Somehow mechanically taught. The children are not taught Arithmetic with sufficient thoroughness, and do not exhibit the requisite expertness and accuracy in the management of simple numbers and calculations. On the whole I think the Schools subject to these exceptions in a tolerably fair state.

I have to repeat attention to the want of an additional female Teacher specially for the Infant Pupils of whom there are frequently forty and fifty of both sexes present. Miss Harpen the female Teacher is quite overworked, having to take charge of about 20 infant boys in addition to a large school of girls, the consequence is that in the afternoon to teach all, all are imperfectly taught. A suitable gallery provided with fittings and apparatus for the instruction of these infant children is also wanted. The so called gallery recently erected is worse than useless.



Circumstances connected with the case of Anne Stafford submitted to the Clerk of the Union for approval of Guardians.

It appears from the Relieving Officers Application & Report Book, that in the 27<sup>th</sup> February last Anne Stafford of Ballagh, in the Electoral Division of Dringagh, who was then convalescent after Suffering Fever, but who was confined to bed and in a very weak state from bed sores on different parts of the body, applied to the Relieving Officer for out door relief.

Whilst the Guardians were considering the case it was suggested that the Law precluded the applicant from relief, her husband having in his occupation four acres of land and also a horse and a pig.

Reference having been made to the Rate Book it was ascertained that the Mother of Anne Stafford's husband was rated as occupier of an land in question.

The Board then ordered that a sum of 20/-

Next Meeting of the Guardians to be held on Saturday, the day of

2/- per week for a fortnight be allowed her, and also sanctioned the payment of 5/- per week for the services of a Nurse. Some Mr. Farish had stated Dr. Boyd had employed, and likewise a sum of one Shilling per day for Spirits.

When the relief was about to be renewed on the 5<sup>th</sup> March, the question was raised by Mr. Hore the Guardian of the Division in which the woman was charged, whether the relief afforded her was legal, her husband being in possession of 4 acres of land, and the Board ruled that the absence from the Rate Book of the name of Anne Stafford's husband was evidence, prima facie, that he was not the occupier and that consequently she was not shut out by Law from relief from the Rates.

The relief was continued, Mr. Hore still asserting that the husband of Anne Stafford killed and manured the land, paid the rent and sold its produce.

The relief was renewed at the same time rate weekly till the 19<sup>th</sup> March on which day Mr. Hore protested against the continuance of the Nurse at the expense of the rates, principally on the ground that the Mother in Law of Anne Stafford who lived in the house with her, and who followed the occupation of Nurse Tender could find the sick woman such attendance as she required.

In answer to an inquiry Mr. Farish stated that the Nurse was engaged by Dr. Boyd at one Shilling per day, and that he was present at the agreement.

The Guardians considered the charge excessive, and on the representation of Mr. Hore agreed that the Nurse Tender shall be dispensed with, that she should be paid at the rate of 5/- per week.



from the 20<sup>th</sup> Feb to 19<sup>th</sup> March, and with the view of inducing the Mother-in-law to afford the sick woman such care as was necessary directed that the relief should be increased from 2/6 to 4/- per week.

On the 16<sup>th</sup> April the case was again brought under the notice of the Board by the Relieving Officer, who then reported that with the desire of acting in conformity with the order of the Board on the 19<sup>th</sup> March, he went to the house of Anne Stafford on the 22<sup>nd</sup> March and conveyed to the Nurse the instructions given by the Guardians to pay her but 5/- per week which he said she refused to accept, but from the angry state in which he believed Anne Stafford was then ~~in~~ he was afraid to incur the responsibility of discontinuing the services of the Nurse without the approbation of the Medical Officer, that he consulted Dr. Boyd who told him that if the Nurse was displeased with the woman's death, would be accelerated, and that under the circumstances he could not obey the order of the Guardians to discharge her.

