N^o 87 M. 199 dated 13th February 1899 Drawing the Guardians attention to the paragraphs of the Memorandum of Instructions issued some time since dealing with the collection of the rates before the appointed day. Stating that it is essential that all rates legally recoverable under the existing warrants should be collected and lodged before the 25th prox. That not only will the collectors who have not closed their warrants on that day forfeit their poundage fees but the incoming Board must take legal proceedings against their sureties; that the Guardians should before the close of the present month hold a special meeting for the purpose of striking out of the Ratebooks all rates which are legally irrecoverable; that the Guardians will have no power after the appointed day to issue cheques on the account existing before that day and that until the adjustment of the accounts is completed the balance in the Treasurers hands can only be operated on to the extent and by the terms of the

by the Local Govt. Board
On the motion of Mr. Jas. Codd J. P. seconded by Mr. B. Furlong the Acting Clerk was directed to summon a special meeting of the Board for Saturday next the 25th inst. for the purpose of cancelling bad rates and to communicate with the collectors to attend the meeting with their arrears sheets. The Guardians wish to know from the Local Govt. Board what body will issue cheques and otherwise conduct the affairs of the Union in the interval between the appointed day and the first meeting of the Rural District Council. The Guardians respectfully suggest that they should act until the election of the Council.

N^o 8298/99 dated 16th February 1899 Stating they intend prescribing new forms for the keeping of Union and District accounts and that the Guardians should not order a greater supply of existing books and forms than will suffice for the period which is to elapse until the appointed day.

The Chief Secretary for Ireland and Mr. Peter French M. P. wrote acknowledging receipt of the Guardians resolution on the subject of the Workmen's Swelling Purchase Bill.

The Inspector of Poor East Kilbride, Scotland wrote giving notice that the Poor Law Authorities there will require the Guardians

to pay the expenses of a poor person chargeable to the parish of Kilsbride but belonging to Rosslare in this Union

An Eviction notice at the suit of Rev. R. L. Hays and others against Eliza Fortune for possession of a Dwelling house in Barrack Street Wexford was laid before the Board.

Mrs. Sheridan J. P. and Cardiff certified that they had on the 16th inst. visited the Clerk of the Union and that he was wholly unable to resume duty, and would not be at least for a month.

The Guardians consider the committee appointed is competent.

The School Teacher (Miss Irwin) applied for permission to keep one of her children who has attained the age of 15 years in the Workhouse, ^{for some time longer} stating she is extremely delicate and enclosing a certificate from Dr. John Crean to the following effect:— "I certify that Annie Irwin whom I have examined is in a delicate state of health. In my opinion it would be advisable to have her under her mother's care for the present."

On the motion of Mr. J. O'Donnell seconded by Mr. M. Murphy the Board granted Mrs. Irwin permission to keep the child with her for a further year.

I have to call attention to the collecting of the rents in Mr. Devereux's district, many of the tenants being heavily in arrears. I also have again to refer to their being no means whatever of adequately checking the Rent Collectors' accounts, the amount of rent to be collected is £249 per annum and it is obvious that there

should be a systematic check over so large a collection.

I have looked at the books to which the Guardians refer - red as affording a sufficient check but I find that for such a purpose they are absolutely worthless. I must ask the Guardians to again take the matter into consideration

as I cannot certify for the correctness of an account which it is not possible to check in its present form and I again urge that the Collectors should be supplied with type numbered receipts and blocks.

On the motion of Mr Codd, seconded by Mr. B. Furlong the auditor's suggestion was adopted.

they had their collections on the appointed day and in a satisfactory manner.

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Mr. Hore drew my attention to the salary of the Inspector of Explosives being charged over the Urban portion of the Wexford Electoral Divisions as well as the Rural portion. I have looked into the matter and apportionment seems to be correctly charged. There is an error however in the accounts of the Union under the heading, as through oversight the salary of the Inspector of Explosives for Duncormack and Taghmon Petty Sessions districts has been charged over the Union at large instead of on the Electoral Divisions comprised in the Petty Sessions districts mentioned - this error can easily be rectified at close of the current half year's accounts.

With reference to the surcharges against the surety of the late James O'Connor, vouchers were produced to me £19; 9; 5 leaving £30; 6; 2 due. I understand that a further sum of £3; 6; 10 has been recovered leaving £26; 19; 4 to be paid by the sureties. Dr. Cardiff has his proportion but it will be necessary for me to take proceedings to enforce payment of the balance.

A voucher of £1; 10; 1 was produced to me in favor of Mr. E. O'Connor, which changes the balance of 11s/7d against him to one of 18/6 in his favor.

