"A patient in the Infirmary named William Barber became a Roman Catholic on Friday 30th inst. In connection with this matter Rev Canon Lyster Protestant Chaplain to the Workhouse wrote:-

"I should be obliged if you would kindly bring the following circumstances under the notice of your Board. Mr William Barber Milehouse has been for some time an Inmate of the Infirmary being registered as a Protestant. I have visited him regularly. On going to see him Friday last I found him very ill. From his appearance I should say he had an apoplectic stroke. He was only semiconscious and was
incapable

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incapable of any intelligent utterance. I was subsequently informed that on the previous evening a priest was sent for, and that he had been received into the Roman Catholic Church. Now of course a man in the full possession of his faculties has a perfect right to change his religion if he pleases, but I submit that it was simply a farce for any man in the condition Mr Barber was to change his religion. A short time ago he told me he wished to see his own Rector, Rev Mr Squires of Monant, and when Mr Squires went to see him he told him, that if he did he wished to be buried in Monant Church Yard, as nothing would ever induce him to change his religion. I understand his son who is a Roman Catholic came to see him on Thursday evening, and that he asked the Master to send for the Priest. The Master informed me that he asked Mr Barber did he wish this, and he said yes. Judging from his condition when I saw him on Friday I should say that he was incapable of understanding what was said to him. Mr Squire's saw him yesterday in the presence of the Master. He is now a little better and asked him if he knew what he was doing on Thursday. He replied that he did not, as the Master can testify. I desire therefore to enter my protest against a so-called change of religion carried out under such circumstances."

Mr Lett. said the Master should have the Rector before the man changed his religion, and let the two clergymen be with him. It was then decided to hear the Master, who made the following

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following statement. On Thursday evening the 29th April at about 4 o'clock, Mr Samuel Barber called to my office and said that his father who was a patient in the infirmary, wished to become a Catholic. I said we would go and see him. We proceeded to Mr Barber's bedside. The son asked him if he were prepared to become a Catholic. "Yes," replied the father, "I would be glad if you would go and bring me the priest." Some other words passed, and to make sure of the thing, I asked the man myself if he knew what he was doing, and he said he was perfectly satisfied. The son then went for the priest and brought him to the father on Friday morning. The priest came to me first and asked me what had happened. I told him exactly what had occurred on Thursday evening, the priest said to me will you go in now and see Mr Barber, and ask him if he is satisfied to become a Roman Catholic. I did as I was requested, and the man told me that he was. Then of course I could not prevent the priest going in at the man's own request. Shortly after that the Rev Canon Lyster was with Mr Barber. It was on the same day Friday. He went away without coming to me to say anything about it. Then I thought everything was all right, when the Canon did not come to speak to me.

On Monday last, Canon Lyster came to the House, and asked if I were aware that Mr Barber ^{had} become a Catholic. I said I was perfectly aware of that. The Canon said Mr Barber must not have been in all his senses, and that when he (Canon Lyster) saw the man on the

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the previous Friday he appeared quite stupid and looked as if he were after having a fit. He said he would see the Rev Mr Squires about it. I happened to be in the ward at the time the Rev Mr Squires came. I was walking away and leaving Rev Mr Squires and Mr Barber together, when Rev Mr Squires said I had better not go until the thing was cleared up. I remained then and he asked me a few questions. He asked Mr Barber what religion was he, and he replied a Roman Catholic. Then he wanted to know from him why he changed his religion, and asked him to give some reason. Mr Barber did not say anything to him. He put the question several times, and then after some time asked him again why he become a Catholic. Mr Barber said he did not know what he was doing. Then Mr Squires asked him if he wished to remain a Roman Catholic, and he said he did for the present anyhow. Then Mr Squires wrote down on a paper words about what he Mr Barber had said on Friday and got him to sign it. Mr Squires handed the paper over to me to witness it. I said I could not do it under the circumstances. Mr Squires then put him a leading question, and said "do you wish to remain a Roman Catholic?" "I do" said Mr Barber, and "don't wish to see you any more." Then Mr Squires asked him if he might write to his daughter and tell her that her father is a Roman Catholic. He said "yes". "These are the very words that passed and the two of us came away together. It was then decided

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decided to send a message to the Medical officer asking if the man was in a fit condition to be interviewed.

