A Meeting of the Committee appointed to consider the Officers' Application for revision of Salaries met on 30th June, the Members present being:- Messrs:- T. McCarty, J. Hall, M. Mahon, J. Doyle, J. Kelly & J. O'Brien.

They recommend the Board to fix the following salaries:-

Baker to be given the Town Rate of Wages when same has been fixed up.

Carpenter, Tailor & Shoemaker to have their existing rate of 35/- per week each increased to £3 per week each.

With regard to Workhouse Porter who was in receipt of £29 per year (including) £4 for Clothes) with rations estimated at 16/- weekly. Committee recommend that he be allowed Vegetables and 7 Eggs weekly as additional rations thus bringing the annual value of his rations up to £45:10/- and that his cash salary be fixed at £58:10/- per annum making a total of £104.

Dealing with the Agriculturist, who had also charge of the Engine and was acting as Motor Driver and whose Salary was £70:12/- per annum (including £15:12/- for looking after Engine) and who was allowed the keep of a Cow for driving Ambulance, and who had a free House and Garden and Allowances estimated at 21/- weekly. The Committee recommend that a Man be appointed to drive Motor Ambulance and look after Pump; and that the Agriculturist be allowed a Salary of £3 per week with free House <sup>and 1/2 acre</sup> and the keep of a Cow.

With regard to Porter's Application for leave Committee recommend that he be allowed three hours off on three evenings each week.

Dealing with same Officer's application with regard to Clothes alleged to have been injured when he was attacked in February last, Committee consider the new salary recommended as sufficient to cover this.

In the case of the Midwives Committee recommend that all (except Nurse Storey, who is not a Member of the Union) be allowed £52 each per annum with a fortnight's holidays. For Holiday leave Board to provide Substitutes at 21/- per week.

If going any considerable distance from Headquarters or remaining away for more than three hours he must get leave from the Master and arrange for a substitute who must be approved of by the Master to drive the Ambulance in case of urgent call. The wages to include overtime and Sunday work while engaged within the



Enniscorthy Union, but in accordance with the custom prevailing, if Ambulance is working outside the usual hours worked by the other men in the ~~Union~~, the driver will be entitled to deduct that from his working hours the following day provided he is not wanted for urgent Ambulance work. For each run to Dublin an allowance of ten shillings to be made to cover out of pocket expenses. ## SALARIES COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

A Meeting of the above Committee was held on Wednesday, 4th. August, the following Members being present:- Messrs:- T.McCarthy, J. Wall, J. O'Brien, M. Maher, & Seumas Doyle.

The Master's Salary was first dealt with. The present salary is £75 per annum plus £32 :10/- Bonus with rations valued at £41:12;0 per annum.

The Committee recommend that the Master's total remuneration including Rations be fixed at £4 : 0 : 0 per week or in other words an annual salary of £166:8:0 with rations valued at £41 :12 :0.

In the case of Relieving Officer Browne, who is at present in receipt of an annual amount of £78 made up of £50 as Relieving Officer, £10 Bonus £3 for posting Notices and £15 as Sanitary Sub-officer. The Committee recommend that his salary be fixed at £117 per annum i.e. 45/- per week. £102 being as Relieving Officer and £15 as Sanitary Sub-officer.

The cases of Relieving Officers Donohoe and Murphy were taken together. These Officers being also Rent Collectors and not having near so many cases as R.O. Browne, the following decision was arrived at :)

Present Salaries and Bonuses amounting to £62 :10:0 per annum each to be replaced by salaries of £91 per annum each and to be apportioned £78:10:0 as Relieving Officers and £12 :10:0 each as Sanitary Sub-officers.

In the case of Mrs. Askins, Fever Hospital Porter, who was in receipt of £38:1:4 from the Board of Guardians and £7:12:0 from Rural District Council with/ Free House. The Committee recommend that her salary be fixed at £1 weekly i.e. £44:8:0 per annum from Board of Guardians and £7:12:0 per annum from District Council.

Committee's report was unanimously adopted on the motion of Mr. J. Sinnott Seconded by Mr. J.P.Kelly.



#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

#### RE EXPORT OF FLAX.

---

Mr. P. Ronan Proposed "That the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians is surprised to learn that Irish Flax is still prohibited of being exported, although the attention of the Government has been called to the matter. Such a restriction is not now warranted, and if retained would place the grower of Flax in the hands entirely of the Irish Spinners, which will work to the detriment of this important Agricultural Industry. There will be a large demand for Irish Flax and with a free and open market the grower can only hope to get the proper market value, and the keeping on of control will benefit the Spinners in Ireland, who can, and doubtless will, purchase the Flax at their own prices. It is only fair and just to the Grower that he be allowed to sell at the highest and best price their surplus stock and we ask the Government to remove this restriction without further delay."

Mr. M. Kelly Seconded.

### RE MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

---

Dr. Furlong, Medical Officer, wrote as follows:-

"I was appointed Locum tenens to the Enniscorthy and Oylegate Dispensary Districts either late in 1870 or very early in 71 and this position I continued to hold until permanently appointed in Feb'y, 72 Thus I have practically completed 50 years as a Union Medical Officer During this unusually long service I did not cost the Guardians on ~~an average~~ an average five shillings a year for holidays. Now nearly every Doctor takes four weeks every year at a cost of from five to seven guineas a week. It will thus be seen, that calculated, even at the lower figure, I have saved the Guardians well over £1000. After this long and far too faithful service, any decent employer would have been only too anxious to smooth down my path in life for any few years that may yet remain to me instead of throwing petty and useless worries in my way. Now as to the Justiceship of the Peace, I have not adjudicated at a Petty Sessions Court for eight or ten years and it is improbable that I shall do so again. However I object on principle to coercion and your resolution is a coercive ~~method~~ measure. It is also from every point of view illegal, and in the cutting which I append, which has emanated from most influential quarters, on your side of the House they call such action both illegal and tyrannical."

The Cutting referred to was copy of a resolution adopted by the Waterford County Council relative to the imposition of religious and political tests as a condition of employment in Belfast.

RE WORKMEN'S WAGES.

L. No. 46883/1920. Dated. 24th. August, 1920.

Referring to Minutes of the 14th. ultimo as to the terms of employment of the Workhouse tradesmen, Agriculturist and Porter and stating that they observe that the Guardians propose to give their Baker the twon rate of wages and that they learn that the wages now fixed for bakers in the Town is £3:12:6 per week. Presumably the wages of the other tradesmen are fixed on the same basis. If so, the Board would be glad to know whether the tradesmen employed in the Town are paid wages by their employes during sickness and holidays and whether they are entitled to Superannuation Allowance like the Union Tradesmen. If not, it is obvious that regard should be had to these facts in fixing the wages of the Baker, Carpenter, Tailor and Shoemaker.

