The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows) :—

Mr James Guilfoyle writing under date the 14th Dec requested the guardians to kindly consider that his present salary of 10/- a week and $\frac{1}{4}$ for rations was altogether too small for him to live on and he was grateful if they would kindly allow him an additional $\frac{1}{8}$ per week bringing the whole thing up to 11/- ^{per week} which the Board was good enough to allow before, but which the Local Govt Board was not sanction.

After some discussion Mr Jas M^o Mahon, gave notice that he was more on that day fortnight that the Cook's application for an increase of $\frac{1}{8}$ per week be considered by the Board.

Mr Waurahan Boro-Sumner wrote under date of the 14th Dec as follows.
 I have had experimental pumping done on yesterday and this morning and am very

pleased to be able today that the supply has considerably increased. I calculate at present that the well is giving about 300 gals per hour. Some of this is surface water. I strongly recommend the ~~Council~~ ^{Board} to continue the boring operations.

The bore at present is 78 feet 6 inches deep and the total depth of the well is 138 feet.

This matter was very fully discussed by a Committee of the Board with Mr. Hanrahan present, and on the motion of Mr. O'Brien seconded by Mr. Busker, it was unanimously resolved to recommend the Board to have boring operations continued for another 12 feet provided a sufficient supply is not obtained prior to this depth.

On the motion of Mr. Devereux seconded by Mr. Caney, this recommendation was unanimously approved of and Mr. Hanrahan was requested to attend the next meeting of the Board when the matter will probably come up again.

Lady. Maudie Fitzgibbon and Mr. C. B. Parnocky requested the kind permission of the Board to give their usual entertainment to the children and other inmates at James Newyeast.

Permission was granted and the Board passed a vote of thanks to her ladyship and Mr. Parnocky for their kindness.

The matter of the Bridgetown Asylum residence was again referred to a Committee of the Guardians of the District, to meet on Tuesday the 17th Dec at 10 o'clock.

The following resolution from the Kilmacthomas Union was on the motion of Mr. O'Brien seconded by Mr. Devereux passed unanimously:

That this Board while heartily recognising the good intentions of this proposal, holds that any joint Control of public health administration by non official bodies will prove dangerous, unworkable and destructive of due responsibility for officials and Authorities alike, and warning seems necessary that all employed qualified nurses are not as worthy of extra support as this Circular suggests; any efforts to independently educate public opinion as to public health reforms and any publicly worked examples of up to date health treatment will always earn the approval and cooperation of honest elected representatives of the people but there will be the first surge that divided responsibility and efficiency can never coexist.

the Wexford Union for the half year ended, 30th
Sept last and enclose duly Certified abstract
of same.

I hold over pending the examination of
the vouchers relating thereto in the office of the
Board the various payments made during
the period in respect of medicines and of
Medical & Surgical Appliances.

It gives me much pleasure to record

the highly Creditable manner in which the rep were presented for audit.

The Board expressed themselves pleased with the Comptrol paid to the Clerk and Asst Clerk.

Miss Kathleen Wright wrote resigning her position as Nurse Matron of the Wexford General Hospital and stating she wd. continue to do duty there for 4 weeks until her successor she thanked the Guardians the Guardians for their kindness to her during her 9 year of Office and asked for a day or 2 absence about the 7th Jan.

The Board accepted her resignation and ordered that advertisement be issued for her successor on that day fortnight at a salary of £40 a year and rations or a salary of £55 a year without rations at the option of the person appointed age limit being 25 to 45 years. The Medical Officer is to be consulted about the days leave.

In accordance with notice of motion, Mr Jas M^o Mahon moved and Mr. Wm. R. Sereneus seconded.

That the Cook's wages be increased by 2/8 per week making it up to £1-0-0 per week, and the Local Joint Board are requested to sanction it as this is a good man and giving every satisfaction as Cook under the New dietary scale.

A Committee met in reference to a typewriter for the Clerk's office.

