Having considered the subject of placing an additional check on the distribution of out door relief, we are of opinion that every case of either a renewal or a new case should be visited and reported upon with the fullest particulars by the Relieving Officer, as prescribed by the Poor Law Commissioners, and we strongly recommend the Board to have this system acted upon for the future, and if the Relieving Officer is unable to perform that duty effectually, that proper assistance should be given him.

We are convinced that a proper supervision of the distribution of out door relief will not only be economical but will be the means of preventing the spreading of a system, which has been found to work so prejudicially in other Unions.