Anne Stafford died on the 18<sup>th</sup> April, and on the 30<sup>th</sup> of that month a Bill from the Nurse for 39 days at one shilling per day (commencing on 20<sup>th</sup> February and ending 19<sup>th</sup> April) was presented for payment to the Board of Guardians, when on the Motion of Mr. Lamb seconded by Mr. Samuel Palmer it was resolved that the Bill should not be entertained by the Board for the reason that the Relieving Officer had received instructions on the 14<sup>th</sup> March to discontinue the services of the Nurse, and to pay her at the rate of 3/- per week.

This decision of the Board having been

communicated to Doctor Boyd, he returned a letter to the Board of which the following is a copy.

Barrow May 3<sup>rd</sup> 1864,

Dear Sir,

On Saturday last the nurse in attendance on Anne Stafford at Ballary applied to the Guardians for her wages and was refused payment, as the Guardians had not sufficient information before them respecting the agreement made with her. Therefore send you the following statement. I first saw Anne Stafford on the 26<sup>th</sup> January, and as she had Typhus I went to send her to the Fever Hospital, but her husband would not permit it, when I saw her on the 28<sup>th</sup> she was then insensible and unfit to be moved, her husband said he was unable until he sold a pig to procure wine that she was in need of, I sent to her Mother and she also refused to let it.

I then sent for a bottle to a shop and wrote to the Relieving Officer who came out and having heard that the pig was sold for the husband to pay for the wine, the husband also procured everything necessary, and his mother nursed her. In about a fortnight Mrs. Stafford got a change for the better, but her recovery was retarded in



consequence of bed sores. About the middle of February I called at her house at 9 o'clock in the evening, her mother in law who was in bed on the floor told me she was exhausted attending her, and was quite unable to attend to her any more, Mrs. Stafford was then sensible but unable to move, she had three large bed sores one on each hip, and one the size of a dinner plate on her back - very weak - she asked me to procure her a drink, could not get any fluid in the house, even water, must day and night to the Relieving officer to come out and take charge of her, as otherwise she would be neglected. He did come and agreed to pay the nurse one shilling per day, the nurse wanted to be fed, but he said the family should feed her, the only thing I did with the agreement was that I told the nurse to continue in her attendance as she was one of the 1/- per day, and that if the Relieving officer represented to the guardians the state the patient was in - the dreadful stench from the bed sores - and the evacuations (which she passed involuntarily except on two or three occasions with the last, that the guardians might allow her something for her diet. About a month after the agreement the Relieving officer called on me to say that the guardians were not satisfied to pay her the 1/- shilling per week, and

we could the nurse be dispensed with, I told him that if the nurse was removed the woman's death would be hastened. He then went to the House, and as Mrs. Stafford seemed not likely to live many days he desired the nurse to stay with her, however the poor creature lingered for some weeks in the most dreadful suffering, when I recommended the Relieving officer to employ the nurse it was impossible that any one woman could keep her clean and dry, but one could attend to her with the assistance of another for a short time each day, that assistance was given by the Mother in law who also had to attend to her infant. - Certainly both the Relieving officer and myself had trouble enough with the case, as she refused to be seen so often, and the distance so far,

The statement of Dr. Boyd that Mr. Caragh employed the nurse was at variance with that made by the latter, who informed the Board that Dr. Boyd had engaged her, but it turned out on inquiry that they were both present and that one had as much to do with the agreement as the other, when Doctor Boyd's letter was read for the Board on the 17th Instant, Mr. John Diverens presented for Board Division gave notice of his intention to move

The queries were all answered favourable. No 1, Yes, we consider the workhouse slowly and steadily improving in order in cleanliness, No 2, Yes, as far as we can judge the children make progress. The schoolmistress attends regularly. No 3, Yes, the boys' clothing is better. The schoolmistress complains that the number of young women children in the same room with the older ones, is a hindrance to the latter. The School Inspector has reported to the same effect. It would be possible at a very small expense to separate the children without taking them from under the care of the schoolmistress, by partitioning off a part of the women's day room which can be well spared, and by opening a door at the end of the present washroom which opens into the girls' school. There are two wooden galleries in the dormitories on the women's side which have been long unused and which interfere with ventilation. The materials of one of these galleries would be more than sufficient for the partition. It would be desirable that a Committee of the Board of Officers, and others, should inspect the schoolroom and women's day room, 3rd August 1864 (Signed) J. Duffast, Master.





