I beg to direct the attention of the Board to the necessity of painting the Workhouse.
I have to report that the Board will give me credit for 452 lbs soap, being the decrease in weight for the half year ended 25th March last.

Orders, that the Clerk advertise for 400 lbs of Best Fleecy Wool, and for the painting of the external wood, and iron work of the Workhouse, and also of the interior of 12 windows, and for the staining of the Chapel furniture—the Guardians finding all materials, and tenders to be considered by the Board on the 4th Prox, and that credit be allowed the Master for 452 lbs Soap.

No 13283/70, dated 21st May 1870. Stating that there is no authority for the application of the Poor Rates for the payment of the Cost of Relief which is not given by order of Board of Guardians or Relieving Officer.

No 13285/94, dated 20th May 1870, expressing their Sanction to the use of kumilk instead of Buttermilk at the Breakfast Meal of the Children in the Workhouse, as proposed.

No 18182/70, dated 20th May 1870, stating that they have received Mr Hamilton's half yearly Report on the Loxford Union. & ordered that the Master is hereby requested to pay more attention in future to the Clothing of the aged and infirm males,

Ordered that Margaret Carroll, who states that her husband, Patrick Carroll, has refused to maintain her be admitted with her child into the Workhouse, and that notice requiring him to enter the Workhouse be served on him by the Clerk.

Ordered that the Master Taylor reoccupy the Apartment which, for some time was appropriated to the use of the Infant Children, the room having been disinfected and the Medical Officer having stated that it can now with safety be occupied.

Ordered that the Master direct the Shelter to proceed, if he considers the evidence sufficient, against John Whelan of Ballymole, Hugh Roche of Keshford, Michael White of Ballymole, and William Atkin of Keshford, for the recovery of the Cost of the Maintenance of Children in the Workhouse of whom they are respectively stated to be the putative fathers.
