The inmates were allowed a Meat Dinner on New Year's Day and Twelfth Day.

Eliza Farrell, wife of a soldier; Wm Doyle a discharged soldier; John Barr temporary discharged soldier; and James Murphy a Navy man; are at present in Hospital. James Butler a soldier from Ballygeary was admitted on the 22nd December and discharged on the 31st.

Eliza Farrell was charged at 4/- per week; William Doyle (no charge). John Barr (Lady M. Fitzgerald to inquire) and James Murphy charged 5/- a week, and James Butler charged 2/- a day.

Miss O'Han is to procure a home for the two boarded-out children, who came back to the house during the week.

The postponement of the tenders re sanitary business was again ordered, in order to give the Master an opportunity of having the water in well pumped out and analysed.

Mr Burrell's Chief Secretary, Mr J. E. Edmunds, Sir Thos Esmonde and Mr Peter French wrote replying to receipt of Mr John Larkin's resolution re amending the law relating to the appointment of temporary substitutes for Medical officers during vacation and illness.

The clerk submitted his Estimate for the coming year amounting to £704 9 against £849 2 last year or £144 3 less - which would mean over 3d in the £ off the rates.

On the motion of Mr. Blease, seconded by Mr. Hies. Furlong, it was resolved that the four children of a man named Meyer be admitted by way of loan to the Fever Hospital and charged at the rate of 2/- per head per week.

Ordered: To erect a sheltering porch outside St. Francis' Ward, at a cost not exceeding £5.

Mr. Larkin reported that the landlord of Murrinstown Dispensary Depot was satisfied to provide increased accommodation there including fireplace, and the guardians agreed to supply half-ton of coal annually.

The clerk submitted a statement of Expenses in connection with the Poor Law administration - ~~which~~ copy sent to each Guardian and copy enclosed - which was considered satisfactory, and on the motion of Mr. O'Brien an unanimous vote of thanks was passed to the Chairman, the clerk (Mr. Lehee) and the other officials for the manner in which they conducted the finances of the Union.

Dr Thos Purse wrote a long letter to the Board complaining of a man who called to his place on the night of the 28th ult, just before 12 o'clock, in an advanced state of intoxication, with a ticket to attend his wife in Byrne's Lane; a priest had gone to visit her whom he met coming back and who told him that he found the place in darkness; that the woman opened that door and told him there was nothing wrong with her, and that the husband had gone for <sup>him</sup> ~~them~~ as the result of a drunken fit. I have seen the woman since.

This same man rapped at his neighbour's door late on a Saturday night, and instead of writing until the servant told him he had made a mistake, dropped a visiting ticket in the latter's house. He received it next morning, visited the house and found no person sick.

On another Saturday night he spent over an hour trying to find out where this man lived in William Street and failed, and when I called next day I found no ~~one~~ sick.

His reason for bringing this case under your notice is with the hope that it may have the effect of inducing the Guardians to exercise more care.

He had many times received tickets at unreasonable hours, where people could visit the Dispensary and were not sick. Guardians and Wardens delegate their powers to other people to issue tickets which is most unjust.

Ordered, That the Doctor be requested to give the names of the parties complained of before the Guardians can take any action.

The Master applied for and was granted two weeks leave of absence to be taken when convenient, and the Matron to attend to his duties.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

No 12, 433/1915 dated 2nd March 1915 Approving of the revised Dietary Scales for the Workhouse inmates.

No 9, 549/1915 dated the 27th February 1915 Sanctioning for a further period of twelve months, the allowance of six shillings a week for the purpose of enabling the Master to procure clerical assistance in connection with the working of the new Dietary in the Workhouse.

No 13, 229/1915 dated the 12th March 1915 Giving the substance of a report received from Dr. Mc Cormack, Medical Inspector, on his recent inspection of the Workhouse Infirmary and Fever Hospital, and requesting the Guardians to give the several matters adverted to, their attention.

The report on the whole was satisfactory. Dr. Mc Cormack, however, made the following recommendations:  
1. The appointment of an experienced Nurse who would have sole charge and responsibility for the care and management of the infants and young children.



Ordered. The majority of the few children in the Workhouse are being cared by their mothers, and the motherless children are receiving every care and attention, and the Board considers this would be a highly superfluous appointment.

2. Mattresses require repairing and others replaced with iron fittings.

Ordered. The Guardians will provide Mattresses when the occasion requires.

3. Provision of disinfecting apparatus.

No order.

4. Providing Ambulance Van with rubber tyres.

Ordered. The Van is so seldom used that the Guardians fear that rubber tyres, if provided, would deteriorate and become useless, and on these grounds they don't feel justified in going to any expense in the matter.

Dr McCormack concluded his report by paying a tribute to the Nuns for the cleanliness and the order in which they keep the Infirmary.

