Schools, which the Secretary to the Grand Jury can always obtain.

Spring Assizes, 1881.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS REPORT.

The committee reports that between June 30 and December 31, 1880, there were, as shown by the lists, 8 discharges and 17 admissions—admissions being in excess of discharges. The money asked for now is somewhat in excess of that granted last assizes, being £323 4s. 10½d. as compared to £295 10s 11d. The presentments to the schools in this county are meant to

extinguish original building debts, but the managers of the schools are a little slow in falling in with the intention of the Grand Jury. The debt upon St. Michael's, Wexford, was reported last assizes to be £1153 12s. 5d. It is returned now at £1161 2s. 5d., though the grant at the assizes was £128 8s. 7d. It will be seen in the report on Industrial Schools that a sum of £118 7s. 4d. was spent in 1879 upon "improvements in the buildings of the school." There is no fund for such expenditure except annual income and private benevolence. Still the committee recommend the Grand Jury to draw the attention of the Managers to the addition to the debt without the previous assent of the county. In the case of t. Aidan's, New Ross, error in the last return of the debt has been corrected, and the amount granted has been applied as intended. The detailed reports of the different Petty Sessions Clerks are appended. The law seems to have been strictly complied with in cases of committal.

Summer Assizes. 1881.

Ordered—The Committee on Industrial Schools report that the number of discharges exceeds that of admissions in the six months ending June 30th. Discharges, 28; admissions, 19. The total sum applied for by Industrial Schools at this Assizes is £314 12s 4d, as compared to £323 4s. 10d. at last Assizes. The Presentments to the two schools in this County have been applied to keep down the building debts, but in the accounts rendered interest is also claimed, which it will be for the Grand Jury to refuse or allow. In St. Aidan's account a sum of £50 8s 8d has been added to the building debt, without any previous reference to the Grand Jury, and without explanation.

At St. Michael's a new Infirmary has been recommended by the Inspector and Medical Officer, with other improvements. The total cost will be close on £1,000. The Manager asks that this may be added to the debt, and liquidated gradually by presentments as before. When these improvements are effected, the establishment, it is asserted, will not require any further outlay to building.

Reports from the different Petty Sessions Clerks, with the exception of Enniscorthy, are appended.

Government brings before the Grand Jury a new Industrial school, "The Kilmore Probationary Industrial School," designed to meet a particular class of cases.

The Grand Jury is authorised by Act of Parliament to appoint and empower a Committee to enter into an agreement with the Managers of any Reformatory school for the reception of juvenile offenders.

We find from Mr. Ryan, R.M., that the cases which would be eligible to this Probationary School from this County would be very few, and the expense to the County probably insignificant.

Ordered—That we consent to the request of the manager of St. Michael's Industrial School with regard to the Infirmary building.

Ordered—That the Grand Jury shall arrange with the Managers of the Kilmore Probationary Industrial School for the reception of children under 12 years of age convicted of offences punishable as misdemeanours, and will pay 2s 6d per week as required; and that the following be appointed to communicate with the promoters:—George LeHunte, Charles M. Doyne, and J. C. Pounden, Esqrs.

Spring, 1882.

Ordered—That the Secretary be requested to purchase ten boxes with locks and keys, to be called tender boxes, in which all tenders must be lodged within office hours on or before the day previous to the approaching sessions, in a closed envelope, and endorsed "tender," the name of the Barony outside, or sent by post in a registered envelope directed to the Secretary of the Grand Jury, and marked "tender," and the name of the Barony outside. That the Secretary keep the key in his own possession.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee handed in the following report:—The discharges since the last report here have slightly exceeded the admissions, being 15 as compared to 13. The presentments amount to £324 4s 8½d as compared to £314 12s 4d in the summer of 1881, and to £323 4s 11d in spring, 1881. Such slight variations will always occur. Presentments are made on the collective number

of days the children enumerated in the returns have resided. The building debt returned from St. Aidan's, New Ross, is £356 8s 9d as compared to £898 19s 11d in summer, 1880. The debt on St. Michael's is reduced, "Original debt," £944 16s 8½d as compared to £1153 12s 8d in summer, 1880. To this debt £400 are to be added, being the sum expended up to the time out of the £1000 allowed by the last Grand Jury. Returns from the several Petty Sessions, with the exception of New Ross, are appended.

Summer, 1882.

The Committee on Industrial Schools report that the admissions in the half year appear to have been 10, the discharges 13. The amount of presentments £243 2s. 1½d., as compared to £256 6s. 9d. presented at last assizes. Returns from the different Petty sessions are appended. The debt on St. Michael's is returned as £840 17s. 11d., as compared to £944 16s. 8½d. at last assizes. The amount expended on the new Infirmary out of the £1,000 allowed by the Grand Jury has been £539 17s. 7d.

Accepted 19th July, 1882.

Spring, 1883.

Ordered—That the County Surveyor be directed to report to the Grand Jury at each assizes the cases of any roads which have been disallowed on two occasions previously, with a view of having the amount represented in aid.

