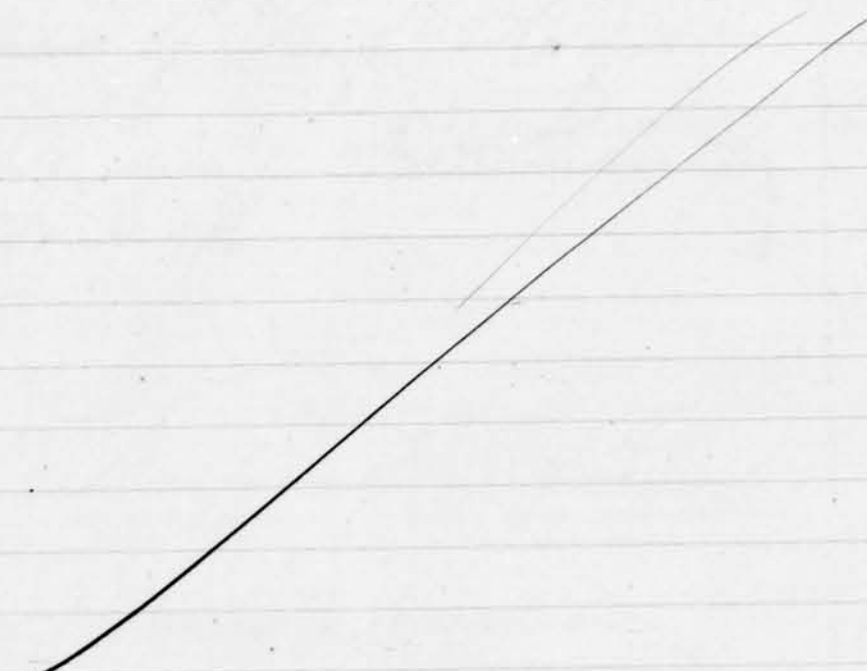



They to report that a pauper named Davidstun expressed a desire to me on Sunday last to change his Religion from Protestant to Roman Catholic, acting on the instructions contained in article 34 of the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners. I informed him that his wish could not be complied with until the Board of Guardians would meet on this day. The Protestant Chaplain on hearing of Davidstun's wish requested me to allow him to speak to the man, but I refused for the reason that I do not think any interference could be permitted without a violation of it until the Guardians would have given their decision on the case.
