The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect: (see Orders made on them respectively as follows):

A Circular from Mr. Hall, of 55 Stephens Green Dublin, dated the 15<sup>th</sup> March 1847, requesting to have an accompanying tabular form filled up, & stating in the column for remarks whether the Guardians have struck a rate or intended striking a rate, for the ensuing half year, & what is the amount of that rate.

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated the 16<sup>th</sup> March 1847, No. 129, M. 47, requesting to have the names of the Magistrates acting or residing in each Electoral Division of the Union, entered in an accompanying form, with the address of each Magistrate.

A Letter from Daniel Boydell, the Medical Officer, stating that the quantity of Milk given to the Infant is insufficient - the Nursery & apartments allotted to the Children is too small and the ventilation very imperfect - that the Children

Children should not be exposed to rain or cold - that the sudden transition from their warm apartments to the cold during Hall is very injurious, that there should not be any definite time for their meals - that cleanliness is not sufficiently enforced, and that the children should be brought out in the air in the middle of every fine day."

It was ordered that the Clerk do write to the Guardian this day advising them that the Board will, on this day week, take into consideration the propriety of making a Rate for the purpose of carrying into effect the Measures about the brought into operation under the New Relief Act.

The Board proceeded to receive tenders for New Smith, & accepted Mr. Armstrong's tender for 3 years from the 1<sup>st</sup> July next, at 6<sup>d</sup> per Imperial gallon. And the Board agreed to take New Smith from Mr. Bytles from this until the 1<sup>st</sup> July next, in such quantities as may be required.

Mr. Goadall proposed, seconded by Mr. L. Hunt, that Francis Goadall the Boos Rate collector for the Division of St. Julian & St. Patrick be suspended, & that a request be sent to the Commissioners for his dismissal.

Also that the consideration of Mr. Goadall's tender be postponed until the answer of the Commissioners be received.

That the Clerk write to the Clerk to the effect that he shall collect no more

more Rates, and that similar Notice be given to his successors." Passed unanimously.
