Nurse Doyle writing on the 27<sup>th</sup> Feb. Mr. Healy called on me on the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. I told him I was unable to attend his wife owing to a rush of red ticket cases at the time. His wife was confined on the 21<sup>st</sup>, so he had 5 days notice. I didn't advise his wife not to engage a doctor but when speaking to her 4 months previous, said I would tell her later on if a doctor was necessary when I saw the nature of the case. I told O'Brien on the 28<sup>th</sup> Dec. that I had given up the case. This case is a private one no red ticket case and I consider I was carrying out my duty in leaving a paying case and attending to the case for which the guardians are paying me.

O'Brien writing on March the 14<sup>th</sup> 1914 all I have to say is, I was called to attend the case.

Forwarding the Report of their Inspector Mr. L. J. McCarthy as follows, and requesting that the matter therein may receive the attention of the Guardians.

I am pleased to be able to report that a good standard of cleanliness is maintained throughout the workhouse, particularly the Infirmary where the plastering of the walls of the dormitories is a great improvement.

The workhouse yards are in good order and neatly kept.

The new outlay scale is giving satisfaction and has effected a saving.

In reference to the Sanitary Condition of the workhouse, the Guardians have at present a scheme under consideration which I trust will provide for the erection of sanitary annexes to the Infirmary in place of the water closets at present



there; better lavatory accommodation might be provided for the body of the House.

The supply of Clothing is good and sufficient and the straw beds are gradually being replaced by fibre with wire mattresses. Some improvements have also been made by replacing the old diamond pattern windows with others of more modern shape.

Some easy chairs and linen for the passage between the sick wards is required for the Infirmary. It wd be desirable that the fire guards in the nurseries and idiot-wards shd be made more secure and some portions of the boundary wall need attention.

The several matters contained in this Report were postponed for the new Board, and in the meantime the Clerk suggested that Mr Hanrahan Bord Surveyor be written to. to lay his hand in reference to the plans etc of the Sanitary Scheme which he is preparing until the guardians deal with this Report, as perhaps he might then have some additions to make.

Dec 20.40:1914 - 18<sup>th</sup> May 1914. Forwarding the District Inspector's last report on the Workhouse schools which was good, and considered satisfactory.

The Committee of Management of the Tuberculosis Prevention Ireland Act, forwarded a Circular of the Local Joint Board which was read by the Clerk, and a resolution of theirs, asking if the guardians were prepared to transfer fever hospitals to the Rural Dist Council, to allow of advanced cases of Tuberculosis being dealt with by the County Council.

The matter was postponed for the new Board and in the meantime the Clerk will write to the Local Joint Board for a further definition of the guardians powers in the matter, taking into account that the Urban District is the Sanitary Authority in this case.

The Clerk read instructions from Mr Colfer Boards Solicitor as to the best means of carrying out a prosecution against a man named Murphy for desertion of his children and the matter was decided to wear informations against this man and let the law take its course.

"That in future an independent doctor who must reside in the district be appointed to act as locum tenens for dispensary doctors on leave of absence.

Mr Lill proposed and Mr Cullen seconded the adoption of this resolution. On a poll being taken 20 voted for and 2 against the resolution which was accordingly adopted. Regarding the remuneration to be paid to the proposed appointee Mr Pascoe proposed Mr. M. J. Borman seconded, "that he be paid at the rate of  $\text{p}4-4-0$  a week whilst employed. To this Mr Larkin proposed and Mr Crouch seconded an amendment that as permanent man be appointed at a salary of  $\text{p}100$  a year, to act as locum tenens for any doctor in the Union on vacation or sick leave or absent through any cause. —

Mr Larkin's amendment was passed by 14 votes to 8 and it was ordered to advertise such an appointment about the 1<sup>st</sup> Jan and in the meantime the Local Joint Board are requested to sanction —