The Master having consulted the Medical officer said the latter's opinion was that Mr Barber might be asked one or two questions but no more. The Doctor was of opinion that too many should not go near him as he was dying. It was decided not to interview the man owing to his condition Mr Lett asked the Master, was it the patient himself or the son who asked for the priest first. The Master replied the son mentioned it to me first, and then the man himself asked for the priest

Bringing under the notice of the Guardians the desirability of taking steps to meet a possible shortage in the coal supply in this country in the coming winter. As the Guardians are no doubt aware there is a great demand on the Coal Supply of the United Kingdom for carrying on the War, while at the same time there is a considerable shortage of miners owing to the large number of this class who have joined the Army, and it is more than probable that the difficulties in obtaining coal for use in Ireland which were experienced last winter will be repeated next winter and in possibly a more acute form. In these circumstances it appears to be a matter of National importance that as much turf as possible should be cut during the present season and accordingly the Board would strongly urge the Guardians to take all the steps possible to secure that the turf owners in their District would save a plentiful supply not only for their own use but also for sale. The Board would suggest that the Guardians should cause notices to be posted throughout the Union urging the turf owners in their District to adopt this course.

Order."There are very few turf owners in this District. As regards the Coal in the Workhouse, during the summer, fires are only to be maintained

in the Nursery, Infirmary and for Cooking and Laundry purposes."

RE LEACY V GUARDIANS.

Messrs:- J.A.Sinnott & Coz, Solicitors wrote as follows:- "Referring to the Civil Bill served at the suit of Mr. John Leacy of Slaney Street here for £3 : 4/- for goods (to wit) Flannel supplied by him to the Guardians, we beg to inform you that unless we receive the amount by Saturday week next (the 15th. May inst.) we shall have the process entered for hearing as we cannot understand in face of the order of the Board why this amount has not been paid long since. Kindly let us have cheque for the amount together with 11/- costs of this Process and also please let us have copy of the minute directing payment of the amount (or endorsing Mr. Power's action in ordering the Flannel) otherwise it will be necessary to serve notice to produce the Minute Book should the case go to a hearing."

The Clerk stated that when this Bill came before the Finance Committee in the first instance they could not pass it, as the item did not appear on block of Order Book, neither was there any authority given for it to be procured. Some short time ago, the Master had reported to the Board that he had urgently required the material and that he had told Mr. Leacy to send it up, but that he forgot reporting the matter to the Board afterwards. The Board sanctioned Mr. Power's action, but the Finance Committee refused to pass the Account, that was how the matter stood at present.

In reply to a query, the Clerk stated that the matter would not come under the notice of the Auditor until the Account was paid, the Local Government Board had already intimated to the Board of Guardians that the matter had been referred to the Auditor.

The Clerk stated that he had received replies with reference to above matter from Father Fitzhenry and Samuel Barbour.

By direction of Chairman the latter's reply was first read as follows:-

Milehouse, Enniscorthy,

May 11th, 1915.

To the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians.

Gentlemen—When my father sent for me on Thursday evening, 29th April, he was in his faculties, and explained to me that he wished me to bring Father Fitzhenry to him. It had been arranged by my father and myself some time ago that later on I was to bring the priest to him. The reason my father did not change his religion sooner was this, that his daughter was sending money from America for him regular to Rev Mr Squires, and of course he knew the minute he changed, the money would be stopped. When I saw my father on Friday night, May 7th, his last words to me were that I was to write to his daughter in America and tell her that he was happy dying a Roman Catholic, and wished her to become a Roman Catholic also and die one—I remain, yours respectfully,

SAMUEL BARBOUR.

Rev. Father Fitzhenry's reply was then read as appears on next page:-

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St. Aidan's, Enniscorthy,

May 12, 1915.

To the Chairman and members of the
Board of Guardians, Enniscorthy.

