Oct 17th In the boys' school the improvement is quite satisfactory, but it is not so in the female school. The reason given for their backwardness, is that they spend nearly all their time in manual work without distinction - Until they have learned the necessaries of their Religion, and can read easily, I think they ought to be allowed to spend a good portion of their time in school; and then the more industrious at training the better.

Memorandum from the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the 31st of October 1845, No. 17, 930, 2445, accompanying the copy of a Notice on the subject of the Potato Crop in Ireland, at the request of Earl Melbourne, to be laid before the Board of Guardians.

Memorandum from the Poor Law Commissioners, dated 3rd November 1845, No. 66, 144, stating that in consequence of the apprehensions which exist on the subject of the Potato Crop, the Poor Law Commissioners have deemed it their duty to authorize the Guardians of Unions, to depart from the established Dietaries, by substituting the use of Catechol, Rice, Bread, or other food in lieu of potatoes, whenever the Guardians may deem it advisable to do so. They will therefore be enabled to withdraw from the Market the stone of potatoes, which would be wanted for the inmates.

The Commissioners will entertain any modification of the Dietary in other respects that the Guardians may deem it expedient to propose.

It is desirable that the Guardians should duly weigh any suggestion or recommendation, that may be made to them by the Medical Officers.

A Circular from the Commissioners dated the 5th November 1845. No. 272. N/45, stating that they have had their attention directed to cases in which persons tendering for the supply of Work houses with a view for use in the Establishment, have subsequently refused to enter into contract & security. They have had the opinion of Counsel as to the liability of persons tendering in such cases; & they are advised, that where the tenders are definite, & mention the quantities and times of delivery, and how long the contract is to last, and is duly signed, it is sufficient to bind the Contractor under the Statute of Frauds.

In order to avoid risk & dispute, the Commissioners would recommend the Guardians to have the form of contract & bond signed as soon as possible after acceptance.