I have surcharged Mr. Devereux with 14/- rent lost through his negligence. I have also surcharged Messrs Peacock, Codd & Hore with the sum of £222 being the amount paid to Mr. Colfer for his untaxed bill of costs. I look upon such a payment as an unfounded one and in order to

avoid the enforcement of the surcharge the Bill should be taxed by the Taxing Master forthwith.

On the motion of Mr. Hore, seconded by Mr. Roche the Bill of Costs was ordered to be taxed forthwith.

The rent of the Medical Officer's Residence has been credited to Medical Charities Account. It should have appeared in "other Receipts" account.

I regret having to draw attention to the very unsatisfactory manner in which some of the Master's books have been kept and checked. In many instances it would appear on looking over the Discharge column of the Workhouse Register that persons were still inmates, but from an examination of the Indoor Relief List and the Admission and Discharge Book, I find there, persons left the Workhouse months ago and they have never been marked off in the Register, the number in each class as

shown in the Diet Book at close of each week should agree with the corresponding columns in the Admission and Discharge book, but the differences between the two are very

remarkable for instance the Admission and Discharge book at the close of the half year shows 148 aged and infirm persons in the Workhouse - the actual number being 196.

Again the Admission Book shows 52 children under two years of age as remaining but the correct number is 5, a difference of 47. These discrepancies have arisen from the

Master's neglect to make the transfers and changes in the

Admission book when they took place. As shown in the Diet Class Books these matters should be at once attended to and discharges should be marked off in the Register and the numbers as shown in the Admission Book be made to agree

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with the Diet Class Book and compared regularly each
The Provision Class Book is very disgracefully kept
calculations of various articles of food consumed and
maining vary for the same quantities in the most ex
dinary manner and it is evident that no care or thou
been bestowed on the matter at all. It might reason
have been expected that Mr. Kehoe would at all even
fully equal to the task of checking the Master's book
in a proper manner but this he has not done, with the
result that at the close of the half-year there were
numerous differences and discrepancies in the quantities
and prices of the stock found, as compared with the
on the books. The differences in the Clothing Stock
are very great and I must express my very great dis
faction with the manner in which the Master's books
kept by him and the manner in which they have been

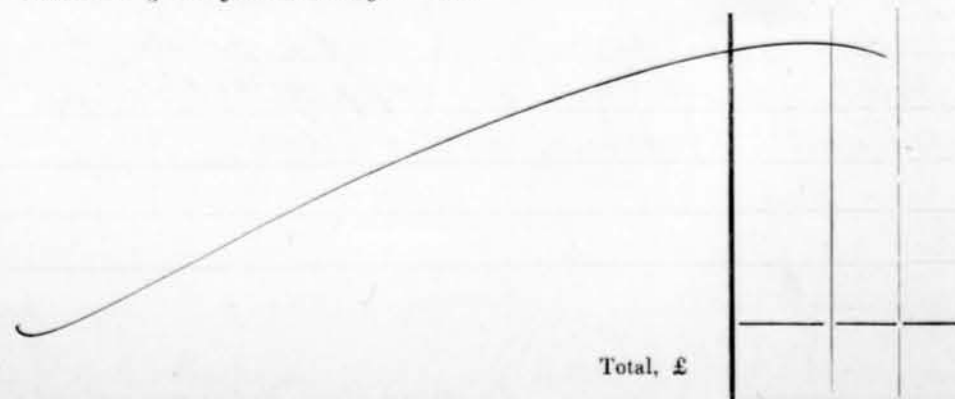

and a special meeting of the Guardians called for Saturday the 12th Aug to consider the advisability of appointing another member a new member.

A list of Quenies on behalf of George Hammett who has been appointed in charge of the Fever Hospital was received from the Local Government Board, and Miss Hammett herself wrote thanking the Guardians for her appointment and stating she would take up the duties on the 29th August.

Patrick Brien Porter at the Fever Hospital wrote asking the Guardians for the Annual Suit of Clothes, it was ordered that advertisements be issued for same.

Mr Culpes Solicitor to the Board wrote stating he had prepared the summons in the case of Bridget Carey who was ordered to be prosecuted by the Board, the Master was directed to have the witnesses in this case ready by Wednesday at 10/30.

Mr Culpes writing in reference to the taxation of Mr Culpes bills of Costs stated that the Taxing Master had certified for the two bills at a sum of £254-18-5 which was considerably higher than the amount accepted by Mr Culpes in the first instance viz £238-10-0.

Mr James Mahony only handed in a notice of motion proposing of the services of Mr John Culpes as Solicitor to the Board.

A tender was accepted from Thos M^o Donald King St for the sum of £4-15-0 for whitewashing & colouring at the Fever Hospital in accordance with the advertisement inviting tenders.

An order of the Board was made that John Connors Shoemaker get a weeks notice stating that his services will be no longer required.
