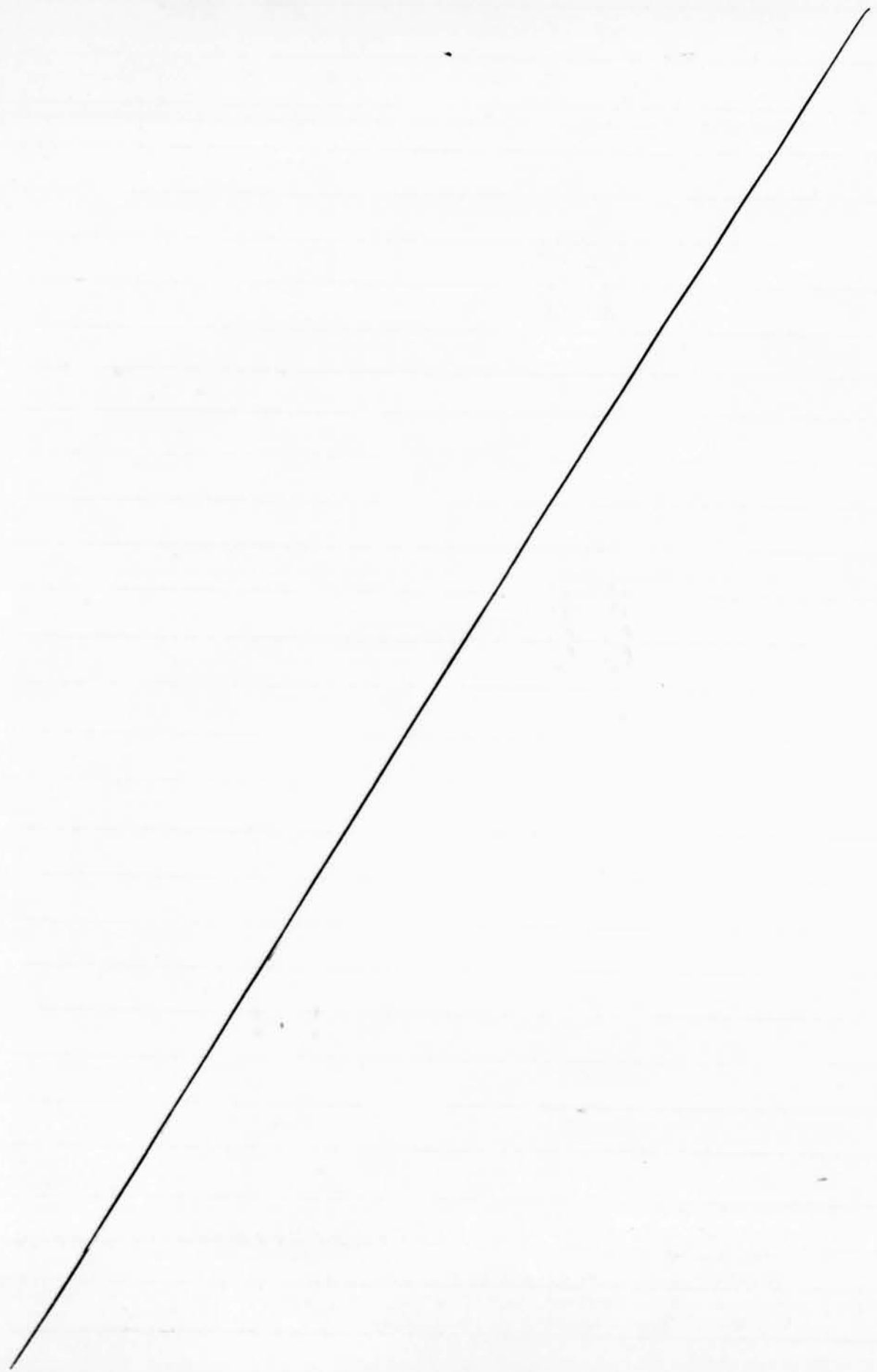

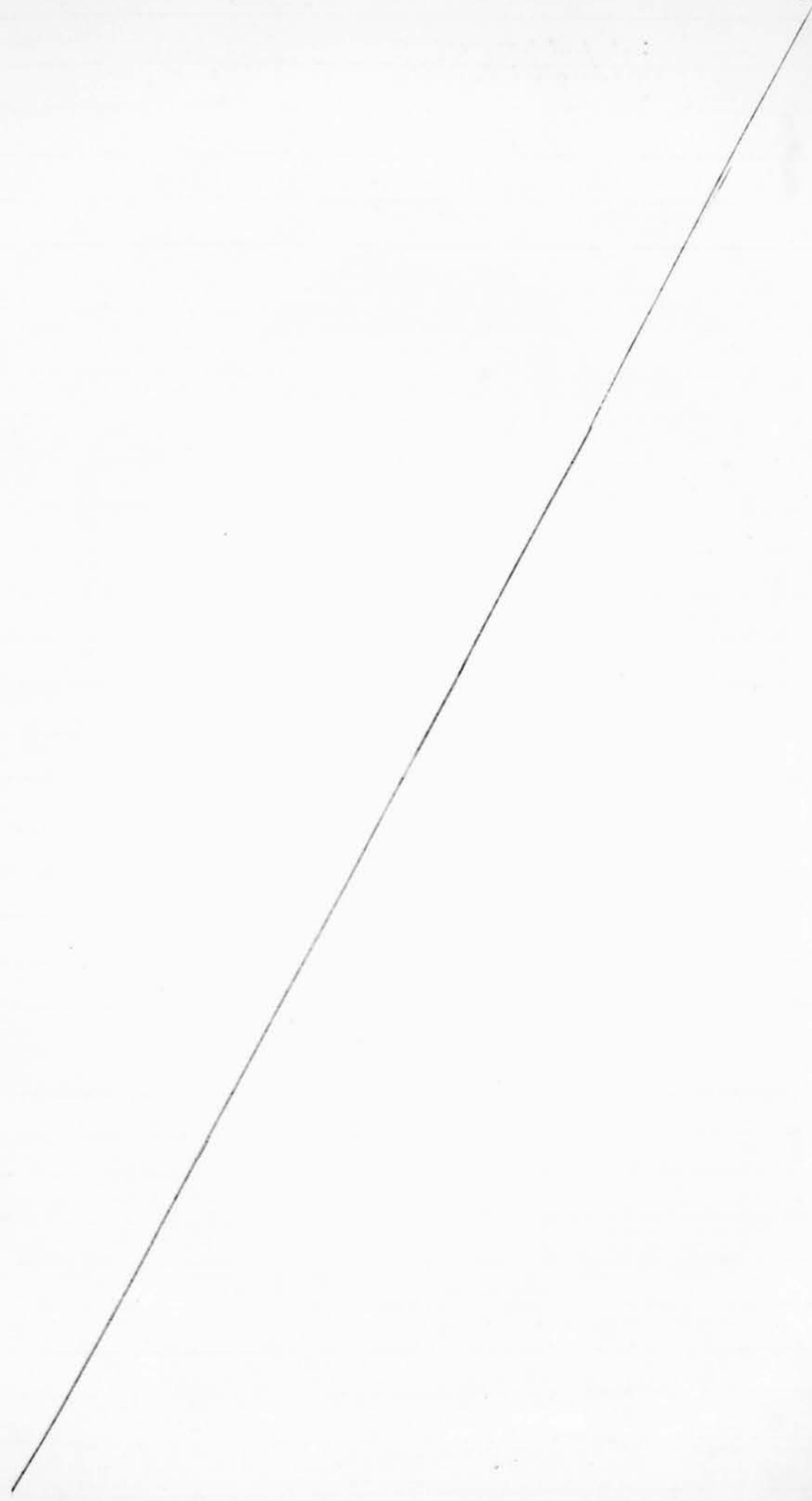

M<sup>rs</sup> Magdalen Johns proposes to let the 1/2 Statute Acres of Land, for £3.12.0. per Acre, for the same term that the ground upon which the Workhouse is built.

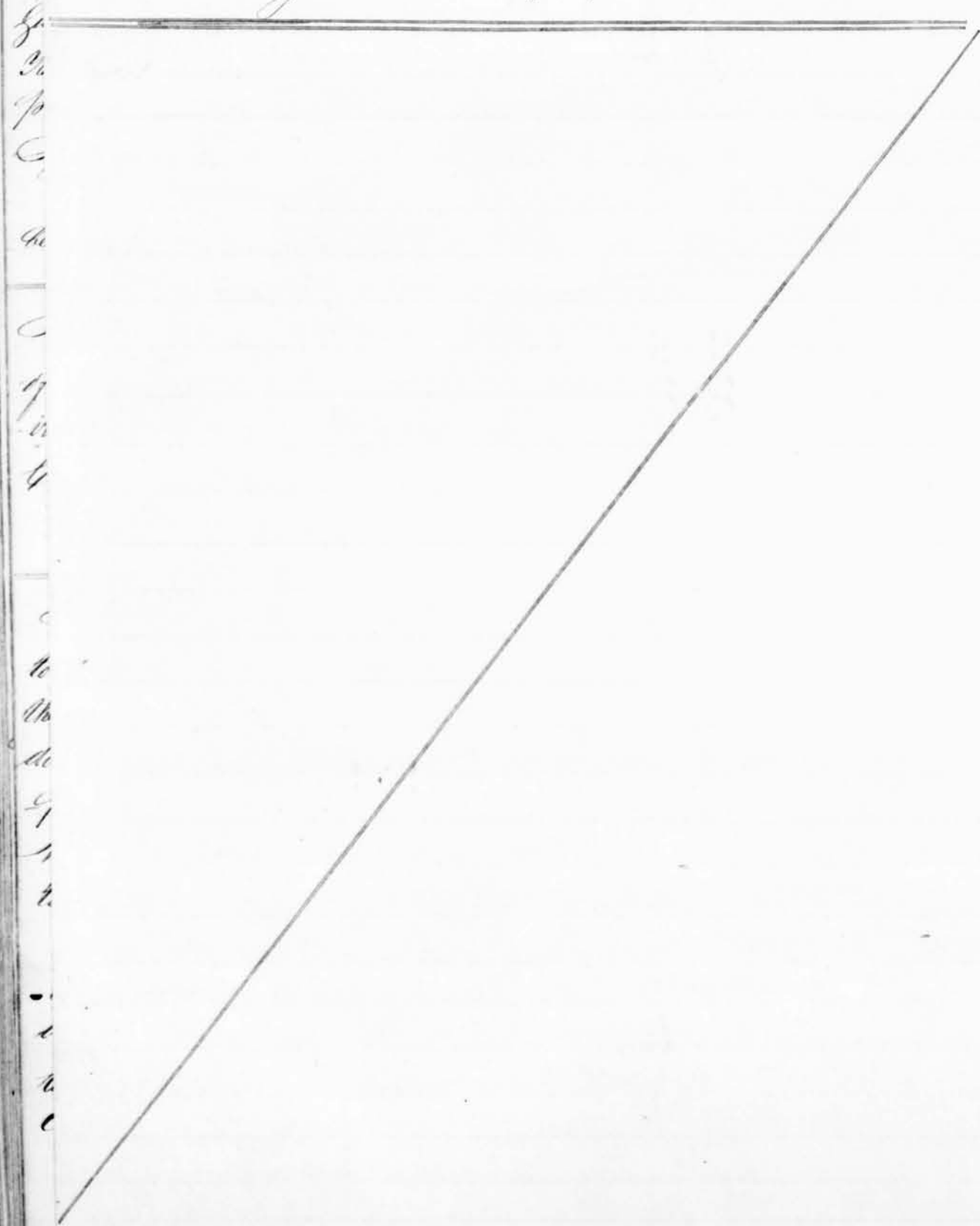

The said Defendant left this House on the 19<sup>th</sup> of July 1852. Her child Michael, having been in the Infirmary of said House, she took it with her, and went the same day, direct to the Doctor, and by Dr. Lanes' Order, she got the child into the Poor Hospital under the name of Matthew Larn, instead of Michael McDonald, and her own name Mary, instead of Anne.

The said Defendant having been arrested, under the War-

Warrant which had been <sup>issued</sup> for wilfully neglecting to support her child, which case I proved (so far) that she the said Defendant, always acknowledged to be the said child's mother, and that she never came to look after him, since the above 19<sup>th</sup> Inst. But the Bench told me, that that circumstance was not sufficient, when I could not prove, whether she was able to support said child or not, and that I could not do. The case was dismissed, the woman let at large, and I have the child still.

The Board respectfully request that the Commissioners will submit this Report to the Law Officers of the Crown, and procure their opinion thereon.

