Resolved "That we the County Council of Wexford do hereby become this Holiness Rite and to the Cardinal Archbishop of Paris the feelings of sorrow and surprise with which we view recent acts of forcible interference by the Government of a professed Catholic Christian Nation, with the worship of God, the Authority of the Holy See and the liberties of religious Communities, sacred rights which are protected and safeguarded by non Christian Powers

We Catholic Irishmen whose forefathers found their salvation both faith by the sacrifice of all words in Christ are joined by our non Catholic Colleagues in tendering our heartfelt sympathy in this hour of trial hour of oppression to our brothers in France, their great Country whose hospitality to Irish Catholics exiles, remains a cherished memory in the hearts of a faithful people

A Committee of the whole Board met this day to take into consideration the Local Govt Board letter No 31 N. 1906 dated 16th June 1907, suggesting a new method for valuing stock in Workhouses.

They reported as follows:

The Committee appointed to consider the letter of the Local Govt Board on the subject of the valuing of Workhouse stock of the Union has been as follows since the passing of the Local Govt Ireland Act. viz.

The made up article in use are valued at cost price and an allowance of 45% for depreciation. The unused made up articles are valued at cost price without any deduction. New materials are valued at current contract prices. The proposed system is as follows.

That at the end of each year the clothing be valued at the rate of £3 per head according to the average of inmates and discharge for wear and tear 15/- per head per year. By this means the total value of the clothing for inmates will be discharged in 2 years. Your Committee cannot agree with the proposal to discharge the total value of the clothing in 2 years. Take one of the most important article of bedding for example the blanket - the Local Govt Board surely do not propose to discard a Keweenaw castle which is noted for its durability after two years, the average life being from 10 to 15 years while it will be laid finance worth off the value of an article which was only so to speak in the infancy of its career.

Your Committee is of opinion that any method of valuing clothing which do not take into account the reserve stock which all institutions like this must have and make the mere stock in fact as valuable an asset for the purpose of valuation as an actual is obviously unsound.

They wish to state that the inequalities in the valuing of clothing cannot be attributed to this Union, the system being uniform the valuation of the clothing and the discharge from the clothing account are influenced solely by the use or face of the actual stock.

Your Committee therefore unanimously recommend the Guardians to continue the present system of valuing the stock in the Union as in our opinion it is far preferable to the suggested system.

The Committee's report was unanimously adopted.



The man Farrell who was declared Contractor for plastering the Laundry and Kitchen wrote stating he would commence work on the 10th inst.

Mr. O'Brien Engineer, wrote enclosing certificate for payment of £27.10/- to Messrs. O'Brien & Keating Contractors for sinks in Laundry. Regarding the new range he wrote saying that it was working satisfactorily but there was a much larger demand for hot water than it was reasonable to expect and consequently it was not always hot when required; that he expected the Master would be able to reduce this later on but quicker heating could no doubt be got if the chimney stack was raised say 10 feet when he arranged that the contractors would do for £13 if the Guardians thought well of letting them do it, if not the work could be finished without raising the stack which could be done or not as desired later on.

The Master disagreed with the Engineer's remark that there was more hot water used than it was "reasonable to expect" as he must have known the six troughs would have to be kept supplied, eventually the matter was referred to a Committee to meet Mr. O'Brien on Saturday next & to go fully into the matter.

Regarding the inmate named Byrne who is a

Reservist and who refused to pay for his maintenance the Regimental Accountant Cork wrote stating that his pay could not be issued to the Guardians for the man's maintenance or for that of his wife or family.

It was decided to reduce the charge for this man's maintenance to 3/- per week and the Chairman undertook to write to the authorities in connection with the matter on being supplied with the particulars.

The Sec. Orthopaedic Hospital wrote stating that all the expenses due to his Hospital in connection with the treatment and maintenance of the girl Meyler who was sent from the Workhouse suffering from curvature of the spine was 30/- for an appliance for the girl's back.

She was maintained free through the kindness of the Chairman getting her into the B. Wexford cot. It was assumed when this girl went to Dublin that the appliance would cost £20, and the Mother in addition to pay the girl's travelling expenses, undertook to pay £5 towards the cost of the appliance and had paid the sum of £4. As the whole cost to the Guardians was the sum of 30/- for the appliance it was resolved to refund the girl's mother the £4 she contributed.
