The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect; (or Orders made on them respectively as follows:)

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 25th May 1846, N^o 10129. D/46, requesting to be informed whether any steps have been taken with respect to the report of the visiting Committee, on the Minutes of the proceedings of the Guardians of the 9th instant, as to a deficiency in the supply of Water for the Workhouse.

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated the 25th May 1846, N^o 262. M/46, stating that Government have it in contemplation to facilitate in some degree the conveyance of the Wives of persons transported, so as to enable them to join their Husbands under certain regulations, and further stating that they request the Guardians will be good enough to cause inquiry to be made throughout the Union in order to ascertain the names of persons in the Union, whose Husbands and Wives have been transported, and to send the results of this inquiry to the Commissioners.

A circular from the Commissioners, dated the 25th May 1846, 126. 261. M/46, requesting that they be forthwith furnished with the number of Women, between the ages of 10 & 40, which was in the Workhouse on the 23rd instant.

The Returning Officer's list of candidates, nominated for the office of Guardian, to fill vacancies in the Divisions of Rathfriland, Mungliff, & Mulranthin, for the year ending the 25th March 1847, was laid before the Board.

And also the Return of the Election was laid before the Board.

Provisional Admissions into the Workhouse, and Applications for Admissions were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Book.

It was ordered that inquiry be made for the names of persons in the Union, who may have had friends recently transported.

The Bonds and other Securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows:—(this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

The Clerk delivered to each Guardian present a copy of the Abstracts, forms 4 & 5, of the audited accounts, for the half year ended the 25th March 1846.

Resolved, that a second door be made in the Nurse's room, to enable it to be used during the time as a nursing room, the use of the surgery for that purpose, being not only most inconvenient, but utterly subversive of the clasification and order of the House.

It was ordered, that the Clerk reply to the letter of the Commissioners, that they decline to proceed criminally against Christy, his former late Rate Collector, as the Matter has passed by so long with out prosecution and that the civil proceeding is pending, and that the debt will

will be recovered ultimately.

It was ordered, by the Board, that the sum of ninety six Pounds four Shillings and three Pence, being declared by the Committee of Guardians, appointed to revise the Collector's accounts of the Drogheda Division, as arrears of Rate lost, should be struck off the amount of uncollected Rate of said Division.

Resolved, that the Clerk inform the Commissioners, in reply to their letter respecting the scarcity of Water, that this Board attribute that, and the many other serious defects of this Workhouse, to the Act of the Commissioners, themselves, in suffering their Architects, Contractors, & Clerks of Works, to perform their duties improperly, & defectively.

That the insufficient supply of Water has been an original, and constant defect, and has been constantly complained of.

That to remedy those defects the Ratepayers have been, and will be, put to great expense. However the Board have now given the Clerk instructions to make inquiry against next Board day, as to the probable cost of sinking a second well upon some other part of the Workhouse ground, in order to enable them to judge as to the expediency of undertaking such work.

The necessary checks and Orders having been duly signed and countersigned, the Board separated.

The Books and other documents in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows:—(this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year)

That the date be posted up in a conspicuous part of the Boardroom with an appendix to this effect, that upon the day above mentioned each Collector shall make a Return to the Board of all defaulters within his District and the names of such defaulters shall be read publicly before the Rate Days of each Division.

That he should be required to lay before the Board the list of defaulting Ratepayers in his District on the day next to the list to be laid before the Rate Days of the Divisions.

Mr. Sparrow brought forward his Motion of which he had given notice, and moved, seconded by Mr. Le Monte, That the Collectors in future be paid 9 in the pound for all money collected & paid within 3 Months from the delivery of the Rate Books; 6 for all sums collected & paid in the following Months 4 and 3 for any further balance that may be collected. Two thirds of the Rate due on the first 3 Months' collection to be paid at the termination of that period, the other third to be held over until the whole Rate, so far as can be collected, be paid in; the payment on the fourth Month's collection to be payable as soon as the amount be ascertained.

Doctor Brady moved an amendment, seconded by Mr. Thom, (read) That no change be made in the Collector's salary at this period.