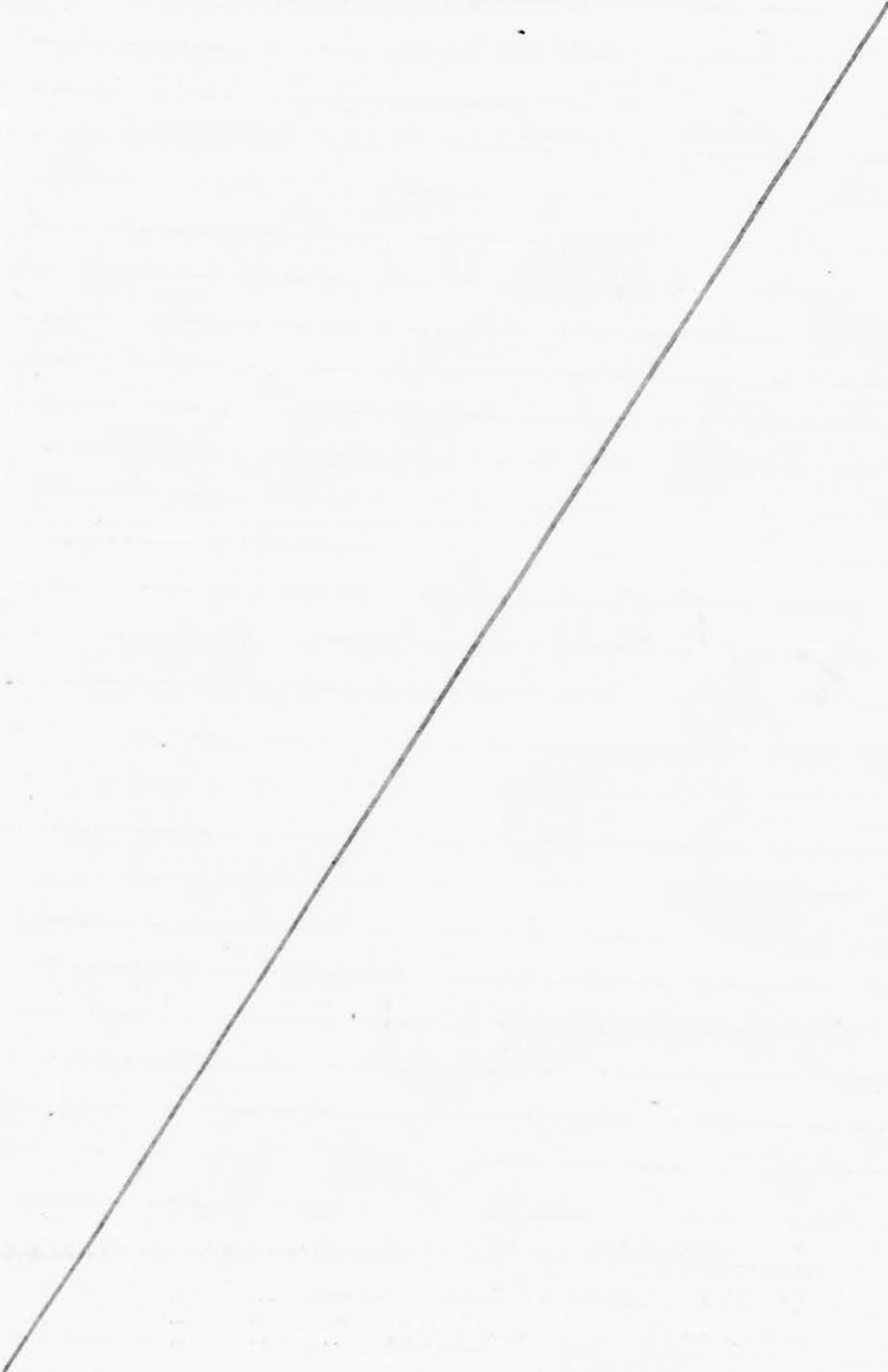

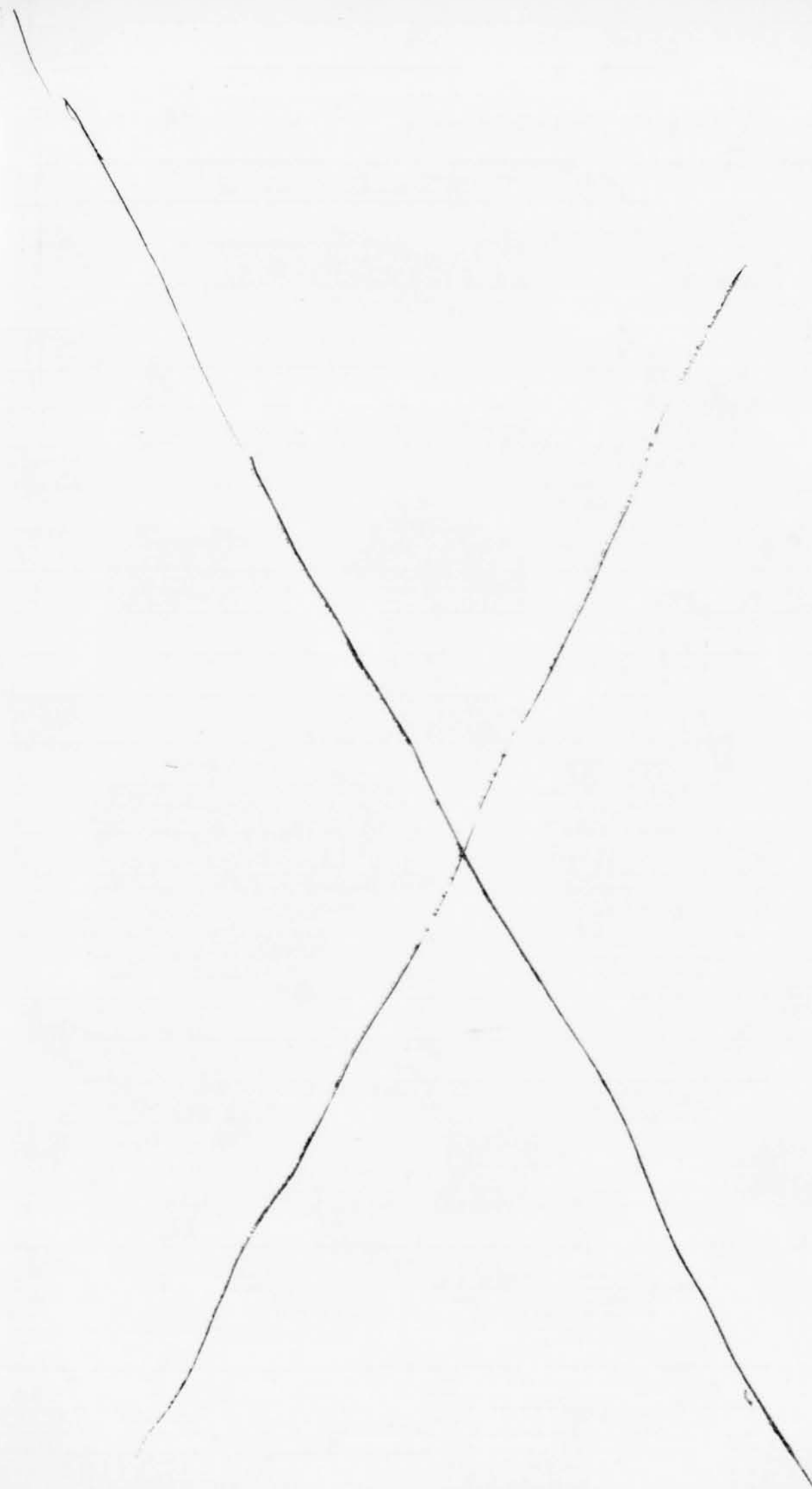
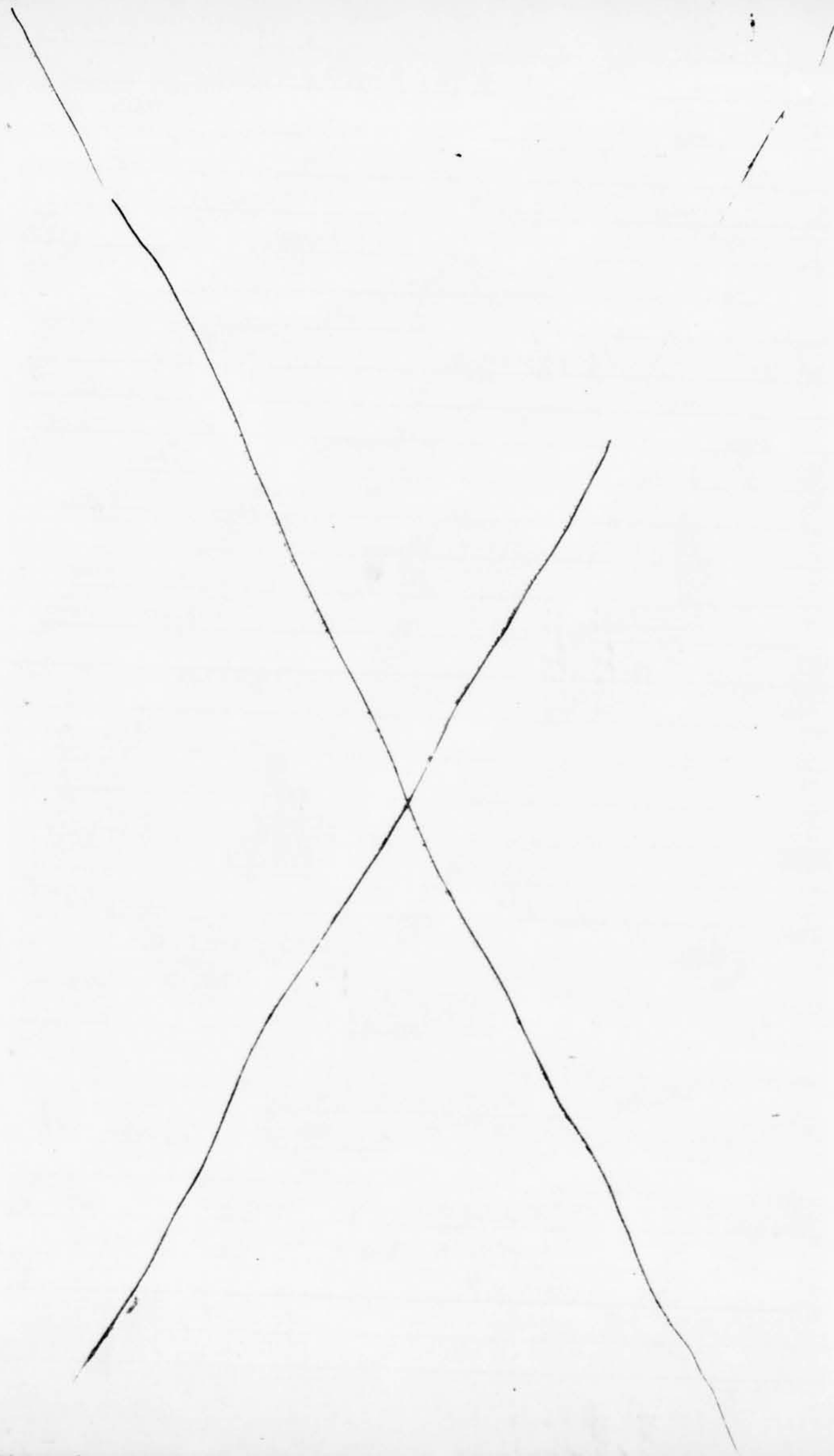

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon, as follows:—

The Queries are all answered favorably.

The Bolsters in the Infirmary become stained in a short time. We recommend that Bolster-cases be procured for that part of the establishment.

This recommendation is adopted by the Board.

Rep<sup>t</sup> Gov<sup>t</sup>. The Matron applies for Rugs. The Rugs of the House wear out sooner than they would otherwise, from the old system of wringing by hand. A Wringing Machine is used in the County Infirmary, and we recommend that one be procured for this House.

Rugs ordered, and the Master directed to write to some of those Workhouses in which Rugs are manufactured, to enquire from what material they make them, their durability, and cost of each. He is also instructed to inquire, what it would cost the Union for a wringing Machine, similar to the one at present used in the G<sup>o</sup> Infirmary.

