During the past few years my failing health, and growing infirmity have frequently urged me to resign the very onerous duties of Medical Officer of this large and populous District. Indeed it has been the repeated wish of my family and as often frustrated by my inability to bring myself to sever the ties and associations of over thirty years, I now feel that I must tender my resignation, and in doing so I may fairly say that I have grown gray in the service and that I never spared myself either night or day while it was God's will to leave me health and strength.