As regards the Agriculturist, the Guardians propose to relieve him of the duties of driver of the Motor Ambulance and Attendant on the Pump and at the same time to increase substantially his remuneration as well as to appoint an Ambulance Driver at a high Salary. This seems to be an arrangement entirely opposed to the ratepayers' interests and not likely to improve administration, but, as the Guardians may have good reasons therefor, the Local Government Board, before giving a decision, would be glad to know of them.

In the case of the Porter, the Guardians proposal is, in effect, to increase his salary by about £35 a year. The Board find that the maximum salary paid to Porters of Workhouses graded with Enniscorthy is £35:12:0 per year, and they would not object to the Enniscorthy Porter being paid this amount but for the fact that he was appointed only three years ago. In order to meet the wishes of the Guardians as far as possible they will, however, sanction a bonus of £10:12:0 a year, thus bringin his remuneration up to the maximum salary aforesaid, and in addition he might be allowed a weekly ration of 7 Eggs and Vegetables when available on the Farm. In arriving at the value of this man's appointment the Guardians appear to have overlooked the fact that he is in receipt of the following emoluments—fuel, light and furnished apartments which cannot be reckoned at the present time at less than £35 to £40 a year.



Order. "Letter marked Read. Guardians adhere to Scale fixed by them."

The following suggestions were received from Dail Eireann, Ministry of Labour:-

"The Labour Department of Dail Eireann recommend that each Local Board should invite its employees to join them in forming a permanent Conciliation Board to meet when required for the purpose of discussing and arriving at an amicable settlement of such questions as the advance of wages, length of working hours, and other questions that may arise between employers and Employed: such Conciliation Board to consist of two or more representatives of the Local Board and two or more representatives of the Officials or Employees.

A Neutral Chairman to be appointed who shall be agreeable to both parties (Clergymen of all denominations are eligible). Failing such agreement Chairman to be appointed by the Minister for Labour. The expenses if any to be paid off the rates. The names of men or women chosen as Chairmen to be forwarded to the Minister of Labour. In the case of Labour Disputes not having been settled by means of Conciliation Boards, an Arbitrator (non-resident) will be suggested from the Ministry of Labour."

Forwarding for information of Board of Guardians substance of a Report received from Mr. A.P. Delany, Inspector, and requesting that the matters adverted to therein should receive the attention of the Guardians.

Copy.

"Up to the present no fire extinguishing appliances have been secured for any part of the Institution."

"There was a distinct improvement in the matter of cleanliness since I last reported, but with an<sup>in</sup>adequate Water Supply, the difficulty of keeping such a large Institution even moderately clean is very considerable."

"A Committee has recommended that a bath for females be erected in the Hall-way between the Nursery and the Female Idiot Ward. The only existing bath for the Female division of the House is situated in a shed in the Infirmary Yard, and consequently is seldom used in Winter time."

"The Water supply is wholesome but not sufficient. I have previously made recommendations as to how it could be supplemented, at a small outlay."

"I would again point out the necessity of improving the lighting and ventilation of the Infirmary Wards by the enlargement of the windows in front of the building."

"The drains are all unpiped channels."

"The Sanitary Condition of the Workhouse is not satisfactory. There is no Water Closet either in the body of the House or the Infirmary. In the Fever Hospital there is only one water closet and a proposal to erect another has not yet been adopted. Pending an improvement in the Water Supply, however, it would not be desirable to equip the Institution with modern sanitary convenience."

"Since I last reported the lunatics and Idiots seem to be treated with proper care."

"Some slates should be replaced on the roof the the Main building."

"The gutters, eave shoots and down pipes should be cleaned."



"Some new locks are required."

"The Visiting Committee have not met and reported during the half-year. Their attention is directed to Article 59 of the Workhouse Rules."

Mr. D. Doran wrote as follows:- "I regret that it will be impossible for me to be in attendance at your Meeting on Wednesday next owing to my being engaged in a Conference in another part of the County, and as the above matter is on the Agenda for consideration, and not wishing to have a further adjournment on my account, I think it only right to place on paper the case I would make on behalf of the Workers of the District if I could possibly be in attendance. The Oulart Branch of the I.T. & G.W.U. have had several Meetings about this matter and



at each Meeting were unanimous in calling upon the Council to rebuild the Hospital and they based such decision on the following facts:-

(1). This Hospital was built by public Subscription very many years ago.

(2). It was handed over to the Board of Guardians in the year 1868 in trust for the people, to be used as a Fever Hospital.

(3). The Guardians (Trustees) failed to carry out the trust by allowing the building to go into ruin and our predecessors as admitted in the statement furnished to us by Mr. Connolly could have repaired the building at the cost of £160 (See Engineer's Estimate of 14th. Novr. 1917) which they did not do.

(4). The Oulart Farmer's Association who comprise the majority of the Ratepayers of the District are in favour of having this building repaired and this being so, how can the Guardians go against their

(5). The Hospital was no doubt not much required after the year 1904 until winter of 1918/19 when Flu broke out- the Hospital was then badly needed as both Enniscorthy and Gorey Hospitals were filled-Proof of this is that the Doctor wired to get Patient into Enniscorthy but received reply that there was no room-Many patients in the District then had to be treated in their own homes and this was certainly not a means of quelling the outbreak. Furthermore had the Hospital then been in repair many people in the District might have been saved.

(6). The Main point however is:- The Guardians who were only trustees for the people of the Parish and District of Oulart allowed the Hospital to go into bad repair. They took no steps whatever to carry out the trust and can the Council now as their successors say to the people of the District you can now have the building back as we do not want it and are not accountable for practically letting it fall. I believe the Guardians are responsible to the people and consequently I hope they will see their way to have it repaired without delay and further that it will be furnished as an Hospital as soon as possible."

Mr. N. Whitty wrote as follows:- "Since it is impossible for me to be in attendance to-day and as I find the Oulart Fever Hospital is to come up for consideration, I do not think it requires my presence to convince this Board of Guardians as to the futility of expending eight or ten hundred pounds on an old building that there is no want for.



If there be any money available when we obtain our independence it can be applied to better use in helping to develop the Industrial Resources of the Country. We have to sell our wool for a fewpence alb. to go to Bradford to make Millionaires whilst the Rivers of our Country are running idly to the Sea, when they could be utilized in such a way as to give employment to hundreds of men who are deserting our shores every year to build up the wealth of other Countries. I consider it would be foolish and a wilful waste of money to attempt the repairs of this old despicable structure that was allowed to go into ruin because there was no want for it, and now when there is less the Ratepayers are to be called upon to expend a thousand pounds in its repairs at a time when we should be very careful how to husband our resources. I decline to be a party to such foolery. If I thought there was any want for such accommodation I would be the last to object."