Workhouse. named John Parle and Margaret Gullam, and into the discipline and management of the Workhouse generally, referring also to their Resolution of the 18<sup>th</sup> Dec. requesting that inquiry would be made respecting the sleeping of the Porter Books, and as to the Members of the families of Officers who are residing in the Workhouse, the Commissioners state, that they instructed their Inspector Mr. Burke, to make an inquiry into the matters referred to, and that they have received his report, and the evidence taken by him, on the inquiry which he held, on the 20<sup>th</sup> Dec. The irregularities which prevail, seem to have arisen, from neglect of the duty imposed by the 12<sup>th</sup> paragraph of the 6<sup>th</sup> Article of the Workhouse Rules. And even yet the duty imposed by that Article is but negligently observed, the entrance door, being unlocked some nights up to 11 o'clock, and the Officers of the Workhouse being in the habit of occasionally stopping out, until that hour. It appears the Subordinate Officers leave the Workhouse without permission from the Master - that the Assistant Master does not sleep in the Workhouse, and that the Matron is in the habit of giving passes to female Inmates, to leave the Workhouse, which she has the power to do, only in the absence of the Master.

It further appears that the Masters wife, the Matrons Daughter, the Schoolmasters wife, and Auld, the Porters five children, the grand-daughter of the Infirmary Nurse, and the Auld of the Assistant Infirmary Nurse, are residing in the Workhouse. And that the children of the Porter, Sleep in the Bath-room,

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### Cherries of the Choice

That the Master is not equal to the responsible duties, entrusted to him, and they therefore request, that the Guardians will require his resignation. The admission of various Members of the families of Officers, being opposed to the Workhouse Rules, and having led to great irregularities, should be discontinued from the date of the Guardians next Meeting. And the Commissioners request, that the Assistant Master may be required to sleep in the Workhouse, regularly, in future.

It also transpired in the inquiry, that the Peter has been observed on some occasions, to have been affected with Liquor, but not intoxicated. And that on one occasion he permitted the brother of the Clerk of the Union, to remain in the male Probationary Dormitory all night, and that on some occasions he went to the Country, and remained out, during the night, with however the Masters permission - The Commissioners therefore, recommend the Board to discharge the Peter.

The Commissioners desire to observe, that the Putnam, every Wards and Dormitories, should be reserved exclusively, for persons who are being prepared for admission to the Workhouse, or provisionally admitted in cases of urgent necessity, and the Guardians are requested to give directions to this effect. — " — " — " — "

Resolved - That the Keys of the entrance be returned by the Porter to the Master, at 9 o'clock each night, agreeably to the 12<sup>th</sup> paragraph of the 6<sup>th</sup> Article of the Workhouse Rules.

The comfort and health of the Master, depend greatly on his having his wife to prepare his meals.

The Daughter of the Master is required by her for the same reason, as the Masters wife, and she is besides of great use to the Master, who deserves every indulgence from the Guardians.

The Grand-daughter of the Nurses who is a good Officer, is an unprotected child of eight years of age, her residing in the House, is not attended with the slightest inconvenience, or expense.

That the Probationary Wards, and Bath-rooms be kept solely for the purpose, for which they were designed.

Resolved, that with respect to other matters, contained in the Commissioners Letter, especially as relates to the Master and porter, and the children of the latter. Mr. St. Hunte - the Chairman, is requested to convey to the Commissioners the unanimous feeling of the Board, which they respectfully hope, may receive their favorable consideration.

A letter from Messrs. Crofts and Kelly, Secretaries to the Commissioners of National Education, forwarding for the information of the Board of Guardians, the following extracts, from the District Inspectors Report, of the 23<sup>d</sup>. Oct. on the Monford Poor Law Union National School - The Teachers are sufficiently qualified as regards literary acquirements and conduct the business in rather a satisfactory manner.

Only 13 Boys are learning to write; 8 only are advanced in Arithmetic, The Boys of the third class answer well in grammar, and.

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and Geography: those of the Second and Third, read and spell well, and are fairly proficient in explanation.

The Younger boys cannot be properly instructed unless an Assistant paid teacher be appointed.

The girls write well, and are fairly proficient in reading Spelling and Explanation, They are not advanced in Grammar, Arithmetic, or Geography.

The Female School wants Slates, pencils, copy-books, and Geographies.

The girls of the Infant School, in the Auxiliary House, appear to have been confusedly taught.

The Inspector remarks, that the accounts of attendance &c. of the pupils, are well kept in the male department, not quite so well in the female, and that those in the Infant School, have been kept in a careless and slovenly manner.

Resolved - that the School-master be directed to furnish the Board, on the first Saturday of each month, with a return showing the average number of children attending the School during the month, the number of such children learning to read, the number learning to write, and the number learning Arithmetic.

A letter from the Inspector General of Police, enclosing a Warrant which was issued on the 11<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>y</sup> last, for the arrest of a man named Edward Furlong for deserting his wife, and informing the Board, that Edward Furlong is supposed to be working in or about Athy, County Kildare, and that in each case of this nature, it should be stated, whether the Guardians would defray the expense.

The Guardians will not in this case incur the expense, the wife of the Man not being at present in the workhouse, and there being no certainty of his being working at, or near Athy.

