The queries were all answered favourably, excepting 14, to which the following answer was given.
 No 14 The floor is not of good quality to day. The Schoolmaster applies for some improvement in his room, which admits the air through chinks. The cheapest way of remedying the evil would be by papering and erecting a slight ceiling. The same are required for the Schoolmistress room. Both these officers desire to be made comfortable. There were knives and Forks required for the Infirmary which the Committee directed the Master to provide. New Bodies are wanted for the Privy waffons, wheels are wanted for same.
 Some system is required in the women's Clothing and we would call the attention of the Clothing Committee to the subject. We recommend that the alterations in the Laundry recommended by a former Committee be carried out.
 18th September 1861 (Signed) J. H. Lute, Secy.
 Ordered that the Clerk write to the Flour contractor to request that he will supply Flour of the best quality in future. That the Master report to the Board on Saturday next the cheapest and most effecting mode of remedying the defects in the rooms of the Schoolmaster & Schoolmistress respectively that the guardians approve of the Master having obeyed the directions of the Visiting Committee in procuring knives & Forks for the use of the Infirmary—that the Master get the Privy waffons remedied as cheaply as possible, but that the wheels be not placed thereon until the Master shall have ascertained & reported to the Board whether the Metal wheels could be obtained, and if so, at what cost and also the cost of broody wheels—that the Visiting Committee be requested to meet here on Saturday morning next at 11 o'clock, for the purpose of inquiring & reporting to the Board what alterations if any ought to be made respecting the women's Clothing, and also what alterations they think advisable to have effected in the Laundry.

The 1st Class seems to have been carefully taught, the Senior division of it being able to read short sentences of Monosyllables. In the Infants Class the reading was good and the answers in the matter of the lessons fair. The Third & Fourth Classes answered fairly in geography, their reading was intelligent, they are backward in grammar. Of 45 copy Books

copied, about two thirds are well written and some few with ease and freedom, a fair proficiency has been attained generally, and the pupils appear to be improving.