Dear Sirs—The facts about Barber's reception into the Church are so clear, and now so well known, that no reply from me is needed to Canon Lyster's "protest." Courtesy to your board, however, urges me to set forth the facts again. On April 29th Barber sent for me by his son and by the master of the workhouse. For seeing what has since occurred, I did not visit him till nearly 24 hours had elapsed after getting the call. Even then I did not go into the ward until by the master I made certain that he still wanted me, and that all due formalities, legal and otherwise, had been observed. When beside his bed, in the master's presence, I asked Barber did he send for me, and did he want me about his religion and his soul. It was only when Barber had twice distinctly said so that I dismissed the master and began my work. Dr. Furlong saw Barber one hour before me, and he is prepared to testify Barber was then in full possession of his faculties. Canon Lyster saw Barber about two hours after his reception into the Church, and though those around him are prepared to testify that he had no fit or mental collapse, I would not be at all surprised if the Canon found the old man more or less sleepy and exhausted after putting forth the tremendous effort required at his age to make the Confession of his whole life and the other acts required before he could be received into the Church. 'Tis possible too that Barber did not encourage an interview with the Canon, and simulated an exhausted condition as the easiest way out of an unwished-for interference. During my work the clearness of the old man's memory, understanding and will surprised me almost as much as the earnestness and energy displayed in that hour. It is a well-known fact that we do not seek converts—they seek us. The ordinary law of the Church requires that about 40 days' instruction be given to each convert before his reception. The priest cannot receive a convert without the Bishop's permission and power. When a man is dying these rules are relaxed, but no one is received unless he clearly makes the request, and clearly understands what he is doing. It is a pity that in this case ugly and base allegations have been made. During a convert's instruction he is always exhorted to tell his minister and his Protestant friends. If he does not do that it is his affair. Before Barber sent for me he realised not only that his spiritual life had been a farce, but also that he would one day meet the most terrible of all tragedies unless he did what his conscience had long dictated should be done. Even Rev Mr. Squires must have suspected in the past that the man's mind was uneasy when it was thought well to have Barber's declaration that, no matter what happened, he would die a Protestant. On Sunday May 2nd, Barber, unasked, told an Enniscorthy gentleman, who will testify on oath if necessary, that he had become a Catholic and was very happy. On Monday, 3rd, Rev Mr Squires attended Barber, and spoke to him about religion, though not sent for. Gentlemen, is this according to law? Barber assured Rev Mr Squires that he was a Catholic; yet he pressed him with questions and worried him into signing a document. Gentlemen, is this according to law? Forsooth he was quite clear in his intellect on Monday; yet, after the signature, Barber told Rev Mr Squires—see Press report—that he was a Catholic, that he intended to remain a Catholic, and that Rev Mr Squires was to write to his daughter to tell her he had become a Catholic, and, finally, that Barber did not wish to see Rev Mr Squires any more. From April 30th to May 7th he asked several times for the priest, and gave him whenever he asked.—I remain,

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Mr Lett asked what was the law on the matter. He wanted to know if the regulations had been carried out in a legal manner. In the first place he desired to say that he (Mr Lett) would have preferred if Mr Barber, jun., had shown as much interest in his father for some years past as he had at the last moment. The father had been in the hospital since the 8th February last, and the son never came near him until the day he was dying. That, at all events, was what appeared from an entry of the porter's books. If the son had shown as much interest in his father and had as much thought for his (the father's) present and future welfare he might have kept him at home and done all that had happened in the infirmary, and not have such a slur cast on the institution. It was a slur on the house to have such a thing cropping up. He asked the members to put themselves in his position as a Protestant member. Suppose they had a Protestant master and nurses, and that such a thing cropped up with a Catholic patient: what would they say? He (Mr. Lett) knew what could be said. He considered that this case had put the members of the board in a very false position.

Mr Murphy (Enniscorthy)—If a man wishes to change his religion he has a perfect right to do so. Mr Lett—I don't want to prevent any man from doing so. It doesn't matter to the poor man now. He is dead and gone. Mr Murphy (Enniscorthy)—He is happy in heaven now, I hope.

Mr Lett—Amen. I ask you to put yourselves in the position of those on the other side. The son never came here until the man was dying. Mr Murphy (Enniscorthy)—He didn't die for a week after that. You seemingly want to chastise the son.