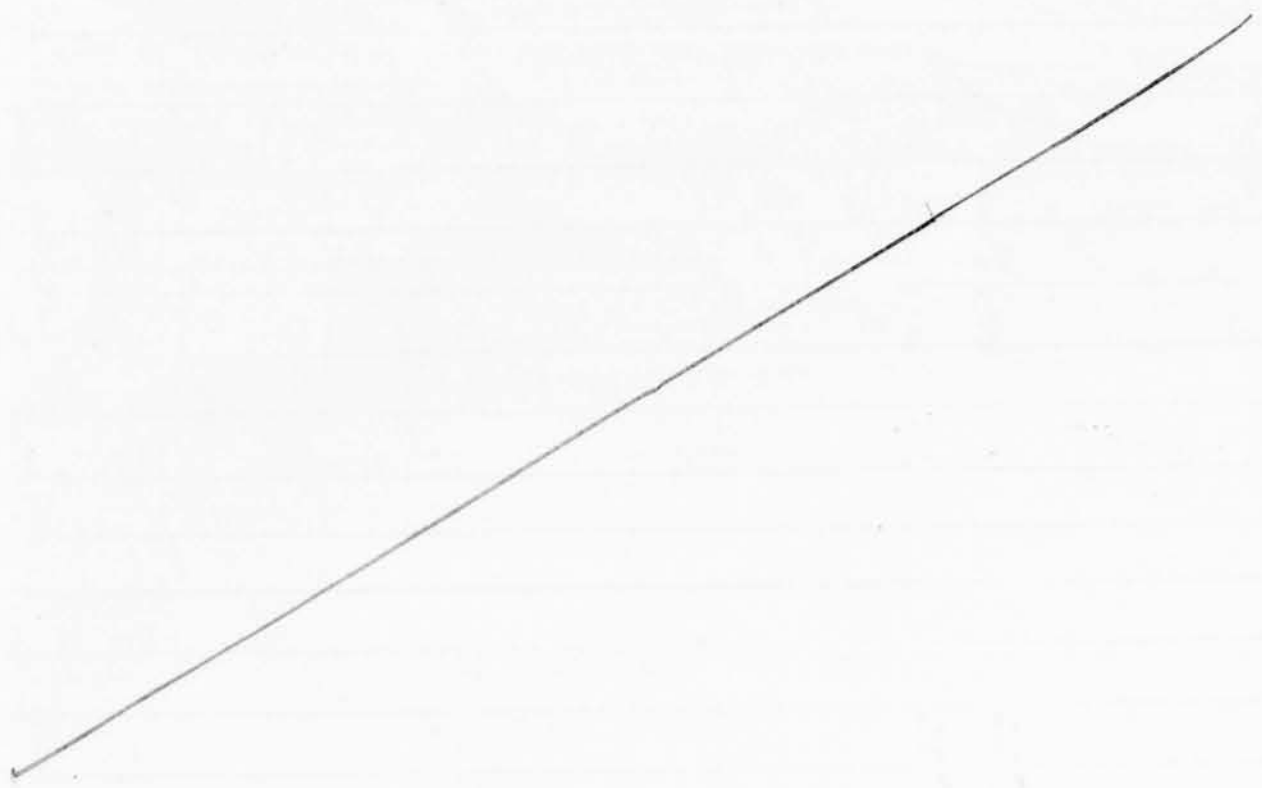

The Committee took into consideration the feasibility of bringing up the children from Mary Street Sanitary House to the main Building, as the numbers are at present, by sending the younger children to occupy one of the Salleries, and throwing the Infant School-room into the Girls School. Sufficient accommodation would be provided, should the numbers increase very much the permission of the Commissioners may be asked to use one of the Probationary wards for the younger children.

The Board approve of the young children being sent to one of the Salleries, and the partition between the girls School-room, and infants School being taken down, and they request the Commissioners to give their sanction to this arrangement.

Rep. Cont. The Committee think that permission may be granted to the Master to carry out part of his plan

for levelling the girls yard, viz; by making drains to carry away the water, and so far altering the level as to permit the carriage thorough from the piers, to cross it.

The Board concur in the opinion expressed by the Committee in this particular and direct the Master to proceed to make those alterations in the girls yard recommended by the Committee.

