Mr Richard Fortune the Representative of James Pendergast, deceased, one of the Securities of the defaulting Collector Pea came before the Board on this day, and stated that he was prepared to make oath that he got no access by said James Pendergast, and that any legal proceedings instituted against him for the recovery of Pea's defalcations would only have the effect of harassing him and entailing expense without any advantage being gained by the Board.

Resolved unanimously that this Board after consideration agree to release Mr Fortune from any liability on payment.



Report of Doctor Nugent read.

This evening visited the Wexford Union Workhouse to inquire into the condition of the Insane Classes maintained in it. The total amounts to eight, namely three females and five males. Two of the females are epileptic and one quite demented. The males with one exception are epileptics, and that exception is a weak minded imbecile. I really see no necessity or use whatever in removing any of the eight to the district Asylum. One of the females is represented to me as being occasionally troublesome; she only requires on that account a little more care. The man in charge of the males informs me that they are quiet and easily managed. Under these circumstances, I think it would be an uncalled for expenditure to place individuals who can be well looked after in a Workhouse, in an Establishment where the cost of their support would be fully three times greater than it is at present. An asylum is intended for Chronic patients, for those likely to derive permanent benefit by treatment in it, or for such whose tendencies are violent and dangerous to themselves or others.

I have repeatedly pointed out to this Relieving Officer, Mr. Corwin, the necessity of reporting fully upon this Book the particulars required to be stated regarding the Applicants for Out-door relief, and have more than once called his attention to the Regulations prescribing his duties in that regard, but without any visible

improvement. There is scarcely one case in his Application & Report Book in which the full particulars required to be stated are set forth—and I have observed some cases in which facts bearing on the legality of the Relief afforded, and which were known to the Relieving Officer and withheld in a way which can only be accounted for by gross ignorance of his duties, or a desire to misrepresent the actual facts of the case. Thus at page 69 Edw. Cleary aged 30 having a wife and three children dependent upon him a sailor described as at sea having no bodily or mental defect is brought forward as an applicant for Relief, and a sum of 7/6 is entered as having been given to him as provisional Relief. It is considerable difficulty I have ascertained from the Relieving Officer that in this case plain the wife of the man Cleary came before the Board, and stated that her husband who was a sailor had arrived in New Ross and applied for means to enable her to go and meet him there, whereupon the Relieving Officer was directed to give her 7/6. The order is not initialed nor is there any authority for this payment on the Application & Report Book. If there had been any such order I might have debited the amount to the Guardian who initialed it. It is entered as provisional relief paid in money by the Relieving Officer, and as the payment was clearly illegal, thereby disallow it as such, and debit him with a sum of 7/6 provisional relief charged in his Relief & Report Book.

which there is no entry in his Application & Report Book. I have observed another case, at page 80 that of Thomas Seary, a child aged 12 represented as an orphan having a sore leg who has been receiving relief under the 1st Section of 10 Vic Cap. 31 for many months. It appears on inquiry that this child's mother is alive, and that he is living with her, but the fact is not set out in the Application and Report Book. I pointed out on my last visit to this Union that in cases like that of Seary the Guardians have no power to order out door relief under the 1st Section, unless the parents liable for his maintenance fall within one of those classes of cases specified in that Section. If the case of the child is an urgent one the Relieving Officer can deal with it under the 7th Section, and afford provisionally such aid as may be necessary, and I have now to state that if any similar case comes before me again I shall debit the Relief to the Guardians or Guardian by whom it has been authorized. The conduct of the Relieving Officer in withholding the facts of the above cases as well as his general neglect to report as he is required by the Commissioners Regulations to report upon this book the particulars of the cases of applicants is deserving of

and Report Book the particulars referred to be entered in each case - the neglect & shame done which has arisen in a great measure from the fact that the circumstances of each case are known to the Guardians of the Division upon which the paupers are respectively placed before the Relief is granted - that the Board in consequence desire to hear testimony to the strict honesty of Mr. Parish, and of the anxiety manifested by him for the efficient discharge of his duties, that the Board have instructed him to be particularly careful for the future in acting on the instructions given to him by the Auditor, and to use every effort in his power to afford the Auditor satisfaction,