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RE ESTIMATE & DEMAND.

The Clerk reported as follows:-

"In submitting my Estimate for the ensuing Financial Year, I have to point out that the Estimated Expenditure exceeds that of the current year by £3396.

This increase is accounted for under the following headings:-

(1). Maintenance and Clothing due to the fact that Milk, Flour, Coal Meat and some other Articles were contracted for at a price higher than was estimated this time twelve months.

(2). Establishment Charges caused by increased Salaries and Wages granted during past year and to improvements through the House.

(3). Medical Charities under which allowance has been made for the increased Salaries to Midwives, the proposed increase to Medical Officers and the increased cost of Medicines and maintenance of Dispensaries.

(4). Outdoor Relief, this item has gone up by some £12 per week, and I have allowed £500 more than last year. In connection with this item I would point out that in this District you are distributing nearly £1000 per annum more than in Wexford.

In making out this Estimate I have put matters as fine as possible and you will readily realize this when you compare your Estimate with the average Estimate submitted this year.

The real difficulty is to endeavour to forecast our Financial Position on the 31st. March next. Were we to receive the balance of Demand from County Council viz:- £3594:10:0. I consider we would have a Credit Balance of £94:10:0; but as I could not get any guarantee as to whether there would be any of this sum available, I must only estimate a Debit Balance of £3500.

This would mean that your Demand from the County Council would be £6896 in excess of last year.

To tell what the actual increase in Union Rates will be is another difficult proposition and will entirely depend upon the state of the Country. Thus if matters are settled and your Grants restored, you will only require an additional sum of £3396 or an increase of Sevenpence in the Pound, but if on the other hand the position remains the same your Demand will be an increase of £6896, to which will have to be



the sum of £5340 :10 : 0 for Loss of Grants. This would mean an increase of £12236:10:0 or  $2\frac{1}{2}$  in the Pound.

Continuing the Clerk stated that with regard to the estimated Financial position at the close of the year, as there was a possibility of some money being available for transfer by the County Council, he suggested that the Board empower the County Council to reduce the Estimated Debit balance of the Board by the amount that might be transferred previous to close of year.

On the motion of Mr. J. Murphy seconded by Mr. M. Cummins, the Estimate was adopted with the addendum suggested by the Clerk.

MIDWIVES' SALARIES.

Mrs. Mortished, Irish Nurses Union, wrote as follows:-

"I am informed by one of our Members, a Dispensary Midwife, that they have received no Salary from your Board since October last and no official notice of any kind about it. Whilst we understand the financial circumstances of many of our local Authorities prevents them from at present discharging their debts to their employees punctually, we would suggest, that if the money is not available for payment at the usual time when it becomes due, the Midwives are entitled to some definite and reliable information as to the cause of delay, and should not be left to conclude from what some of them may see in the Newspapers that there is no money wherewith to pay them. These midwives are finding it as difficult as most people with small salaries would to manage without their usual quarterly salary, and although knowing the Board's difficulties they have refrained from making any complaint so far, they would be glad to receive an assurance of the Board's intention to pay the amount due to them as soon as possible."

DR. KELLY'S SUPERANNUATION.

Dr. T. J. Kelly, Enniscorthy wrote as follows:-

"In 1914 owing to ill-health I sent in my resignation to the Old Board. They voted me after 47 years service, the great sum of £20 per year Superannuation. The Irish Local Government Board could not sanction that magnanimity and as owing to the War, they arranged with me and the Board that I should resume duty until after the War when the question of my Superannuation would be considered, meantime the salaries were raised and mine amongst the rest, which was sanctioned and paid up to the last. I was never dismissed or resigned after and without notice my Superannuation fixed at £120 per year in contravention of the Act of Parliament which enacted that I should get two-thirds of my existing Salary and emoluments. Remember that I acted on the advice of my Doctor, to get your Board out of a hobble, resumed work, and having carried on during the Influenza and as a result collapsed after the Epidemic, was rewarded by being kicked out without notice whilst I was sick in bed and my Superannuation was cut down from the normal two-thirds, which under the Act I was entitled to, to the starvation wage it now is. Now I pray that this enlightened and democratic Board will not perpetuate this gross injustice but will vote me the full two-thirds of the Salary I was entitled to when I was summarily deprived of my Office."

A further letter from Dr. Kelly was received as follows:-

"As the question of the equitable assessment of my Superannuation has hung fire for some months and the real conditions relative to this matter are quite obscure to the Board, I would ask the Guardians to get from the responsible Officers Answers to the following questions.

- (1). In 1914 did Dr. Kelly send in his resignation.
- (2). When the Guardians voted to Dr. Kelly an impossible and ridiculous Superannuation did the Local Government Board send down two Inspectors to inquire into the matter.
- (3). Did these Inspectors arrange with Dr. Kelly that the question of his resignation and superannuation should remain in abeyance until after the War.
- (4). Did Dr. Kelly work on until attacked with illness.



(5). During his work did the Guardians increase the Salaries of the Dispensary Doctors?

(6). Was Dr. Kelly's salary increased as the other Dispensary Doctors and paid on the increased Scale.

(7). While Dr. Kelly was sick in bed did the Guardians appoint Dr. Murphy to his Office, without notice and in face of a Protest conveyed through Mr. O'Flaherty, his Solicitor. Having ignored this notice did the Guardians fix a Superannuation Allowance of £120 per year, when in accordance with the Provisions of the Local Government Act, he was entitled to two-thirds of his then fixed salary.

(8). Is the War yet technically over.

(9). Did Dr. Kelly get the Board of Guardians out of a bad mess by resuming duty during the War, when they could not employ Medical Men of Service Age.

(10). Will the Guardians have the answers to these questions embodied in an affidavit to be sworn by the Officer responsible."

The Clerk stated the Dr. Kelly resigned in October, 1915 and the Guardians granted him £100 year Superannuation. Dr. Kelly then wrote to the Local Government Board stating that the Guardians had not granted him all he was entitled to. His letter was sent down to the Board of Guardians, and as a result on Notice of Motion, his Superannuation was cut down to £50. Shortly afterwards, Dr. W. Kelly, who had been appointed to act temporarily was not able to act any longer and Dr. T. J. Kelly was appointed temporary Medical Officer until after War, and his <sup>Superannuation</sup> ~~Salary~~ was left in abeyance. The terms of appointment were at £4:4:0 per week. Some time afterwards, the Salary of the Permanent M.O. for this District was fixed at £190. Dr. Kelly applied to be paid at this rate plus the standing salary of £3 :10/ for M.O.H. This was granted. Later on a further new Scale of Salaries was adopted under which the maximum was £230 per year. Dr. Kelly was paid at that rate for the last few months of his work. When the Board of Guardians proceeded to consider the question of Superannuation, the Local Government Board stated the Guardians might base the matter on the last three years of his temporary duty, but the Board decided to give him the Superannuation he would be entitled to on his last three years of actual service and this was done.

