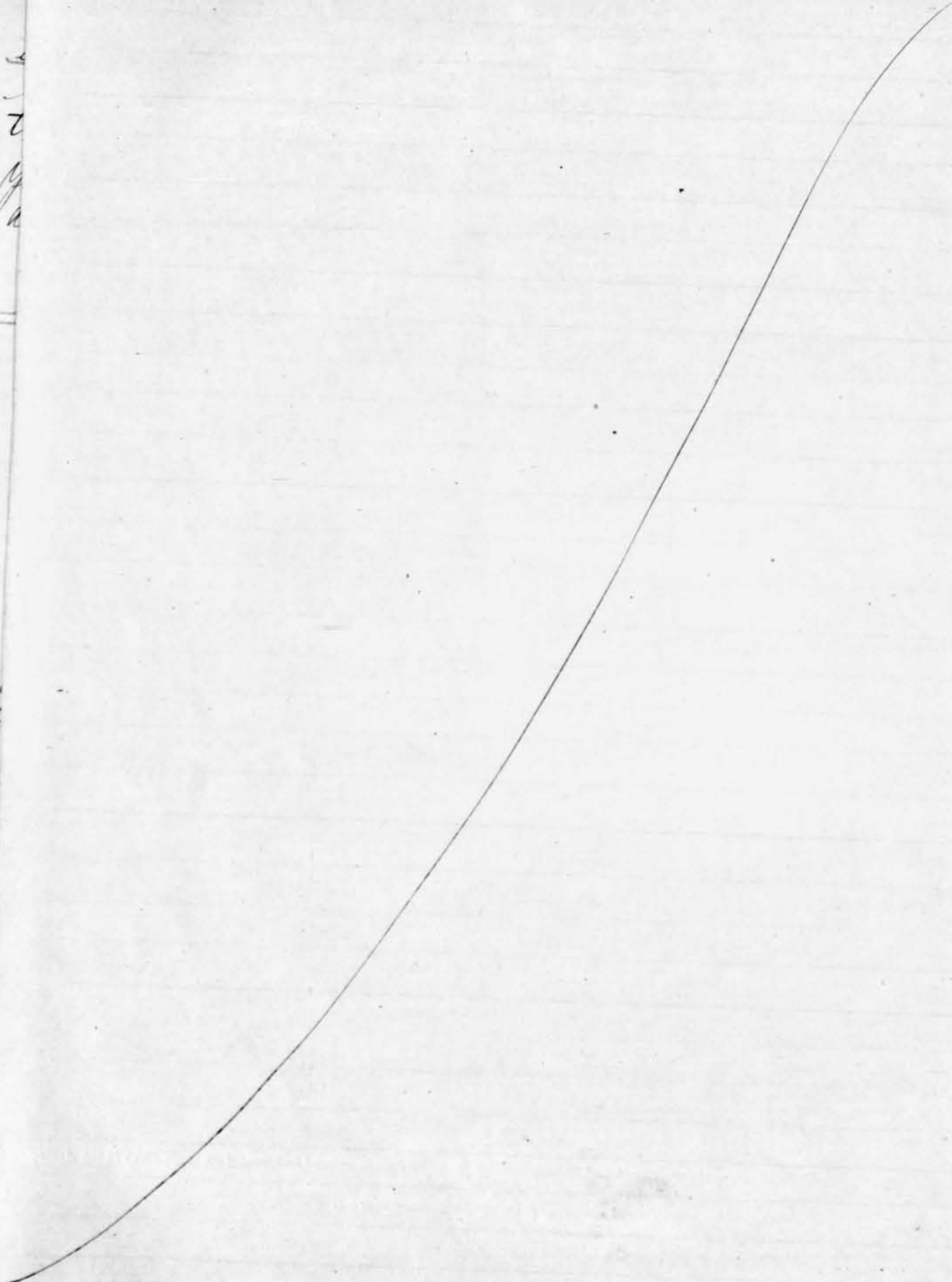

The Infant School has been suppressed as unnecessary owing to the diminished number in the House, and incorporated with the male and female schools,

Visited the School & the Workhouse. The children are improving. Would earnestly recommend a further classification of the able bodied women in the workhouse. The nursing women and those of supposed bad or indifferent character to be separated from those of better character. Their constant intercourse together renders the food unfit for service outside, which they would easily procure were they kept separate, and thereby remove the objection, there is to taking laundry out of the house, and relieve the Board from the cost of supporting women that would make good and useful members of society. Strongly recommend the most desirable change, already sanctioned by the Commissioners to be carried out without delay on the subject of classification.

