Kelly permanently to the position of M.O., L. Emms Corry Dispensary District. The Board is again to express upon the Guardians that it is contrary to the public interest, that permanent appointments to vacancies in the poor law service should be made during the war. The Military authorities are appealing to all qualified medical practitioners of suitable age to give their services during this time of National emergency. There is a shortage of medical men for the care of the wounded as a result of this call, a great number of the best & most experienced medical men have left the country. The Guard consider it would not be right, that their absence. On the last occasion that I saw him the 14th inst I considered him well able to work & told him so this evidently did not satisfy him as his letter of Compt. was before the Board. 2 days later on 16th inst. There is no truth in the statement that I advised him at any time. The Board are not satisfied with D. B. formally's explanation & request the L.C.B. to investigate the case.

The Engineer, myself and Assistant visited Mr O'Dempsey's residence when the Solicitor accompanied myself and Mr Monaghan to the Court. I handed Mr O'Dempsey all the papers in connection with the case in the presence of the Engineer. When the case was called Mr O'Dempsey was not in Court, nor did he leave the papers with Mr Moffat. If I had known Mr Moffat was to defend the case for Mr O'Dempsey I could have instructed him properly.

 wife to Mr J. Barlow Ballydonfin to ask him for a red ticket  
 to send for some doctor as quick as possible. He told her to go  
 up the land and send down his son to him which she did.  
 He told him to get on the horse and go as fast as he could  
 for Dr Connolly and also told him to call on J. Stamp etc  
 for a red ticket. He handed the ticket to Dr Connolly at the Dispensary  
 and told him to come at once. He visited me about Haypast  
 one, and asked me had I got sick again. I said I was sick  
 enough now anyhow. He asked me what was wrong. I said  
 I did not know but to go to the Chamber and he would  
 see for himself. He took it in his hand and looked at it  
 he then tried my temperature and felt my pulse. He asked  
 me were my bowels all right. and said I did not know as I  
 had not been eating much for some time. I asked him if he  
 was



was going to give me any medicine or should take a dose of salts. he said he <sup>my hands were very sore</sup> enough, and said that they were not sore at all as there was no fire in them. he said very well as what ever you like. I asked him for a certificate for the insurance and he told me to go to Dr Kelly, and said you put me from that. he said he had not seen Dr Kelly for a fortnight, and said you are not going to him if you either and went out. I was getting up every quarter of an hour and nothing coming but pure inflammation the same as I often asked from a heart. Some neighbours advised me to take salts others oil. about 11 o'clock that night took a dose of oil. and the first discharge was throwing stones into a tin. my bowels moved three times when there was no stain or sign of inflammation in an hour after the blood and horrid looking stuff commenced coming and never ceased until the following morning.

A neighbour advised me to go to Hospital for if any of that inflammation <sup>remains</sup> in you it would kill you in an hour. I procured a ticket from Dr Kelly admitting me to the Union Hospital on the 17th April and remained under the care of Dr Kelly until April 17th

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## RE BALLAGHKEENE DISPENSARY.

Dr. Connolly wrote as follows :- <sup>2</sup> "At their Meeting on the 3rd. Feby. last the Board of Guardians ordered that the Relieving Officer remove the Medicines into the new Dispensary at the Ballagh, the same order was again made at the Meeting of the 11th. May, and apparently it was again repeated at the last Meeting on the 31st. May. Notwithstanding all these orders the Medicines are still where they ~~were~~ for the Dispensary is not in a fit state to go into; infact on the 3rd. Feby when the first order was made, the waiting-room had not been plastered and a heap of clay and rubbish in front of the House practically debarred access to the Door. Though some work has since been done, the premises are still unfinished and unfit to go into and I would ask the Board to appoint a small committee to inspect them before taking them over from the Contractor. If a Committee be formed I would wish to direct their attention, among others, to the following defects, one window in the Waiting Room has never been glazed, the concrete floor is rough and slovenly laid down, the back-door is locked and has no key to open it the Consulting room is not sufficiently lighted and would require another window in the Gable, the one window is nailed up and cannot be opened it has one pane of glass broken, shelves put up, apparently for the Medicine might do for a Provision Store, but are not suitable for a Dispensary and are even placed in the wrong position. The L.G.B. will insist upon a locked Press for Poisons, which has not been provided, the floor is as bad or worse than the Waiting Room. The Surface of the yard is very uneven and has large boulders scattered about it., the concrete forming the doorstep at the back has already broken down and fallen away, the yard gate has no fastenings, it is swayed sonorously backwards and forwards by the wind and by the delighted youngsters of the Village there is no attempt made to provide and Stabling accommodation, though a small corrugated shed would not be expensive. The Closet in the Yard occupies the most prominent and conspicuous position available, its lean-to roof slopes toward the front instead of the back, it is the laughing-stock of the Country-side, later on if used for the purpose intended, it will become a danger to the health of the Village. The inside of the



"The new dietary scale has been in force in the Workhouse for almost a year and is giving satisfaction. It has effected a substantial saving in the Guardians' expenditure.

New cooking appliances have been purchased and are about to be installed in the Main Kitchen. Hot water will be supplied from the kitchen Range to the Laundry and a considerable saving will thereby be effected in the consumption of Coal.

A further saving could be effected in Coal consumption by the substitution of good modern grates-similar to those in the Infirmary Wards-for the old fashioned grates in the body of the House.

No steps have yet been taken to improve the Healthy Nursery in the body of the House by replacing the flagged floor by a wooden one, and by improving the lighting and ventilation. This Nursery which should be one of the brightest parts of the Workhouse, is the coldest and most dismal Ward in the Institution,

About a year ago the Engineer was instructed to prepare Plans for the construction of a Bathroom for the Female lunatic Department but he has not yet submitted them to the Guardians.

I regret to observe that the Workhouse Buildings have been allowed to fall into a somewhat dilapidated condition. The roofs, gutter eave-shoots and down-pipes all require attention.

As previously mentioned the Workhouse Ambulances are two-wheeled vehicles. In order that the sick poor may be conveyed to the Workhouse with the minimum of discomfort, it would be very desirable that at least one modern four-wheeled ambulance should be purchased.

Most of the walls in the Sick wards have recently been repainted and distempered. Limewashing is required throughout the Institution; a machine has been provided for the purpose.

The Lighting and ventilation of the Infirmary wards could be greatly improved by the enlargement of the Windows in the front of the building. I am glad to observe that fibre mattresses have been substituted for straw beds in some of the wards in the body of the House.

To prevent the walls in the Convent Building from becoming damp, additional down-pipes are required and the open channel in the yard of the Male Hospital requires attention. Iron bars should be fixed to the window of the Bakehouse. There are three Children in the Workhouse, who are legible for Boarding Out, and I trust the Guardians will a range

RE OLD AGE PENSIONS.

---

The following resolution was received from Wexford Board of Guardians:-

"That this Board begs respectfully to direct the attention of the Irish Executive Government to the present working of the Old Age Pension Act, 1908, and particularly with regard to the questions being raised by the Local Pension Officer, apparently with the object of disqualifying for pension persons who are in receipt of Poor Relief in the Workhouse Infirmary. Those persons, in the great majority of instances, were, previous to the colossal fight for freedom in which the nation is now engaged, able to eke out existence on their pensions, but the enormous increase in the price of the ordinary necessities of life, owing to the war, and which has reduced the purchasing value of the Old Age Pension by at least one-half, has driven them to seek relief in the Workhouse Infirmary, for which they have been paying, and are willing to continue paying their full pension.

