On the motion of Mr O'Ryan, seconded by Mr Boggan, it was decided to do the work - the Engineer to make out Specification and estimate. It was also decided to ask the Engineer for a report as to remedying the dampness in the Sacristy Walls.

It was decided to advertise for Meals and Meat contracts for the period ending the 30th Sept. next, also for the articles of clothing appearing in the Master's Requirement Book, viz:- 25 yards Best Hessian Ticken; 200 yds. Blay Calico; 150 yds. Twill Sheetting, and 150 yards Linen Sheetting.

The Commanding Officer, Irish Republican Volunteers wrote in connection with the recovery of 18/- due by a man named Cagney for the maintenance of his child in Hospital; stated that Cagney was summoned before a Sinn Fein Court and had promised to attend the Board and pay the amount due, and that if he failed he would be summarily dealt with.

It was decided to inform the Volunteers that Cagney had not yet paid the amount due.

The Master stated that an inmate named Mary Waters who was sent to a Dublin Hospital for special treatment had developed complications which would likely result in her death; that her relatives were anxious in case she died to bring the corpse home for burial, but were too poor to bear the expense themselves.

On the motion of Mr Donnelly, seconded by Mr Boggan, it was unanimously resolved that in the event of the girl's death her remains be brought home for burial, and that the Board bear all expense.

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (for Orders made on them respectively follows):—

No 44892/1920 dated the 16th July, 1920. Asking to be furnished with an estimate in connection with the proposed work of painting the walls of the Dining Hall and St. Clare's Ward of the Workhouse.
Ordered. Referred to Engineer for Estimate.

No 44892/1920 dated the 10th July, 1920 Stating they will not object to the proposal of the Guardians to hold their meetings at 2:30 o'clock, P.M., in the future.

No 44892/1920 dated the 10th July, 1920 Stating they will not object to the proposed expenditure of a sum not exceeding £4 on an excursion for the Workhouse children.

No 44892/1920 dated the 10th July, 1920 Stating that they have approved of the arrangement by which the Porter will look after the Oil Engine., and have sanctioned the proposed payment to him at the rate of 12/- a week.

No 44174/1920 dated the 9th July, 1920 Forwarding copy of the Auditor's Report for the half-year ended the 30th June, 1920.

"I have the honour to report that I have audited the accounts of the Guardians for the half-year ended the 31st March, 1920, and I forward, herewith, certified copies of the Abstracts.

"£55:3:6 was paid during the half-year for motor hire, being the cost of 44 journeys taken to convey 46 inmates to the Workhouse. I am informed that a motor car is hired because the Workhouse horse is old and unable for the journeys. Having regard to the cost of the motor hire the Guardians might consider the purchase of another horse.

"On the 31st March last the Guardians account with their Treasurer was overdrawn £2091. At the rate of expenditure for the past 3 months this account will be overdrawn to the extent of between £3000 and £4000 on the 31st March, 1921, and it will be necessary, therefore, to curtail expenditure as much as possible for the remainder of the financial year".

Having fully discussed the question of the motor hire, the Guardians came to the conclusion that the present system of hiring a car when required was the most economical. The Master stated the Medical Officers now ask to have Motor Cars sent for patients.

No 44892/1920 dated the 10th July, 1920 Forwarding Query Form for answer by Mr N. Kehoe, who has been elected Asst. Clerk of the Union. Query form answered and signed, and returned herewith.

(Sanction respectfully requested.)

Mr Wm. Caulfield, Solicitor, Commercial Quay, Wexford, wrote stating he observed that at the last meeting when the Election of Solicitor came on, his was the only application received up to 12 o'clock - the hour named in the advertisement - but subsequently at 12:30 o'clock an application, obviously not in order was received from a rival candidate stating that in strict accordance with the conditions of the advertisement he made no canvass of the members, and in justice to his supporters and himself he was bound to carry the matter further in view of the unfairness with which the election was carried out; and requesting to have the matter re-opened and the election carried out regularly, and with that view asking the Board to rescind their resolution of the 3rd instant.

No 44174/1920 dated the 9th July, 1920 Forwarding copy of the Auditor's Report for the half-year ended the 30th June, 1920. Mr W. Caulfield has notice that he would on that day fortnight move

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That in view of the irregularity in connection with the receipt of his application, the appointment of Mr Crotty as Solicitor to the Board be rescinded.

The General Secretary Dail Eirann writing relative to the Guardians' resolution re the imprisonment of James Larkin, stated that the Consul-General of the Republic at New York afforded Mr Larkin all the assistance during his trial, which a Consul is entitled to give to a citizen of the country he represents, and adding that the Minister for Foreign Affairs has called for a complete report upon the whole matter, and pending its receipt no further action can be taken by the Government.

