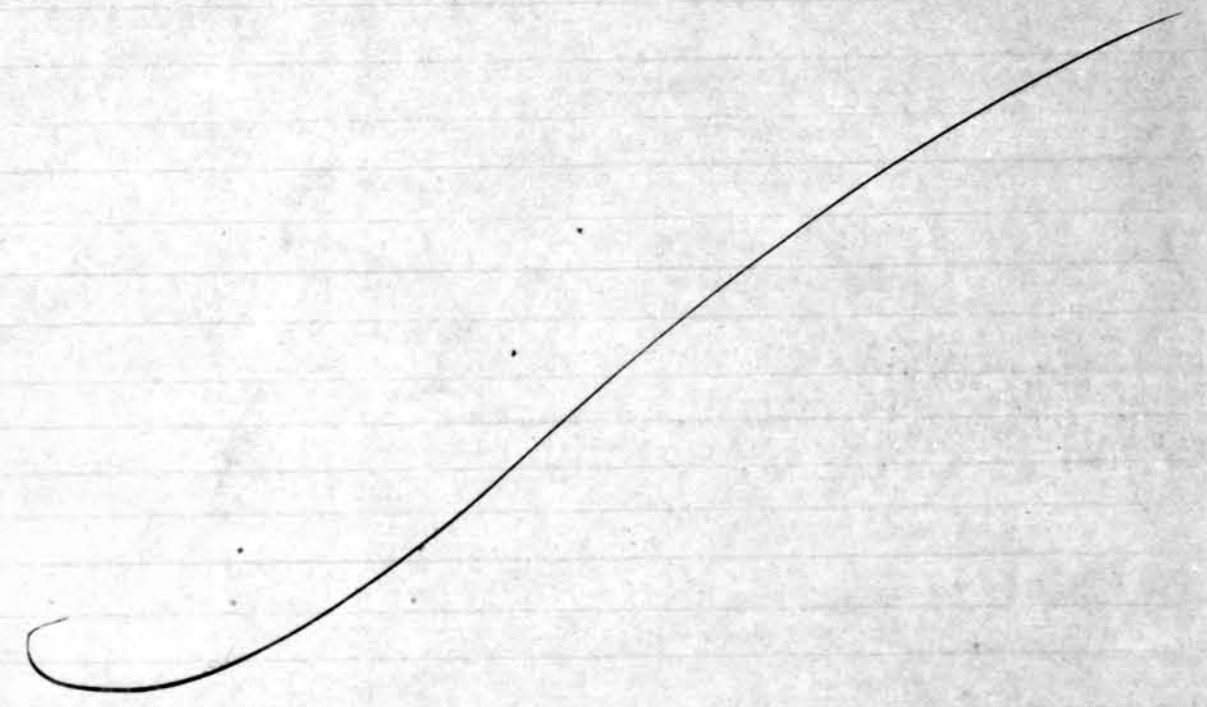

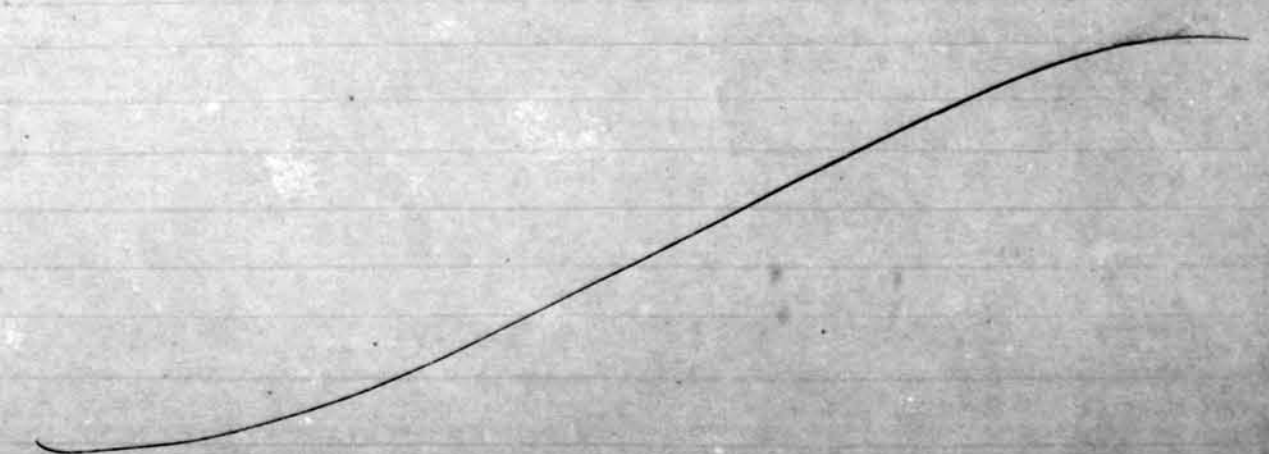

Newford May 9th 1862, Gentlemen - In answer to the communication of the Commissioners for administering the Laws for the relief of the Poor in Ireland conveyed to me through the Clerk on the 7th Instant relating to the drop of the Patients in the Fever Hospital, I beg to state that I think the proposed alterations would be injurious for the following reasons. There are two classes of persons who become inmates of the Institution - one class - respectable Housekeepers and Officials in the business establishments of the town &c. if you place any but then you dress on those, it is my decided opinion, that will not be induced to enter the Hospital and you thereby endanger the lives of whole families. If I were to recount to you the many such instances that have come before me in days gone by of the ravages produced

by Fever Patients, not being sent in early to Hospitals would exhaust your patience, but I cannot withhold from you one last anecdote before the present formidable system of Dispensary relief was adopted. In those days of Houses opposite the Distillery the wife of one of the inmates became ill. She was not seen by any Medical Man until, far advanced in fever, when I then visited her. I found a strong in the house complaining the contagion had spread & I believe not a family in any of the houses escaped. What misery must not this have entailed on those poor creatures, not to speak of the expense attending on treating them in the Fever Hospital. Look now to what has occurred within the past six weeks a bad form of Fever spread up & down the neighbourhood owing to the poor fitness of the Dispensary Medical Officer in having the cases handed over to Hospital, fever has been allayed, and there has not been admitted a case since the 22nd of June from that locality.

There is, naturally a repugnance to come ones home during illness to enter an Hospital & we cannot be too cautious in introducing any change that would in the least tend to increase it.

The second class of Patients I allude to are poor half naked creatures - see the many images you expose them to by stripping them of the provided food Hospital clothing and placing on their own tattered garments, when you discharge them from Hospital.

As the course adopted in the Fever Hospital relative to the clothing of those admitted may not be known permit me to state that every article which can be washed and secured is and that those which cannot are cleaned and exposed to the air.