Ordered—That the Solicitor to the Grand Jury be authorised to carry on prosecutions in cases of infractions of the bye-laws prohibiting traction engines from crossing New Ross bridge,

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Industrial schools report that the number of admissions and discharges balance each other. The amount of the applications at this assizes is somewhat in excess of that of the last half year, but these amounts will always differ, as they depend upon the date of admissions and discharges, or on the collective number of days for which the county consents to pay a certain proportion. The committee feels it necessary to call the attention of the Grand Jury to the building debts as returned by the managers of the two schools in this county, to which the main bulk of the committals is given. As the Grand Jury is aware, the presentments are granted for the reduction of the building debts, as the Government grant of 5s per head per week was conceived to be quite sufficient for the maintenance of the children. The building debts on St. Michael's and St. Aidan's were ascertained in 1879 to be as follows:—St. Michael's, £1,343 19s 2d; St. Aidan's, £951 4s 6d. The amount of presentments made from summer assizes, 1879, to summer assizes, 1882, both inclusive, amounted to St. Michael's to £933 18s 4d., for St. Aidan's to £401 12s. Since 1879 no detailed statements of the payments applied in the reduction of debts have been furnished; but the amount of debt stated as still due is considerably in excess of what the committee finds it ought to be, if the presentments were regularly applied in reduction. The committee recommend that no money be paid until these accounts are furnished. They do not recommend the presentments to be disallowed, but merely held over until our Secretary receives the accounts. The return of committals from the different Petty Sessions are appended.

Summer, 1883.

Ordered—That a committee, consisting of Messrs. Donovan, Leigh, Kirk, Cookman, and Walker, be appointed with the County Surveyor to enquire into the danger of allowing traction engines to draw loads over the bridge in the county Wexford, and report to the Grand Jury.

KILDavin BRIDGE.

Ordered—That the Foreman be authorised to sign the requisition form of presentment when the amount of interest shall be ascertained and the instalments settled with that Board.

Resolved—That this Grand Jury is of opinion that the Rent Charge is now an unjust imposition on land and ought to be abolished.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Industrial schools report that during the half year the admissions were 16; the discharges 13, including two deaths. The amount applied for is slightly less than that applied for at last assizes. 10 of these admissions come from New Ross, and no explanation of so large a number admitted has been received.

With reference to the direction of the Grand Jury at spring assizes, 1883 that the Managers of St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Industrial Schools should send in detailed statements of the reduction of debt since Summer Assizes, 1879, when the amount of debt was ascertained in each case. This direction has been obeyed, and it appears that the debt on St. Michael's (not taking into account £935 2s 4d spent on the new Infirmary, with consent of the Grand Jury, being part of £1,000 authorized to be expended), has been reduced from £1,343 19s 2d in July, 1879, to £618 15s 3d in July, 1882; and of course the debt is to be reduced further by the amount presented at spring assizes, 1883, as well as that at the present assizes.

The debt on St. Aidan's has been reduced from £951 4s 6d, due July, 1879, to £658 15s 6d in July, 1882; and is also to be further reduced by the amounts granted in spring and summer, 1883.

These statements agree substantially with the calculations made by the Committee as to the amount by which the debts should be reduced at the last assizes, except in one particular, and prove a satisfactory correction of the error then made in the returns.

That particular is the payment of interest on the debt out of the money granted by the Grand Jury. This is contrary to the resolution passed at summer assizes, 1881, and the amount of £91 9s 1d in the case of St. Michael's, and an approximately calculated amount of £40 in the case of St. Aidan's should also be considered as reducing the debt.

The Manager of St. Aidan's has made a special request to be allowed to pay the interest out of the grant but no remark has been made by the Manager of St. Michael's, the order of the Grand Jury being simply ignored.

The Committee wish to state that they have accepted the statements of the Managers as correct, not requiring any vouchers of payment by the Managers to be laid before them.

They believe that any responsibility undertaken by the Grand Jury is limited to making, from time to time, presentments at the rate of 1s 6d for each child admitted by committal from Petty Sessions, the presentments to be applied gradually to extinguish the debt as ascertained in July, 1879, and that it will cease when a sufficient amount has been presented, even though some debt should remain due by the Managers at that time.

That the return of the building debts of each industrial school and its reduction by means of the moneys presented and granted by the Grand Jury, be furnished to the Secretary along with the returns of admissions and discharges at each assizes.

Report of the Committee of the Grand Jury appointed to consider the Bye Laws for regulating the use of Locomotive engines on Public Roads and highways in the County of Wexford.

Recommended the following to be adopted:—

1. Every Locomotive propelled by Steam, or by other than animal power, traversing any public Road or Highway, during the period between sunset and sunrise, shall have conspicuously affixed thereto two efficient bright white lights in front, and a green light in the rear. In case of Waggon being drawn by it the green light to be affixed to the hind most Waggon.
2. No such Locomotive shall be propelled at a greater pace than the man who is to precede it (as hereafter provided by Bye Law No. 3) can conveniently walk.
3. Every Locomotive, when in motion, shall be preceded by a person who, during the time when lights are required, shall carry and display an efficient red light at least 100 yards in advance of the Locomotive, and during all other periods shall, at like distance, carry and display a red flag.
4. The weight of every Locomotive shall be painted in white letters one inch in length thereon, in some conspicuous place, and shall have the name and address of the owner in a similar manner visible from each side of the engine.
5. The weight of each waggon, as well as the weight it is to carry, is to be painted in white letters one inch in length thereon on either side of the waggon. The load on each waggon is in no case to exceed six tons.
6. No Locomotive propelled by steam or other than animal power shall be driven upon or pass over the following bridges:—Wexford, Deep's, Ferry-car-rig, and Hodge's Mill, or any Railway or other bridges not constructed of stone.

