Sanctioning the arrangements made for the discharge of the duties of the Matron of the W.K. House during her absence on leave for a month.

The Clerk explained that the Matron had now had 3 months leave from 17th Sept to 17 Dec and on today he received a certificate read from D. M. J. Halligan, stating that D. M. J. Halligan although considerably improved in health and in his opinion requires at least a further 2 months sick leave.

On the motion of Mr. Peacocke & seconded by Mr. Nealey, a further 2 months leave was granted to D. M. J. Halligan, Sister Bernard who is acting to perform her duties during that time.

The Local Board are respectfully requested to sanction the arrangement.

A Miscellaneous Circular dated the 10th December in reference to proposed pensions for people in receipt of relief was read by the Clerk, stating that the relief to such people must cease on Jan^y the 1st in order to qualify them for the pensions on Jan^y

6th; however in the case of indoor paupers, the Guardians might if they considered that probable pensioners would endure any hardships on account of being discharged on the 4th January, that such persons might be kept until the morning of the 6th

Two probable old age pensioners were allowed clothes off the old clothes store when going out to recover their pensions, their names are John Lewis, & Denis O'Leary

D. J. B. Keogh returned a cheque for £2.2.0 in 2 lunacy cases, the names of the lunatics were Riel Dermott for which he claimed a funeral and Peter Hurlong £2.0.0, allowed and recommended by the Magistrates as a special case & Keogh being called on by the Police the day before the Committee to dress the wounds self inflicted on the throat of the lunatic and having to travel 12 miles to do so

Ordered "The Lunacy Committee ordered a funeral in this case, and the Board consider same a reasonable sum as well as being the usual amt allowed in such cases.

Mr. Mushy Walsh, Parish Teacher was allowed the usual holiday from Dec 18th to Jan 17th.

Messrs. Clarke & Co wrote stating in reply to the Clerk's letter re medicine empties that they knew the Board was not responsible for empties but they would be glad if Mr. Kehoe Clerk would write to the Medical Officers of Bamon, Lashmon, & Broadway Dispensaries to have the empties returned.

The Clerk replied that he would do so if the Contractors paid the amounts due to Contractors for packing etc.

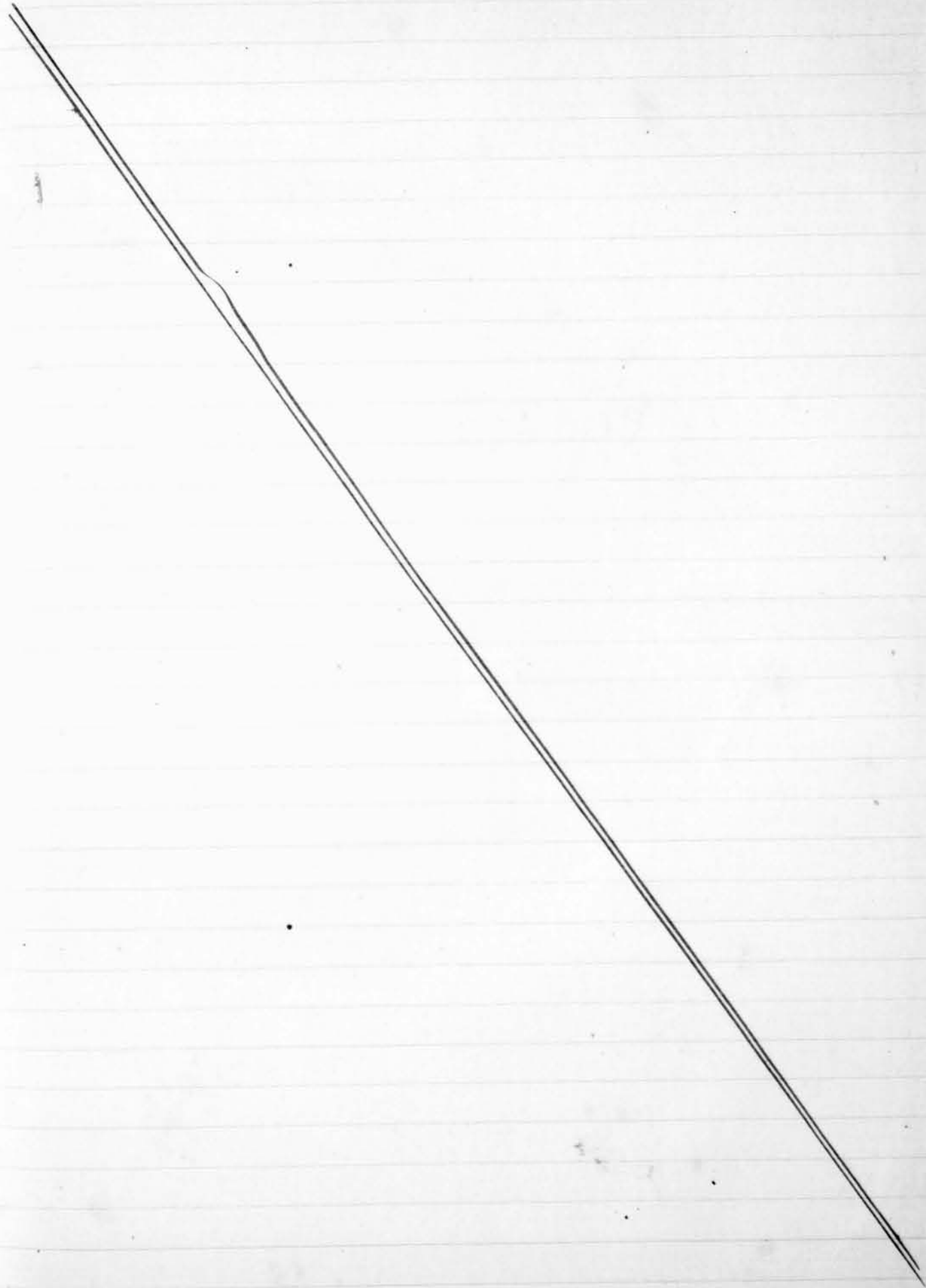