The Clerk explained that this typewriter which was in view was practically a new one costing at first £23, he put the reference of taking it at a cost of £10, at which price he considered it an exceptionally good value, and it was also

"That in view of the present deadlock in the Irish Cattle Trade, we call on the Irish Parliamentary representatives of all Parties, to take united & prompt action, to induce the Government to take such steps as may be necessary to readjust the relations at present existing between the Board of Agriculture Fisheries and the Irish Department of Agriculture, as it appears to the members of the Council, that the opinions and views of the Veterinary Staff of the Irish Department, as to the existence of disease amongst cattle in Ireland not only have no weight, but are absolutely disregarded by the Board of Agriculture Fisheries, with the result that although it is the opinion of Mr Russell and his Veterinary Advisers that the County Meath is and has been for over 4 months free from disease we are still prohibited from moving cattle out of the County, furthermore we call upon the Irish Parliamentary representatives to insist that Mr Asquith will remove Mr Runciman to some other sphere of duty, as he has proved himself unsuited to be Head of the Agricultural Board, and that the

suggested 12 hours detention at the other side of the Channel wd be most injurious.

The Chairman in putting the Resolution stated she was in entire accord with same as she believed that hardship and loss had already been entailed by the New Regulations.

Replying to the Clerk's letter as to the liability of insured parties to pay for their maintenance. Messrs. Colfer & Son Solicitors both Board, wrote stating that it was reasonably plain, that out door relief was never capable of being treated as a loan and that section 109, expressly excludes outdoor relief; as to recovering indoor relief given in workhouse hospitals the right of the Guardians remained as they were, previously to the Insurance Act and that section 12 prevents the benefit accruing to insured persons from being made liable for repayment of such loans.

No 11-134/1913 dated 7 March 1913. "Sanctioning the temporary employment of Miss K. Higgins as nurse in the General Hospital of the Workhouse at 1-11-6 with ration."

No 596/1913 dated the 6 March 1913. "Sanctioning the proposal to grant an allowance of 6/- per week for the purpose of providing clerical assistance for the workhouse master."

No 9422/1913 dated 28 July 1913. "Referring to the R.O.'s reports on boarded out children for the month of January and stating the facts to parents of children Martha Corish, Mary Pore and Cath Daaford & Josephine Curran and be requested to send these children to school regularly in future that if the Guardians have not already granted fresh outfits for Mary Pore and John Suggan, whom the R.O.'s report to be in need of clothes, they should do so at once. Ordered "Referred to R.O.'s. Clothes have been granted to children Suggan & Pore."

Poolaw officers and the workmen's Compensation Act. Replying to the Clerk's letter as to whether it was necessary for the Guardians to continue insuring the officers of the Union and having regard to the fact that the master of the Rolls decided there was no contract of service between Poolaw officers and Boards of Guardians, Messrs. Colfer & Son Solicitors both Board wrote, stating that in their opinion as long as the judgment of the master of the Rolls on the South Dublin Union Case remains law, there was no necessity for the Board to insure persons coming within the scope of that decision, that is persons appointed to discharge statutory duties as distinguished from persons acting under a contract of service, and that this was also the effect of the case of Murphy v. Dr. Piers writing in reply to the Clerk's letter dated there were 119 deaths registered during the 13 weeks ended 24 May 1913, being 30.9 per 1000 of the population over

Deaths from Measles numbered 45.

About the middle of July, the disease came under my notice at which time the majority of cases were removed to Fever Hospital, the schools closed and every precaution taken.

There were I daresay at one period 500 cases. The largest number of deaths occurred in children under 5 and if precautions had been taken or the children isolated at first, the number of cases wd have been considerably lower.

The principal causes were, insufficient and unsuitable food, want of warm clothing, cold rooms, & overcrowding.

The weather was most inclement when the outbreak was at its height, the majority of the children contracted bronchopneumonia which was the immediate cause of death. No deaths occurred from any other infectious disease.

For the quarter ended the 29 March 1913, the death rate of Wexford was 20.8. Wexley 34.4. Kallee 34.6. There were 4 deaths from Measles in Wexford, 36 in Wexley, and 17 in Kallee.

The Report was considered very full and under the circumstances explained by the doctor very satisfactory, more especially as a comparison with other towns of the same population.

No 48, 978/1913 dated the 15th August 1913 Sanctioning the payment of £1:11:6 per week with rations to Miss Coffey for her services as temporary substitute for Miss O'Connor, Trained Nurse, during a period of 4 weeks.