7. On passing over any bridges noticed as weak or doubtful. The engine shall first pass over singly and then draw each waggon over separately by means of a wire rope or otherwise. The engine itself not again going on the bridge.

8. Every person who shall offend against the foregoing bye laws shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds, to be recovered summarily.

Spring Assizes, 1884.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The committee on industrial schools have little to report. The checks instituted by former Grand Juries for the protection of the cesspayers are maintained. The returns of committals, with explanations of each case are sent, and are appended to the report. The amount of the building debts, reduced by former presentments, is given, returned by the managers of the two schools in this county, to which the great bulk of the committals go. In January, 1883, the committee called attention to the fact that the reduction of those debts did not follow accurately the sums presented. There appears to have been some misapprehension, which has been corrected. The original debt on St. Michael's was £1,343 19s 2d. It is now £409 1s 4d. The new debt for an infirmary, which was sanctioned by the Grand Jury is £948 16s 6d. A half year's interest on the debt—really a part of the debt, £33 12s 1d. The original debt on St. Aidan's was £953 18s 4d. It is now returned at £599 2s 4d, with interest for half a year £15. These returns seem to tally with the requirements of the resolution passed at spring assizes, 1883.

GEORGE LEHUNTE.

I feel myself unable to concur in the report drafted by Mr. LeHunte, as I do not believe it was at any time intended by the Grand Jury to allow interest on the debt due by St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Schools to be charged against the presentment made by the Grand Jury in aid of the liquidation of the debts. In corroboration, I would refer to the reports of spring, 1877, and summer, 1877, from which it would appear that the full amount of the debt was expended in reduction of the principal, and also to the resolution of the Grand Jury, passed summer, 1881, No. 131, and I am of opinion that the committee have no power to report that the interest can be charged against the presentment until the resolution of summer, 1881, No. 131 be rescinded.

Summer Assizes, 1884.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee reports that the admissions into Industrial Schools since the previous returns were 19. From Ross, 6; Enniscorthy, 3; Wexford, 7; Gorey, 2; Killinick, 1. The discharges were 17. The charge on the county is £338 5s 10d, being £7 7s 6d less than last half year. The building debts returned—By the Manager of St. Michael's, at £1244 3s 8d. This sum includes the balance of the original debt, and the £1000 expended under the sanction of the Grand Jury. The return from St Aidan's amounts to £567 17s 8d. Your committee, following out the resolution of the grand jury at spring assizes, 1881, which limits the presentments to the reduction of principal only, find that the amount of the building debts at present due are—For St. Michael's, £1,211 19s 11d; St. Aidan's, £530 0s 5d.

Spring Assizes, 1885.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Industrial Schools report that the number of admissions during the half year ending December 31st, 1884, was eleven and of discharges ten. It would appear that the debts on Schools at June, 1884, were—St. Michael's £1,211 19s 11d, and St. Aidan's £530 0s 10d. From these should be deducted the amount presented at Spring Assizes, 1884, St. Michael's £145 17s 11d; St. Aidan's, £69 1s 11d; so that the amounts due are, St. Michael's, £1,066 2s; St. Aidan's £469 18s 11d; and these sums will be further reduced by the presentment passed last Summer, not yet paid. The returns of committals by Petty Sessions Clerks are appended.

Summer Assizes, 1885.

REPORT ON INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, JULY 25, 1885.

The committee report that from a careful examination of the returns it would appear that the admissions were 19—girls, 13, boys, 6; that the discharges were 12—girls, 10, boys, 2; that the present number for whom the county is called on to pay is 114—girls, 111, boys, 33. The presentment now asked for amounts to £335 6s 3d, of which £223 8s 10d is for the girls, and £111 18s 5d for boys. These sums altogether, with £374 1s 1d, presented last spring, make a total cost for the year of £709 7s 6d. A presentment for two small boys, sent to Cappoquin, is asked for by the manager at the same rate as for other boys, viz., 2s 6d per week. The debts on St Michael's and St Aidan's schools, as returned by the managers, are considerably in excess of the amount, for which the last report of the committee shows that the county is liable. The grand jury has ordered that the whole amount of the presentments in these cases is to be considered as credited in liquidation of the principal. The debt on St Michael's was stated in the last report to be £1,066 2s, from which should be deducted £142 3s 1d, presented last summer, which would leave the amount now due £923 18s 11d, but the return of the manager puts it as £1,021 0s 4d. The debt on St Aidan's was stated in the last report to be £409 18s 11d, from which should be deducted £74 18s 3d, leaving the debt to be £335 0s 8d, but the return of the manager puts it at £423 17s 6d. The committee believe that the grand jury are not called on to present for more than the amounts of debt as estimated by them. Only two petty sessions Clerks have made the required returns, which are appended.

