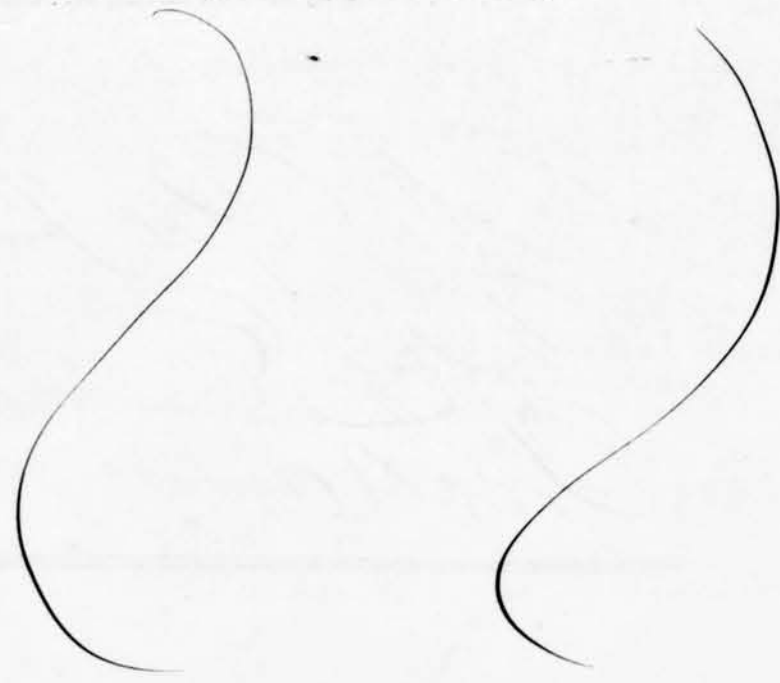

The Queries were all answered favourably—except Nos. 1, 9, 11, & 14. To which the following answers were given:—
No. 1—Yes with the exception of the Calverton, of the New Building, the floor of which is very bad indeed—No. 2 Sleeping Ward in the same building had the bed wet. And the Night Buckets had been upset. The Marks of which remained.

The Master stated in reference to this query, that he had procured the tiles to make the floor, and that he would have put them to work at it in a few days, he also stated that the Man who wet the bed, and disturbed the Buckets had been removed from that Ward the next morning.

Query No. 2—The Refracts in the Lying-in Ward have not sufficient appliances for their being washed. The Nurse should be supplied with a large tub, and be made responsible for their cleanliness. The Master stated that he had got a tub for the purpose, and had conveyed the instructions of the Committee to the Nurse.

Query 11—There are Measles still in the House. No Order made.

No. 14—Yes. There is not a sufficient supply of New Milt. "Ordered" that the Clerk write to the Contractor informing him of the circumstances and that the Board request he will supply the quantity of milt required. The morning, through which to be made as soon as possible. The Nurse said they were very offensive. (Signed) George L. Hunt. The Master stated that he would have them purged, with the least possible delay.

Having been directed by the Board to enquire into the expenses of the House, we have done so, to a certain extent, and though our enquiries, are by no means conclusive, we give the result as far as we have gone.

The Board was naturally startled by the fact, that in the printed report of the Commissioners, and in the Public Papers, the Work House is always quoted as an expensive one. We have carefully gone into a comparison between the expenditure of Warford House, and of other Houses, and we find that this Workhouse is really below many of the Workhouses so compared with it, though quoted in Reports &c as much higher.

Thus we find causes from different modes of calculating the weekly average cost, of Relief a very different House.

Some including items which others include, We have taken one uniform method which shows the real average and we subjoin this method, having taken the sums from which our calculations are made, from the Half-yearly Abstracts of the different Unions. To the 25th March last, We take the Collective Number of days of Relief given in each Workhouse during the Half-year. The sums expended on a/c of in Maintenance, and the Weekly averages calculated from these, which show the real average weekly cost of Relief.