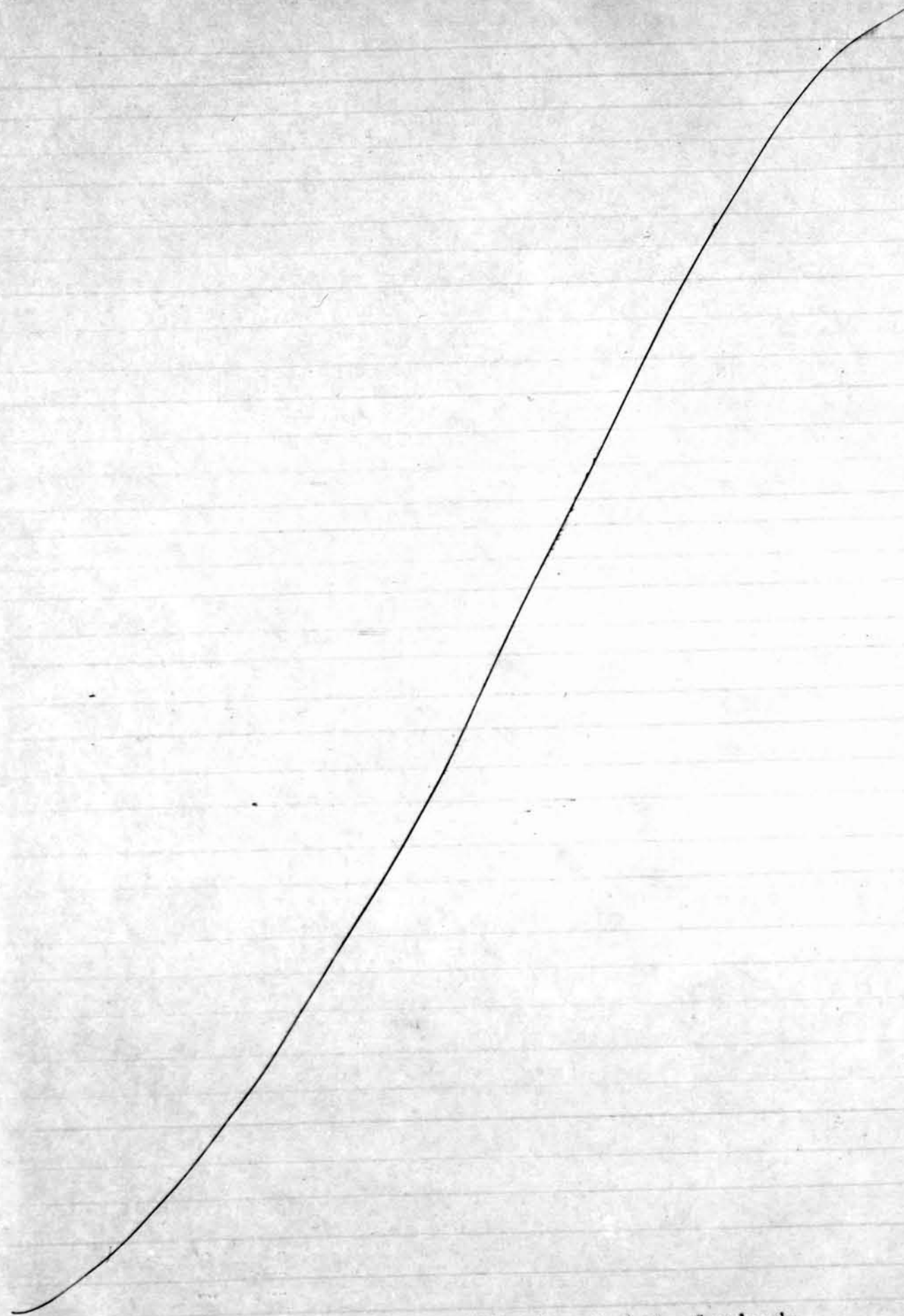

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon as follows:—

The Visiting Committee met to consider the best system to be adopted for the women's clothing.

It was recommended that only such a number of each article shall be kept in the Laundry as shall be necessary to afford a change when required, and that the remainder be kept in store in such form as shall admit of their being easily counted. That the Matron shall check those in the Laundry regularly.

The Committee visited the Laundry and recommended that there be a thorough repairs of the wooden work, and that the Pipe formerly used to convey hot water be made efficient, serviceable for the purpose. That the Force Pump now lying idle with the pipes attached be sold to cover the expenses.

The Committee likewise recommended that the sleeping rooms of the schoolmaster and schoolmistress be ceiled with light boards, and the crevices by the walls stopped with plaster.

The Committee will meet again with permission of the Board to consider further an improved system for the management of the clothing.

Resolved by Board of Magistrates that this Report is approved and adopted, and the Master hereby directed to have the recommendations contained in it carried into effect, and that leave is given to the Committee to sit again for the purpose specified in its Report.

Masters Report

Agreeably with the directions of the Board on last Saturday. I have to report that the cheapest and best mode of improving the schoolmasters and schoolmistress rooms would be by putting up a ceiling of light boards and pasting strips of batten over the joints of the boarded partition & papering all over with cheap Room Paper. The cost of metal wheels for the Piny waffons will be 20 shillings for wheels 2 1/2 feet high, and of wooden wheels large size about 29/- per pair. I have to request that a Committee may be appointed to take stock of provisions & necessities &c that may be put hands on the 29th September instant.

The day rooms of the adult women were filthy and in speaking to the Adult Matron there did not appear to me to be any system of cleaning them, their being no woman to whom that duty had been told off, all the passages I passed through were not what they ought to be found in a woman's yard there was a quantity of ashes & dirt lying. I was particularly disgusted as I took a friend over the House with me, and felt very much ashamed of it. 14th November 1861 (Signed) V. L. Patton.

A woman named Mary Radford of Ballyknock, in the Division of Ballymally was brought here in the Workhouse Car on Monday night last. She seemed unwell & died on Wednesday night.

The inmate Mary Molloy (an idiot) who was pregnant was confined in the Ward on Thursday morning, and the child was found dead in bed. Of an word to the Head Constable of Police, there was an Inquest held by the Coroner & the jury returned a verdict as follows.

"We find that a Male Infant born in Wexford Workhouse on the morning of the 2nd of June 1862, was alive at the time of birth, but from want of proper care its mother Mary Molloy being an idiot, the said Infant's death resulted, and we are of opinion that there is no blame to be attached to any of the officials of said Workhouse in this case."

I had a Mason employed during the week repairing roofs here and at Four Hospital, and also the Fire places at Four Hospital.

Visited all the wards of Workhouse - and a School, am happy to state that the House in general is in a satisfactory condition, and to suggest that Board of Guardians recommend a clause be inserted in the Bill now before Parliament for the better moral classification of the inmates of the Workhouses in Ireland, 17 March 1862 (signed) John Walsh (Mayor).

Ordered that Mr. Le Haute, & Mr. John Walsh are hereby appointed a Committee to prepare and lay before the Board on Saturday next, a Petition to the Legislature praying that a Clause similar to the one referred to in the foregoing Report may be inserted in the Poor Law Amendment Bill now before Parliament.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others, were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

No 490/61, dated 22nd February 1862, stating that the Workhouse site being held under Lease for Lives with Covenant for renewal, and one of those lives being His Late Royal Highness the Prince Consort, the Commissioners have forwarded the Lease to their solicitors with instructions, to take such steps as may be necessary in consequence of the cessation of the life.

A letter dated 23rd February 1862 from the Right Honourable Lord, Cairn stating that he will present the Petition forwarded to him from this Union.

A letter dated 27th February 1862 from the Clerk of Mullstreet Union stating that the Board of Guardians of that Union have adopted the Petition forwarded from this Union praying that the fathers of illegitimate children may be made compellable by Law to maintain them.