Spring Assizes, 1886.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Your Committee report that the number of admissions in the half year ending December 31, 1885, was 20; of discharges 6. In consequence of the small number of discharges, the amount of presentment is large, being £412 19s 4d, as compared to £378 19s 4d at the corresponding Assizes in 1885.

Taking the building debts on the two schools in this County, as calculated by this Committee at last Summer Assizes, it appears that the debt on St. Michael's, counting principal, not interest, and deducting the presentment levied at Spring Assizes, 1885, and paid to the managers after last Summer Assizes, should stand at £783 13s 8d; on St. Aidan's at £319 14s 3d.

Your Committee has observed that the question of an "extended certificate" for St. Aidan's has been mooted in the House of Commons. The managers may be reminded that the Grand Jury is not bound to make the cesspayers liable for any increase to the Building debt, without its special sanction after a thorough investigation.

The children committed to Industrial Schools and Reformatories were distributed as follows:—From Wexford, 10; New Ross, 4; Enniscorthy, 3; Gorey, 3; Arthurstown, 1. The different Petty Sessions Clerks have been directed to send particulars to the Secretary of the Grand Jury.

Summer Assizes, 1886.

REPORT ON INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The committee reports that the number of admissions in the half-year ending June 30, 1886, 20; of discharges 11. The total amount applied for is £407 17s 3d. An increase of £72 11s upon the amount granted at spring assizes. Your committee observes that juvenile crime has notably decreased. The principal of the building debt on St. Michael's, after the reduction of £141 11s 9d paid to the managers after spring assizes, will stand at £882 7s 2d; on St. Aidan's, after the deduction of £69 5s 4d, at £315 15s 4d. The total number of children in the schools for which application in aid is made, appears to be 104.

Spring Assizes, 1887.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Committee report that the number of admissions during the half year ending December 31st, 1886, were 23, and of discharges 24. The total amount applied for at this assizes is £452 11s 4d, being an increase on last half year of £44 14s 1d. This is partly accounted for by the fact that three of the schools divide the year into 5 months and 7 months, the longer period falling into the accounts furnished for this assizes. This does not account for the entire excess, the half yearly accounts also differ, as the collective number of days differ, these being regulated by the dates at which discharges and admissions take place. In the report at last assizes, an error was committed in the calculation of the "Building Debts." The debt, for which the grand jury is responsible, was in the case of St. Michael's, £492 10s 1d, and in the case of St. Aidan's, £182 3s 4d on December 31, 1886. These sums will be further reduced by the presentments made at last summer assizes now to be paid, and it may be expected that in 1888 the full amount of the debts will have been presented, and so far as the present arrangement is concerned, the grand jury will only have to present for children then in the schools, and only for the term of detention of each. In respect of new committals, some fresh arrangement must then be made. The committee would remark on the steady increase in the amounts presented during the past four years, notwithstanding the strict supervision they endeavour to maintain. The figures are—In 1883 £621 18s 7d; in 1884 £680 11s 1d; in 1885 £709 7s 6d; in 1886 £819 16s 7d. If a sum equal to what is now asked for is presented next summer, the total for 1887 will exceed £900.

Summer Assizes, 1887.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS REPORT.

The committee report that the presentments applied for at this assizes amount to £425 13s 7d, being less by £26 17s 9d than the amount presented at the last assizes. The number of admissions into the schools during the half year was 19, of discharges, 12. The "building debt" on St. Michael's school, at Wexford, is £339 13s, which will be diminished after the assizes by the amount presented at last Spring Assizes. The debt on St. Aidan's, at New Ross, is £111 4s 2d, subject to the same diminution. The committals during the half year into the different schools were 7 from Wexford, 4 from New Ross, 3 from Duncormick, 2 from Enniscorthy, 2 from Newtownbarry, 1 from Gorey. The clerks of petty sessions have been directed to furnish the particulars under which committals have been made.

Ordered—No locomotive propelled by steam, or other than animal power, shall be driven over the bridge, on the new road between Oulart and Enniscorthy, over the stream dividing the baronies of Ballaghkeen North and Ballaghkeen South.

Spring Assizes, 1888.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The committee report that the admissions into the Industrial Schools during the half year ending December 31, 1887, were 18; discharges 22. The numbers admitted were, from Wexford, 5; New Ross, 5; Newtownbarry, 2; Enniscorthy, 4; Gorey, 1; Ferns, 1. The amount of presentments at this assizes is £470 0s 3d, showing an increase, as compared with the presentments at last assizes of £44 6s 8d. At last summer assizes the amount of the building debt, for which the grand jury considered the county liable, was, on St. Michael's, £339 13s; on St. Aidan's, £111 4s 2d. From these sums the presentments of Spring 1887 paid immediately after the last Assizes, and the presentments passed at the Summer Assizes, which will be paid after this Assizes, are to be deducted. In Spring the presentments for St. Michael's was £157 4s; Summer £155 2s 10d. Total, £312 6s 10d. In Spring for St. Aidan's £74 7s 6d; Summer £73 2s 11d. Total, £147 10s 5d.

showing that the debt for which the Grand Jury considered itself liable will be very nearly paid off in the case of St. Michael's; more than paid off in the case of Aidan's. The committee believe that the county is bound to pay for all children committed until a formal notice is given, but no further contributions will be made. It is for the Grand Jury to consider if the 5s per child per week is sufficient for the maintenance and instruction of children in these schools, 5s being the contribution by Government out of the general taxation of the country. The benefit conferred by these Schools cannot be over estimated, but the duty of the Grand Jury to the ratepayers must force them to refrain from any unnecessary burden upon the rates. In case the Grand Jury may consider that 5s per head per week is sufficient, notice should be given that no payments out of county cess will be made in the cases of children committed after the next Summer Assizes.