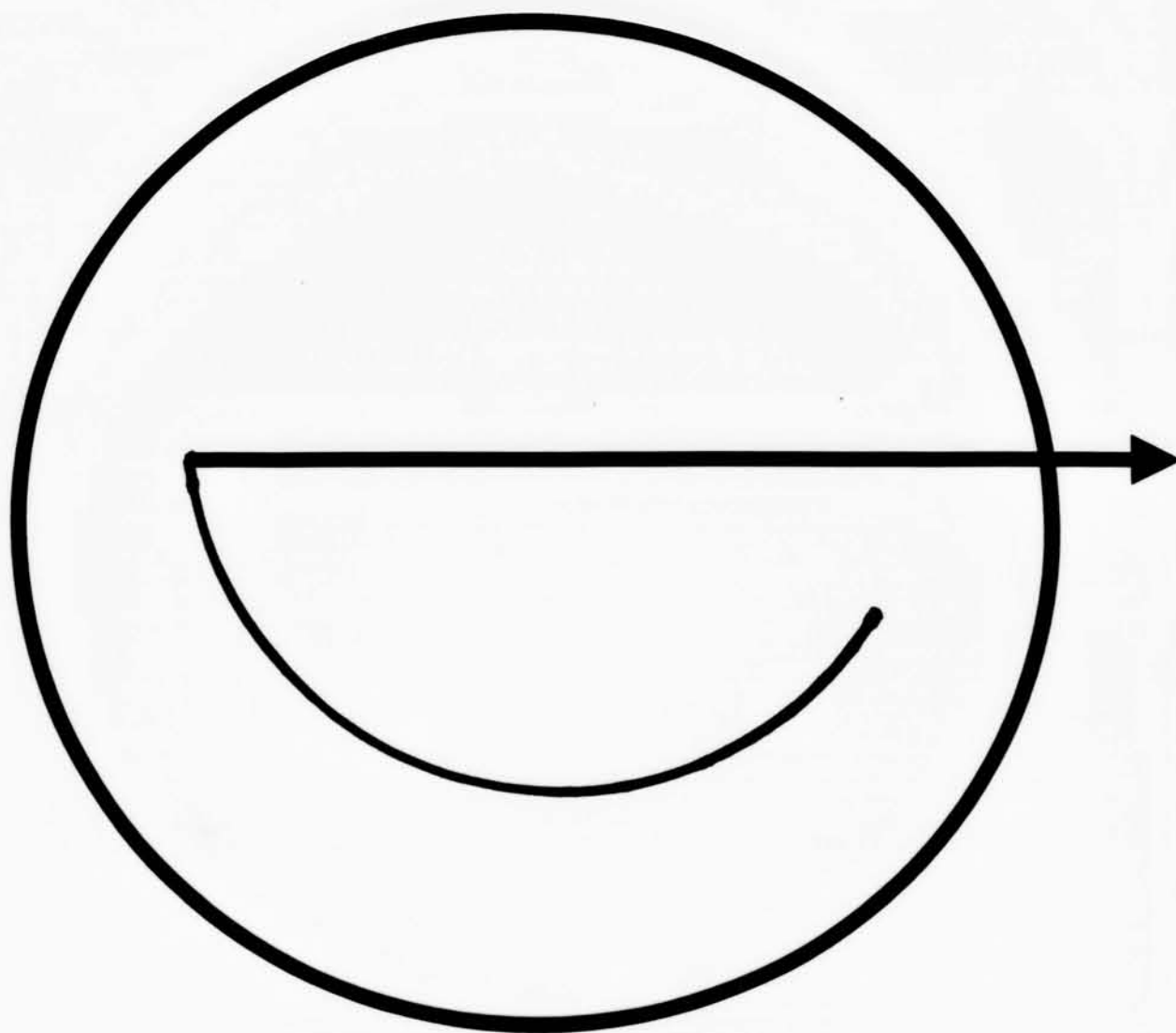