Into those Unions whose real average appears lower than that of the Wexford House, we shall in future put them for the purpose of perpetuating by this example, if possible, We have taken one change in the Dietary from them, for the purpose of recommending its adoption by the Board, which if carried out will lower the average.
One Cause of the lower cost of Maintenance in the Wexford Workhouse is that the clothing of the inmates costs less, than that in other Workhouses in the County.
In the other Unions of this County the cost of clothing is 3^d per head per week, in our House it is 2^d. This arises from the amount of work done by the inmates and

and show that the Ratepayers of this Union are benefitted by the exertions of this Office connected with the Industrial department.

The first recommendation we make, such a change as will tend to reduce the expenditure, is the adoption of Soup for Work at Supper to the Able-bodied Classes; to the Children over Five, and to the Children over Five, We calculate the saving to be about £120. if Annual, taking the average Number of Inmates at that of last year. The Diet is used in other Houses with much success.

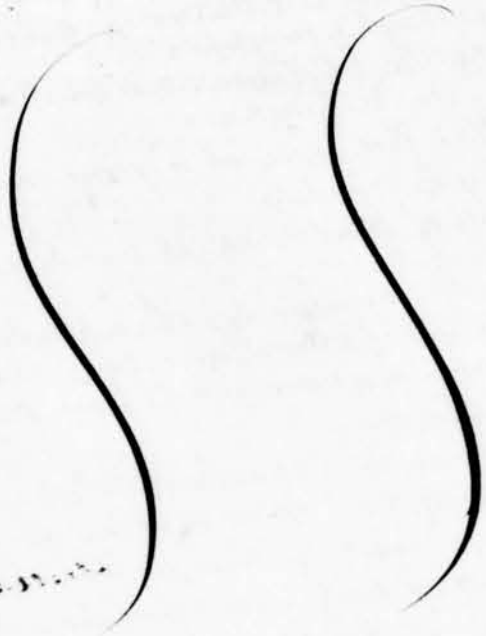

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon, as follows:—

The Queries were all answered favorably, except No. 2 & 9. to which the following answers were given:—
No. 2—Yes with the exception of some complaints to be brought before the Board, by the Master.
The Master complained of two Paupers, one of whom he found drunk, on Christmas day, and the other he suspected, had been drinking whiskey, on the Sunday.
The Pauper who was found drunk, is serving his time to the Bakers, and acknowledged, that having been sent of a message, to one of the Auxiliaries on Christmas morning, he got from a man, in town some whiskey, which he drank, and became intoxicated.

He was severely reprimanded by the Board, and suspended from his duty as an apprentice to the Bakers, for one fortnight, at the expiration of which time, the Board will again consider his case.
The Proof against the other Pauper not being satisfactory, the Board dismissed the case.

Rep. Cont. No. 9. Yes with the exception that the children do not receive regular washing as they ought.
"Observe" that the Master have the Children brought down to the Bath room, twice each week, and wash, — There is a new Pipe reg., for the Boilers in the Women's Bath room, very cheap cast-iron Pipes can be procured by Mr. Willis.

Rep. Cont. The Master was ordered to get a Pipe from Mr. Willis for the purpose of a larger Board than the present one is reg. in the Female School, for the instruction of the girls in ciphering. A larger Coal Box is wanted for the Laundry. These requisites were ordered by the Board. Mrs. Brady, a nurse in the Infirmary, applied for some clothes for her son, to enable him to go out of the House, his clothes being ragged. The Board ordered a cradle for washing clothes from the Boilers room, to remove any danger which exists from the present use of a ragged cloth. Orders were also made for the purchase of a new broom by the Master, with the least possible expense.
The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

I beg leave to report to the Board, that having been ordered by the Poor Law Inspectors, to remove from the rear, on the Female side of the Workhouse, a large heap of manure, several of the Guardians, Sir Francis L. Mount, Messrs Robert Roche and Webb Furlong, having objected to its immediate removal, they request of the Board to finally decide on the matter.