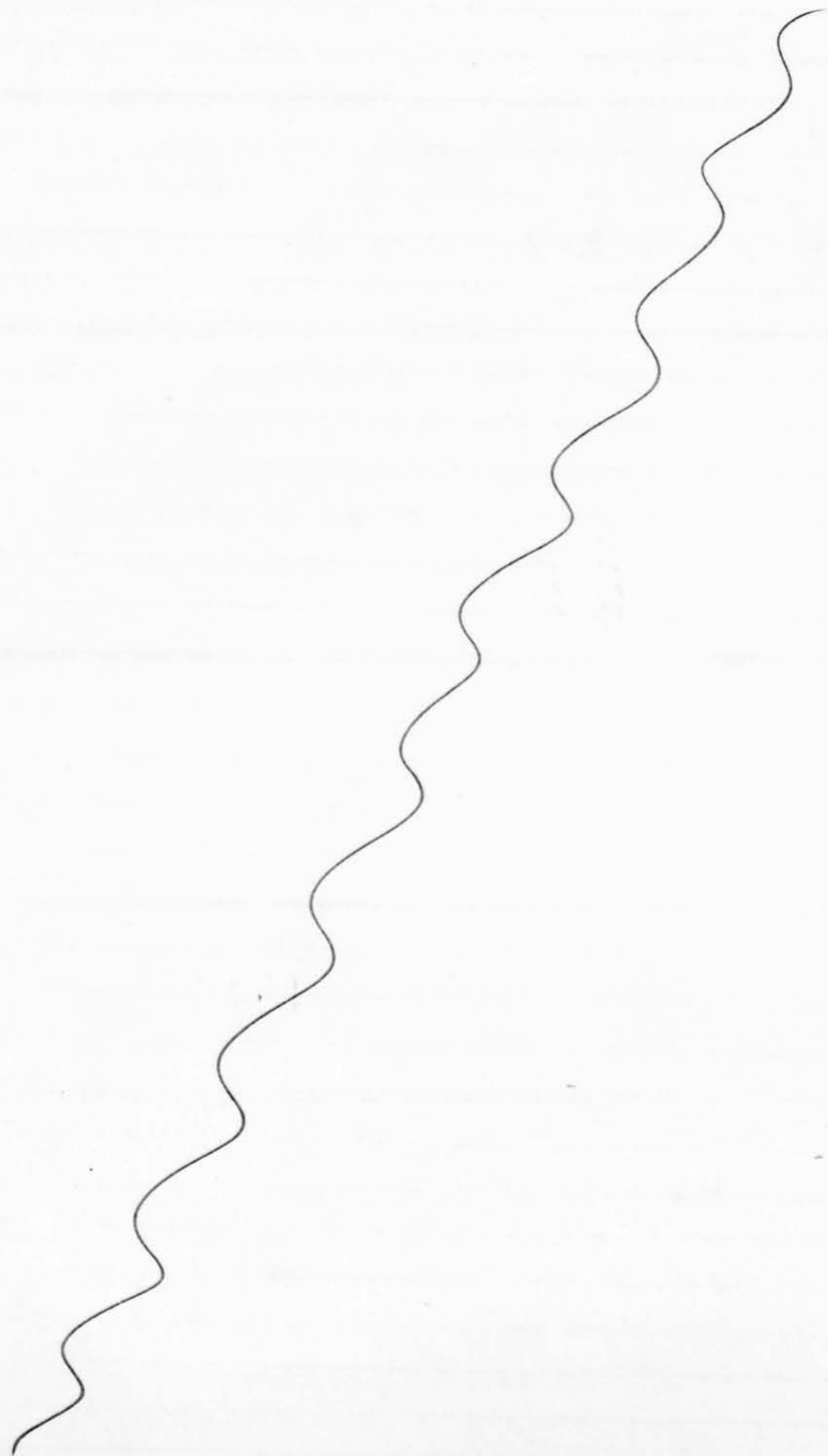

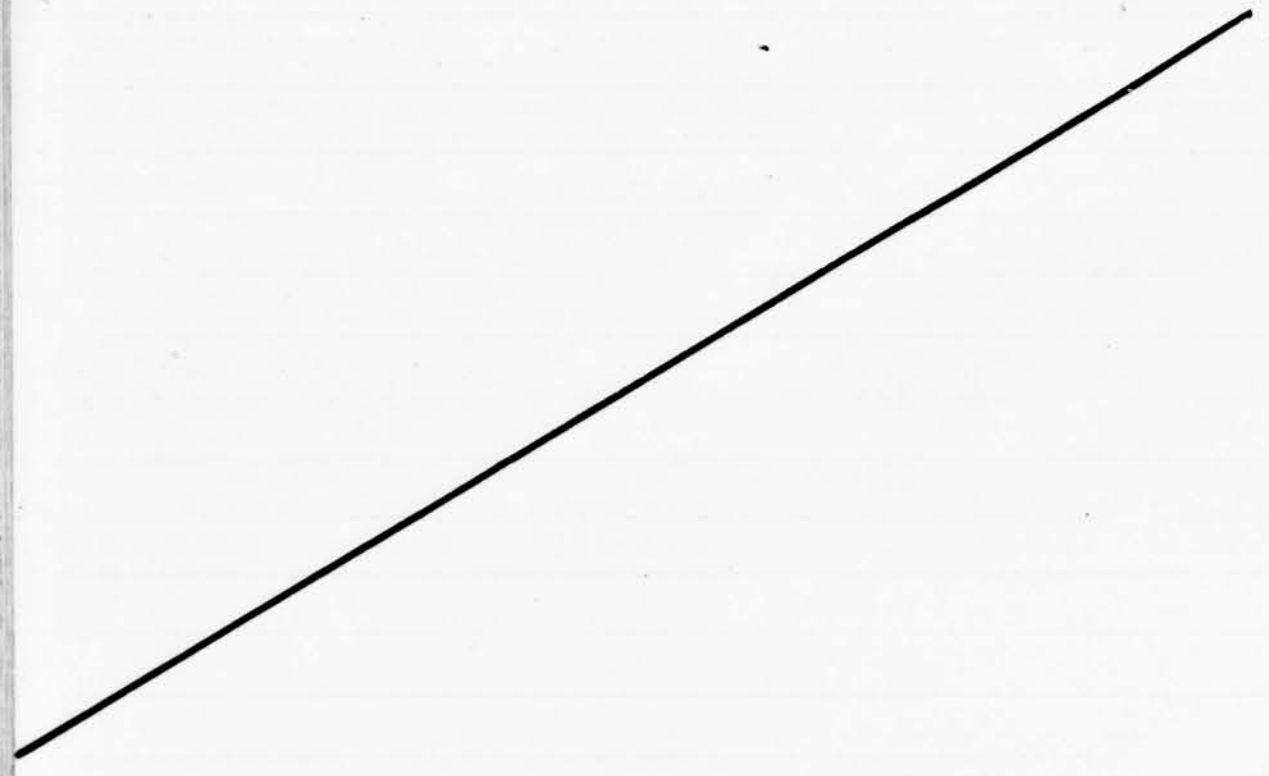

Six ounces of meat are now given for dinner in place of eight ounces, and two ounces of Bread are taken from the eight ounces previously allowed for dinner and added to the Bread for supper. In full diet there appears to be more meat than necessary.

There are at present 50 patients in the Fever Hospital, and but 3 Nurses including the Head-Nurse. The Rules of the Board of Health allowed a Nurse for every 9 patients, an additional Nurse is therefore now required.

in the three departments at the date of inspection being 308, out of the 184 who were 11 years of age, and upwards, only 38, or one in five - one in eight of the total - were able to read with any degree of ease, a simple narrative in the Lesson-book.

Of the 308 pupils, 15 only (5 Boys & 10 girls) - can write a fair hand. Only 15 know the nine parts of Speech; 6 of these, however, are able to parse an easy sentence -

3 Boys only or 1 in 52. Show any knowledge of the outlines of the Maps of the World. The 157 girls are wholly ignorant of the subject.

Of the 308 children, 3 only could enter millions from division: 8 Boys worked a sum in Subtraction, all the girls and the rest of the Boys being wholly ignorant of practical Arithmetic.

The Head Inspector represents the Teachers, all of whom were ranked as National Teachers of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Class. (2<sup>nd</sup> or lowest divisions) - as qualified in nearly corresponding degrees, for their respective positions. All these, he observes, require to be trained.

The Children were all particularly well conducted. No Order made by the Board on this letter.

The Teachers are all willing to agree to whatever arrangements you may agree on or think best. The Embroidery Teacher attends at the present at half-past 9 in the morning, that is the time the children in the Auxiliary House get Breakfast, and I understand it would be half past 10 before they would be ready for work. So that that would be some loss. and as Success in business is what is wanted by all parties. I would suggest that the Embroidery Teacher go out to the Workhouse in the morning at 9 or half-past 9 and remain till one or half-past one, if it would not interfere with your other employment, and in the afternoon to the Auxiliary House.

Vis Chap 14, and suggesting that these charges usually denominated Staff expenses, should be defrayed out of the Consolidated Fund, with the view of a Petition somewhat similar being adopted by the Board of Guardians of this Union, if the Prayer of the Petition should be in accordance with their views on the subject.

It is at the rear of the Fever Hospital, and only a few yards distant from it. Besides it is small, there being room for only fifteen beds.

It lying in ward in the Infirmary, accommodation for women nursing their own children, when so it is an addition to the Nursing, and more clothes for the Infants, when carried into the Infirmary, are most necessary.

