The premises were all well furnished. No 11. The Infirmary very clean - we have visited the New House this day. No complaint was made by any of the inmates. We found the Infirmary clean and a good order in every way. Some portions of the New House were not so clean as they ought to have been by, the among the repairs men, day room & several of the passages. Some of the Cocks & Cistern pipes leak. Require repairs - we desire to submit to the Board an application from the four women employed in the Kitchen two of whom are obliged to be up during the whole night attending for a Cup of tea each when their turn comes to sit up and we beg leave to add that this report seems to be reasonable. We also enclose it with mention that it appears to us that the white washing & cleaning of the rooms & passages have been very inefficiently executed. This gives greatly for the cleanliness of the premises to improve the work, but chiefly for the hall not having been plastered. We would request the Board to provide air to take into consideration the expense of trying the experiment of plastering one of the school rooms. 30th May 1860 Signed J. F. Hutton

Pelly states that two women named Casey and Whelan were present when Miss Canoll told her this. I asked Miss Canoll what had she to say to this. She told me rather sharply she would give me no answer till Saturday. One of the messenger boys told me that he brought Whiskey several times to Miss Canoll last winter, he thinks the last he brought to her was on Ash Wednesday. She denies the boy's statement. It is also alleged that Miss Canoll borrowed money from several of the paupers some of whom have not yet been paid.

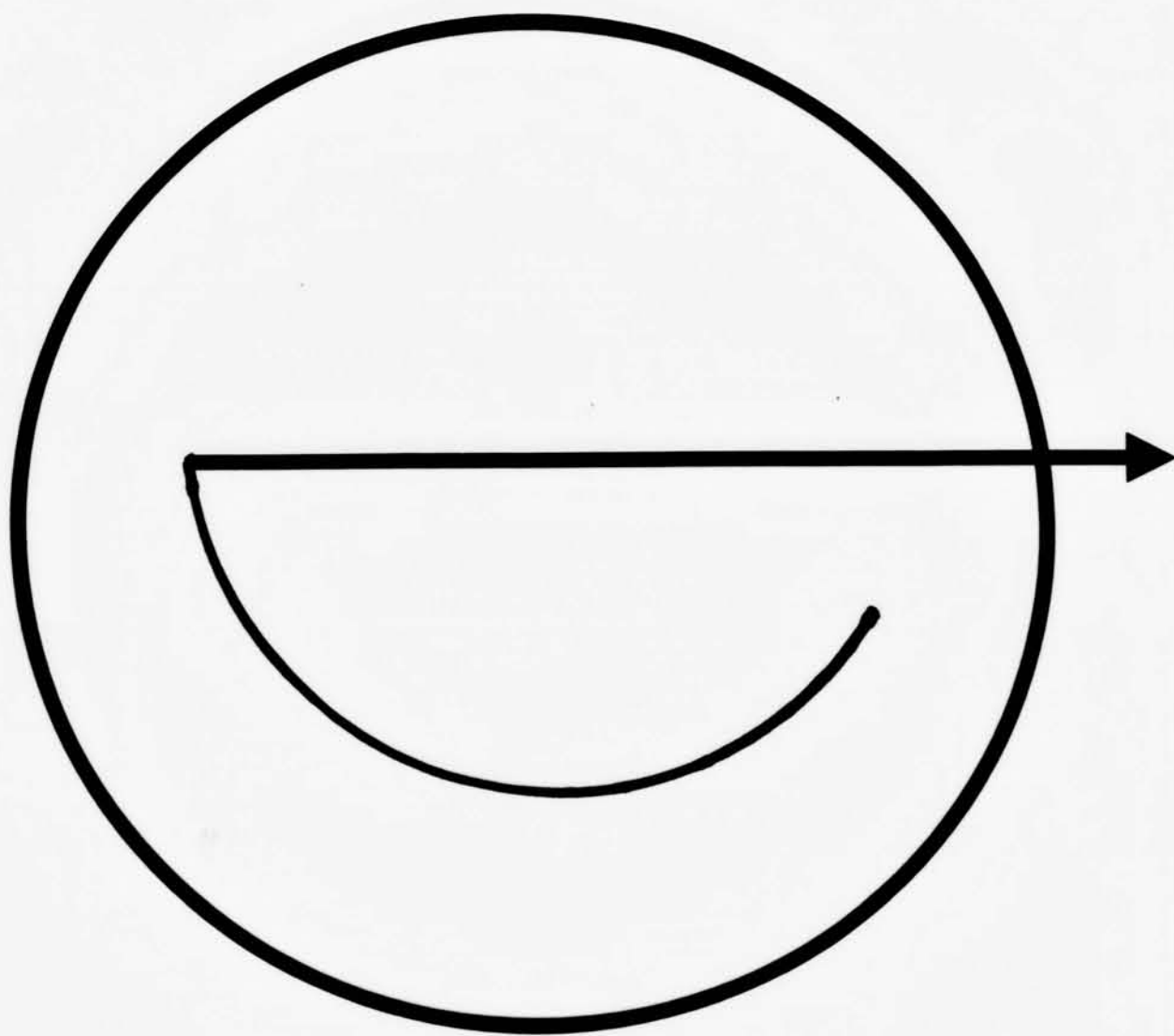