RE MEDICINE TENDERS.

"At your Meeting held in March to consider tenders for Supplies, I tendered for Margarine at 1/- per lb, there was one more tender at 1/3. Subsequently I was asked if I could supply Irish and the Manufacturer's name, this I supplied as requested for your last Meeting and was satisfied my tender was accepted. In the meantime you asked another trader if he would supply Margarine at 1/- and he tendered at 11½d. Knowing my price I don't think this is quite in order. The Clerk informed me to-day that the Contract would be divided, which is not at all satisfactory, as you don't know exactly how much supplies to cover yourself for, or when you may get an Order. The Board made an Order that Flour be purchased from me last year when I was losing heavily on the Margarine and I have not got any Orders since last September. If you wish to cover for this Article now, I will supply for 6 or 12 Months @ Seventy-eight Shillings per Sack delivered. Bags Free."

The Clerk stated that at the first Meeting at which the matter cropped up, there were two tenders received one from Gowan at 1/- and one from Duff's at 1/3. The Board decided that the Contractors be asked to state whether the Margarine was of Irish Manufacture. At next Meeting replies were received to the effect that Gowan's was Waterford made and Duff's was Enniscorthy made. It was then decided to ask the Contractors to submit samples and to ask Duff if he were prepared to supply Enniscorthy Manufacture at 1/- per lb. At next Meeting Samples were received, Duff submitting one sample at 11½d and one at 1/3. It was then decided to divide the Contract between Gowan at 1/- and Duff at 11½d.

RE SUPERANNUATION DR. T. J. KELLY.

In connection with letters from Dr. T. J. Kelly relative to above matter read at last Meeting and which had been postponed until this Meeting for Dr. Kelly's attendance.

Dr. Kelly attended and made a Statement in support of his claim from which it appeared that he claimed his Superannuation should have been calculated on a Salary of £230 plus emoluments instead of a Salary of £160 plus Emoluments.

The Clerk stated that on the 16th. September, 1915, Dr. T. J. Kelly, who was then permanent Medical Officer of the Enniscorthy Dy. Dt., gave a Month's notice of his intention to resign. The actual resignation was submitted and accepted on the 14th. October, but of course the Medical Officer had to put in four weeks duty from that date.

On the 21st. October, Dr. Kelly was granted a week's sick leave with his son, Dr. W.P. Kelly to do temporary duty, this leave was continued for three weeks on the 28th. October.

On the 18th. November Dr. T. J. Kelly was granted a Superannuation allowance of £100 per annum and Dr. W.P. Kelly was appointed to do temporary duty in the Enniscorthy Dy. Dt. at £4:4:0 per week until a permanent Medical Officer was appointed.

On 9th. December, L. G. Board wrote to Board of Guardians enclosing Copy of Letter received from Dr. T. Kelly to the effect that he had not been granted all the Superannuation to which he was entitled. Notice of Motion was then given to rescind the resolution granting him £100 per annum. This motion was considered on the 20th January, 1916, when the resolution referred to was rescinded and the Superannuation was then fixed at £50 per annum.

On 3rd. February, 1916 L.G. Board refused to sanction a permanent Medical Officer of Military Age until after War. Dr. W.P. Kelly was then appointed to do temporary duty until after War at £4:4:0 per week.

On 10th. February Notice of Motion to suspend Standing Orders to allow Chairman to accept a further Motion relative to Dr. Kelly's Superannuation was given. This was withdrawn on the



24th. February. Some Members remarking that Dr. Kelly would resume duty until after the War.

On 2nd. March, 1916, Mr. Browne R. . reported that he had appointed Dr. T.J.Kelly on previous day to do temporary duty, as Dr. William Kelly informed him that he could not act any longer. On the same date a letter was read from Dr. W.P. Kelly resigning his temporary appointment, owing to pressure of business. Dr. T.J. Kelly was then appointed to do temporary duty at £4:4:0 per week until after the War and the Local Government Board was requested to do nothing with regard to the £50 per year Superannuation until after War as the question would then be re-considered.

At the Meeting of the Board of Guardians held on the 1<sup>st</sup>. Feb. 191<sup>1</sup>, a letter was read from Dr. Kelly as follows:- "In September, 1915, I resigned Enniscorthy Dispensary. In March, 1916, I was appointed Locum Tenens for Enniscorthy. I have received no Salary and yet this matter was not disposed of or settled. Please order the Clerk to pay my Salary and Emoluments for the period from my resignation to my appointment as Locum Tenens." This Letter was referred to L.G.B.

On 19th. February, L.G.B. wrote stating that when Dr. Kellys Superannuation had been settled. Payment could be made for the period referred to. The Board of Guardians then decided to take no action until Dr. Kelly would go off duty. On 20th. June, Dr. Kelly applied for an increase of £2:2:0 per week for doing temporary duty. The Board made no Order upon this application.

On 26th. September, Local Government Board wrote enclosing copy of a Letter received from Dr. Kelly and copy of their reply in which they stated that if the Board of Guardians would agree to pay Dr. Kelly at the Maximum Scale of £190 adopted for the permanent M.O. of the Enniscorthy Dy. Dt. the previous February, they would sanction the proposal, and this would enable the Doctor to obtain the Salaries set aside for Medical Officer of Health for Enniscorthy Rural and Urban Districts. Notice of Motion was given to consider matter and at Meeting held on 10th. October, it was decided to pay Dr. Kelly for his temporary services at the rate of £190 plus £37:10:0 as M.O.H. A total of £227:10:0 as against £218:8:0, he was previously in receipt of. This was approved of by L. G. Board.

On 14th. November, 191<sup>7</sup>, Dr. T. J. Kelly wrote applying for



Leave of Absence. The Guardians decided to ask L.G.B. if they could give Leave of Absence to a temporary Medical Officer and pay his Substitute. On 22nd. December, L.G.B. wrote stating that the Guardians could give the Leave and pay both the Temporary M.O. and his Substitute. Dr. Kelly was then granted Leave.

There was nothing further in connection with the matter until 18th. March, 1919, when L.G.Board wrote removing Prohibition of Novr. 1915 with regard to the filling up of permanent Vacancies in the existing Medical Staffs of Unions. The Board of Guardians thereupon decided to advertise for a permanent M.O. for Enniscorthy Dy. Dt. and Dr. Murphy was appointed on 16th. April, 1919. At this time the Guardians considered there was no other course open to them, as Dr. Kelly, who was then acting M.O. had been off duty on Sick Leave from 22nd. December, 1918; and Guardians were paying a Substitute at £17:0 per week.