Mr Lett said he understood that the law was that where a patient registered as belonging to a certain religion, expressed a desire to make a change, it was the master's duty in the first instance, before sending for a clergyman or anybody else, to bring the matter before the board.

Mr O'Connor—I disagree with you altogether there. Mr Lett—That is my reading of the law. If a patient is in a dying condition the master can use his own discretion, but not otherwise. He is also bound to acquaint the patient's clergyman before the change takes place. I want to know if the master did that before going for Father Fitzhenry.

Mr Murphy (Enniscorthy)—The master didn't go for Father Fitzhenry. Mr Barber's own son went. Mr Lett—I am talking about the master's duty. I ignore the son altogether.

The Clerk read the regulations on the point. In cases where patients expressed a desire to change their religion it was the master's duty to report to the board, but in urgent cases the master was to use his discretion in communicating with the clergymen desired by the patient.

Chairman—The only mistake that I see the master made was to allow any person, no matter who, to tamper with the patient after his desire about a clergyman had been satisfied. I don't care whether or not these people were of the man's own persuasion in years gone by, they had no right to be allowed to tamper with the man when he had made a change, and when, furthermore, they had no earthly business whatever with him. I remember we had a somewhat similar case some years ago, and what we did was to appoint a committee to interview the person concerned. We couldn't do that in Barber's case as the man was dying on the last meeting day. Mr Milne—That is very fair.

Mr Lett—My contention is that Canon Lyster is wrong in saying that the man was in a dying condition the master outstepped his duty by calling in a clergyman before reporting to the board.

Mr O'Connor—He must have been in a dying condition when the doctor would not approve of a committee of the board questioning the man.

On the motion of Mr. Bennett seconded by Mr. Cleary, the Board decided that the necessary formalities had been carried out as presented.

Mr. Lett dissented on the grounds that he considered the Clerk did not do his duty in the case as presented.

RE INSPECTION OF INSANE INMATES.

The Secretary, Lunatic Asylums, Dublin Castle wrote forwarding memorandum of the inspection of the insane Inmates of the Union made by Dr. T. J. Considine on the 14th. May:-

Cepy.

"As the result of my visit to this Workhouse to-day, I should like to draw the attention of the Board of Guardians to a few matters worthy of their consideration. The Sanitary Accommodation is very poor, and the introduction of flush water closets would greatly improve the institution.

I understand the drinking water has been condemned, and this important

question should be attended to without delay. At present the drinking water has to be boiled before using. On the female side a bathroom, with hot and cold water supply is badly required in the body of the House. The Bathroom attached to the Infirmary is scarcely suitable for the purpose, being situated in a yard and thereby causing risk to the old and infirm women, who have to go out into the cold after getting a warm bath before they can reach their dayroom again. A suitable bathroom in the Infirmary would be more in keeping with the requirements of the Institution. With regard to the bedding- straw ticks are used on the Female Side, while mattresses are provided on the Male Side. I should like to see hair mattresses and spring beds supplied to all. I do not wish to urge the Guardians to incur any unnecessary expense, but I find that even in the poorest parts of the West of Ireland an effort is made to introduce these articles by degrees and I hope that the Enniscorthy Board will do likewise in the near future. More attention to the changing of Sheets on the Male Side is required, and I regret to say that I found vermin on one bed during my inspection. The Twenty females and nine males who are classified as of unsound mind were found clean and appear to receive attention. The Diet Scale appears sufficiently good."



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The Master wrote as follows:- "I have to report that a woman named Mary Carty, Drumgold, came to the House with a Child on 18th. instant, and she having no Relieving Officer's Ticket or Medical Officer's Certificate I refused admission. She stated that Mr. Fortune of Drumgold sent her with it and that he had arranged for its admission. Not knowing Mr. Fortune, I told her to take the child to Mr. Fortune. She then left. On 21st. about 9-30 A.M. a man called to my office to see me, he gave the name of William Fortune, farmer, Drumgold, he looked excited and demanded of me my authority of refusing admission to a child he sent to the Union and if I did not admit it he had the Police outside. I went to the Hall where a woman named Eliza Cegley, Drumgold had a child in her arms. I asked him had he a ticket and he said he had not. I told him to get a ticket and I would admit the Child, he went away to get a ticket leaving the woman with the child, he came back after some time and had no ticket and ordered the woman that was in charge of the Child home and to leave the child there. I then informed the Police who compelled him to take the Child away. I would thank the Board to say what to do if he send the child back again or if similar cases turn up."

