A man named Doherty was before the Board, he stated he had been in the Infirmary and also in the Workhouse Hospital, and it was ordered that Dr. O'Donnell be requested to state if he considered an operation would be of benefit to this man if sent to Dublin for treatment.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

No 29,795 15 June 1911

Forwarding an Extract from a Report received from Miss Fitzgerald Kenney respecting the home of Mrs Connors with whom 3 children named Blourey are boarded out, adding that Mrs Connors had changed her residence from an overcrowded house to a good one, that she was a good foster mother and looked after the children well but that neither Miss nor Mrs Blourey looked very robust. Miss Kenney further reported that she was informed that Dr Doyle had not visited these children regularly although the Returns for Feb. March, and April showed that Doyle had made the necessary inspections and requesting to be furnished with the Dr's observations in regard to the matter. Dr Doyle wrote stating he passed the house where the children were every Saturday morning that he called about once a month, that he was there on Sat. the 6<sup>th</sup> May and promising to see them oftener in future.

Lady M. Fitzgerald wrote thanking the Board for their great kindness and courtesy in electing her so often as



then Chairman and promising to carry out the duties to the best of her ability

D. J. V. O'Connor, Med Officer of the Workhouse wrote approving of the changes in the hospital dietary recommended by Dr Smyth viz that Corned beef be substituted for one day for diets Nos. 2 & 2A, 3 & 3A instead of Oxhead Soup and that milk be used for one day instead of potato soup for the same diets; regarding the hotch potch stew he considered it a suitable article of diet when made strictly in accordance with the prescribed formulae but when any of the ingredients cannot be procured he recommends that milk in the same quantities be substituted.

A long discussion took place with the above and eventually it was decided to summon the visiting Committee and Dr Smith, R.G. Board & O'Connor for next Saturday after the Board when the whole matter will be gone into.

Mr Cooper wrote expressing his thanks to the Board for electing him to the position of Deputy Vice Chairman.

The Clerk read the Agenda where the Master wished to resign charge of the farm and care of the boys after school hours owing to the fact that he could not give them proper supervision in consequence of the time entailed by the carrying out of the new diet.

This matter was fully discussed and several Guardians requested the Master to continue in charge of the farm for the present and eventually the Master consented to do so.

The Clerk reported that it would be necessary for some one to take charge of and teach the infants in Miss Minnis place. Mr Erwin was then sent

for and asked if the Master was satisfied to take charge of and teach all the children, boys and girls, numbering about 20. Mr Minnis stated she would do so but trusted the Guardians would allow some little increase in her salary for this.

On the motion of Mr Gore seconded by Mr Rossiter it was resolved that in consequence of the few children now in the workhouse, there was no necessity to appoint a successor to Miss Minnis but that Mr Erwin be appointed to look after & teach all the children.

The Clerk was requested to put the matter of allowing some increase of salary to Mr Erwin on the Agenda Paper for that day fortnight.

The Committee appointed by the Board to enquire into the Complaint made against Dr Angham Med officer of the Broadway Disp by a man named OBuen of Ballygarry reported having met at the Broadway Disp on the 23<sup>rd</sup> inst, seven members, together with Dr Angham OBuen Nurse & Cunder. The Committee asked for information on 2 points (1<sup>st</sup> whether a Doctor is Compelled to attend paying patients and 2<sup>nd</sup>, as to a resolution of the Board which Dr Angham said was on the books prohibiting gradians & hardens to issue tickets to Railway Employees, as the Committee came to no definite conclusion they attended the Board with a view of assisting the gradians at arriving at a decision.