The question of Dr. Kelly's Superannuation was considered on the 7th. May, 1919, when a letter was read from L. G. Board stating that the Guardians could if they wished take into consideration Dr. Kelly's salary as temporary Medical Officer. The Board of Guardians refused to do this and decided to give Dr. Kelly the legal Superannuation to which he was entitled based on his Salary at the time of his resignation, which amounted to £120. per annum.

Dr. Murphy took up duty on 14th. July, 1919 and Dr. Kelly wrote asking to be allowed last Quarter's Salary at the rate of £230 per annum, which was in accordance with Maximum permanent Scale adopted on 1st. April, 1919. Board of Guardians allowed this and L.G. Board sanctioned it.

Continuing Clerk produced Sealed Order approving of Superannuation Allowance of £120 a year based on a Salary of £160 a year plus Emoluments.

In reply to a query the Clerk stated that Dr. Kelly claimed his Superannuation should be based on the sum of £230 a year plus emoluments i.e. the rate at which he was paid for the last Quarter he was on duty, hr (Clerk) did not agree with that as Superannuation was based on the average salary for last three years of duty.

In reply to a further query as to the difference between the amount given to Dr. Kelly by the old Board and the amount that could



have been given in accordance with terms of L. C. Board's letter,  
the Clerk stated that the difference would be about £9 per annum.

After further discussion the Board declined to make any alteration  
in the Superannuation Allowance already fixed.

did, shortly afterwards Bogan came up again and complained that Devereux had assaulted him, I went down and Boggan brought in some Millworkers, who were on the Road and they agreed ~~with~~ with his statement that Devereux had been on top of Boggan ~~on~~ the table when they came in. The Master also stated that he had seen the tea spilled on the bed. And that he had since taken Devereux away from the Lodge.

Copy of Report of Finding of County Conference re Amalgamation.

The Hon Secretaries wrote as follows:-

"At a Conference of Representatives of the four Boards of Guardians of the County, held at New Ross Workhouse on the 2nd. instant, to consider the question of Workhouse Amalgamation, ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ the following resolution was adopted on the motion of Mr. Mc.Carthy (Enniscorthy) seconded by Mr. Dunphy (New Ross). (The Labour Representatives present asked to have it recorded that they reserved an "open mind" on the proposed Scheme at the present stage.

That, as this Conference favours Workhouse Amalgamation, we recommend:-

- (1). That the Four General Workhouses be abolished as such.
- (2). That the existing General and Fever Hospitals (to be properly equipped) be retained and converted into, and called "District Hospitals" on the lines contemplated by Section 90 of the Local Government Act, 1898.
- (3). That the necessitous aged and infirm be accommodated in a central Institution, to be called the "County Wexford Home".
- (4). That all children be boarded out, preferably in country Districts.
- (5). That, with a view of saving retiring allowances as much as possible, the new "Home" absorb as many of the existing officers as it may be deemed advisable to transfer thereto.
- (6). That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to each Board of Guardians for consideration.

On the motion of Mr. Mc.Carthy Seconded by Mr. J.P. Kelly, it was decided to approve of the Committee's recommendations, except that No. 4, should have the word "preferably" struck out.

MASTER'S REPORT.

The Master reported as follows:

"Cream per Centage for week was 10 2/7."

"I lodged to credit of Union the sum of £86 for the sale of Hay by Auction."

"I have had to use Bread for the past week for dinner and also occasionally before then owing to shortage of Coal. I do not consider it prudent to buy any more Potatoes."

Order. "Approved of."

"There was an illegitimate Child born in the House on the 7th. July."

Order. "Referred to Solicitor."

"On the 6th. July, the R.I.C. commandeered the Ambulance to go to Dublin with wounded R.I.C. Men from Ferns. The D.I. told me that it would be paid for, also the amount previously due."

"On the 5th. July, I received a wire from Dr. Lawler to send Ambulance on next day for a Patient to Ballyroebuck, I could not do so, as when I was sending it, the R.I.C. came for it. I sent a Motor Car for Patient next Day, as the Ambulance had not come back from Dublin."

Order. "Account for cost of Motor to be furnished to R.I.C."

"Since last Meeting M. Lythen was sent from Hospital to body of House."

"Samples of Goods as under will be required for next Meeting."

"On Saturday evening, 25th. June at 4.15 p.m. the Motor Driver reported to me that there was at the Railway Station 2 casks Medicines, 1 Box, 1 Bag Linseed Meal for Ennisceorthy Workhouse and



2 Casks Medicine for Killarne Dispensary and that Station Master required them removed on same Evening. I told Motor Driver to bring them up on Lorry and he did so. On next day Sunday, 26th. June at 12-15 p.m. Armed and Disguised men told me they required the amount of Medicines that came from the Railway Station on Saturday evening, as they wanted to destroy them as they were goods from Belfast. I told them they were from Boileau & Boyd, Dublin. They then destroyed the Medicines in question."

Dr. Furlong, Medical Officer, wrote as follows:-

"Shortly after the last Medicines ordered were delivered here some evil disposed persons came and burned them. We are now in a bad way for some of these Drugs and it is very sad to have the poor patients suffering this way for want of them. Would the Board kindly renew the Order and ask to have them expedited."

The Clerk stated that in March last the Board had accepted the tender of Boileau & Boyd for Medicines & Appliances. Shortly afterwards a Circular was received from the General Council of County Councils stating that they had made arrangements for a Pool in connection with the Medical Contracts. This fell through and the Guardians had to fall back upon the original Contractor. On the 27th. June, when he was informed of what had taken place, he wired Boileau & Boyd instructing them not to send on any more goods until things were settled, he also wrote to the General Council of County Councils and had received the following replies:-

Boileau & Boyd.

"We duly received your telegram of yesterday's date and your letter of Confirmation to-day. We are surprised to learn that you have not received information, that the ban on our Goods had been removed. A trader in your town writes as follows:- 'I received a letter from the Central Committee, Dublin, Belfast Boycott, stating that you are now allowed to trade.' We note the Goods invoiced have been destroyed, and assume that you will obtain redress for their loss from the proper quarter, of course we can accept no liability whatever."

Mrs. Gearmt wrote:-

"In reply to yours of the 27th. instant, I wish to say that I am making inquiries as to the name of a suitable firm and shall let you



shall let you have same as soon as I obtain it. In the meantime I wish to state that I understand that Messrs:- Boileau and Boyd, having paid the fine are not now on the Black List."

