Forwarding a memorandum of inspection of the Insane Lunatics of the Wexford Workhouse by Dr. George Farrel which found generally speaking in good condition but calling the attention of the guardians to 3 points as follows.

1. That there appeared to be no provision made for in the dietary scale for vegetables or fruit and that such an arrangement was calculated to produce an outbreak of scurvy amongst the inmates,
2. That Careful supervision was required in the case of a young fellow recently transferred from the District Asylum and who at times became excited.
3. Recommending that straw beds be done away with and replaced by wire woven hair mattresses.

Ordered "That the Doctor's attention be called to the suggested change in the dietary."

The County Council wrote consenting to the application of the Board of Guardians that the expenses of out-door relief should obtain the rate of the Courthouse whilst waiting for payment of same, provided said rate does not in any way interfere with the administration of justice or any use of the Courthouse, by the Sheriff or Justice and that intimation be conveyed to the Sheriff that permission has been granted.

Replies were recd from Belfast, Ballymena, Larne, Carrickfergus, & Milneburg Union, acknowledging receipt of the Guardians resolution & Poor Law Commission Returns most of whom approved, also one from Cardiff Union stating they could not get anything from the Treasury and had to pay their own Officers.