"This however, is, for the reasons already mentioned, quite inadequate to pay in full the cost of such relief, especially when establishment charges have to be included in this cost. The Board, therefore, consider it manifestly unfair to disqualify those old people from receiving their pensions by a stringent application of regulations framed at a time when normal conditions prevailed, and evidently in the belief that the amount of the pension was sufficient for the pensioners' support and they respectfully press upon the Executive the necessity of postponing a rigid administration of the Act with regard to the matters above referred to until after the conclusion of the war,"

Mr. Harte proposed that the resolution be adopted that copies be sent to the local M.P.s Premier and Under Secretary, requesting them to use all their efforts to have this resolution carried out.

## RE APPLICATION FOR INCREASE OF SALARY M.O.

An application of a graduated increase and retrospective scale of salaries was read from the following medical officers of the Union:- Dr. N.J. Furlong, Dr. G.E. Greene, Dr. W.C. Lawlor, Dr. M. Delaney, Dr. B. Connolly, and Dr. M.W. Kelly. The application was based on the following reasons:- (1) That a dispensary doctor on £200 a year is the worst paid official on any public service. Doctors entering the army or navy receive three times the average paid in Enniscorthy Union, and in addition have no working expenses. After from 20 to 25 years' service they receive nearly double their initial salaries, and can retire on £1 a day pension. After nearly 40 years' service and doing as much work as three army doctors Dr. T.J. Kelly was only voted £50 a year pension by the guardians. (2) Their salaries had been fixed at a time when the purchasing power of £1 was double what it was now. This had been recognised in the case of civil servants and others whose salaries had notably increased within the past 50 years. No advance, however, had been given to poor-law doctors. (3) The standing of living and working expenses (including a motor car, which was now a practical necessity for every doctor) had greatly increased. In some cases their salaries were not sufficient to meet working expenses. (4) Doctors in England and the Colonies were paid double the salaries of ten years ago, "locums" in England receiving from 6 to 8 guineas a week. (5) Every other union in the county, and some 6 in Ireland had adopted graduated and retrospective scales of salaries for their medical officers. In Shillelagh, a neighbouring and much poorer union than Enniscorthy, the doctors receive an initial salary, of £150 a year, graduating up to £200. They put these considerations before the Board with confidence that the members would do justice to their medical officers. They pointed out (contrary to his own expressed wish) that Dr. Greene, of Ferns, after nearly 30 years of honoured and efficient

service was at present receiving a smaller salary than any other dispensary doctor in Leinster. They desire to anticipate and answer some likely objections to the application, (a) "During the War is no time for raising salaries." It was likely that 80 per cent of the increase would be paid by farmers. They were the class that had benefited most from the war, and in spite of the increased cost of living, working expenses, etc., they were far better off than ever they were before. Even if the doctors' ~~were~~ double the cost on the rates would not be serious. The ratepayers would be no worse off than those of Shillelagh and Ballyinglass two poorer unions where the doctors' salaries gradually increased up to £200 a year. (b) If the doctors are not satisfied with their salaries let them resign. Some of them had strong regrets that they ~~did~~ not do so long ago. They had spent the best years of their lives in the Board's service and would find it hard now to adopt new duties and associations. Were it not for help from private sources some of them could not live in their dispensaries. The older and more experienced doctors would very strongly advise no young doctor to waste his time and energy in any dispensary of your union. He could at the present time do far better elsewhere. But many of us prefer to live and work in the land of our birth that to go to England or the colonies. In conclusion the doctors ~~sta~~ stated that if they were live and discharge their duties efficiently they should receive adequate remuneration. They asked that their salaries be doubled, a penny in the pound would satisfy them. This meant a farmer with £30 valuation pay half a crown a year. They asked to be placed on an equal footing with the rest of the medical officers of other unions.

RE ISOLATION SHED.