The Clerk continuing stated that the Board had been placed in rather a false position in connection with this matter inasmuch as they never received any Notification of a Ban on Boileau & Boyd. In fact at present they had no Official intimation as to whether the ban existed at present or not. He had written in connection with the matter but had not yet received a reply.

It was decided to appoint a Committee consisting of Messrs:- Mr. Darty, J.P. Kelly & M. Maher to make inquiries in connection with the matter and report.

The Committee in question having gone down Town and inquired into the matter came back and reported that the ban on Boileau and Boyd had been removed on the 25th. June. The reason apparently the Board had not received Notification was because of the difficulty of communication whilst the firm was only on the list for a very short time.

It was then decided to repeat the orders for the Goods that had been destroyed.

#### MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

During a debate in connection with the matter, it transpired that the Mother of the Child referred to was one of the girls who had been refused admission on the 27th. July. She had been since admitted on a Medical Officer's Ticket. The child was born on the day of admission.

"I enclose herewith copy of letter received from Messrs:- Huggard & Brennan to-day. I shall be glad to have your further views on same as Messrs:- Huggard & Brennan's letter is in direct contradiction to my instructions!"-

"Your letter of the 29th. ulto. addressed to Messrs:- P.J. O'Flaherty & Son, Solicitors, Enniscorthy has been handed to us by Mr. Moses Fortune, Enniscorthy, Blackwater and your Clients, the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians appear to have taken up an extraordinary attitude in connection with this matter. We should have thought, that before they adopted this attitude, they ought to have ascertained definitely whether the deceased, John Mythen had any assets or not, and they seem because the deceased made a will to have jumped at the conclusion that he must have had assets."

The position of affairs is that, in the year 1911, John Mythen was in possession of a small House on a Farm which was purchased by



Mr. Fortune. A question arose between Mr. Fortune and John Mythen as to the possession of this House and ultimately it was agreed and this agreement was put in writing that Mr. Fortune should allow Mythen to retain possession of the House, free of rent for his life, and after his death the House was to revert to Mr. Fortune, and we presume that something like this was present to Mythen's mind when he made the Will. The life interest which Mythen had in the House was the only property he had. There was absolutely no furniture in the House, and Mr. Fortune got absolutely nothing through Mythen's death except the House which he was entitled to under the Agreement prepared in the year 1911.

Not only is this the case but Mr. Fortune himself went to Ennisceorthy and purchased from Mr. John O'Reilly the Coffin, hearse and paid the funeral expenses amounting to £6 and the various point of it is that, notwithstanding the fact that our Client purchased the Coffin your Clients demand £1:15/- for the Coffin supplied.

We have gone into the matter thus far so that you may be in a position to put the facts before your Clients and we trust that when this has been done your Clients will in fairness contradict the erroneous statements which have appeared in the local papers about the matter."

The Clerk stated that the Coffin was specially made for Mythen, as Mr. Fortune stated that he would not supply a Coffin, but offered to supply the Mountings for the Coffin. The Corpse was taken out on a Board-day. Apparently Mr. Fortune changed his mind and purchased a Coffin outside; but that was not getting away from the fact that the Guardians had to pay for Materials to make a Coffin. With regard to the property question, he had made some inquiries, from which it would appear that Mythen was possessed of property and he recommended that the matter be adjourned so that further inquiries could be made.

The Department therefore can only consider the question in the light of a Centralised Scheme of County Hospital and County Home leaving over for the present a Scheme for Cottage and District Hospitals."

The Dail, Inspector was present and addressed the Meeting on the subject, when after a short discussion, it was decided to appoint Messrs:- T. Mc.Carthy and L. Maher to attend the Conference and act as they considered best.

The Master reported as follows:-

Order. "Leave Granted."

"The Winter's Stock of Coal will be required now."

Order. "Quotations to be invited."

"The following were transferred from Hospital to bed at Home." John Brennan, Shannon, Aged 66; Anne Walsh, Knock, Married aged 40; Anne Moorhouse, Shannon Age 6."

Order. "To be discharged."

A girl named Lizzie O'Connor was admitted to Hospital on 9th. August suffering from ulcers in both legs. Dr. Furlong now states she is pregnant and that he will discharge her from Hospital this week."

RE AMALGAMATION SCHEME.

Mr. Frizelle, Secretary County Council wrote as follows:-

"I desire to inform you that the County Council have approved of the Scheme of Union Amalgamation as agreed to at Conference held on 4th. October. For the information of your Board I append herewith copy of resolution passed at Conference:-

"That the four Union Hospitals be abolished and that a County Hospital be established at Wexford for the general Medical needs of the County. We respectfully request the Local Government Department to sanction the establishment of a small Cottage Hospital at Gorey, the present Fever Hospital there to be utilised for the purpose. We recommend that arrangements be made with the Management of the Houghton Hospital, New Ross for the treatment of urgent cases from New Ross and District."

"That a Public Health Committee constituted as follows be appointed to arrange further details and the working of the Scheme:- County Councillors 8; Chairmen of Rural District Councils 4; Reps of the towns of Enniscorthy & New Ross 2; Wexford Corporation 2; Gorey Town Commissioners 1; Persons nominated by County Council 4; Reps of County Insurance Committee 3; Reps of present Boards of Guardians 4; Reps of County Medical Association 2. Total 30."

"It is proposed that a Meeting of the Public Health Committee be held on Wednesday, 2nd. prox in the Town Hall, Wexford and I would be glad to have the names and addresses of your Representatives."

Order. "That Mr. James Lawlor be elected to represent Enniscorthy Board of Guardians on Committee."

The Clerk reported that he had received a letter from Dail Eireann Inspector as follows:- "The Board of Guardians should immediately take steps in the matter of boarding out inmates of the Workhouse. It would be well to begin at once to find what Inmates can be boarded out, to make arrangements for such boarding out and to take the necessary steps to obtain Old Age Pensions for those qualified. It will be advisable to give Enniscorthy Inmates the impression that they are going to be moved, as experience shows that they are more easily



boarded out."

The Clerk stated that acting on the terms of the foregoing letter, he had, in company with the Master, interviewed all the Inmates in the House and Hospital and had prepared detailed statement in each case, which he submitted for consideration. With regard to Old Age Pensioners, there were a number of these in the House, who had been unable to live outside on the amount of their Pension, but if they were granted an additional Five Shillings per week Outdoor Relief, they would be able to leave the Institution.

A Committee consisting of Messrs:- T. Mc. Carthy, M. Maher, W. Williams, J. Lawlor & M. Sheill were appointed to consider Clerk's Statement and deal with same.