The Board orders the postponement of the removal of the manure referred to.

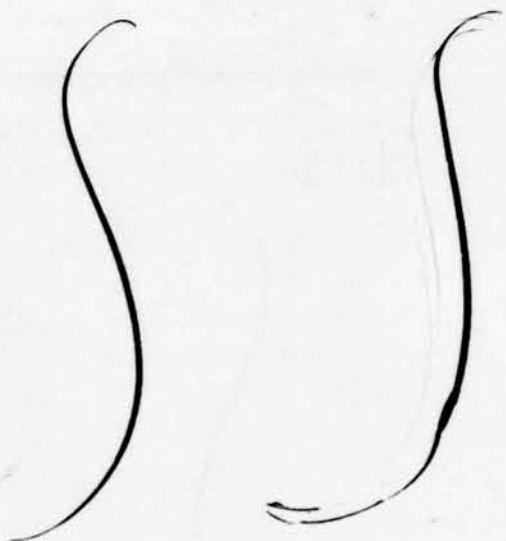

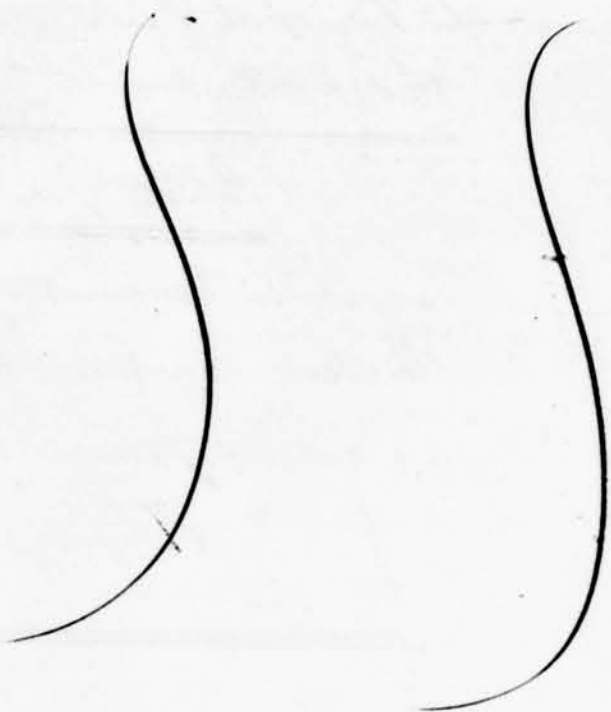

We have well considered the question of the expense of the Relieving Officers, in this Union, & we think that the expense, may be altogether saved by the abolition of the Office - The intention of the Legislature, appears to

to have pre-supposed the existence of Out-door relief, upon the appointment of Relieving Officers -

Out-door relief, has never existed as a system, in this Union, & therefore the Machinery for carrying it out, was always, unnecessary. - Our experience, of the working of our Union, by means of very efficient, Relieving Officers - is, that their efforts, tend to the increase of Idleness. Paupers - the burden of which, is now very excessive.

And, that Guardians, attend less to their duty, of watching the admission of Paupers, upon Board-days, than formerly. - We therefore recommend the Board, to apply to the Commissioners, on the subject, & in case of their taking steps, to carry out, the opinion of the Board, we advise that the Guardians, of the several Divisions, shall, after the change, give tickets of Provisional Relief, in place of Relieving Officers, a Duty, which is rendered, easy, from the curtailed size of the Divisions. - And, also, that the admission of Paupers, take place, earlier, in the proceedings of the Board.

In case, there is very prolonged, delay, in carrying out, the opinion, we have expressed. - We advise, that the Salaries of the Relieving Officers, be reduced.