The Master reported that on Friday August 4th., Dr. Browne Local Government Board Inspector, visited the Fever Hospital and Isolation Shed. He directed me to send in the following report to next meeting of the Board for their serious consideration. Inspected Isolation Shed and found same very untidy dirty night slops not removed, very evil smelling. Caretaker did not think it worth her duty to do anything in connection with same, except hand in food. The Guardians should see that the caretaker carries out her duties. Bedding should be out in the open in fine days which caretaker was not doing. The upper door in lane-way nearest to Sportsfield should have a lock and proper latch, or if possible to have ~~same~~ door and door put in end of Isolation Shed into small yard leading to field. The privy for Isolation Patients is not at all suitable. I would recommend that the privy at present should be made a double one with two doors, one entrance in small yard at end of Isolation Shed the other in field, Privy to have a movable pan arrangement in order to have same constantly cleaned out and some sods placed in privy for use of Patients, after using privy. Proper arrangements should be made at once for disposing of privy matter, and slops of Fever Hospital and Isolation Shed, as the present arrangements are perfectly dangerous and should be seen to at once. The caretaker of Isolation Shed states that the Disinfectant chamber is out of order. The acting Master direct the Guardians attention to main Hall of Fever Hospital there is no door in the middle of same, and the Sister in charge is constantly annoyed with recovering Patients going into the kitchen which is not a suitable place for them to be. A light door half glass would suit. The windows in Fever Hospital are all out of gear and requires repair. I would suggest a small Committee of 2 or 3 members be appointed by the Board to inspect the necessity of the suggested improvements



and send in report before meeting adjourns  
Dr J J Kelly reported as follows:-

"Referring to recent outbreak of Typhus fever (4 cases) Scarlatina (5 cases) in this Union, I beg to call immediate attention of the Board of Guardians to the very inadequate accommodation at the Isolation Ward and the dilapidated condition of this secure for a proper ward, no water closet. Also to the antiquated and useless disinfecting Chamber as it is long obsolete and would require modification of a radical character to make it efficient.

There is a very important matter about the time contacts are retained in the Isolation Wards. Notice persons who have not suffered from Scarlatina and who have been in contact with the diseased should be kept in

Isolation for the full prodromal period of the disease, and the clothes and effects should be thoroughly disinfected with formaline before the persons are let out

undisturbed and that it is contemplated that the Porter of the Dispensary who is also caretaker of the Fever Hospital should clean the isolation ward and perform cleaning functions about this contagious disease period. I request that the Porter of the Dispensary be released for that purpose or that she be transferred to the Fever Department or share in with for her to carry disease down the town.

The clerk stated that the caretaker of the Fever Hospital is also caretaker of Dispensary

It was decided to refer the reports to Dr. J. J. Kelly M.O. of Fever Hospital who subsequently attended before the Board. he agreed that it was not advisable that the caretaker of the isolation shed, should be going to the Dispensary, and recommended that a Committee be appointed to go into the reports.

On passing through the Ballagh this evening, I was surprised to

window acting on the instructions of the Board's Engineer.  
A window of this size will not be sufficient to light the room  
properly, as any member of the Committee or indeed anyone who  
was ever in the room will know that anything less than twice that  
size, would in my opinion be too small, and I would ask the  
Board to stop the work before it is any further botched and direct  
a suitable window say 6 by 4 to be put in. As it is two months since  
the Committee recommended this work to be done I think some limit  
should be put to the time to complete it.

The Engineer stated that the work will be completed by Saturday next.

## RE DRUGS OULART DISPENSARY.

L. No. 41462/1916. Dated. 1st. September, 1916.

Referring to Minutes on 17th. ultimo and enclosing a copy of a letter which they had received from Boileau & Boyd, Medical Contractors, in regard to a supply of Drugs ordered in May last for the use of Oulart Dispensary District.

Copy.

"In answer to yours received to-day ref. No. 41,555, 1916. Enniscorthy Union. The Medical Officer, Dr. Connolly, wrote us some little while back on the subject, to which we replied as under. We trust the matter is now in order."

Copy of Letter from Contractor to Union.

"In reply to your favour of the 19th. instant. We are surprised to learn that the Drugs ordered May 26th. have not as yet been delivered. On investigation we find that they were sent by rail paid to Enniscorthy on June 23rd. and that Dr. Connolly was advised. Will you kindly make further inquiries and let us know result."