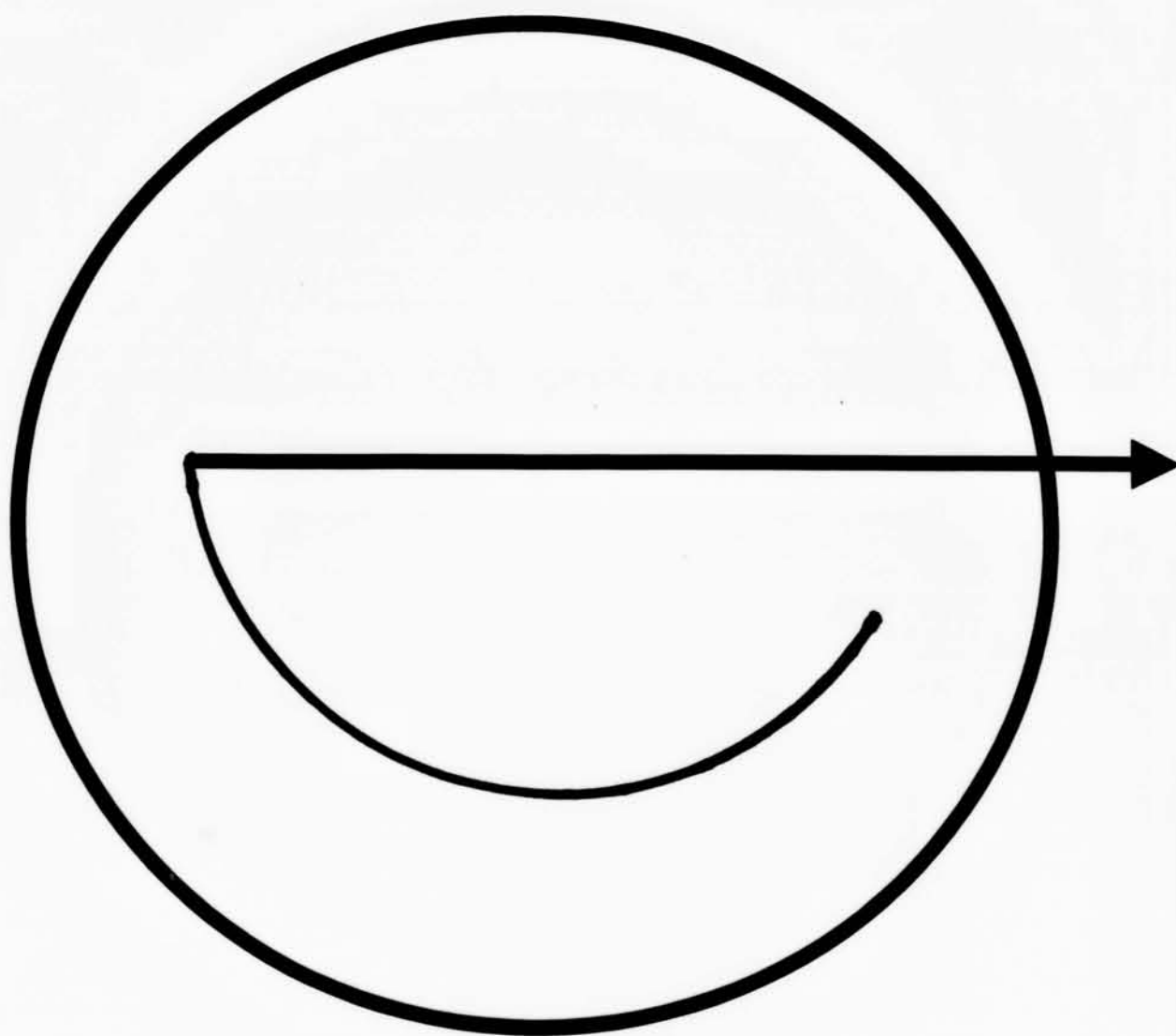