The Committee on dealing with the cases made arrangements whereby 14 Mothers with 23 Children belonging to them could take their discharge; Outdoor Relief to be given in three cases to assist Mothers. In some of the others Clothes allowances to be given to enable the Mothers to take their discharge.

One Deserted Child to be boarded out.

5 Healthy Males and 5 Healthy Females to be discharged.

10 Cases of Old Age Pensioners, who were unable to live outside on their Pensions heretofore to be allowed Five Shillings per week O.D.R. in addition to their Pensions.

Instructions were given to have applications made for Pensions for a couple of other cases. And inquiries to be made regarding the possibility of having some of the friends take out some other Inmates.

When this information has been procured the Committee will re-consider the matter.

Mr. Flood, Engineer, reported as follows:-

"In view of the Amalgamation Scheme the Master required the use of the Ward where the Agriculturist stored his Corn; After consulting with both, we decided to put a loft over the Straw-house with a door opening to the Road. It will cost about £22."

Order. "Work to be carried out."



RE ARTESIAN WELL.

Mr. Flood reported as follows:-

"On the 19th. instant we carried out a test as to the capacity of the Spring in the Artesian Well at the Workhouse. In five Hours it gave a total of 1316 Gallons or an average of 263 Gallons per hour. At the present time this would be the maximum amount the Spring would give: the Springs at that date being very low and it would be safe to count on this Supply at all times. Assuming that your population under the Amalgamation Scheme would be 300 and allowing 8 Gallons per head per day, this supply would be ample even independent of your present supply!"

Order. "Approved of. Engineer to take necessary steps in connection with erection of Storage tank."

Mr. Flood, Engineer, reported as follows:-

"The roof principal over one of the Wards is defective and new piece will have to be built in and also some repairs to Valley adjoining it. Cost about £5."

RE STOCKTAKER &c.

Dail Eireann No. 14213/21. Dated. 13th. October, 1921.

Referring to Minutes of 28th. ult and stating that they have sanctioned the payment of £7 to Mr. George Dixon for his services as Stocktaker. Also asking how long the Inmate Mary Butler was in the Institution and if it were usual to allow women of this class outfits when leaving. Also to state what was the Master's reason for employing a man to deliver corn and what work was performed by him. With regard to the employment of two men on the Workhouse Farm, the Ministry would like to be furnished with details showing the duties at present discharged by each.

The Clerk stated that he had answered the letter with the exception of the last paragraph.

"I beg to inform you that the I.R. Police found trespassing on the Graveyard at Cherryorchard 1 donkey and 1 Jennett, the property of Mary Dunne of Redmond's Street, also 1 donkey the property of Mary Pender of Patrick's Place. Both found trespassing on the 17th. October, I am leaving it in your hands to prosecute."

I also told her I could not admit the five year old boy as he was healthy, but that I would admit the Infant ten months old if she got a ticket from Dr. Murphy, as he was suffering from sores on his head. She did this. On the same evening I received a Message from the Sister in charge of the Infirmary stating that Dr. Furlong had sent word that the mother was to be sent for immediately to nurse the Child, this I refused to do. On yesterday Mary Phillips presented a ticket from Dr. Furlong stating "to admit bearer to Hospital" without stating what she suffered from. I admitted her on this ticket, as the woman seemed ill and her legs were swollen."

In reply to a query the Clerk stated that there were three modes of admission (1) By an order of the Board; (2) By an Order of one of the Relieving Officers (3). The Master in urgent cases on his own responsibility.

The Medical Officer could not issue a Ticket for Admission. His duty would be to examine a Person after his admission and decide to what part of the Institution he should be sent.

#### RE WORKHOUSE FARM.

The Agriculturist reported as follows:-

"I have received Notice from your Clerk to supply to the Meeting a detailed Report of our work on the Farm, but to give every thing done would be impossible as <sup>any</sup> ~~every~~ Farmer knows the many turns he has to do. Since John Kenny's son came to work about three weeks ago. We are engaged Ploughing, Picking drawing in and sorting about four and a half Irish Acres of Potatoes and clipping drawing home and covering Mangolds. The Farm Committee came out last Spring and laid out the Crop to



sow in the different fields. I would feel grateful if the Farm Committee would call out to-day and see if their instructions are not carried out."

RE GUARDIANS v SHANAHAN.

Mr. Dunbar, Solicitor, attended in connection with this case and laid before the Board the information he had received in connection with the matter.

Order. "Guardians to proceed against Shanahan in Republican Court for Maintenance of Girl and Child."

RE MAINTENANCE HOSPITAL CASES.

Mr. Dunbar, Solicitor, wrote as follows:

"With reference to your instructions as to Patrick Walsh and Joseph O'Neill injured in Railway Accident and given attendance and maintenance in the Union Hospital, I have been looking into these cases and it would appear to me to be practically impossible to fix the employers with liability unless they entered into a Contract, express or implied, to pay such maintenance &c. They certainly are not liable under the Workmen's Compensation Act."

"Of course each case of this kind would depend upon the conditions under which they entered and remained in the Hospital. The Hospital is a Public Institution and if a Person of no means be injured and brought there he cannot be sued for the consequent expense. If however he has any means (if he cannot be described as a Pauper) and he goes to Hospital knowing he will have to pay, he can be sued."

"Under the Public Health Acts it is provided that any Person maintained in a Hospital by a Sanitary Authority if he is not a Pauper shall be deemed to be liable for maintenance and the Sanitary Authority may recover from him at any time within six months after his discharge from the hospital the expenses so incurred. So that where the injured persons cannot be described as paupers they would in my opinion be liable for the expense of maintaining them, provided proceedings are brought against them



within six months. Please let me know if you wish me to proceed against the two persons above-named. Your letter would seem to indicate that your Board wish me to proceed against the Railway Co. but I do not think the Company is liable unless as stated above a Contract can be proved to between the Company any your Board."

Order. "Master to submit account for these men's maintenance to Railway Company."

#### RE RARM HAND'S WAGES.

Mr. M. Kehoe, Sec. Transport Union wrote as follows:-

"We have been informed that John Kenny's wages have been reduced from 50/- to 34/- per week. We are at a loss to understand the reason for such a big reduction and we consider there is nothing to justify this action on the part of the Board. I have no objection to the above arrangement and renounce all claims to any portion or balance of the money, and leave it to Mr. Aidan Stafford to carry out my Brother's wishes as he pleases."

The Medical Officer, Dr. Furlong, wrote as follows:-

"I wish to point out to the Board that neither of their Orders recently conveyed to me by Mr. Connolly were at all applicable in my case."

We recommend that the supply for the House each day be sent up by four o'clock the previous evening. It is recommended that Butter be ordered for the use of the House from this date and also that the Egg Diet for Breakfast be restored."

