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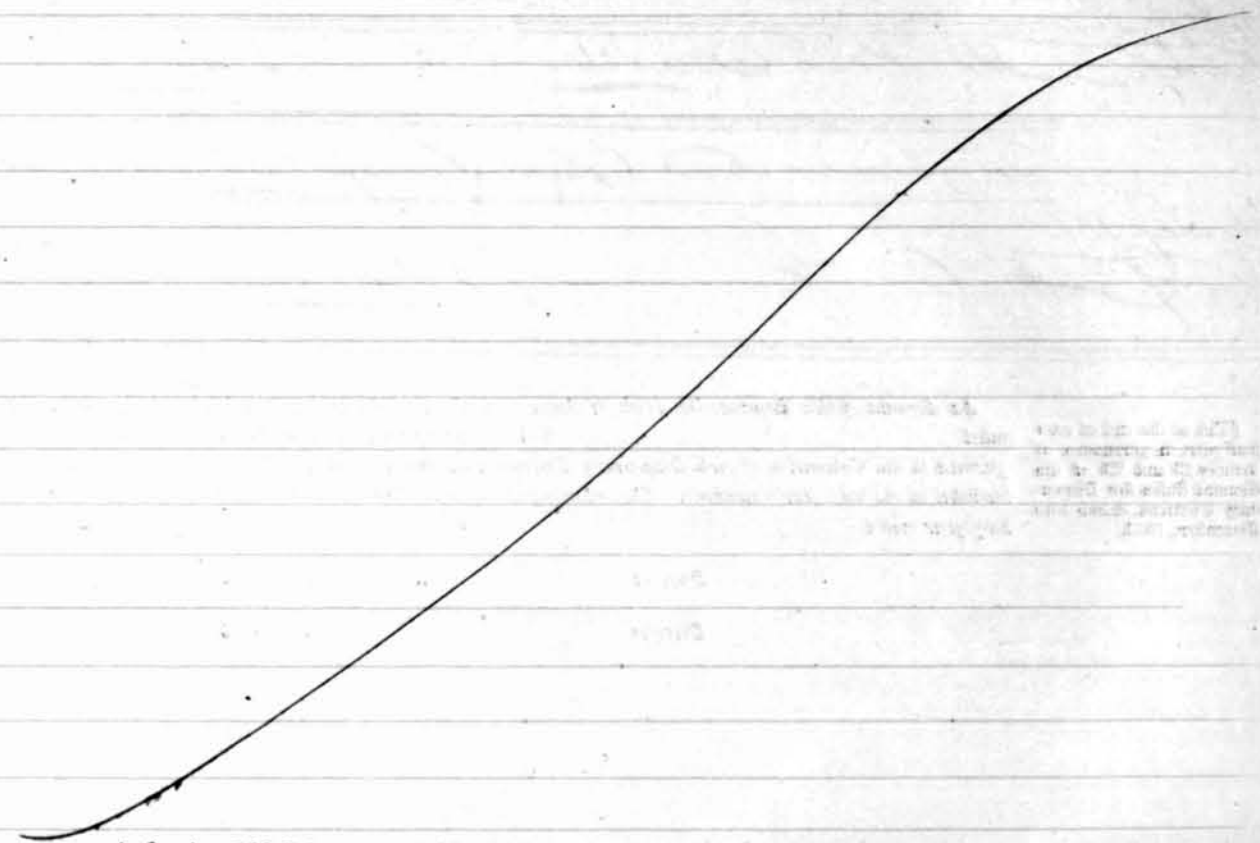

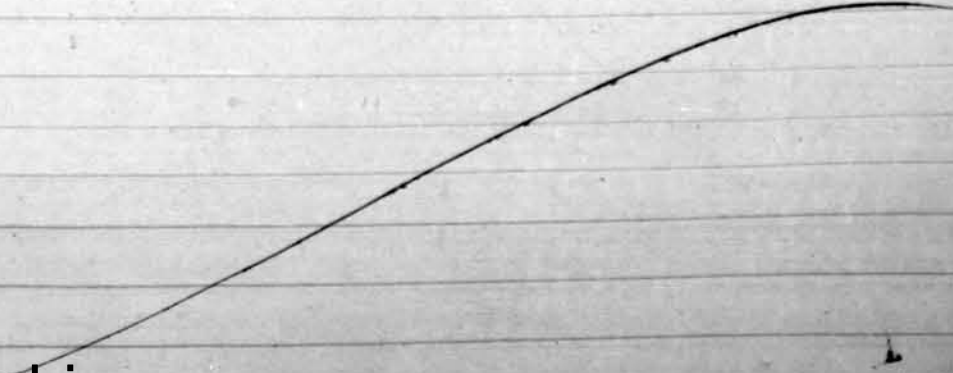

I suggested that he would be sent from one Station to another until he would arrive here, however he was set at liberty. He frequently absconded before and returned after a few days. I purchased this week the Flour and Meal at the same price as last week.