Ordered—That as the Grand Jury have presented to the full amount of the debts for which they considered themselves liable in respect of the Industrial Schools of St. Michael's and St. Aidan's, and as they consider the Government allowance of 5s per week is sufficient for the ordinary expense, the Grand Jury decline to present any sum in aid of the Government allowance in future for children committed to the Schools.

Summer Assizes, 1888.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The following correspondence was referred to the Committee:—

The Committee met, but not being unanimous submitted two reports.

The Committee have read the letter of the Manager of St. Michael's School, and in reply beg to state to the Grand Jury that it correctly quotes the resolution passed by them in Summer, 1881. But they would remind the Grand Jury that they have fulfilled their part of the agreement by having already presented, according to their calculation, the full amount of the principal of the debts due by both St. Michael's and St. Aidan's; and as the Grand Jury is bound to pay for any children committed before Summer Assizes, 1888, they consider the amount is able to defray the £287 10s. 4d. alleged by the Manager of St. Michael's School still to be due.

The Committee feel they are bound to consider the interest of the cess-payers as well as the Industrial Schools; and, under the circumstances, they do not feel justified in recommending that the resolution passed in spring should be rescinded.

REPLY FROM MANAGER.

St. Michael's Industrial School, Wexford, 19th July, 1888.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 30th ult., transmitting report of committee on Industrial Schools and order made thereon by the Grand Jury at last Spring Assizes, in which they decline in future to present any sum in aid of the Government allowance for children hereafter committed to this school on the ground that they consider the 5s. a week allowed by the Government for

each child sufficient for the ordinary expenses; and, in reply thereto, I have to respectfully call the attention of the Grand Jury to the fact that there is a building debt of £287 10s. 4d. still due for our school, being the residue of the cost of building our new Infirmary, which was recommended by the Inspector of Industrial Schools and the Medical Officer, and sanctioned by the Grand Jury at Summer Assizes, 1881. The following is an extract from the Grand Jury Committee's report relative to this Infirmary:—

"At St. Michael's a new Infirmary has been recommended by the Inspector and Medical Officer with other improvements. The total cost will be close on £1,000. The Manager asks that this may be added to the debt, and liquidated gradually by presentments as before."

On this report the Grand Jury at Summer Assizes, 1881, made the following order:—

"That we consent to the request of the Manager of St. Michael's Industrial School with regard to the Infirmary building."

On the faith of this order we borrowed the sum necessary to build the new Infirmary, and after applying the presentments received since the old debt was cleared off in liquidation thereof, the above balance of £287 10s. 4d. remains due by the school.

It would appear from the order made at last Spring Assizes that the Grand Jury are under the impression that the Government allowance of 5s. a week for each child is sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses of our school. Now this is contrary to the fact, as will appear from the following statement:—Our school as well as all other Industrial Schools is managed, as regards dietary, clothing, etc., according to rules laid down by the Inspector of Industrial Schools appointed by the Government, who examines our accounts every year, and sees that the regulations laid down are strictly complied with. And if the Grand Jury will refer to his reports for the years 1885, 1886, and 1887, they will find the average cost per child, per year, in our school for the three years was £18 0s. 9½d., including all items of expenditure, and upwards of £17 without including anything for rent of the school or interest on building debt. The Government allowance of 5s. per week for each child would only amount to £13 a year, and when supplemented by the grant of 1s. 6d. per child per week, heretofore allowed by the Grand Jury, would only amount to £16 18s. per child per year.

I feel convinced the Grand Jury, when making the before-mentioned order at last Spring Assizes, believed the 5s. a week allowed by the Government for each child was sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses, and now that the true facts are laid before them I am equally certain they will not adhere to said order, but will continue the grant of 1s. 6d. per week for each child committed in future to our school, and by so doing they will enable us to give the preference to County Wexford children to fill vacancies as they occur in our Institution as we have hitherto done.

Trusting you will be so kind as to bring this letter under the notice of the Grand Jury at next Summer Assizes,

After discussion of the reports submitted, it was proposed by Mr. Cookman, seconded by Mr. Gibson, and resolved—

"That 1s. 6d. be given for admission of each child to St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Schools until next Assizes, with exception of two children to be admitted without payment by the county, so that the case in dispute may be brought before the judge for his decision."

Ordered—That the accounts of Industrial and Reformatory Schools be made out up to the 31st May and 30th November in each year.

Spring Assizes, 1889.

