The queries were all answered satisfactorily except that which the following answer was returned, 1st There is some smell about the entrance hall to which the Master should give his attention, 2nd Had not time to examine Schools. There are drying lines required in the Bath room yard - the yard itself might be kept more tidily. The Infants School requires coloring - there is a want generally of smartness about this school - the Maps are torn and greasy - the Childrens shoes untidy &c. The old Pump room has been used as a wash house for the Women - We recommend that Flap instead of Pavement be placed under the Troughs - and a Flap placed over the well.