T.B. Moffat Esq., Solicitor, wrote as follows:- "I am instructed by William Fortune of Drumgold, to apply to you as representing the Guardians of the District for a statement as to why the Relieving Officer and one of the Officials of the Board refuse relief to an unfortunate Child which was brought to Mr. Fortune's field by a woman named Belger and left there. Mr. Fortune had the child placed for safety in the house belonging to a woman named Mrs. Carty, as otherwise its life would have been in danger, and then applied to the Relieving Officer who promised to take charge of the child and have it placed in the Union. Subsequently the Relieving Officer refused to do as promised and the Master of the Workhouse has refused to admit the Child. I am informed that the Mother of the Child left the District, and I should have thought that out of common humanity the Guardians would have at once taken steps to provide for the safety of this unfortunate baby. I would be glad to know from you on what grounds the Relieving Officer or the Master refuse admittance to the Child, and I would be glad of an early reply, as I intend placing the matter before the Local

Government Board, and ask for a Sworn Inquiry unless the answer is satisfactory."

The Master stated that he would not exercise his discretion and admit the Child in this case, as he had not satisfactory evidence to show whether the Child was Destitute or not.



RE COST OF MAINTENANCE IN EXTERN INSTITUTION.

Secretary Catholic Institution for Deaf and Dumb, Dublin wrote as follows:- "My Committee have had under consideration the heavy increase in our expenses; last year our Expenditure exceeded Income by a very large amount, and owing to the abnormal conditions now prevailing there will be a large deficit in the future. The Education of the Deaf and Dumb must of necessity be more expensive and tedious than that of the Children gifted with speech, and in order to maintain our Institution in its present state of efficiency and provide for the additional cost of Education, Food, Clothing &c, it is necessary our Income should be increased. Under these circumstances my Committee regret being reluctantly obliged to fix, that in future the amount of Pension paid for each Child under 18 years of Age shall be £20 instead of £15 as heretofore. When in the year 1864, my Committee arranged to charge £15 per annum for each child under 18 years of age, the number of Pupils in our Institution was 225; at present our number is 373, viz:- 324 Children under 18 years and 49 over that age, whilst the amount we receive in Subscriptions has decreased by over 60 per cent. I would point out that in Schools for the Deaf and Dumb in England the minimum amount contributed towards the maintenance of each child, by

the Board of Guardians, and the Educational Authorities, is £30 per annum. In addition to which a yearly grant is given by the Government (this does not apply to Ireland). I need hardly mention that since the foundation of our Institution, the lot of the Deaf Mute has been brightened; by the Education imparted they have been made self supporting, and able to take their place in Society. Were it not for the kindness of Boards of Guardians in contributing towards the cost of their maintenance and Education, many would have been deprived of this inestimable blessing, and would have become a burden on the Ratepayers. Will you kindly notify your Board, and obtain their sanction to pay the increased Pension, which in the case of those at present in our Institution will take effect at the expiration of the current half-year's Pension."

Stating that they have received the report of their Medical Inspector, Dr. Browne, relating to his recent inspection of the Dispensary Districts of the Union and enclosing extracts therefrom with the request that the several important matters therein referred to might receive the careful attention of the Guardians. Also stating that the Guardians should at once obtain from each Medical Officer, a list of the names of the unvaccinated children longest in default, with a view to the institution of legal proceedings under the Vaccination Acts.

Clonroche Dispensary District.....The Dispensary records are not returned punctually to the Medical Officer. No vaccination has been performed in the District for the past three years. The number of Vaccination Defaulters in last report was 649. The Vaccination Acts are not administered efficiently in the District.