We have likewise, considered the Wages, paid to the Baker, & are of opinion, that 15 Shillings per week, is sufficient, under all circumstances; his salary varying, at present, from that sum to one Pound,

The Steward, wishes to know what he shall do with the Flax seed, saved by him, "Ordered", that the Clerk, advertise, in one of the Local Papers, for Tenders, for the sale of one half ton, of Flax seed, grown on the Workhouse ground; to be considered, on the 27th Inst., & that notices of the sale, be posted, throughout the Union. —

A Country Woman, applied for a Girl, from the School to serve as Maid-Servant. It appeared, she intended to give her, neither Wages, nor clothes. 20th March 1832 (Signed) George I. Hunt. The Board made no Order, in reference to this Application.

Masters Report.

That, on the 19th Instant, the Relieving Officer for the Electoral Division of Wexford, gave a Ticket, for admission into this Workhouse, to a Man named David Dwyer, from the Electoral Division of Rathspick. who was in a dying state, and, at 8 o'clock, in the evening, sent for the Car, belonging to the Union, to convey him to this Workhouse.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directed to be given thereon, as follows:—

That, when the man, in charge of the Car, arrived at the House, into which Percival had been taken, from off the road-side, he found him almost lifeless, & of course, did not disturb him. That, in about 2 hours after, Percival died, & was brought, in the Car, by the man in charge to the Workhouse. That, after consideration, he took the Corpse & gave it a Coffin & Shroud, belonging to the Union; & had it, interred next day.

The Board did not consider the Master culpable, for taking in the dead body, under the circumstances, but ordered, that the Division to which Percival belonged, be not charged, with the expense of the Coffin & Shroud, as it would be illegal.

The Relieving Officer of the Division, informed the Board, that the friends of the deceased, would have paid for the Coffin & Shroud. The Board ordered the Master to see, that the Union be not at the loss, of the Coffin & Shroud. Supplied. — The Master also reported, that Catherine Cusker, the Cook of the Fever Hospital, requested, a weeks leave of absence, to go see her friends. The Board, granted her permission, and ordered, Ellen Green, to perform the duties of the situation, during the absence of Cusker. The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

Extracts from the District Inspectors Report, of the 3rd Inst. on the Wexford, P.L. N. National School, forwarded by Messrs Giff & Kelly, Secretaries to the National Board of Education.

The Teachers are sufficiently qualified, as respects literary acquirements, & their method of conducting the School, is "rather satisfactory." The elder boys, appear to have been, pretty well taught. - The younger boys, must be neglected, unless an Assistant, paid Teacher is appointed, for the Male School.

The Board desire to inform the Commissioners, that they do not consider it necessary, to appoint an Assistant Teacher, as, the boys are occupied, nearly every day, at field-work & receive literary instructions, in alternate classes, one from 9, to 12, & the other from 12, to 3.

Rep: Comd An additional Desk, is wanted for the Male School, and another for the Female. - The Board ordered the Master to have two Desks made without delay.

Rep: Comd Half the Girls are taught, in a distant Auxiliary House, but the Assistant, instead of confining her self, to the Younger Girls, has in her charge, as many classes, as the principal Mistress, an arrangement, which prevents both Schools, from being rightly conducted. The Assistant should have the first class, alone, leaving the elder Girls in the parent house.

This suggestion of the Inspector, has been carried into effect, since he made this report.

Rep: Comd The Female School is open, only two hours a day, during the Winter half-year; a period, entirely too short. The Board ordered the Schoolmistress, in future, not to neglect, on any account, observing the Rule, laid down by the Commissioners, of devoting three hours to literary -

Literary instruction, during each day.

Resolved The Girls are very backward in Arithmetic, & have done but little in Grammar, Writing, or Geography. Explanation has not been sufficiently attended to, by the Mistress.

The Board hoped, the Schoolmistress would, in future, pay more attention to her duties, & that a report similar to the above, would not, be brought before them again.

A Letter from John Murphy, of Umhaggard, stating that the house, occupied by William Doyle, in the townland of Greyrobin, was pulled down, and that he hoped the Board would have it obliterated from the Rate-book, before the next Rate is made.