The Clerk explained that the reason for suggesting that the Meat be delivered on the previous evening was to allow time to have it returned in case it was not of good quality, as were it only delivered on the morning it was intended for use, it would not be possible to procure a fresh supply in time for dinner.

Replying to a query the Clerk stated that should a Contractor not supply an article of proper quality, it could be returned with the request to have the correct article supplied, should this not be done, the Master could then purchase elsewhere or substitute something else, should there be any difference in price, the amount should be charged against the defaulting Contractor.

RE AMALGAMATION SCHEME.

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The Meeting was proceeding to deal with the revision of Outdoor Relief before handing same over to Public Health Committee, when a question was raised as to whether the Board should deal with the Town Cases or let the Urban Council deal with them as they stood.

The Chairman inquired as to the chargeability of cases, and how the matter stood generally.

The Clerk stated that he had been speaking to the Secretary of the Public Health Committee in connection with the matter and the latter informed him that the Relief was to be charged against the Union Area as heretofore. When this matter was dealt with ~~before~~ before the Local Government Department wrote to the Public Health Committee suggesting the appointment of a Central sub-committee for dealing with Outdoor Relief. Copy of this letter was sent to each Board of Guardians for their observations. Enniscorthy Board suggested that Outdoor Relief should be transferred to the District Councils (Rural for Rural areas and Urban for Urban areas). This was approved of at the Meeting of the Public Health Committee held on 19th. April.

ORDER. "That the question of revision of Outdoor Relief be adjourned until a definite reply has been received from the Public Health Committee as to the manner in which it is to be charged up."

Special Meeting of the Board of Guardians held on Wednesday, 6th. September, 1922.

SUPERANNUATION OF OFFICERS.

The Meeting proceeded to deal with the question of Superannuation of Officers, whose positions were abolished under the Amalgamation Scheme.

The first case taken up was that of Dr. N. Furlong, Medical Officer. The Clerk explained that Dr. Furlong had resigned after a service of 50 Years. He would be entitled to two-thirds his Salary.

The Amount of Salary was £200 per annum and the Superannuation in accordance with Prescribed Scale would be £133.6.8

It was unanimously decided to grant Dr. Furlong a Superannuation Allowance of £133.6.8 per annum.

Mr. Jasper Whitty, Assistant Clerk, was the next case taken up.

The Clerk stated that Mr. Whitty was appointed in February, 1909. He consequently had 13½ years Service. His salary was £143.6.8 per annum.

In accordance with Section 8 (1) of the Local Government Act. The Superannuation Allowance would be a Sum not exceeding two-thirds his Salary and not less than an allowance calculated according to the Scale provided by the Superannuation Acts 1834 to 1892.

The maximum amount would be £95.11.2. Whilst if the Board adopted the old Acts and added ten years service, the amount would be £56 per annum.

It was unanimously decided to grant Mr. Whitty a Superannuation Allowance of £56 per annum.

The Case of the Clerk was next taken up. The amount of salary in this case was £266 per annum.

The Clerk stated that whilst he was actually 22 years in the Office, he could only claim 14 years Official Service, as that was the period for which he was acting as Clerk, the balance of the time had been as Assistant to the previous Clerk. In his case the maximum Pension would be £177.6.8. per annum.



Whilst if the old Acts were taken into consideration and the ten years allowance added the amount would be ~~£106.8.0~~ £106.8.0 per annum. In reply to a query the Clerk stated that in most cases, the maximum allowance had been granted, but that personally he did not expect it, as he had not sufficient service, he would be quite satisfied with the lesser amount.

It was unanimously decided to fix the Clerk's Superannuation Allowance at £106.8.0 per annum.

The Clerk stated that he would prefer a Gratuity in his case under Sec. 6 (1) of the Act of 1900 could change the Superannuation to a Gratuity, in accordance with Scale given in that Act, the Gratuity would be 13.66060 Years Purchase. When their Accounts would be cleared up the Guardians would have more in hands than would cover the amount. Hence he would much prefer to accept a Gratuity and be finished with the matter.

On the motion of Mr. Hall Seconded by Mr. Nolan, the Clerk's application was unanimously granted.

#### RE LEAVE OF ABSENCE

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The Clerk stated that Mr. Murphy R.O. had called on him and informed him that last winter, he had appointed Dr. Bowen to do duty for one week in Ferns during Dr. Greene's illness and had overlooked reporting the matter. During the same period Dr. Greene had done duty for one day and night in Newtownbarry District.

Mr. Murphy, who was present, explained that owing to Family troubles he had overlooked the matter.

Order. "Dr. Bowen to be allowed the recognised Fee of £6.6.0. for the week. and Dr. Greene £2.2.0. for the day and night."

#### RE ACCOUNTS.

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The Clerk reported that during the Terror Period when the Board were dealing with the old Local Government Board, the Guardians had refused to carry out suggestions made by the L.G.B. and had done what they considered was right themselves. Then after the break away and before communications were established with the Local Government Department, other matters requiring Sanction were passed. He suggested that the Board now make application to the Local Government Department for sanction to these items.



Order. "Clerk to make necessary arrangements to obtain sanction to those items mentioned by him."

RE PORTER ENNISCORTHY FEVER HOSPITAL.

The Clerk stated he had received a communication from the Public Health Board with reference to this matter. It appeared that they did not propose to retain the services of this Officer. This person (Mrs. Askins) was acting as Porter to Fever Hospital, <sup>Caretaker</sup> ~~Porter~~ to Enniscorthy Dispensary, and Caretaker of Disinfecting Apparatus situated at the Fever Hospital, this latter was the property of the District Council. She was living in a House situated on the Hospital Grounds. It appeared that the Public Health Board had agreed to allow her to remain in the House as Caretaker at the rent of Sixpence per week. She would retain her position as Dispy. Caretaker. She would require Compensation for her Office as Porter of Fever Hospital. Her Average Salary for that period was £27.5.9 to which the Guardians would want to add her House Allowance, She was appointed in August, 1915, her Compensation allowance consequently would work out at Four Years Salary (i.e. 1 Year for first year and 2 year for each additional year).

It was decided that her House Value be fixed at ~~£17.4.3~~ £17.14.3, so as to make her Salary and Emoluments £45 per annum. The amount of Compensation then awarded was £180.

In reply to a query the Clerk stated that, in his opinion, if the Fever Hospital were retained, it would be necessary to have a Porter. The Hospital was situated some distance from the Entrance Gates and someone would be required to admit Callers &c. The place was only held as a Yearly Tenancy.

It was decided to recommend the Public Health Board to retain the services of the Porter if they proposed to continue the use of the Hospital.