That the Guardians wish further to remark that they are not influenced in the slightest degree by any motives of economy nor are they willing in any manner to interfere in every way with the Commissioners for the benefit and comfort of the sick and destitute poor, but their experience convinces them that the alteration proposed in the clothing of Convalescent Fever Patients would be prejudicial to the local public and they therefore trust that the Commissioners will not further object to a system which has worked well and without any disadvantage sover for so many years.

the Laundry made was well understood, and submitted to, and that as nothing could be more prejudicial to the character of the House than a continuance of such a system, he felt it his duty as an officer of the Board to bring the matter under its notice with a view to further investigation, and to prove the truth or falsehood of the statement.

On the suggestion of Col. Latton several of the Guardians proceeded to the Laundry and inspected the clothes which had been recently washed, and on their return reported to the Board that the clothes could not be cleaner.



No complaints were made to me by any of the inmates. It was mentioned to me by the Master that the Auditor on last looking over the accounts objected to the charge for a Barber for the Infirmary. I spoke in consequence this morning to Doctor (Cecil) on the subject, and asked him whether a handy inmate could be employed as barber, he said he thought it absolutely necessary that a professional man should share the patients in the Infirmary. Many of whom are ill, weak, and requiring the utmost care in shaving. 16th August 1867.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon as follows:-

2. To call the attention of the Board to the Idiots of both sexes. One of the male Idiots was struck lately by one of the men in charge of them, but not severely, the other man in charge of them is quiet but not at all adapted for such a place. We have now better to put over them. The female Idiots have no place out to walk for some time until indeed last that are so manageable, but the Inspector says they must be taken out to walk regularly in future. I do not think it safe to allow them out without any officer to mind them. I think it would be well to have paid persons to be in care of them. There are nine of each sex now.

The Schoolboys broke several panes of glass in the School Room windows on Tuesday last when the Schoolmaster was engaged in the Board Room.

The Inspector desired that some of the School girls be sent to the Infirmary kitchen to learn cooking without an order of the Board unless the door of the kitchen yard be kept constantly locked. I have resigned 185 of the Punks from Mr. Shaw and request a Committee of the Guardians to examine them.