The Secretary Larkin Release Committee wrote forwarding 3 copies of a Memorial to the President of the United States of America, asking for Mr Larkin's release.

The Memorial was signed by those present, and the Clerk was directed to forward it to the proper quarter.

In accordance with Notice Mr Rossiter proposed, Mr Bergin seconded and it was unanimously resolved:-

"That Miss Ellen Molloy, Assistant Trained Nurse, be promoted to the position of Trained Nurse in the Fever Hospital, in room of Miss O'Connor resigned, at a salary of £80 a year, and rations, fuel, light and apartment."

Approval of L. G. Board requested.

It was decided to advertise for an Assistant Trained Nurse (vice Miss Molloy promoted) at a salary of £40 a year, rations, fuel, light and apartments. Election to take place on the 31st instant.

In accordance with Notice, Mr Culleton moved, and Mr W. Boggan seconded:- That the request of the Irish Transport asking to have the wages of the Workhouse Tailor (T. Devereux) raised to £3 10/- a week by converting his present bonus of 30/- a week into wages, and giving him an additional £1 a week, and that he get a month's vacation annually - be acceded to. An amendment proposed by Mr O'Ryan and seconded by Mr Furlong that the matter be adjourned for a fortnight

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to get further information as to the current rate of wages of Tailors in the town was defeated.

On a poll Mr Culleton's motion was adopted by 17 votes to 9 against Sanction requested.

The Clerk stated that a charge was made by the Contractor for Win for extra duty, but he was unable to produce evidence of having paid it, therefore he (the Clerk) could not certify for same.

The Head Nurse (Sister Antonio) wrote stating that some of the Sisters and herself intend going on Retreat on the 24th instant, for a fortnight and their places would be filled by other Sisters, free of charge, and requesting the necessary permission.

On the motion of Mr Larkin, seconded by Mr Furlong, the Sisters request was acceded to.

The following resolution, forwarded by the Wexford Gaelic League, was unanimously adopted on the motion of Mr O'Ryan, seconded by the Mayor (Ald. Corish) "That, henceforward, all candidates for positions under, and promotions in offices, under this Board, must pass an examination in Irish, standard to be defined by the County Committee of the Gaelic League."

On the motion of Mr U. Devereux, seconded by Mr Clancy, the following resolution was unanimously adopted :- "That we the Wexford Board of Guardians call on our fellow country men, who were appointed to act as Magistrates by the English Government to resign their Commissions, and no longer play the enemy's game, but follow the example set all over Ireland."

Mr Crotty wrote thanking the Guardians for appointing him as their Solicitor.

Pauper Children (Ireland) Acts, 1898 to 1902, and Infant Life Protection Act, 1897.

Copy of Minutes of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians of the Wexford Union, under the above Acts,
at their meeting held on Saturday the 17th day of July 1902.

Mr John Doyle, R.O., reported that in accordance with instructions he called at the house of Miss A. Walsh, Crandaniel, to bring in the boarded-out child, Thos. O'Brien, with a view to sending on the boy to his mother, as per the Guardians' order at the last meeting, and the boy absolutely refused to come away with him.

It was decided to take the boy off the books, and to inform the Mother that she must try to get custody of the boy herself.

The Hon. Sec. of the Ladies Committee wrote giving an account of the proceedings of the Committee at their meeting on the 2nd July; they elected Lady Fitzgerald President of the Committee; recommended that the children John and Joseph Cloney be removed from the present foster-parent and placed at nurse with Mrs Millar, Kyle, a house recommended by Mrs Lambert; recommending that the Guardians consider the question of raising the maintenance and clothing allowances for boarded-out children owing to present high prices; and that the Board consider the matter of boarding out with Mrs Harpur, Bridgetown, the illegitimate child of her daughter.

It was decided to have the Cloney children removed from Mrs Hayes, Poulmannagh and placed with Mrs Millar, Kyle (Form A will follow) and the Mayor (Ald. Corish) gave notice that he would on that day fortnight move that the Board consider the question of increasing the maintenance and clothing allowances of Board-out children; and the Board considered they had no power to board-out the illegitimate child referred to as the mother's address was known. The Clerk informed the Board that the school attendance of the Cloney children was very bad.

A bill of 13/8 for School Books supplied by Mrs Roche, N.T., Kilrane School, to Joseph Taylor and Mary K. Murphy, boarded-out children, was allowed.

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No 44080/1920 dated the 9th July, 1920 Stating that in order to meet, as far as possible, the wishes of the Guardians they had sanctioned payment of £2 :2/- a week to Nurse Murphy as vacation substitute for the Midwife of the Bannow Dispensary District for a period of two weeks.