Enniscorthy Dispensary District.....The Dispensary Records are not returned punctually to the Medical Officer. The list of all the instruments provided for Dispensary use has not been recently submitted to the Clerk of the Union for his examination. The Dispensary Midwife's Register of cases is not submitted regularly to the Guardians for examination. The Notices Form N have not been duly posted at the Dispensary and throughout the District. No Vaccinations have been performed during the past year. The number of Vaccination Defaulters returned in last report was 3000. The Vaccination Acts are not efficiently administered in the District. The Dispensary building requires limewashing, painting and some repairs.

Ferns Dispensary District.....The Notices Form N have not been duly posted at the Dispensary and throughout the District. No vaccination have been performed in the District recently. The number of Vaccination Defaulters returned in last report was 410. The Vaccination Acts are not efficiently administered in the District. Children are not always brought to the Medical Officer for inspection on 8th. day after Vaccination. The Dispensary building is in a bad state of repair. There is no yard attached to the building. There are no sanitary conveniences in the Dispensary for the use of the patients. The Dispensary Residence requires some repairs and water laid on to the Water Closet and Bath. The Medicine supplies for the Dispensary are only ordered half-yearly. Some of the Medicines require to be replenished.

Killann Dispensary District.....The Dispensary records are not returned punctually to the Medical Officer after examination by the Guardians. There has been no vaccinations in the District for the past two years. 528 Vaccination Defaulters were returned in last report. The Vaccination Acts are not efficiently administered in the District.

Newtownbarry Dispensary District.....The Midwife's Register of Cases is not submitted regularly each month to the Guardians for examination. The Notices Form N have not been duly posted at the Dispensary nor throughout the District. No Vaccinations have been performed in the District during the year until recently. 274 Defaulters returned in last Report. The Vaccination Acts are not efficiently administered in the District. Medicine supplies are ordered half-yearly.

Oulart Dispensary District.....The Dispensary Records are not returned punctually to the Medical Officer after examination by the Guardians. The Midwife's Register of cases is not submitted regularly to the Guardians for examination. The Notices Form N have not been posted at the Dispensary nor throughout the District. Only a few vaccinations have been performed recently in the District. 479 Defaulters were returned in last report of the Medical Officer. The Vaccination Acts are not efficiently administered in the District. The Dispensary Building at Ballaghkeene is in a very bad state of repair. A temporary Dispensary has been obtained pending the repair being carried out at the permanent Dispensary Buildings. There are no Sanitary conveniences for the use of Patients attending the Dispensary. The Medicine Supplies are ordered half-yearly.

Order. "Medical Officers to be requested to furnish necessary lists of Vaccination Defaulters. Carriers of Dispensary Books, Medical Officers and Midwives to be notified that their Books must be submitted on the First Thursday of each Month in future for examination. Carriers to bring in the Books on that morning and take them back to Medical Officer same evening. Attention of Relieving Officers to be called to the Posting of Form N. Necessary Repairs referred to are being carried out."

Forwarding a Communication and a copy of their reply to a Woman named Eileen Carroll on the question of Outdoor Relief.

Copy of Letter.

"I now take the liberty of writing to you 5 of us and my Mother were in receipt of 5/- per week from the parish of Enniscorthy for two years since my father died. My Mother died five weeks ago. The Relieving Officer, Mr. Browne stopped that money the same week. Gentlemen it is so hard for us to be left on the side of the street to starve with the hunger. If anyone of you Gentlemen has a kind heart sanction the getting of that money back, it would cost the Ratepayers a lot more to support five of us in the House. My late Father was employed by Mr. Thomas Hayes, the Chairman of the Board up to his Death, that Gentleman would tell you I am a deserving party and Gentlemen it is a hard thing to be told to go into the body of the House at present I have two uncles serving their country and their king. I hope Gentlemen you will do your best for me."

L.G. Board Reply.

"I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 15th. instant, respecting your claim for an allowance for outdoor Relief from the Board of Guardians of Enniscorthy Union; and I am to inform you that the Board are prohibited by law from interfering in individual cases for the purpose of granting relief. Your letter, has, however, been forwarded to the Guardians."

Order. "Referred to Relieving Officer to investigate and report fully by next Thursday. The Board would wish to be informed by the L.G. Board whether they could legally give Relief in this case, when the Mother of these Children died, none of them was 15 years of age, they were under the charge of their Grandmother, to whom Provisional Relief was given for one week, the Guardians were led to believe that the Administrator of the Parish was taking steps to have the Children sent to Industrial Schools. Hence the matter was adjourned until next Thursday pending advice from L.G. Board, as to what action should be taken."



