In reference to a complaint made by a man named Phil. Moran against Dr. O'Brien, Bannow, and contained in last week's Minutes (Page 5) also in reference to Mr. Parle P.H.G. for not giving him a ticket. Dr. O'Brien replied by letter as follows:
