## Agricultural Inspector

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon as follows:—

Visited for the Commissioners of National Education to report as to the industrial training and instruction of the Workhouse schoolboys for the Commissioners of Nat. Education, examined the schoolboys in Agriculture and inspected the cultivation of the Workhouse farm.

I have been very well pleased with the amount of progress and proficiency exhibited in the answering of the Agricultural Clap, who appear to be carefully instructed. The preparatory tillage of the land for next years cropping, is not so forward as I would wish to find it at this season and I have therefore to recommend that every possible assistance be afforded by the unemployed inmates to get it executed as quickly and early as possible. I would also wish to find a larger proportion of the farm bearing successive or "store crops", I have been disappointed with the pecuniary result shown by the farm account Book, especially as my impression of the appearance of the crops in summer and autumn was very favourable. It appears to me that sufficient credit is not given for farm produce consumed in the Establishment, and I should suggest that a strict account be kept of the precise quantity and value of all vegetables required in future for the use of the inmates of the Workhouse.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon as follows:—

Visited for the Commissioners of National Education to report on the agricultural training and instruction of the Workhouse school boys. The pupils constituting the "Agricultural Class" evince a very fair amount of proficiency in practical agriculture, though their local classification and limited literary attainments preclude the possibility of their making much progress in acquiring a knowledge of the theoretical department of agricultural knowledge. This same cause restricts the advantage of receiving agricultural instruction to a very limited number of the school boys, as 12 or 13 pupils for the "Agricultural Class" is but a comparatively small proportion out of a daily average attendance of 150. I have now drawn some suggestions which will, I hope, have the effect of producing an improvement as regards imparting theoretical instruction, and of making it more on a par with the efficiency of the practical instruction.

The farm management continues to be fairly carried out, for, though, in consequence of the unfavourable nature of the weather, but very little progress has as yet been effected in cropping the land, the preparatory tillage is in a forward and satisfactory state. I will recommend a gratuity for the half year ended 31<sup>st</sup> Dec: 1860 (signed) M. J. O'Sullivan, Esq.