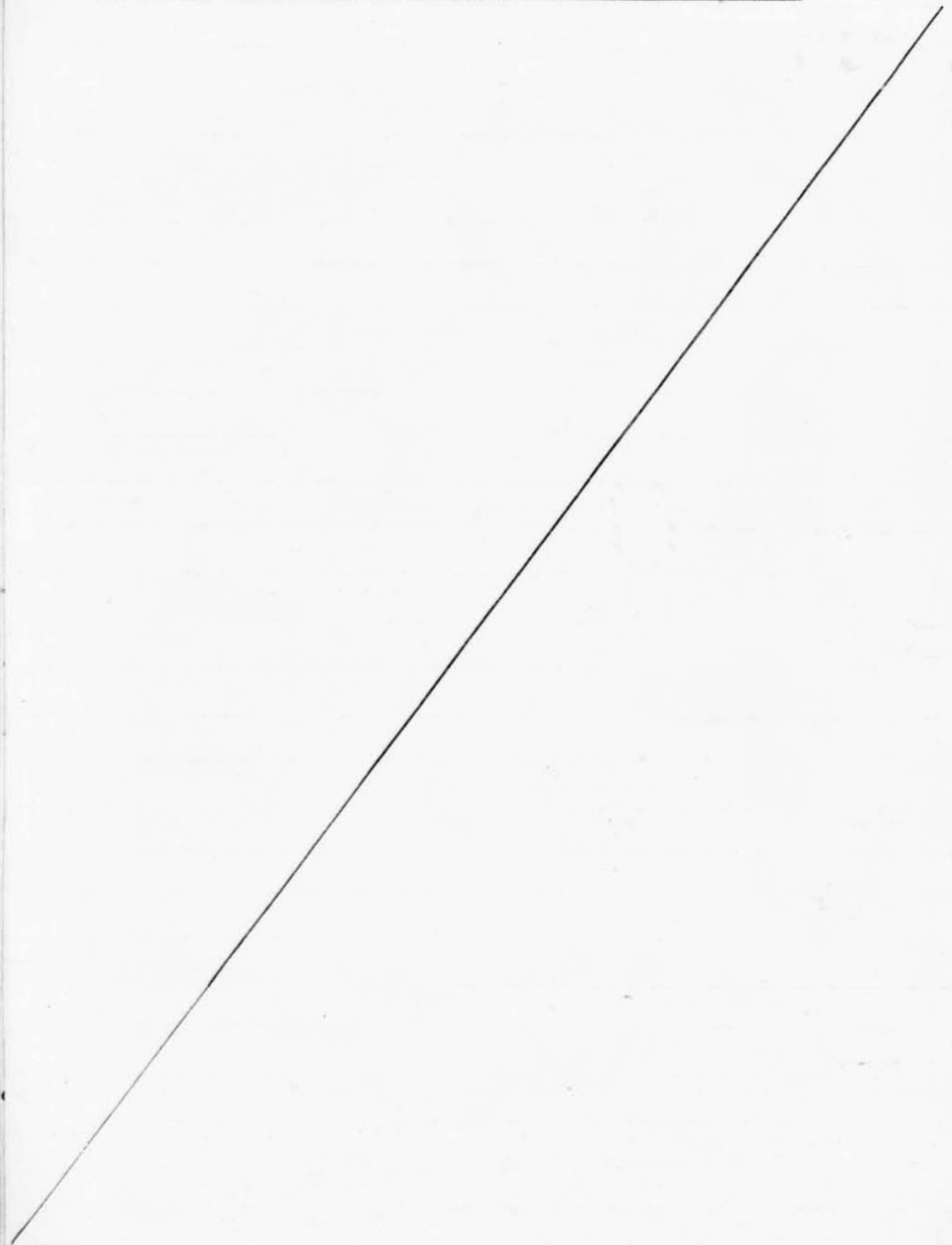

In the Infant School 27 Girls were present, of these "We were able to read, 10 read well, 2 were beginning to write" in Slates. This School wants slate pencils, copy-books and "reading-stands".

In the female School 46 were in attendance, all of whom could read: they answered fairly in Spelling and explanation.

"None were advanced in Arithmetic."

"Only two answered fairly in Grammar."

"Only two answered well in Geography."

"Only one are learning small hand. They write fairly; Writing from dictation is not practised."

The Girls should be more silent, and should cease from quarrelling."

In the Male School there were 134 Boys of the 12<sup>th</sup> "can read. They are fairly proficient in Spelling and explanation." "Two. The elder boys read very well."

"Six are advanced in Arithmetic."

"Five answered well in Grammar, 14 tolerably."

"Three answered very well in Geography, 11 fairly."

"Ten write small hand well."

"The Younger Boys and the School in general cannot be properly taught, unless an Assistant School-Master be appointed."

The following Letters on matters arising under the Medical Charities Act, from the Poor Law Commissioners, officers, need read by the Clerk, and decisions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (for the same on them respectively as follows) -

Read Letter from The Commissioners 24th/12/53.  
relating to

Dated 18<sup>th</sup> February, 1853. Stating that they had before them a resolution of the Board of the 24<sup>th</sup> Ulster, expressing their concurrence in a Resolution of the Norfolk Dispensary Committee contained in Guardians Minutes of same date, in which it is recommended that the Salary of the Medical Officer of that District be increased from £40 to £50 per annum, and that of the Apothecary of the District from 40 to £45 per annum. upon the grounds of the heavy amount of duty devolving upon these Officers. In reference to this Resolution the Commissioners suggest whether under the circumstances, in the Guardians Minutes the preferable course would not be to increase the number of Medical Attendants of the District, a course which the Commissioners would be prepared to sanction.

Resolved - that the Commissioners be informed that this Board are fully convinced that the appointment of additional Medical Officers to the Norfolk Dispensary District would be very inadvisable and would be calculated to do serious injury to the poor of the District, upon whom the system of Medical Charities has conferred such great benefits.

The Board speak respectfully, and under the correction of the Commissioners when they say that if two more Medical Officers were appointed, those who have been since the commencement in office and who have discharged their duties with the greatest efficiency towards the poor, would be obliged to bear the heaviest portion of the duties, notwithstanding all the caution the Managing Committee might use to prevent it.

The Medical Officers at present in office are fully capable to discharge their respective duties, as the Commissioners will learn on reference to the Medical Inspector of

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 of the District - but the important consideration with the Board was and is, that the time it takes to get through such an amount of duty, leaves them little time for private practice. Such being the case the Board feel that they are really entitled to the increase of Salary proposed to be given to them, and therefore request that the Commissioners will not further object to sanction it.

A Letter from Frederick Selby M.D. Esq. J.P. dated 24<sup>th</sup> February 1853 - enclosing a copy of a Petition to be presented to Parliament from the Board of Guardians - praying that the Bill now before Parliament by which power is sought to construct a Railway through this Poor Law Union, under what is termed the "Guarantee System", May not as it now stands pass into a Law. &c. &c.

The Board of Guardians fearing that their interference in a matter so serious might incur expense which could not be paid out of the funds of the Union, and which by consequence should be defrayed by themselves, declined to give an order to have the Petition forwarded by Mr. M.D. presented to Parliament.