Mr Hanrahan, E.E., Wexford, forwarded certificate for the payment of £167:15:4 to Messrs Robert Warner & Walton on the Waze, in full satisfaction of their contract for the erection of Engine and Pump; of this sum £160 was amount of contract and £7:15:4 was extra for lowering water and staging, which he considered a reasonable charge - and that none of the contractors tendered for this particular work and it was a difficult thing to estimate for.

The Board unanimously agreed to pay the £7:15:4, as Mr Hanrahan considered the charge reasonable and the work necessary and could not be provided for before hand.

Mr Guilfoyle, Cook, again applied for an increase of his salary.

The Board adhered to their former decision, deferring consideration of all applications for increases of salary for six months.

Mr John Cogley, Edwardstown, wrote thanking the Guardians and Clerk for their expressions of sympathy with him on the death of his father.

An Ejection Notice at the suit of the Hon. Mrs Deane Morgan against John Lawrence Kehoe, for possession of the lands of Johnstown, was laid before the Board.

The Clerk reported that Joseph Reddy's temporary appointment as Van Driver expired on the 14th inst.

On the motion of Mr Rositer seconded by Mr O'Brien, it was unanimously resolved to renew Reddy's appointment for a period of twelve months at the usual remuneration of 4/- per week (Sanction of local Government Board requested.)

Miss M.E. Browne, Hon. Sec. Ladies Committee of Boarded out children, reported that her committee met on the 10th instant, and that the reports made as to the condition of children were satisfactory; the committee however after a long discussion on the subject, decided to ask the Board to grant an increase of 6d to the weekly allowance of 2/6 for the maintenance of each child, as, owing to the high price of food, 2/6 a week was an inadequate allowance.

The Chairman (Lady Fitzgerald) gave notice that the matter be considered on that day fortnight.

Dr Dobson, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, reported that it would be necessary to send two patients to St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin, for special treatment; one a patient named

Forwarding copy of a circular letter dated the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 1915 containing the opinion of the Law Advisers of the Crown regarding the disqualification of Charwomen or pensioners, by reason of maintenance in Workhouse Infirmary. The Jersey Authorities Channel Islands, wrote stating they were about removing a child named Ester born at Northwrydon in the year 1911 and at present an inmate of the London County Asylum in Surrey to the Workhouse.

This is the illegitimate child of Johanna Slater born at Taghmon Co. Wexford in 1888.

The Clerk stated he had written to the Local Board on the matter and read a letter recd from them.

They advised the guardians who wrote to the Jersey Authorities stating they were not prepared to receive the child until they are satisfied these Authorities are acting within their legal rights in removing a child born



London, whose mother although born in Ireland in the year 1888 is apparently domiciled in England.

'Ordered' that the Clerk carry out the instructions contained in the local Govt Board letter.

The Clerk was directed to communicate with the Ladies Committee with the view of procuring a suitable home for the child.

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

No 23813 : 1915 dated the 6th May 1915. Sanctioning remuneration at the rate of £1:11:6 per week with rations to the value of 13/7, to Miss. O'Roughlin for her services as temporary Night Nurse in the Fever Hospital.

No 22, 286/1915 dated the 30th April 1915. Acknowledging the receipt of the Relieving Officers' Reports for the month of March respecting the children Bogged-out; and pointing out that the attendance at School of James Murphy and Annie Redmond, with Mrs McSwath, is unsatisfactory and requesting that the foster parent be warned to send the children regularly to school.

Ordered: That a copy of the letter be sent to the Foster Parent and she be warned that unless she sends the children more regularly to school, they will be taken out of her charge.

Regarding the case of a man named Hong, the Secretary Trade and Labour Society that as long as he (Hong) was able to obtain a certificate, but from inquiries it appeared that no effort was made by

him



him to obtain a certificate

A letter from the Insurance Commissioners acknowledging receipts of the Clerk's letter with reference to this matter, was read.

It was decided to take no further action in the matter.

No 71/1915 dated the 6th May 1915. Being a circular letter on the subject of the supply of turf.  
This circular does not apply to this Union.

Mr P. Hawrham, Basis Surveyor, Wexford, in enclosing certificate for payment of £200 on account, to Mrs O'Connor, Contractor for the sanitary improvements of the Union, Workhouse, stated this work was to have been completed by the 9th instant, but the contractor had great difficulty in getting materials required, particularly the sewer and drain pipes and plumbing materials; that those materials were now on the site and the work should be finished in three weeks; and he recommended that the time be extended for that period.

The extension of time suggested was unanimously granted.

In connection with this matter, the Master mentioned that the various Inspectors of the Local Government Board, disapproved of the sewer running under the building on the Women's side of the house, and that the contractor was at present constructing a sewer, which if connected on with the present sewer, would, he thought improve matters, and meet the objections raised by the Inspectors from time to time.