The committee report that there were, it appears, 22 children discharged up to November 30. and 25 admitted, one boy being sent to St. Kyran's. That the presentments amount to £332 10s 8d as against £431 16s in the previous half year. This diminution is in some degree owing to the fact that under the resolution of last assize the accounts were closed on November 30, while in the previous years they were closed on December 31st, thus allowing only five months in the half year instead of six. To form a correct comparison, about £66 should be added to the amount applied for, so that the presentment would be £398, as compared with £431. Referring to the past decisions of the Grand Jury on this subject, the committee find that in the report presented to the Grand Jury at Spring Assizes, 1887, it was stated that "the debt for which the Grand Jury is responsible was in the case of St. Michael's £692 10s 1d, and in the case of St. Aidan's £182 3s 4d on December 31, 1886," and that "these sums will be further reduced by the presentments made at last Summer Assizes, now to be paid." The presentments since, including that referred to as passed in Summer, 1886, are as follows:—

In the letter from the Manager of St. Michael's, dated July 19th, 1888, it would seem that she lays great stress on the fact that £287 10s. 4d still remains due by the Institution. The Committee have no means of knowing how this has occurred; all they know is that, taking the statements of the Managers of these two schools as correct, in their report to the Grand Jury at Spring Assizes, 1885, that the debt on St. Michael's was then £1,211 19s 11d, and on St. Aidan's £539 0s 10d (the presentments of the previous Summer Assizes not being yet paid). A sufficient sum has since been presented to pay the entire principal, and leave the large balances as above to the credit of the schools. The Committee would remind the Grand Jury that any agreement entered into between the Grand Jury and the Managers is, in their opinion, restricted to children whose admission has been once presented for, and that it is open for the Grand Jury to make a new arrangement at any assizes in respect of children admitted to them since the last account was furnished; while, on the other hand, it is open to the Managers to refuse admission to any child for whom the Grand Jury may decline to present. It may be a question whether the Managers would forego the Government Grant of 5s per week, because the Grand Jury refuse to give the 1s 6d; but it is not one which the Grand Jury are at all called on to take into account. The Committee would remark that if the presentment be stopped, the effect would be gradual and slow, as some of the children are committed for ten years, so that presentments of some amount would have to be passed for the latest committals for many years. The Committee have no information as to the two children which, on Mr. Cookman's motion, were to be committed without payment.

REPORT ON INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The committee report that since the last assizes there were 10 admissions and 14 discharges, and that the amount present for is £432 6s 10d. As in some of the schools seven months are included in this half-year, the amount is considerably larger than in the spring, but almost identical with that presented a year since. The committee report that in consequence of the order made last assizes "That we apply to the Judge for directions as to whether the Grand Jury are bound to present for any child sent to St. Michael's and St. Aidan's Industrial Schools after this assizes," the question was argued before Mr. Justice Holmes by Sergeant Hemphill for the Grand Jury, and Mr. Lynch for the schools. After the other business of the assizes had concluded and the Grand Jury had been discharged, in consequence of which only two or three were present. The following summary of the Judge's decision is taken from the report in *The People* newspaper of March 20, 1889:—

"The Judge began by stating that the question was an important one, and he would not like to decide it without taking the opinion of the other Judges. His views were that the Industrial Schools Act enabled the Grand Jury to enter into a contract with the managers of Industrial Schools in a particular way; that the contract entered into by the Grand Jury was a contract limited as regards numbers, but not limited as to time. Mr. Lynch argued that it was a continual contract which could not be put an end to by the contracting parties unless steps were taken for the purpose of withdrawing the certificate from the schools altogether. He (the Judge) thought it so important that probably if it were necessary to decide it, he would reserve it for the consideration of the judges, so that a decision might be given upon it once for all for guidance hereafter. He would be disposed to think nothing was said with regard to time that the contract would be determined by either side by reasonable notice given. He said Mr. Lynch had not convinced him that it was a contract of that character and he did not decide that it was a contract of that character. Assuming that it was, the Grand Jury might give notice that the contract entered into in 1872 will determine in a year or six months without prejudice to the persons previously introduced, or the manager might give similar notice to the grand jury, but it seemed to him that one party could not modify the terms of the contract without the consent of the other, and he could not find anything in any of the resolutions of the grand jury giving notice to the other side that in future the contract of 1872 would come to an end altogether, and from that time they would not pay anything. He did not accept Mr. Lynch's proposition, he did not know if it be the law. If it were the law he would not be inclined to give a decision off hand, and it was not to be assumed he was giving any decision on that. At present he thought the presentment should be passed." The committee remark that the Judge gave no decision except as to the passing of the presentment at that assizes, but he indicates very plainly that in order to rescind the contract, the first step is to give reasonable notice—a year or six months—and if the grand jury are not prepared to pay for all children committed in future and for all time, they will have to pass a resolution giving such or adhere to that resolution and refuse to pass any presentment for children committed after the expiration of the time named in the notice, upon which decision the managers can apply to the Judge to compel the Grand Jury to pass the presentment, when an opportunity will be given to have a legal decision of the highest authority obtained. The committee would remark that no member of the Grand Jury has at any time objected to paying for children actually committed. The objection has been confined to this—that from 1874 down to the present time the presentments have been "made mainly in respect of building and other charges incurred at the outset of the schools" (see report 1874, summer)

and that a sufficient sum to cover these outlays has now been presented, together with a large sum over and above this, which may represent interest on these outlays. They would also remind the Grand Jury that the question of continuing the grants on the grounds mentioned in the letter of the manager of St. Michael's, of July 19, 1888 (which are there fairly stated) is totally different from the question as put by Mr. Lynch—viz., that once having contracted to present for an industrial school, the Grand Jury are bound to continue to present until and unless steps be taken to withdraw the certificates altogether from the school. The Committee have endeavoured to lay the case fully before the Grand Jury. They do not desire to offer any opinion as to the course to be pursued, but would prefer to have the question fully argued without such opinion.