No 43, 373/1913 dated the 20th August 1913 Stating that they would not raise any objection to the Guardians' proposal to renew the policy of insurance of the Workhouse officers under the Workmen's Compensation Act.

No 41, 190/1913 dated the 15th August 1913 Forwarding for the attention of the Guardians extracts from the report of Mr R. Kelly, Inspector on his recent inspection of the Workhouse.

The Report was as follows:

At the close of the last financial year there was only a balance of £494 to meet claims amounting to £1373 which accrued due in March 1913. There will be similar claims on the balance of £944 expected to be due to the credit of the Union on the 1st April 1914.

A sum of £177 has been spent in sinking a well in order to obtain a water supply for the Workhouse. No official report of the result has yet been furnished but it is expected to be satisfactory. Should it prove so, I understand the Guardians propose to proceed with a Scheme for improving the sanitary and lavatory arrangements in the House and Infirmary, which are at present in anything but a satisfactory state.

The difficulty of getting water is experienced in every department and makes it impossible for attendants to do their work properly.

The Visiting Committee visit the Workhouse but do not submit any reports to the Guardians and attention is directed to the requirements of Article 59 of the Workhouse Rules in this respect.

There is a boy in the Workhouse eligible for boarding out and the Guardians should endeavour to find a suitable foster-parent for him. The child has been delicate but now appears fit to be placed at nurse.

Ordered: Visiting Committee to be summoned to consider report ^{when report} as to water supply has been made. Relieving officers to endeavour to find a home for the boy to be boarded out.

Query form guaranteeing payment of £15 a year for the Deaf & Dumb boy David Bergin ordered to be sent to the Galbraith Deaf and Dumb Asylum was signed by the Chairman.

Mr Walter Doyle, R. D., Wexford submitted a certificate from Dr Pierce, Wexford, to the effect that he (Mr Doyle) was suffering from ulcerated leg and would require leave of absence for a month.

The Acting Clerk explained that he had spoken to Mr Doyle as to the best arrangement for having his work done and he would suggest that Mr Doyle be allowed some remuneration to employ an Assistant as it was approaching the end of the half year and the cottage rents required collecting and the accounts closed. Mr Doyle to be responsible for the work.

Mr Doyle agreed to this proposal.

On the motion of Mr Bergin seconded by Mr Kelly it was unanimously resolved that Mr Doyle be allowed £1 per week for four weeks for the purpose of obtaining assistance in the performance of his duties and to be responsible to the Board for their fulfilment. (Sanction of L. G. B. requested.)

This being the day for fixing the superannuation of the late Van Driver (Walter Brien) the Acting Clerk explained that Brien's services would entitle him to £6:2:4 but the Board could add ten years to his service for the purpose of computing the pension and if they did so Brien would get £12:3:8.

On the motion of Mr Mc Mahon seconded by Mr Chandler it was unanimously resolved as follows:-

When dealing with the letter from the Local Joint Board asking you to adopt a graded scale of salaries for your Officers, we would respectfully ask you to ~~take~~ and arrange a scale for us as you have done in the case of the Medical Officers.

By creating a scale of salaries you arm yourselves with the means of appreciating the good services of deserving officers and disapproving of the action of Officers not meeting with your approval by recommending an increase in the case of the efficient officers and not doing so in the case of the inefficient.

Union Officers as you are aware are usually appointed at low salaries and remain so for years.

As to the Officers' claims for periodical increases of salary it is the rule in all departments that increases be given at stated periods to all efficient ^{and deserving} Officers and why the Poor Law Officer be debarred from such privileges.

By adopting a graded scale of salaries dependent on a faithful and efficient discharge of duty you will give a stimulus to Officers to perform their ^{on-going} duties more energetically if possible, with more interest in their work, and with a mutual desire for the welfare of the ratepayers, knowing that by so doing they are looking forward for the reward they will be entitled to by a meritorious discharge of their duty.

If you adjourn the matter for a couple of months or until the meeting of the new Board we will submit a scale which we hope will meet with your approval.

"The matter was discussed and on the motion of Mr. M. Murphy it was unanimously resolved to adjourn the matter for 12 months until the new Home Rule Bill is passed when formal application can be made."
