To the Board of Guardians of the Oxford Union  
Your Committee appointed on the 25<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup> last to watch the progress of a Bill recently introduced into Parliament relating to the Law of Settlement and removal of Paupers in England with the view of introducing a Clause into the Bill prohibiting the removal of Paupers from England to Ireland have met and agreed to the following Report.

That shortly after their appointment as a Committee Lord John Russell gave notice in the House of Commons of his intention on the part of the Government to introduce a separate Bill prohibiting the removal of paupers from England to Ireland, that the Settlement and Removal Bill met with very great opposition in Parliament and the principle of it was affirmed by the House of Commons by a very small Majority; that in consequence Lord John Russell gave notice on the 11<sup>th</sup> Instant

Instant that it was not intended to proceed during the present session with any Bill relating to the Removal of Paupers whether English or Irish but that as soon as possible after the Easter recess a Motion would be made to appoint a select Committee to inquire into the whole question of the removal of Paupers from one part of the United Kingdom to any other part. Your Committee recommended that you should tender evidence before such select Committee proving the great hardship imposed upon the Ratepayers of this Union from the present state of the Law which permits the removal from England of paupers having no connexion whatever with Oxford or the neighbourhood to be supported at the expense of the Ratepayers of this Union who have no means whatever of relieving themselves from the burden thus cast upon them, and that the Master be instructed to prepare forthwith a list of all persons now inmates of the Workhouse of this Union, or either of the Auxiliary Workhouses, who have been removed from England, and a full statement of all the circumstances relating to such removal, and to the previous history of such parties.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

Resolved by the Board of Guardians that this Report be adopted and that the recommendations contained therein be carried into effect.

Resolved that it is our opinion with reference to the Commissioners letter of the 1<sup>st</sup> Instant 1844 that the salary of the Medical Officer should be £125 per Annum as decided by the Board on previous days.

The duties have already been pointed out with the exception that the Board omitted to state that there are two auxiliary Workhouses about half a mile distant from each other, which in addition to the Workhouse & Fever Hospital (which are also apart more than half a mile from each other) are attended to by the Medical Officer.

The Fever Hospital receives not only the destitute poor of the Poor Law Union, but also persons in middling circumstances throughout the Union.

There is also an important consideration with the Guardians to which they wish to direct the special attention of the Commissioners which is that they advertised for a Medical Officer for £125 per Annum.

The Guardians think that it must have been an oversight on the part of the Commissioners not to have raised their objection previously.

The industrial training of the boys seems very much attended to, and I should anticipate the best possible results, were it not that they are permitted to work with some of the adults. Experience has convinced me that wherever this has been attempted, it has had the most injurious effects. It has tended to keep the adult classes from seeking employment, and it has made the little boys familiar with idleness and in some instances with bad language. Out of 129 boys at school only 25 are writing in Copy books, and the school-master said about 20 or 30 (He did not know the number), or states, I doubt if there is any other Union in this District with so small a proportion of boys able to write. The supplies appear to be very good. Excellent Bread and Milk

~~The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, Orders made on them respectively as follows):~~

The school girls look particularly well. There is a general want of whitewashing. The colouring of the day-rooms and school-rooms green has been found very beneficial in other Workhouses. And as some of the children's eyes appear tender, I would beg to suggest this for the Guardians' consideration.

Ordered that the Master be directed to have the day-rooms and school-rooms coloured green as early as possible.

The following Report of the Committee appointed to examine and Report on the plan of alterations proposed for adapting the House to a change of the Females to the Male side and vice versa was then read and adopted by the Board.

He said that the Master planned with the former directions of the Committee and meet the wishes of the Doctor. He therefore recommended that they be carried out. Additional

work

now is given to the Infirmary space sufficient for 17 beds which we consider will be enough for the number of patients likely to be in the House. The Inspector recommends that the present Workshops be given to the Infirmary. We respectfully give it as our opinion that the addition we have alluded to will afford sufficient accommodation. By lowering the loft of the Workshops and sinking the ground floor which will easily be done from the shape of the ground we believe that good Nurseries can be made.

### Natural School

The Male Teachers are competent but the female Teachers should be better qualified in Grammar and in Arithmetic. Of 132 Pupils present in the boys school 107 can read. 16 write small hand fairly. 9 answer well in Geography. and parse creditably. 7 are advanced in Arithmetic. The elder pupils read well and are good in spelling and explanation.

### Female School

Of 72 present on the day of inspection all can read. three parse fairly. 9 answer well in Geography. 14 write small hand fairly. The elder girls read generally satisfactorily and are fair in spelling and explanation. Some of them are advanced in Arithmetic.

### Infant School

36 Pupils out of 91 present in this department read, spell, and explain fairly. Five have commenced Grammar. and 6 in Geography. Eight with a little assistance of the Children's Sew. Arithmetic is not learned. This school has improved since the last visit.

Black Boards, tablet stands, pointers and Lesson Books are required for all the schools. Ordered that the requisites mentioned in this Report be procured for the schools without delay.