The Clerk stated it was almost impossible to get any Nurse to go temporarily to Bannow District and eventually Nurse Murphy was induced to go at £3 :3/- a week, and would not accept £2 :2/- a week.

Under the circumstances the Local Government Board are requested to sanction payment of £3 :3/- a week in this case, as the Nurse was engaged by the Relieving Officer at that remuneration.

Dr Anglim, Broadway, writing in reply to the Clerk's letter stated he was satisfied to undertake the additional work of attending the proposed branch Dispensary at Ballygeary, but he considered the remuneration of £50 a year, offered by the Board, insufficient.

The Clerk was directed to ask Dr Anglim to reconsider the matter.

Dr O'Brien, Bannow, wrote applying for his annual vacation of one month to be taken at convenient intervals.

On the motion of Mr O'Bryan seconded by Mr Culleton, Dr O'Brien was granted his vacation and Dr Richard Hickey, Wexford, was appointed substitute at £3 :6/- a week.

No 122/;/1920 dated the 29th July, 1920. Stating that their attention has been called to the series of resolutions passed by certain local authorities in Ireland repudiating the authority of the Imperial Parliament, and declaring their intention to place every obstacle in the way of the existing administration under His Majesty's Government; that in view of the possible effect of this Policy the Government have given the Board explicit instructions that no loans or grants from public funds for any purpose shall be made by the Local Government Board to any local authority without a definite assurance that they will submit their accounts to audit, and be prepared to conform to the rules and orders of the Local Government Board; stating that concurrently with the adoption of these resolutions many local Authorities are engaged in schemes which involve loans and large subsidies from the Imperial Exchequer, and they therefore consider it right to give early intimation that unless the applications for the loans and grants are accompanied by the aforesaid assurance, they will not be entertained; and adding that the sole object and intention of the Regulations and Orders of the Board is to secure efficiency and uniformity in the system of administration, and to safeguard the interests of the ratepayers throughout the country.

On the motion of Mr Devereux seconded by Mr Chancy it was decided that the letter be marked "Read"

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect for Orders made on them respectively.

The Clerk reported that in accordance with the wishes of the Board the Doctor, Head Nurse, Master and himself had met to consider what economies could be effected in the administration of the Workhouse.

After going over each item the Doctor considered that no reduction was possible in the principal items of food, but promised to arrange the diets which, while giving adequate allowance in each particular case, would result in economy.

The Doctor reduced the number on Tobacco by half thereby cutting down the weekly consumption from 9 lbs to 3lbs, confining the allowance for each person to 1 ounce. No further economy was considered to be possible.

It was suggested that it would be advisable from many points of view, that girls who had their parents' homes to go to, should be discharged after they leave the Hospital, especially those who came to the Workhouse for their first confinement.

The report was adopted, and the Master and Doctor got authority to discharge all cases they thought fit to leave the Workhouse.

Mr Jas. F. Crotty, Solicitor to the Board, wrote stating that out the four cases in which he applied for payment of

7

accounts, he received an acknowledgment from only one (Preece) and asking for further instructions.

It was decided that proceedings be taken for recovery of the amounts due.

In accordance with notice, Mr Culleton moved and Ald. Clancy seconded: That the hour of the Guardians' meeting be changed from 2:30 to 2 o'clock, p.m., until summer-time comes into force.

The motion was passed only 3 members voting for holding the meeting at noon.
(Approval requested.)

The Clerk stated that the finances of the Board were in a bad way. The amount of bills passed for payment that day amounted to £1660:12/- while they had only £540 in bank to meet them. The Chairman and himself interviewed the Treasurer, who wrote stating his Directors were prepared to advance £2300 on the Guardians giving the Bank a guarantee for the amount of the advance.

The matter was referred to the Special Finance Meeting, on which three members were placed, viz:- Ald. Clancy and Messrs T. Walsh and W. White; to meet on Friday next at 3 o'clock.

At the request of the Secretary (Mr White) Ald. Clancy and Mr T. Walsh were appointed delegates to represent the Board at a meeting to be held on Tuesday the 18th inst at Wexford - re the Belfast boycott.

Mr Brothy, Solicitor to the Board, submitted letter from Mr Baulfield, Solicitor, on behalf of Joseph Reddy - a vanman who met with an accident while temporarily employed by the Board - in which Mr Baulfield said his client was satisfied with the present weekly payment, but without prejudice he was prepared to accept 5 years' purchase of same, viz £280; that his client was undoubtedly entitled to compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Acts, but that this point did not arise as the Board had acknowledged his right by paying him compensation.

As the Board declined liability and that the payments made and the offer of a lump sum were "ex gratia", they accordingly decided to discontinue the weekly payments to Reddy.

The County Council wrote asking the Board to reconsider their Estimate for 1921-22.