The amendment was carried by 6 to 4. It was moved by Mr. Le Monte, seconded by Mr. Sparrow, & passed That no payment be put in the Rate Book for consideration on this day fortnight.

The Clerk set to be for one, two, or three years. Clerk asked to say whether they would supply the whole, or a part of what may be wanted.

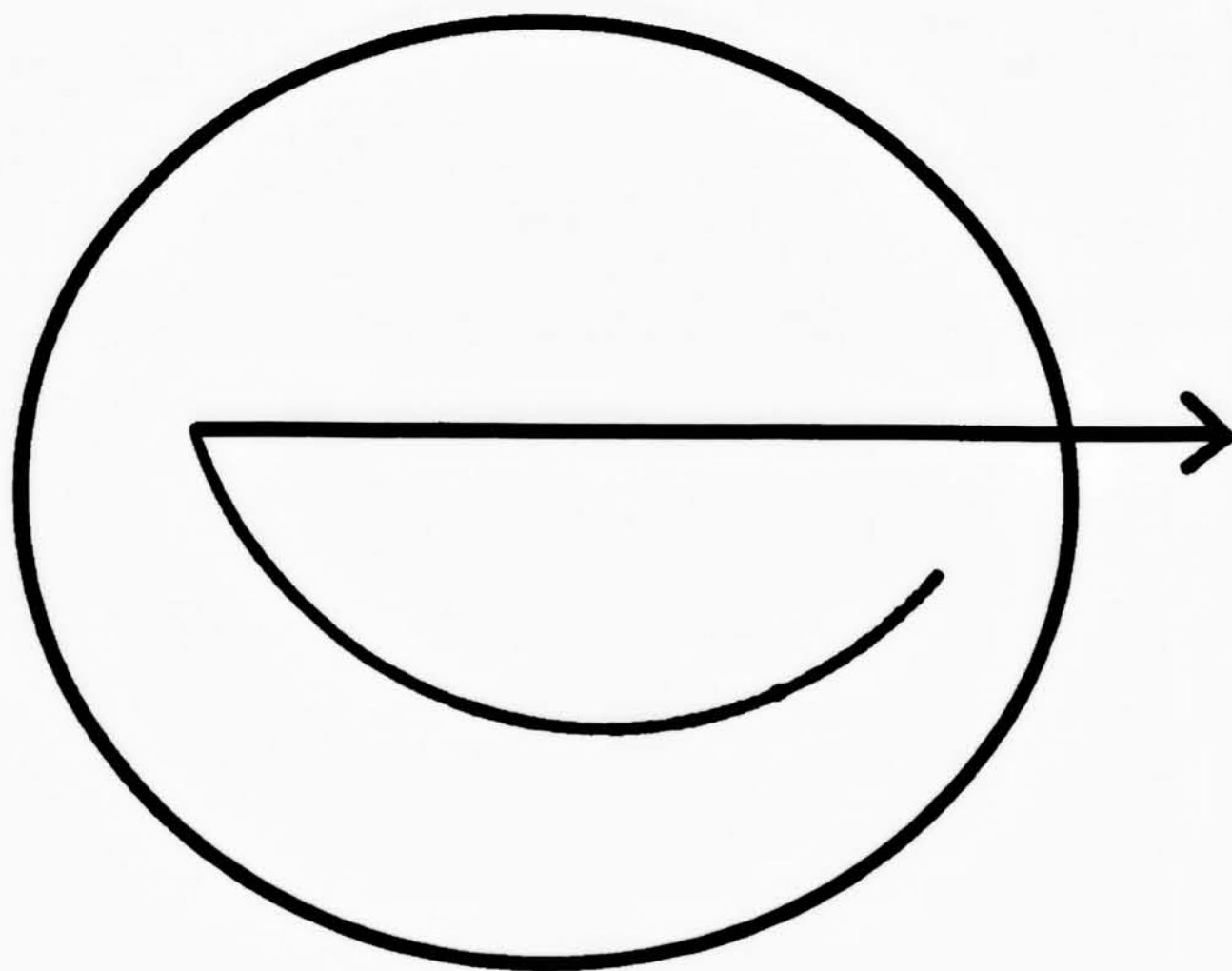