A woman named Elizabeth Mullen applied for admission to this Workhouse and having been admitted at the Board made the following statement which the Board desire to place before the Commission, with a view to their advising the

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the Guardians as to what steps if any it would be advisable to take under the circumstances,

Elizabeth Mullen states, I am a native of Tintern in the County of Wexford, I left Elskar in the Town of Wexford about 10 years since and went to Manchester, where I since resided, I lived for the first four years in that City at a place called Bank Top in the Sisson road and afterwards at Ashton Street off Bank Top street for nearly six years. I took ill about 7 weeks since in my house in Ashton Street and in consequence became destitute, I applied to the overseers of the Parish in which I lived, and a Guardian of the Parish for relief and they told me they would neither give me outdoor nor indoor relief but that they would send me home to my own place. I then told them that my husband was buried there and that my children lived there, to which they replied that they did not care for that, that I should go to my own place. They afterwards admitted me to the Workhouse, in which I spent one day before the meeting of the Board, I was brought before the Board, and told that I should be sent to my own place. I remained for two days after in the Workhouse, and on one of these days was brought before a gentleman in Brown Street who having seen me, asked me where I came from then I told I lived in Manchester,



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I answered that I was born in Waterford, but that I considered myself belonging to the County of Wexford, and that I lived the last 10 years nearly in Manchester. He then told me I should go to my own place, I was taken back to the Workhouse, and from thence to a Railway train, in which I was placed, and brought to Liverpool. I was then brought from the Railway Station in a Cab to a Steamer, and put on board, with a 6 lb loaf of bread, some Tea, and sugar, and of all of which were given me by a man who was sent in charge of me from Manchester. I landed in Waterford, and applied to the Board of Guardians of that Union for money to pay my passage back to Manchester from which place I was brought against my will. The Guardians refused to give me money, but offered to admit me to the Workhouse which I refused. I left Waterford and came to New Ross by the Steamer. I was admitted to the New Ross Workhouse in which I spent 2 nights and one day, and received 3/- from the Relieving Officer of New Ross Union to pay my expenses to Wexford, in which place I arrived on this day.

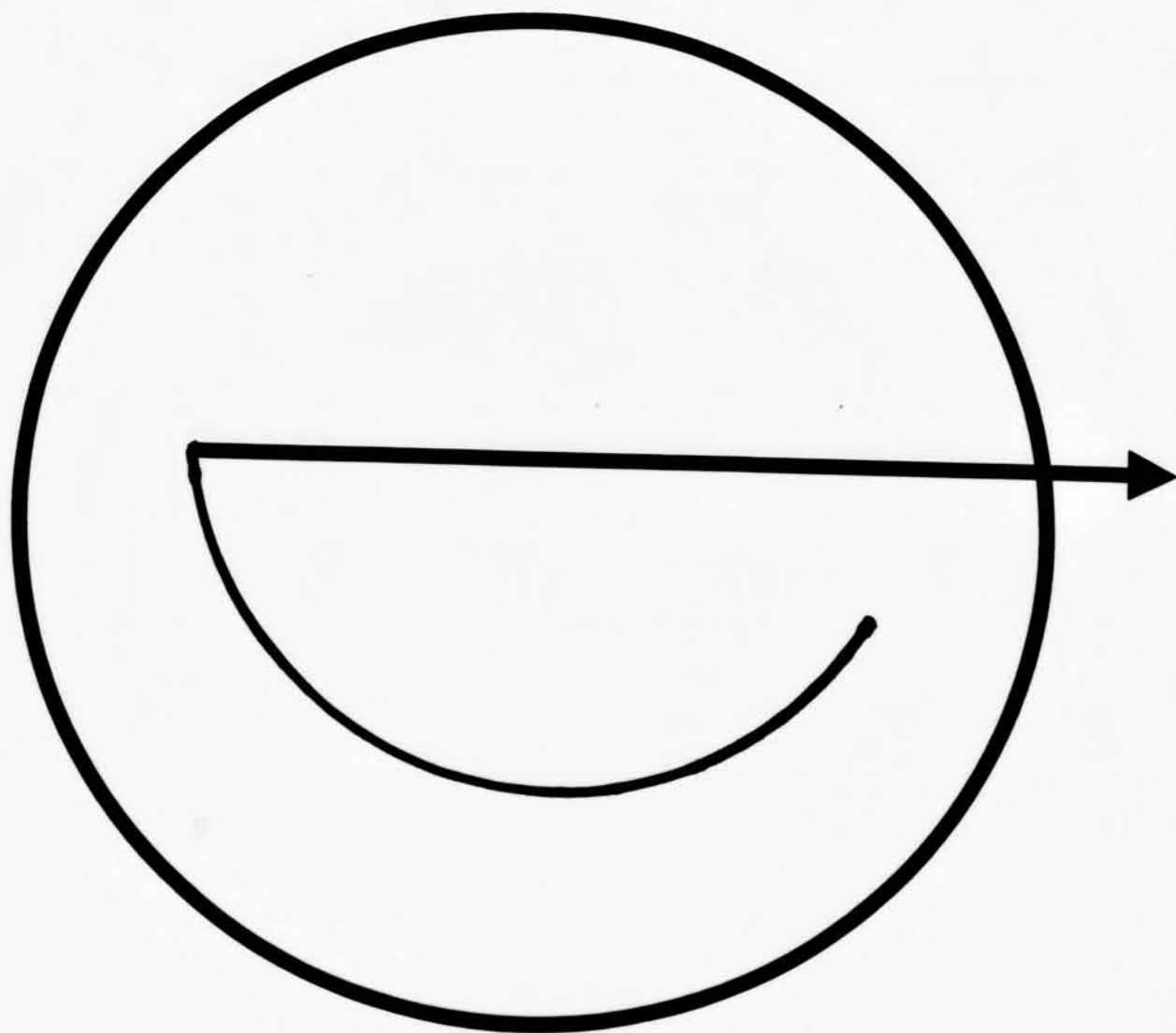
