No 52,340/07 dated the 23rd October 1907 stating in reply to the Board's query as to the cause of the decrease of the Death Duty Grant that the amount varies from time to time as it depends on the amount produced by the Estate Duty derived from personal property.
The amount set apart for distribution this year was £39,107 less than that of last year and the Wexford Union accordingly got less.

No 52,340/07 dated the 25th Oct. 1907 stating reference to the proposal to hire out Thomas Delaney to his former foster parent Mr Patrick Scallan that Mr Scallan on his own statement has not sufficient control over this boy to send him to School and that evidently Mr Scallan would not make a suitable master for the boy and that the Guardians should endeavour to find a foster home for him where he would be kept under proper

The only thing wrong with this boy was that he could not be kept at School he has reached the fifth standard and the age at which it is legal to hire him out and a more respectable employer than Mr Scallan being recommended by Clergymen and known personally to the Guardians and who is much attached to the boy could not be found. In these circumstances the Guardians are of opinion that it would be the wisest course to leave the boy in the home where he is at present and of which the Relieving Officer speaks highly.

Rev. M. O'Byrne L.C. President Gaelic League Wexford wrote stating they had appointed a successor to Mr O'Flynn Irish Teacher who ~~had~~ resigned his position as Irish Teacher in the Workhouse last week and if the Guardians wish this new teacher would carry on the classes pending the appointment in the Workhouse of a successor to Mr O'Flynn. It was decided to advertise for a Irish Teacher at the salary of £1 a month the election to take place that day three weeks and in the meantime that the services of the new teacher (Mr O'Horgan) be availed of at the rate of remuneration proposed above a £1 a month.