The Master was instructed to consult with the Engineer and to get that gentleman to make a report and estimate of the probable cost of carrying out the suggested connection of the two sewers — for the next meeting.

Mrs Mary O'Connor, Matron and Trained Nurse Workhouse Fever Hospital, wrote notifying the Board that she had volunteered her services as Nurse for duty during the War; and trusting the Guardians would grant her temporary leave of absence; pay her salary and also pay her substitute.

On the motion of Mr Hartin seconded by Mr Devereux, a little rule was made in this case as in Dr Doyle's viz: Mrs O'Connor is to get temporary leave during the duration of the war; her position is to be kept open and her substitute paid; no payment of salary is to be made to herself while away.

Substitute to be advertised for at a remuneration of £1:11:6 a week and rations and apartments.

Messrs W. & B. Scott, Smagh, wrote offering the Board Oatmeal at £21 a ton, the quotation being for not less than 2 tons.

The offer was refused on the grounds that the sample submitted was not very good and the Guardians could not very well take in 2 tons at a time.

The Master was instructed to enter into an arrangement with the firm at present supplying the Meat at £22 a ton for the current half-year.

Dr Sturges, Bannow, submitted two Magistrates' Orders for payment of £2 in each case for certifying Lunatics.

The Board directed that the attention of the Magistrates be drawn to the fact that they never pay more than £1:1:6 per case, and that they be requested to amend their orders accordingly.

The Clerk was requested to write to the North Dublin Union regarding the payment of expenses of a child named Browne, alleged to be boarded-out from that Union.

On the recommendation of Dr Dobson, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, it was decided to send an inmate named Patrick McLoughlin suffering from disease of the eye, to the Eye & Ear Hospital for treatment.

No 20,257: 1915 and 23994: 1915 dated the 22 April and 7th May, 1915, respectively: Pointing out that there were 2426 Vaccination defaulters in the Union and requesting the Guardians to be so good as to instruct their Solicitor to institute proceedings against those who have been noticed and have failed to comply with the law, in obedience to the notices.

After considerable discussion, Mr Michl. Sinnott gave notice of motion, to have the Vaccination question considered at the meeting of the Guardians on that day month.

It was decided in the meantime to continue the service of the notices.

On the same subject and in reply to L. G. B. letter No 20,257: 1915 dated the 21st April 1915. Mr Doyle R.D. reported he had served 450 notices on defaulters, and of that number 13 had complied with the law.

Mr Walsh R.D. reported he had served nearly all the notices in the Bredgetown District—over 200—and only two had got their children vaccinated and that he would serve the notices in the Broadway District during the course of the next fortnight.

The Medical Officer's records from Broadway, Brossbeg, Daghmon and Wexford were examined and signed. The Bredgetown and Bannow books were not received.

No 26249: 1915 dated the 19th May 1915. Sanctioning £1 per week to Mr O'Sullivan for acting as clerk for during that Officer's vacation of three weeks.

No 25801: 1915 dated 19th May 1915. Forwarding the Report of their Inspector, Mr J. McCarthy, and requesting that the several matters referred to therein, should receive the Guardians' attention. The Report is as follows:—

"I am pleased to be able to report favourably as regards the financial condition of the Union, the management of the Workhouse and the cleanliness of the various departments. As on the occasion of my previous inspection, the sick wards in particular presented a neat and tidy appearance."

"The Scheme for the improvement of the sanitary condition of the Workhouse, to which I referred in my last report, is now being carried out. A better water supply has been secured by deepening the well in the Workhouse grounds, and water closets are being substituted for the closets of the old type in the several yards in the Workhouse."

"Until such time as the Guardians can see their way to erect proper sanitary annexes at the Infirmary, I would recommend that the sewage from the existing water closets in the sick-wards, should be piped directly into the new sewerage system which is in course of."



"of construction, instead of being carried, as at present, underneath  
"one of the Infirmary buildings.

"The only baths in the body of the House are those connected  
"with the boys' and girls' departments and I would therefore suggest  
"that, pending improvements in the lavatory accommodation of this  
"portion of the Institution, the inmates should be bathed in the  
"baths attached to the idiot wards.

"Classification could be improved by converting the battery into  
"a drying-room in connection with the laundry, and by utilising the  
"existing drying-room as a battery.

"There is an unnecessarily large supply of blankets in the  
"Fever Hospital.

"A few good wire mattresses are required in the Infirmary, as  
"some of those in use are beginning to sag.

"It would be desirable that the remaining diamond-pattern  
"windows in the Infirmary should be gradually replaced by good  
"modern windows as has already been done in five of the wards.

"In the absence of the Schoolmistress owing to illness, her daughter

Mr W.