The Clerk reported that he had inquiries made at the Railway Station at Enniscorthy and the Messenger found a hamper of Drugs lying at the Station but bearing no label, he had written to the Medical Officer and the Contractors and had received the following replies:- Dr. Connolly wrote as follows:- "In reply to your letter of the 25th instant regarding Drugs requisitioned for Blackwater Depot on 26th. May last:-

1. I received Notification from the Contractors, saying that the Drugs had been forwarded, about 25th. June.
2. I received the Invoice from the Contractors about the same date certainly both notification and Invoice were received before the 29th. June.
3. I received no Advice Note from the Railway Company,
4. I sent the usual Carrier to the Railway Station for the Drugs on the 1st. July, he was informed that the Drugs were not there. On the 3rd. July I wrote to the Contractors informing them that the Carrier, whom I sent to the Railway Station, was told that the Drugs were not there and had to come back without them, the Contractors did not reply nor have I heard from them since. I believe that the Contractors are bound



to deliver the Drugs free of Charge at the Dispensary Depot and I see no reason why we should take the damaged case lying at the Railway Station without a label, on the off chance that it may be the missing one."

Boileau & Boyd wrote as follows:- "We are in receipt of your favour and have no doubt the unlabelled hamper of Drugs lying at Enniscorthy Station is the missing consignment in question, as the consignment dispatched from here was packed in a hamper. We do not understand why the Railway Company kept the hamper lying at the Station so long as their consignment Note would at once show both the sender and destination. What we would suggest is that Dr. Connolly takes delivery of the consignment and any Drugs he considers has deteriorated he can return to us at our expense and we will replace same by a fresh supply. Trusting this suggestion will meet with approval."

Order. "The Board refuse to take Delivery, as they have no information as to what they are."

The following is a Copy of a Resolution adopted by the Board of Guardians of Cork Union at their Meeting on 12th October, 1916.

Resolved:-

"That, we the Cork Board of Guardians vehemently re-iterate our abhorrence of Compulsory Military Service for the Irish People, or any settlement of the Irish Question of which Conscription forms a part, as subversive of the principles of Nationality and Democracy. The coercion of the whole manhood of Ireland into the British Army at the instigation of a small but influential clique that preached rebellion against the coercion of Ulster into obeying an Act of Parliament will result in the crushing of all that is sacred to Ireland, and the establishment of an overwhelming tyranny over the liberties of the people fatal to England's prestige.

Before we be asked to accept the duties, let England concede us the right of British Citizens and justify her participation in the war for small nationalities by giving favourable consideration to the demand made on the Home Government by the Lord Mayor of Sydney and Premier and Vice-President of the Federal Council of New South Wales, viz- "That Ireland as one of the smaller nations be raised to the status of an autonomous Dominion, and take her place beside the sister Parliaments of Canada, New Zealand, South Africa and Australia."

That Copies be sent to the various Poor Law Boards in Ireland.

I beg to inform you that the Municipal Council of the City of Dublin, at a meeting held on Monday last, the 9th. instant, adopted the following resolution, viz. :—

“ That we, the members of the Dublin Municipal Council are of opinion that the time has arrived for the Irish Nation to unite in demanding the release of our fellow-countrymen and women interned in English Prisons without trial, and Amnesty for those who have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment, and pending their release we request the Government to consider the advisability of treating them as Political Prisoners : that to give practical effect to this motion twenty members of this Council be now appointed (one for each Ward) to make arrangements, in conjunction with the National and Labour Bodies of the Country, for the holding of an All-Ireland Convention for the purpose of establishing a Political Prisoners' Amnesty Association; and, that copies of this resolution be sent to all Public Boards, Trade Unions, Trades Councils, and National Organizations, and that they be invited to appoint delegates to act and join in whatever steps the Association may think proper to obtain the release of all Irish prisoners arrested and imprisoned in connection with the ' Rising ' of Easter Week, 1916.”