Schedule of tolls, dues, licenses and wharfage charges authorized by the Commissioners of Public Works, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of her Majesty's Treasury to be levied at in the county of pursuant to the Act 16 & 17 Vic., c 136, s 7.

I. Tonnage Dues on Shipping Vessels arriving for the purpose of loading or discharging cargo, for every ton register, 0s 3d. Any vessel loading or discharging cargo less in weight than per register tonnage, to pay only on the actual tonnage loaded or discharged, provided the minimum dues are not less than one halfpenny per register ton. Vessels resorting to the Pier or Harbour to lie up or for shelter, to pay for every ton register one halfpenny per ton per week, or for any part of a week.

II.—Boat Licenses.—All fishing boats of 5 tons and upwards, including boats not registered under the Merchant Shipping Act, to pay sixpence per ton for the whole or any part of a year. All fishing and row boats under 5 tons to pay a licence fee of Two Shillings per year or for any part of a year. Strange boats entering the Harbour for shelter or wind-bound to pay One Shilling for any period not exceeding thirty days.

III.—Wharfage or Quayage.—Grain, Potatoes, Butter or other Agricultural Produce, Guano, Manufactured Manure, Timber, dressed, per ton. Stone and General Merchandise, not otherwise specified, for every ton or part of a ton, 0s 3d. Coal and Culm, 0s 2d. Turf, Manure, Sand, Limestone, Slates and undressed Stones, 0s 1d. For each Horse or Head of Cattle, 0s 2d. For each Sheep or Pig, 0s 0½d. Fish 2d. in the £ on sale value.

The Committee report that the admissions during the half year have been nine, and that the discharges have been 17. The Managers of St. Aidan's and St. Michael's Schools have distinguished in their returns between those children for whom 1s. 6d. per week is paid by the County and those whom 1s. per week.

Spring Assizes, 1893

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS

We, the members of a committee of the Grand Jury directed to report on the number of children admitted to, discharged from, and at present maintained in the various Industrial Schools presented for by this Grand Jury for the period 1st June to 30th November, 1892, are unable to furnish the particulars required, inasmuch as with the exception of St. Michael's, Wexford, there are no reports furnished by these Schools on these points. We have examined and compared the amounts presented for and recommend that they should be passed. We recommend for the consideration of the Grand Jury, that in future a report on the particulars called for accompany the presentments in each case.

Summer Assizes, 1893.

The Committee appointed to examine the Accounts and Report of the various Industrial Schools for the half year ended 31st May, 1893, find that the Accounts are correct, and beg to furnish a statement of the number of admissions, discharges and deaths during that period, and the number maintained on the 31st May, 1893. A blank form should be filled up, with their numbers, by each School.

Spring Assizes, 1894.

Ordered—That not more than one back payment to contractors be left on the book.

Ordered—That the Sergeants of the Royal Irish Constabulary acting as *ex officio* Inspectors of Weights and Measures from time to time, be the parties authorised by the Grand Jury, to act under the Food and Drugs Act in their respective districts.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Ordered—That at each Assizes we request the Managers of the Industrial Schools to send a return stating the names of the children discharged and the employment obtained for them.

The Committee appointed to examine the Industrial Schools accounts report that there are at present 174 children maintained in the schools paid for by the County Wexford. We recommend that in future a form of return, similar to that furnished by the Meath Girl's Industrial School be adopted by the other schools. We find that several schools have not complied with the suggestion made to that effect last year by giving a return of the discharged and dead. We, therefore, have no manner of going into full details, as would be desirable.

Summer Assizes, 1894.

We find that thirteen out of the seventeen schools have not furnished the additional information required, and the remainder, though supplying the information, have not done so in the manner requested by your committee at last assizes. We desire to bring to notice that in Baltimore School, W. Smyth was committed in January, 1884, and not admitted till November, 1887, an interval of nearly four years. He was committed for six one-twelfth years, and is apparently still there. We desire to call attention to the Cork magistrates having committed three girls to the Cork school belonging to Taghmon, County Wexford, for whom a charge of 2s. 6d. each is claimed. These girls, we submit, are chargeable to the County Cork. Highpark School furnishes no report or account, merely the fact that there is one boy therein. We suggest that to insure uniformity copies of the desired (enclosed) form be sent to the various schools.

Spring Assizes, 1895.

We have examined the accounts of the different Industrial Schools, and find that the Managers have complied with our recommendation that the destination of the children should be furnished when discharged or licensed. We have corrected some omissions in the Presentment book as follows:—£41 14s should be £24 19s, as appears by the Danesfort Industrial School. Cork, Rathdrum and St. Kieran's charge 2s, all the other Schools charge 2s 6d. We also draw your attention to three Byrne girls, natives of this county, committed by Cork magistrates to the Industrial Home, Cork, and whose maintenance amount to £6 2s 6d, is charged to the county Wexford.

