

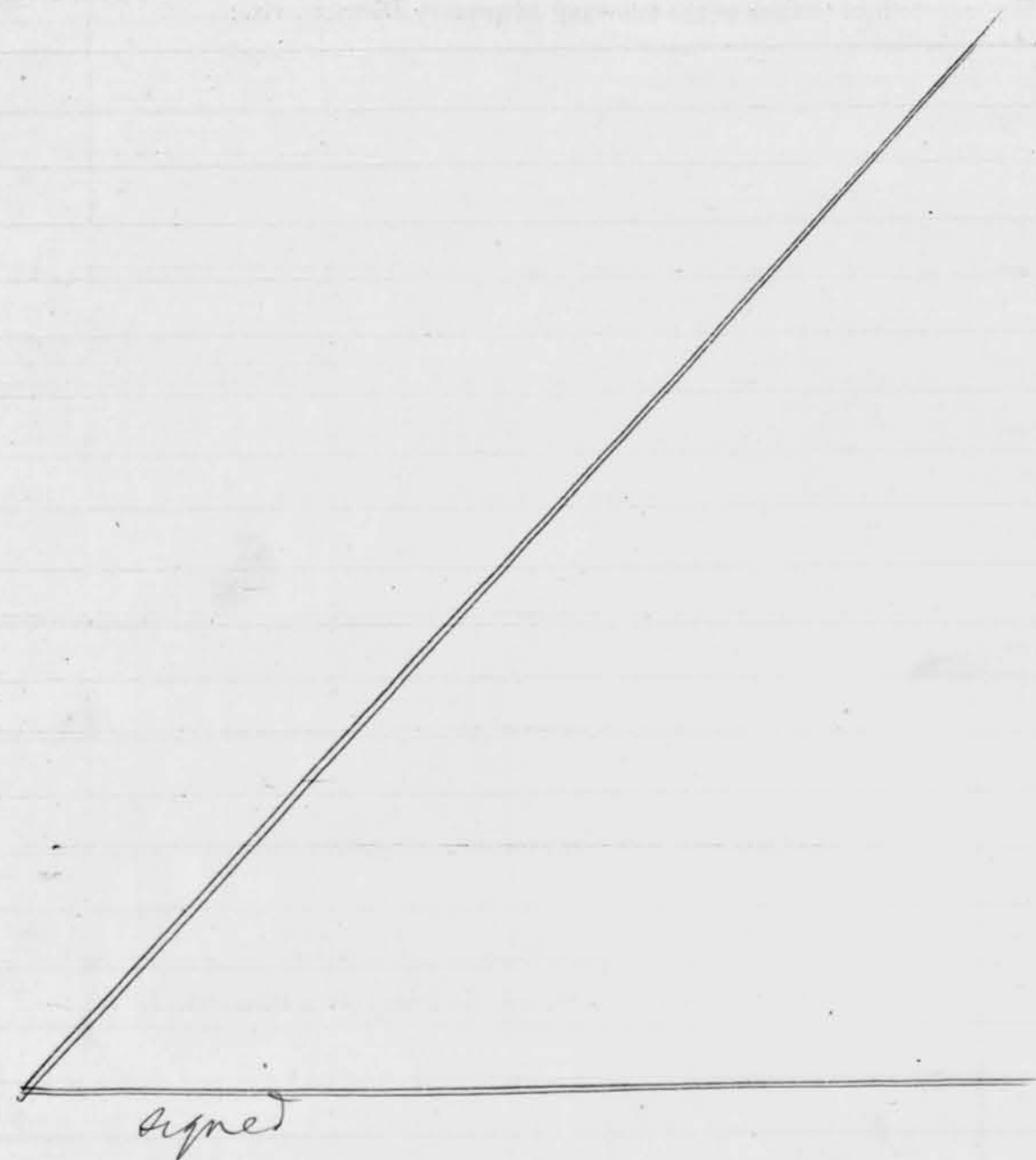

on him under the New Accounts' Order.

that during the Master's tenure of office a gross profit of £615 was made on the sale of pigs.

Lady M. Fitzgerald moved that the Master's salary be increased by £12 per annum on the grounds of extra work and for the general satisfactory manner in which he performed his duties. Mr. Wm Kehoe seconded. Mr. John Codd, (Anghwilliam) proposed and Mr. J. P. Scallan seconded that the Master's salary be increased by £10 a year on the grounds of efficient performance of his duties. Lady Maurice Fitzgerald withdrew her proposition in favor of the latter proposal of an increase of £10 a year.

Mr. Michael Murphy proposed a direct negative; — "That the application be refused", and Mr. Michael Doyle seconded. Mr. Hore proposed, and Mr. Meyler seconded an amendment to Mr. Codd's motion to the effect that an increase of £5 a year be granted. On a poll as to whether an increase should be granted 27 voted for and 10 against. Mr. Murphy's negative was accordingly defeated. On a second poll as to whether the increase should be £10 or £5 a year 17 voted for £10 and 15 for £5, 6 declining to vote. The Master's salary was accordingly increased by £10 a year. (Sanction of Local Government Board requested).