A letter dated 5th February 1862 from the Clerk of Limerick Union forwarding Copies of Petition adopted by the Board of Guardians of that Union, praying for an Amendment of the Fraud Law.

No order made thereon by this Board.

Moved by Mr. John Walsh (Maypass) and seconded by Mr. Patrick Lambert & passed, That with the permission of the Board I will withdraw my notice of Motion referring to the abolition of the Co. Infirmary pending the passing of the Poor Law Amendment Bill now before Parliament.

Ordered that Mary Murphy aged 40 years who is at present in a delicate state of health, and whose husband is unable to procure the attendance & nourishment which her state requires, be admitted into this House, and that the relief which will be afforded her be by way of Loan to her husband Rich^d Murphy.

Ordered that Mary Doyle a sickly poor woman, who occupies 2 of two houses in Wexford & pays 2/2 rent per week, which she has offered to give up to the Guardians to pay in part for her maintenance, be admitted into this Workhouse, and that it be entered on the Minutes that the relief afforded is by way of Loan.

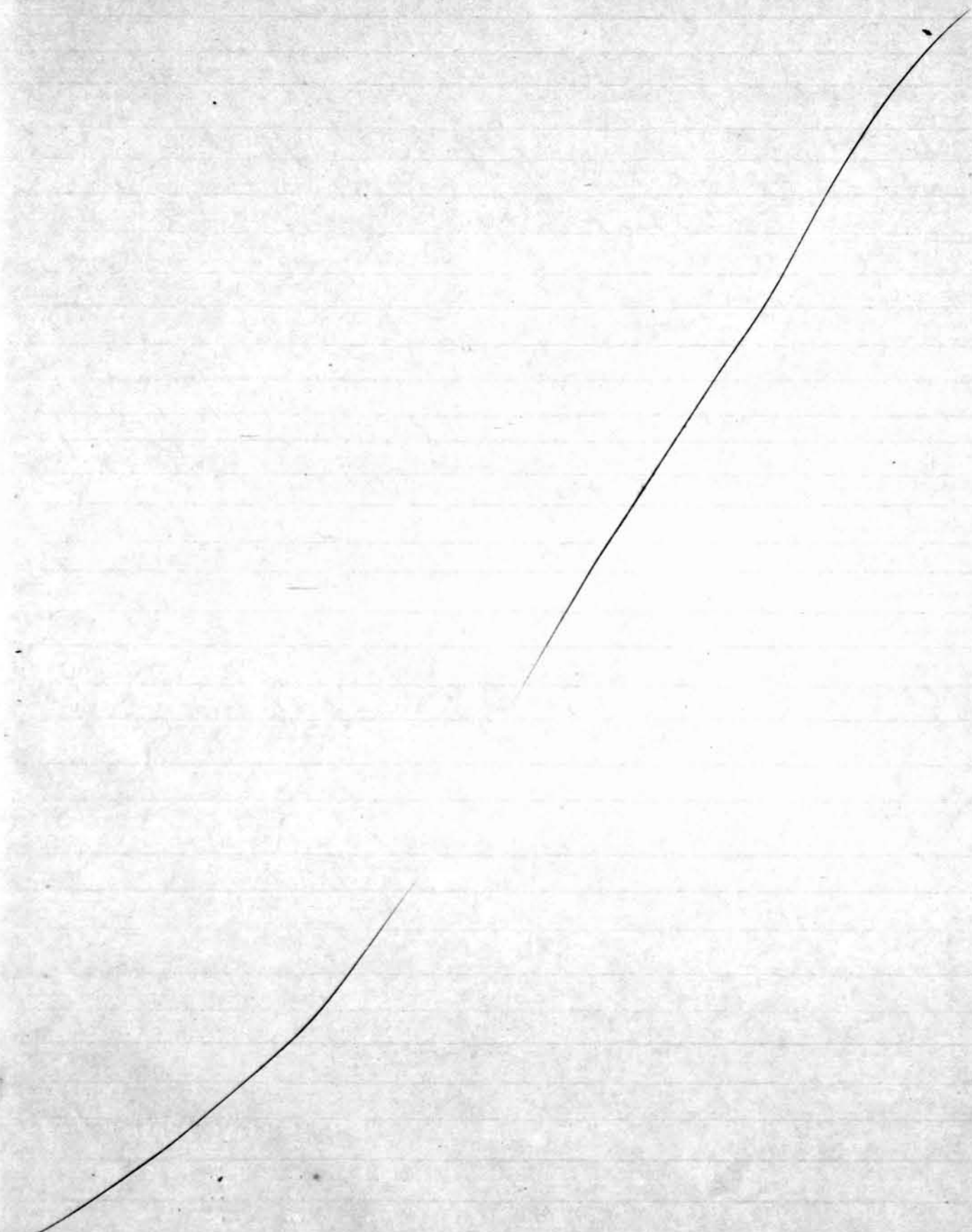
