## CATTLE DISEASES ACT.

The Clerk read the Circular Convening the Meeting to consider the matter of adopting a Petition forwarded by the All Ireland Committee of the Irish Financial Reform League, praying that the Treasury may take some steps to carry out the findings of the Commission of 1894 which comprised as it was of Englishmen of all shades of political thought, testified that Ireland was overtaxed to the extent of 2 3/4 Millions Sterling Annually.

The Chairman (Mr C. H. Keocke J.P.), in rising to propose the adoption of the Petition, said that not alone was Ireland taxed beyond her capacity to the extent set forth in the Royal Commission Report in 1894 but that since then the taxation had increased to a great extent. Mr Keocke quoted some statistics which bore out his statement and spoke at some length on the subject.

Capt M. Furee second the resolution and said the Treasury should be commanded by the Irish People to refund what they had raised in unjust taxation. Mr Michel Brown also supported the resolution and it was passed unanimously. The Petition was then sealed & signed by the Chairman & Clerk on behalf of the Board.

Swine Fever Outbreak No 211

"Stating that Swine Fever existed in the case of a pig belonging to Myles Leary of Coolrainey.

Touching a resolution of the Wexford Guardians contained in their Minutes of the 2<sup>nd</sup> July. Mr Malone writes as follows.

Gentlemen

In reply to the resolution passed at your Board & forwarded to me a couple of weeks ago. I beg to report as follows.

My duties under the Contagious Diseases Act consist of attending all cases within the Union reported to me by the Constabulary entailing very frequently long tedious journeys, in examining minutely into the several cases reported, the causes, surroundings, etc, connected with each particular case.

I have also under an Order of your Board to attend the different fairs of the Union for the purposes of the Act as well as attend to every case reported to me under the head of Rabies. Mr Malone has also appended a list of cases which were visited by him during the last six months in number (24).

The Clerk was directed to write to Mr Malone asking him to report in the future on each particular case as it occurs.

## LABOURERS ACTS.

31764, 1898 = 27 July 198

We respectfully request the Guardians to kindly ask the Local Joint Board to reconsider their decision in reference to our remuneration for furnishing these Reports for the previous year, and we shall in future comply with the requirements of the Local Joint Board.

## CATTLE DISEASES ACT.

## LABOURERS ACTS.

On the motion of Mr Jaslodd J.P. seconded by Mr Murphy the Board adopted a petition under the Labourers Acts praying that the provisional Order be made by the Local Government Board confirming the Improvement Scheme (which proposes the erection of 82 Cottages) and authorising same to be carried into execution.

The Petition having been duly read was sealed and signed by the Chairman and countersigned by the Clerk of the Union as Executive Sanitary Officer.

The Committee on the Plan and Specification of the proposed cottages of new scheme which sat before the Board, recommended some slight alterations in the wording of the Specification which were ordered to be made by the Engineer (Mr McCarthy). With reference to the foregoing Mr M. Browne proposed and Capt McQuire seconded and it was adopted:— That Irish Slate be used in the construction of new cottages.

Mr McCarthy was also directed to endorse on the conveyance to be executed by the Trustees of the Ball's Estate a map showing the site to be acquired.

With reference to the complaint of a tenant of a Labourer's cottage at Little Johnstown, Mr Moses Coefer Contractor, wrote stating that there are no slates off the house.

The matter was referred to the Clerk of Works to report on.

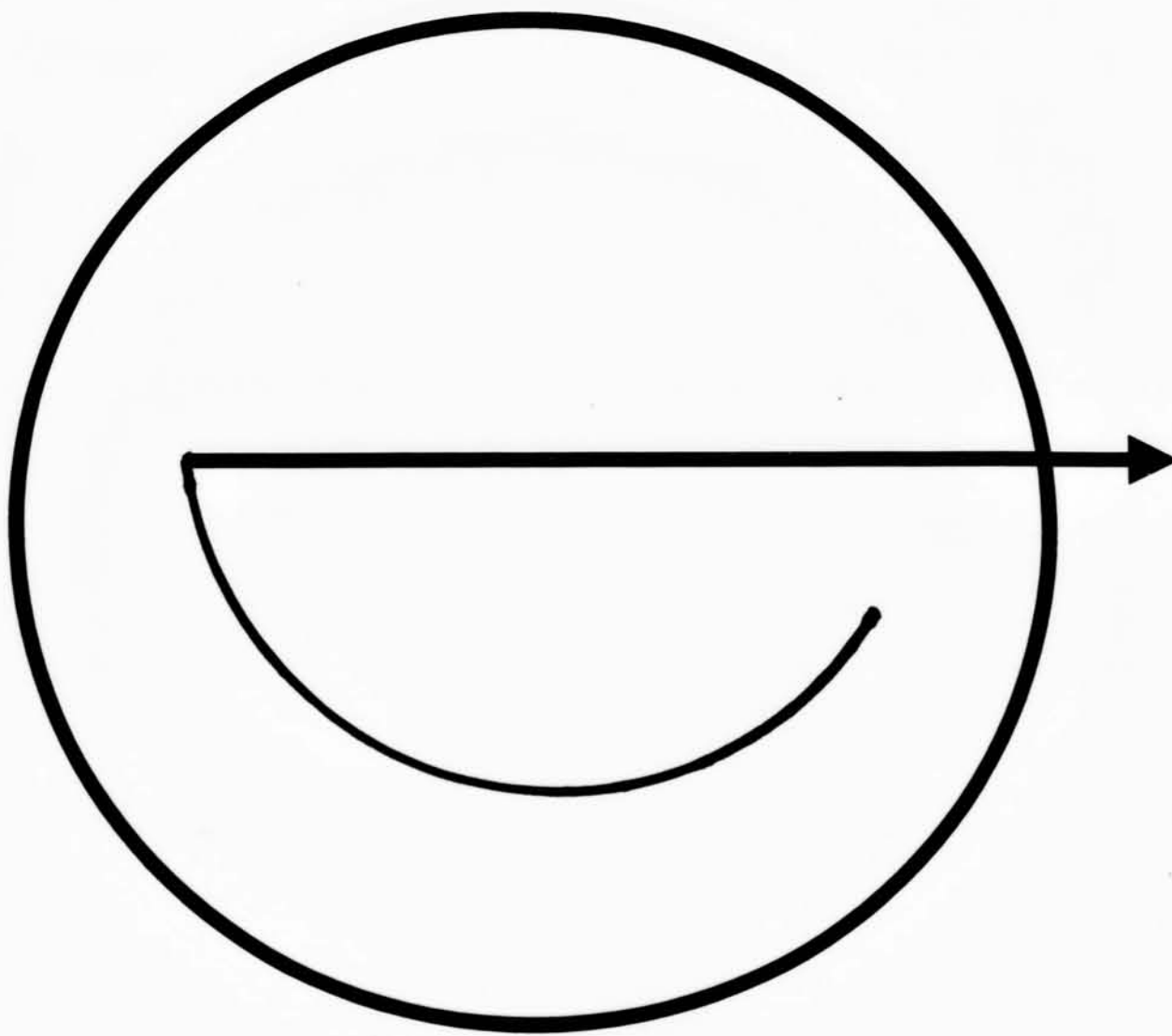
