Memorandum from the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the 31st of October 1845, v. N. 17. 930. D. 45. accompanying Ten copies of a Letter on the subject of the Potatoleap in Ireland, at the request of Col. Mc Gregor, to be laid before the Board of Guardians.

Memorandum from the Poor Law Commissioners, dated 3 November 1845, v. P. 666. 44. stating that in consequence of the apprehensions which exist on the subject of the Potatoleap, the Poor Law Commissioners have deemed it their duty to authorize the Guardians of Unions to depart from the established Dietaries, by substituting the use of oatmeal, Rice, Bread, or other food in place of Potatoes, wherever the Guardians may deem it desirable to do so. They will thereby be enabled to withdraw from the Market to the sum of Potatoes, which would be wanted for the inmates.

The Commissioners will entertain any modification of the Dietary in other respects that the Guardians may deem it expedient to propose.

It is desirable that the guardians should duly weigh any suggestion or recommendation, that may be made to them by the Medical Officer.

A Circular from the Commissioners dated the 5 November 1845, No. 272, M/45, stating that they have had their attention directed to cases in which persons tendering for the supply of Work houses with articles for use in the Establishment, have subsequently refused to enter into a Contract & Security. They have had the opinion of Counsel as to the liability of persons tendering in such cases, & they are advised that when the tenders are definite, & mention the quantities and times of delivery, and how long the contract is to last, and is duly signed, it is sufficient to bind the Contractor under the Statute of Frauds.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and Signed.

The Register Book was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2622 to No. 2630,

both inclusive, by the Signature of the Chairman, and Counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following

effect:

That he had written to the Commissioners, informing them, that the guardians had delayed, for a week, answering the Commissioners' letter on the subject of taking criminal proceeding against Christopher Coffey, late Rate Collector, on account of the smallness of the attendance on Saturday the 16th instant.

That he had also written to the Commissioners, for their sanction of the Board of guardians retaining any security from the Treasures of this Union, the being Manager of a Bank here.

stating, That in accordance with the
wishes of the Board of Guardians of the
Wexford Union, the Commissioners do
not require that the Treasurer of the
Union should enter into security."

It was ordered, That the Board defer,
until this day next, answering the Com-
missioners' letter of the 15th May 1846, on the
subject of taking criminal proceeding
against C. Taffey, late Late Collector, in
consequence of the smallness of the Meeting
on this day, many of the guardians being
engaged at the Extraordinary road pre-
senting session."

Sir Jas. Sefton brought forward
his station of which he had given Notice,
& which had been postponed, & moved,
seconded by Mr. Cashin, that the dues and
startings be taken from the Brays during
the summer Month, & the startings from
the girls during the same season; and also

that the Resolution of the Board on the same subject on the 20th June 1845, be rescinded." Agreed to.

It was ordered that the Clerks do write to the Newmills Contractors on the subject of the complaint made by the Master, that the Mills supplied this some time back has not been paid.

Provisional Admissions into the Workhouse, and Applications for Admissions were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Book.

The number of Provisional Admissions confirmed was	- 1.

The Bonds and other Securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows:—(this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

It was ordered, "That the Names of Persons offering Bonds here, be taken from the sample sent in, & that the Master do attend particularly to this Master, in future."

The Board proceeded to receive Bonds for Clothing, and accepted the following:

Richard Murphy's of Laghman, for 500 yards of blea calico, at 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ per yard.

Stephen Grindstaff of Laghman, for 100 yards of twilled calico, at 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ per yard, and 100 yards of sacking, at 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ per yard.

Arthur Kenanagh, for 100 yards of twilled calico

calico, at 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ per yard, 100 yards of sacking, at 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ per yard, and 50 yards of coarse linen, at 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ per yard.

It was ordered, that half oatmeal, and hay India Meal, 4 ounces of each, be given to the Adult Baupus, made into Strabaut, per dinner, in lieu of Baunes of Oatmeal, given them per dinner this sometime back.


