

Ordered "This Circular letter does not apply to this Union as all children capable of receiving instruction are being taught.

The trained nurse Miss Kathleen Wright, applied for and was granted her usual annual vacation of 4 weeks on condition that she provides a trained, registered nurse as her substitute on the terms usually fixed by the Board.

The General Hospital Porter Patrick Breen, was granted his usual annual kit of clothes.

Mr. Tuam Schoolteacher wrote asking the Board to kindly allow the children their usual vacation and annual excursion.

Ordered, Allowed and that the sum of £2 be granted to defray expenses of excursion.
Sanction of Local Govt Board to this expenditure is requested

The following resolutions forwarded from the Cork and Athy Boards of Guardians were unanimously adopted.

(1) "That we call the serious attention of all Irish Members of Parliament to the proposal of the Government to continue the Old Age Paupers as a charge on the local rates, and that we request them to strenuously oppose that proposition as unjust to the local ratepayer's and the aged persons concerned, and, contrary, to the undertaking of the Government when introducing last years Budget.

"That we, the members of the Cork Board of Guardians, protest emphatically against Mr Lloyd George's proposal to make all those who will qualify for pensions next January, a charge on the local rates, which is a direct violation of the Governments former promise. As this will affect 26,000 old age pensioners the proportionate tax which it will involve on the local authorities cannot fall short of £28,000 a year a formidable sum to ruthlessly inflict on a country which is figuratively ^{speaking} already taxed up to the apple of the throat."

(2) "That we, the Athy Board of Guardians emphatically protest against the action of the Government in endeavouring to make local authorities liable for the greater part of the Pensions to those who have disqualified on account of being in respect of Poor Law Relief to be paid after the 31st December next.

"By the Old Age Pension Act 1908, the disqualification was to cease on the 31st December next, and that Act specified the Imperial Exchequer as the sole fund for the payment of Pensions.

"We while approving of the disqualification protest in the strongest manner against the new proposal of the Chancellor of the Exchequer to make the local funds liable for the greater part of the Pensions to persons who will be entitled thereto on removal of the said disqualification."

The Master reported that he had applied ^{to} the Pension Officer at Ennis Corby to have transferred to his name the Authority to draw the Pension of a woman named Margt Doyle, Garrykeary.

This had not been done but instead he submitted a letter which he had received from the Pension Officer, saying that a question has been raised in connection with this Pension and he the Master, would hear from him in due course on the matter being decided.

It was resolved to inform Mr Haffan DC. who previously interested himself in this case of the facts, and the Master was instructed to keep the Board informed of how the matter proceeds.

Mr Walter Doyle made application for an increase of his salary as K.D.; pointing out that he was 20 years in office, that he had to pay £5.4.0 for an office and keep a pony trap for the proper discharge of his duties, the cost of which made a heavy inroad into his small income.

As we consider these old people when they are qualified for a pension next December should be treated the same as ordinary old age pensioners and made a 'Rate Charge', we therefore call on the Board to put a clause in their proposed new Bill amending Section 6, of the Original Act, with the view of making it legal for Boards of Guardians to deduct from the pensions of parties who became chargeable through sickness or otherwise to the poor rate such proportion of the Pension as the Guardians may in their discretion think should be paid in respect of the relief so afforded pensioners.

I would suggest that the Medical Officer should revise the dietary, drawing up such a number of scales as in his opinion would be required, to meet the varying wants of different classes and conditions, making each diet complete and sufficient in nutritive value for ordinary cases so that extras would be needed only under exceptional circumstances or for special cases.

The following is a copy of the Board's views in reference to the matter which were ordered to be forwarded to the Secretary and it was also understood that any member of the Board who might be in Dublin for the Winter Show would attend the meeting.

That we, The Wexford Board of Guardians, at a meeting specially summoned for the purpose of the consideration of the various proposals for the Reform of the Poor Law hereby resolve as follows:-

1.