Ultimo and stating that they are not aware of any method for recovering the cost of treatment in Union Hospitals, other than that prescribed by Section 4 of the Poor Relief Act, 1962, as (1) Section 111 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, provided that "every assignment of or charge on and every agreement to assign or charge any of the benefits conferred by this Act shall be void;" and (2) no agreement can be made between an approved Society or Insurance Committee on the one hand and a Board of Guardians on the other for the payment in whole or in part of the sickness or disablement benefit of an insured person to the latter Authority.

On the motion of Mr. Hayes Seconded by Mr. Cleary, it was decided to ask the County Members of Parliament to endeavour to have the Act so amended as to make it possible for Boards of Guardians to secure the payment of the cost of Maintenance of Single Persons whilst in Hospital.

RE MEAT CONTRACT.



"The Scheme which the Guardians had under contemplation last year for improving the water supply of the Workhouse has been abandoned. Since then the Guardians have been in negotiation with the Urban District Council in order to obtain portion of the town supply. The only objection to this plan is the expense which would have to be incurred in extending the town main to the Workhouse Buildings. In the meantime the Guardians are having the Workhouse well cleaned out, the sides concreted and other improvements effected. The Guardians have also decided to provide a Bathroom for the use of the Female Lunatics in the Workhouse and have instructed their Engineer to prepare plans for the purpose. During the past year additional accommodation has been provided for the Nursing Sisters, but the proposal to build an Operation Room and Kitchen at the Infirmary has been deferred for the present. The Healthy Nursery in the Body of the House will, I understand, be improved by the substitution of a wooden for the tiled floor and the opening of a second large window. Good cooking appliances are much needed in the Kitchen. Economy could be effected in the consumption of fuel by replacing the Old-fashioned Grates in the body of the House by good modern grates similar to those in the Infirmary Wards. I am glad to learn that it is the intention of the Guardians to provide fibre mattresses instead of the Straw beds at present in use in the body of the House. More attention should be given to the upkeep of the Workhouse Buildings. As previously mentioned some of the walls are showing signs of dampness. Both of the Workhouse Ambulances are two wheeled vehicles. It would be very desirable that a good modern ambulance should be purchased for the conveyance of the Sick to the Infirmary. Arrangements should be made for painting, limewashing and colouring the walls throughout the Institution. The Visiting Committee does not meet and report as required by Article 59 of the Workhouse Rules. There are seven deserted children in the Workhouse.

The Guardians should endeavour to find suitable foster homes for them."

"I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to state that they have been informed that the supply of cube sugar now available for consumption in this country is extremely limited, owing to the cutting off of the supplies from the Continent and it is now quite impossible for the trade to obtain anything like the supplies of sugar of this class that they have received in normal times.

Granulated sugar is precisely the same as the sugar used in the making of cubes and the use of cubes is purely a matter of custom and habit and the Board would therefore suggest that, when advertising for tenders for sugar the granulated kinds should be specified. As far as existing contracts are concerned, where cube sugar is now being supplied it might be possible to arrange with contractors to substitute the granulated article and to make a proportional reduction in price order." RE MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Medical Officer reported as follows:-

"Mr. Connolly has intimated to me two Orders made by your Board on last Thursday. The first that in future I should give all information, concerning any case I would recommend to be sent to Dublin for operation. The reports on my Journal will go on the Minutes of your Proceedings and are therefore liable to be published in the Public Papers and I think that the fact of these being all Poor People here, is no reason whatever, that their names addresses and diseases from which they suffer should be sent broadcast over the County. The present scale is too strictly Red Taped and as the Eggs form part and parcel of a Stereotyped diet I could not reduce them without transferring the Patients from where they were taken to another Special Diet and this would be confusing in the extreme."

November, 1915, the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians after due notice voted me £100 per annum in respect of my salary as Medical Officer of the Enniscorthy Dispensary District which was £150 per annum. I had served thirty-eight years.