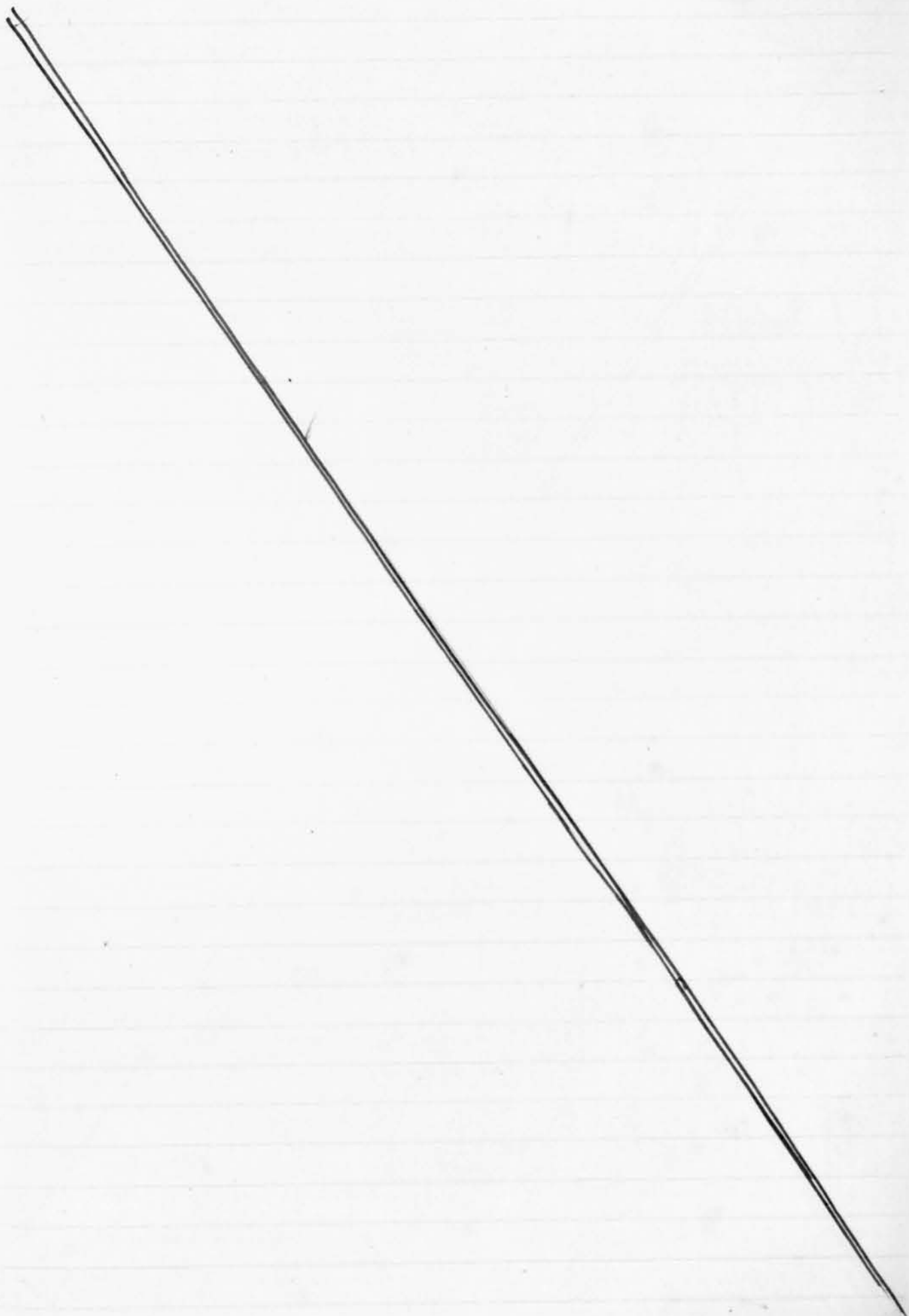

Dr. S. V. Connor wrote stating he fully approved of the New Diet being continued and that it was a great improvement on the former.

The Clerk, Mr. Kehoe, submitted the following statement in reference to same.  
Ladies & gentlemen -

On the Agenda Paper today you are asked to take into consideration the question of the New Diet and whether you will continue its use in the house and Hospital attached.  
In order to help you to come to a conclusion in the matter I have obtained the views of the Medical Officer respecting same and I also submit an abstract from the Provision account giving a comparison between 4 months of the Old Diet and 4 months of the new which shows a saving of over £7.0.0 week.