Summer Assizes, 1895.

We have received no report from the House of Charity, Drogheda, and Danesfort, Co. Cork, nor from the Manager of the Meath Protestant Girls' Industrial School, for which latter the amount of £3 0s 9d is asked. There are at present from the reports before us 146 children presented for in Industrial Schools, 51 being boys and 95 girls. The admissions were 12, the discharges 10, and 1 death. The Committee see nothing further to call the attention of the Grand Jury. The Clerks of Petty Sessions to be noticed to send in particulars of committals in future.

Spring Assizes, 1895.

We have examined the accounts of the Industrial Schools and consider them correct. There are nine admissions and nine discharges.

Summer Assizes, 1896.

ORDERED—That the Managers of Industrial Schools be requested to furnish in their accounts the places to which children of the county Wexford are transferred—the destinations to which they are discharged and licensed. These particulars have been repeatedly called for, but not supplied; also, when new forms have been supplied, in some Schools the old forms are still used.

We have examined the reports of the Industrial Schools and have to report that we find the sums claimed by the several Schools correct, save Glencree, which claims the sum of 10s., balance of last amount, and for Danesfort the amount is furnished to November, 1895, for the sum of £17 6s. Query, has this been paid, as it does not appear in the Schedule. St. Aidan's returns four discharged, but no mention of their destination as ordered. St. Michael's returns three discharged. Their destination should have been entered on the form, not on a separate paper. Artane returns three transfers, but no mention of place of transfer; two licensed but no explanation to whom licensed. Your committee have again to complain that the admissions and discharges are not perfectly entered in the forms, and most of the Schools still furnish the old form of account although supplied with proper forms by the Secretary of your grand Jury.

Spring Assizes, 1897.

Ordered—That this Grand Jury is of opinion that the power of the County Surveyor in initiating prosecutions is in no way limited or curtailed by any previous resolutions, except so far as he is bound to report with a view to prosecution—those contractors at any rate who have been twice consecutively disallowed.

MALICIOUS INJURIES.

Ordered—That the hearing of applications for compensation for malicious injuries be henceforth held on the second day of the meeting of the Grand Jury at 11 o'clock, a.m.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

We, the committee appointed by the Grand Jury to inspect and report on the accounts and claims of the Industrial Schools against this county, having examined all the accounts, find them correct, and, further, that all particulars as to the children have been supplied by the different managers on the forms as required. The total amount due being £265 12s 5d, particulars of which are annexed:—St Aidan's, New Ross, 3 admissions; 1 discharged; amount, £28 2s 5d. Artane, Dublin, 2 discharged; 4 licensed; amount, £70 12s 2d. St Michael's, Wexford, 3 admitted; 4 discharged; amount, £91 14s 6d. Cappoquin, no change; amount, £9 16s. St Julian's, Letterfrack, 2 transferred from Rathdrum; amount, £6 10s 8d. Limerick, 1 discharged; amount, £3 8s 8d. Blackrock, no change; amount, £6 10s 8d. St Joseph's, Clonmel, amount, £3 5s 4d. Meath Protestant Girls, Bray, no change; amount, £1 19s 2d. St Patrick's, Kilkenny, no change; amount, £7 7s 6d. Danesfort, Cork, no change; amount, £26 2s 10d. St Kevin's Reformatory, Glencree, 3 discharged; no admission; amount, £10 2s 6d. Total, £265 12s 5d.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS REPORT.

Summer Assizes, 1897

The Committee report that in the half year ending 31st May, 1897, there were 46 boys and 85 girls in the Industrial Schools, and one boy in Glencree Reformatory. Of these there were 84 girls between St. Michael's and St. Aidan's, in this county. There were 9 admissions and 6 discharges. The total presentment for the half year is £260 8s 8d. This, with the amount for the previous half-year, makes £526 1s 1d for the year, which is much higher than the average for some years back. In the Artane report one boy was re-admitted from license, but no reason given. One boy was transferred from Kilkenny, but no reason given.

St. Michael's 4 girls were admitted and 5 discharged, but no names given. In Kilkenny report one boy transferred; no reason given. Letterfrack—Two boys transferred from Rathdrum; no date or reason given. Waterford—Manager had two girls committed, but asks what payment will be made, showing there can be no contract with that school. In her letter of the 7th inst she asks for 2s 6d per girl, same as Kilkenny. But only boys are committed there, for whom 2s 6d is paid. Only 1s 6d is paid for girls to the Meath Industrial School, Bray, and the Committee consider that sufficient for Waterford school. They suggest that, to avoid unnecessary papers, any explanatory remarks can be put on the face of the report. They desire to bring to notice that very often there may be no vacancies in the County Wexford schools when girls are committed, owing to the fact that the schools can take in girls committed from other counties at 2s 6d each; thus the county is put to the extra expense of committing girls to other schools. Of course, this arrangement affects all the counties with Industrial Schools. But it would be better for each county to retain its own girls, and thus reduce the county cess respectively. The Committee find that the order for all Petty Sessions Clerks in the county to send in a return of committals is not carried out by all. If there are no committals, a blank return should be furnished.