It would be well to have gas lights on both stairs in the Infirmary. New ladders are wanted as the old ones are very unsafe.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:-
Ordered, that the Guardians on Saturday the 27th inst. will consider on the recommendation of the Poor Law Commissioners and Poor Law Inspector, the advisableness of appointing two paid officers to take charge of the male & female inmates & Idiots in this House, that the Schoolboys who broke the windows be lodged by the Schoolmaster in the presence of the Master of the Workhouse, that the direction of the Inspector respecting the kitchen yard be attended to, that the Punks which are sent to sample be taken into the stock of the House - that the men on the stairs at both sides of the Infirmary lighted with gas and that the ladders referred to in the Master's Report be inspected by the Visiting Committee who are hereby authorized to direct him how to procure new ladders instead of those complained of.

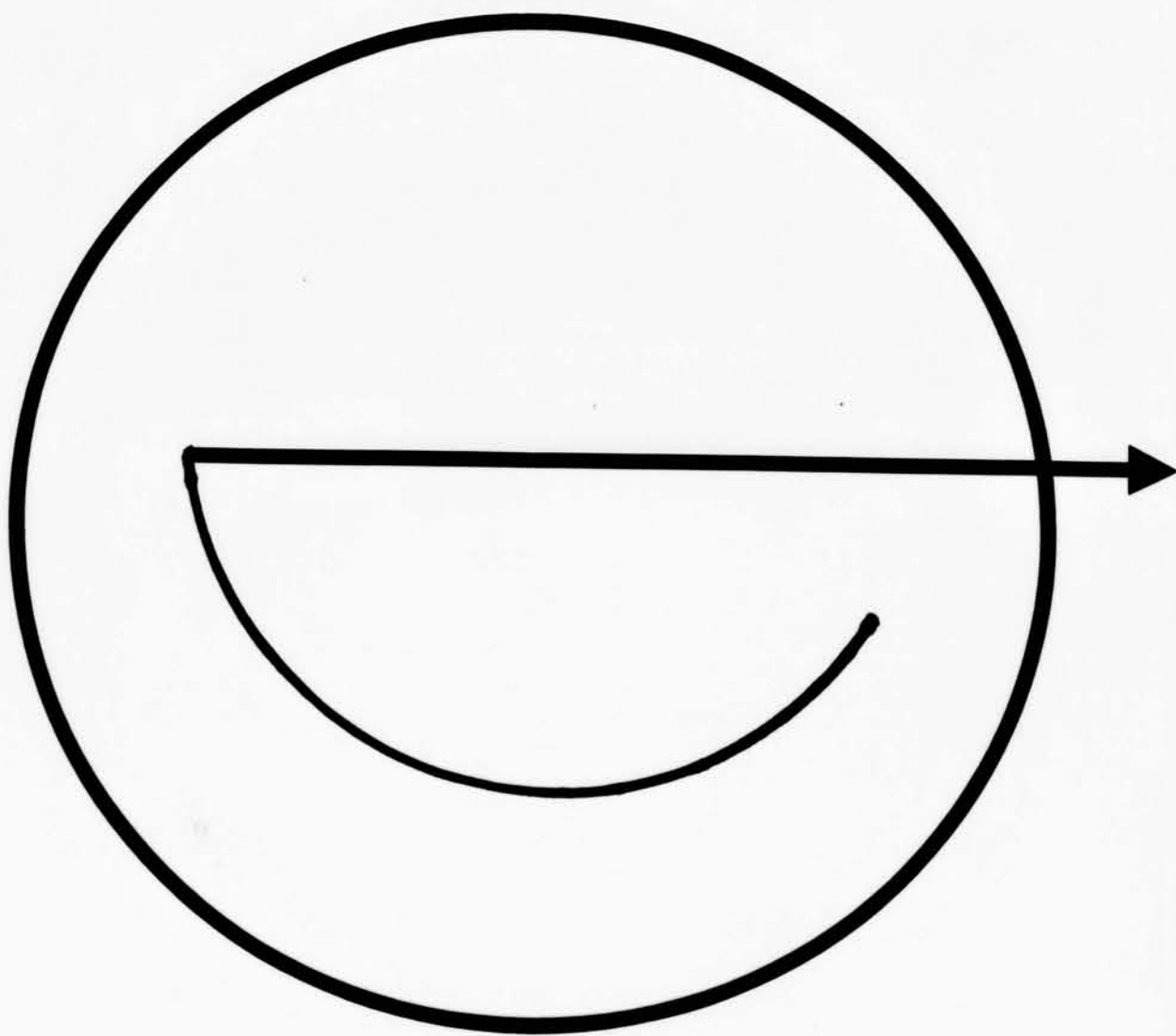