I shall be glad if you will, in accordance with the invitation embodied in the last few lines of the resolution, ask your Body to appoint delegates, and furnish their names and addresses at your earliest convenience.

At the Meeting of the Omagh Board of Guardians and Rural District Council held on the 7th October, 1916, the following resolution was proposed by MR. F. A. GUY, J.P., seconded by MR. S. MORRIS, D.C.

That this Board of Guardians of the Omagh Union representing a very large and important Agricultural Constituency wish to enter their protest against the extension of the Summer Time Act to Ireland next year, or in the future, for the following reasons:—

- (1)—It is an acknowledged fact that it in no way is a benefit to the Farmer, neither saving artificial light or firing—an extra hour in the afternoon is often worth three hours in the forenoon in handling or saving Crop.
- (2)—Greenwich time having been adopted in Ireland, which is an advance of 25 minutes on the time formerly indicated by the Sun, an extra hour added to this would mean starting work at a most untimely hour, and leaving the workers fagged and wearied long before the hour for ceasing work.
- (3)—Little children who have often far to travel to School found the past hour quite early enough without asking them to start an hour and a half sooner.
- (4)—**Fairs, Markets and Trains**—A very large number of people live 6, 8, 10 or more miles from these conveniences—these people found it more or less of a burden in the past to keep up to the old time—how will they manage to start 1½ hours sooner?—indeed some of them may stay up all night to be in time for a Fair or Market.
- (5)—This new time may suit Manufacturing Districts, Munition Works, &c. It may give those in Shops and Offices more time to engage in open air amusements, It may suit those who play Golf and otherwise amuse themselves—this class can usually stay in bed till the afternoon if they so desire.
- (6)—Why not pass a resolution to meet each individual case?—Alter the Factory Acts where necessary—Why make those who obtain no benefit from this change suffer from what all acknowledge to be a great hardship? The large proportion of the inhabitants of Ireland are engaged in Agricultural pursuits, therefore, we would pray the Home Office Committee to take these facts into consideration when dealing with the matter.

PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Proposed by MR. S. MORRIS and seconded by MR. P. CAROLAN,

That in the best interest of Primary Education in Ireland, we, the members of the Omagh Guardians and Rural District Council hereby demand from the British Treasury a War Bonus of 7/6 per week, to be paid retrospectively to the Irish National Teachers, who, under very trying conditions, are rendering most important service to the State.

That as practically all state-paid servants have now received a War Bonus, and as this claim is at least as urgent as any of these already recognised we earnestly request the Commissioners of National Education and Irish Members of Parliament to give all the support in their power to this just and reasonable demand.



#### MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

The Medical Officer wrote as follows:-

"In the early part of the week I was greatly shocked, on being told by the Sister in charge of the Infirmary, that the Master refused to send up Eggs for my weak and Dying Patients. I interviewed the Master and he told me, he was ordered to do so by Mr. Connolly, Mr. Connolly in turn told me that an Order was made by the Board on last Thursday, cutting off all Eggs in Infirmary and that I had agreed to it. I said 'Yes to a certain extent! He said my answer was 'For the present Yes' and on referring to the Document, I found he was right and that I had omitted to add 'to a certain extent'. His Letter had been handed to me while at Lunch and one does not care to write Letters at Meal-time. However this is of very little importance, as no sane person would think of making a wholesale sweep of one of the most important Articles of Diet for Sick People. Here I may complain and I do so bitterly that I got no Notice whatever of this Order of the Board and as Medical Officer of the Union, I was clearly entitled to such Notice. The last time the L.G.B. Inspector was here, he told the Sisters in charge that when the Eggs got scarce, we ought to take off as many Patients as their condition would admit, and mark their Diet @ & 4A, which would be exactly the same diet as 3 & 3A, but minus an egg. This I have done and have taken nearly 40 Patients off their



Eggs. The remainder in my opinion need them badly and I must insist on their getting them. Out of my own pocket I gave Money to the Sisters yesterday to provide for those most in need of them. No doubt it is very hard on a Contractor these exceptional times, but these very conditions ought to prompt the Guardians to recoup him in some way, but not at the cost of hastening the Death of the Hospital Sufferers."

