ordered that the Commissioners be informed that the Guardians are unanimously of opinion that there is no necessity for the appointment of an assistant teacher for the female School, and that they do not consider there is any overcrowding in that School, or that the children can by any arrangement work better or have better health, or be better instructed:—there being six of the grown up girls of the School acting as monitors, that the portion of the Commissioners' letter having reference to increased accommodation for the Lunatics in the House will be submitted to the Medical Officer, and that such recommendations as he may make will very probably be carried into effect, and that the Pictures of

in the House will also be laid before him, with a view to the obtaining his opinion as to whether any change is desirable that with regard to the substitution of candles for gas alluded to by the Commissioners, the Guardians have ordered the use of candles till the commencement of winter, thereby more economical and not inconvenient resulting from the change. The repairs on the chimney and Landmark Roof have been ordered to be done without delay.



pot of thick milk instead of one pint Soup and 6 ozs Brown Bread instead of 5 ozs. If the aged and infirm inmates 12 ozs Tea to 1 pint of milk instead of one oz. to that quantity of water, and for supper 6 ozs White Bread instead of 6 ozs Brown Bread. The Committee further recommend that 10 lbs of Oatmeal be allowed to the full grown men for soup, and 2 lbs Beef to 5 gallons of soup on Sunday, and 1 lb of Mutton in each week for the healthy inmates. The Committee consider that when the inmates become plentiful in the County, it would be advisable to introduce them into the dietary in the same quantities, and to the same classes as were hitherto allowed them,