The Clerk read the letter he had written to Dr. Furlong on the matter as follows:- "Would you kindly let me know, for information of Board, if you approve of suggestion made by L.G.B. Inspector some time ago, to change the Sick Diet Scale, by striking out the Eggs allowed with Breakfast."

The Doctor wrote in answer "For the Present Yes."

This was before the Board on Thursday last and acting on the Medical Officer's reply, the Board ordered the Eggs to be knocked off the Diet in question. In face of this Order, the Master had no option but to refuse sending Eggs, unless those on the Special Diets.

Mr. James Murphy asked whether the Master had ignored the Doctor by refusing to supply Eggs.

The Chairman answered that he did not. The Board had made an Order on the Doctor's reply and the Master should carry it out or get himself into trouble.

It was decided to allow the Medical Officer to amend his reply by adding the words "To a certain extent"

It was also decided to add Diets to be known as 7 & 7A, which would be the same as 3 & 3A, except that the Morning Egg was omitted.

## RE OULART MIDWIFE.

Dr. Connolly, Oulart wrote as follows:- 2/12/16:- Robert Collier of Middletown has reported to me this morning he required the Midwife to attend to his wife; he called at Mrs. Walsh's residence at Ballymurn, he could not get her there and could find no person able to tell him where she was to be found, he then had to walk eight Statute Miles from Ballymurn to Oulart to get me to attend his wife. I have no doubt that Mrs. Walsh has some explanation to offer for her absence from home, but I think some arrangement should be made, when she is not at home, to enable a person who requires her services at 4 o'clock in the morning, to know where she was to be found."

The Clerk stated that on receipt of above letter he had communicated with Mrs. Walsh and had received the following reply:-

"I called at Mrs. Doyle's Cottage the morning Mrs. Collier was sick. Mrs. Doyle told me she told Bob Collier where I was in Ballymurn. I hurried on to see Mrs. Collier. not knowing they got the Doctor at home. I asked her why she did not send for me, she send for Dr. Connolly. If he had come to Ballymurn he had got me as well as a man from Cooladine, Willie Doyle."

## RE KILLANNE MIDWIFE.

If this woman was in the Centre or near it there would be no complaint, but she is living one mile inside her District and that is not fair to the Poor People of her District, I see that the Ballagh Nurse was ordered to reside in the centre of her District. I understand there is going to be a House built for Mrs. Dundon in Ballindaggin, so I Hope the Guardians will see their way to have her residing in the



centre of her District. I am not writing this letter on my own behalf, but it is only fair."

DEAR SIR,

I beg to inform you that a meeting of the Committee appointed to deal with the application of the Medical Officers of the Union for a Graded and Increased Scale of Salaries to be applied retrospectively was held to-day, when the following were present:—Messrs. T. Hayes, J. Bolger, J. Hall, J. Lynch, J. Sinnott, James Murphy (Enniscorthy), James Murphy (Ballagh), J. Johnson, R. Rackard, C. Milne, and J. Nolan.

As you are already aware the Medical Officers suggested a basis of £130 as an initial salary, rising by £10 every three years to a maximum of £200. This did not apply to Enniscorthy District, where the suggested initial salary was £150 and the maximum £220.

These suggestions were first considered by your Committee and were rejected. The question was then carefully dealt with, and eventually the Committee came to the unanimous conclusion to recommend a scale for adoption (copy of which I send you herewith), and from which you will see that in the event of the Board of Guardians adopting it, the total immediate increase on the rates will be £135, or something less than the one-third of a penny in the pound.

This scale will be laid before the Board of Guardians for their consideration at the meeting to be held on THURSDAY, 14th DECEMBER, 1916.
