No. 23,660/78, dated 22nd November, 1878, acknowledging Receipt of Guardians Minutes of the 16th instant, containing an entry of a Report of a Committee of the Guardians recommending that some of the able-bodied female inmates be employed in tailoring work, and receive extra diet while so engaged; and in reference thereto they desire to draw the Guardians' attention to Article 22 of the Work-

house Rules, and to state that no change as that proposed in the diet of the class to which these women belong would be either legal or desirable, &c. &c.

Moved, in pursuance of Notice of Motion, by Alderman Vicary, and seconded by Mr. James Fortune:—

That the salary of Doctor David Hadden, Medical Officer of Crossabeg Dispensary District, be increased from £90 to £100 per annum.

Eight Guardians voted in favour of the Resolution, and nineteen Guardians voted against it.

The Chairman declared the Resolution lost by a Majority of eleven.

A letter, dated this day, from Mr. Thomas Harpur, tendering his Resignation of the Office of Inspector under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

Proposed by Charles H. Peacocke, J.P., and seconded by Mr. James Fortune, and passed:—

That the Clerk advertise for an Inspector under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, for three months, at a salary of £12-10-0 per quarter, which includes travelling expenses—the election to take place on the 7th proximo; that Mr. Harpur be requested to act as Inspector to that date; and that his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant be respectfully requested to sanction payment to Mr. Harpur to that date at the rate of £12-10-0 per quarter.

Ordered—That Luke Doyle be admitted into the hospital of this house, and that the relief which will be afforded him be by way of loan.

Ordered—That the Clerk advertise for the supply, for three months, of best Seconds Flour, Oatmeal, Indian Meal, and Meat.

A letter, dated 22nd November, 1878, from Mr. John Lynn, Secretary to the Wexford Gas Company, stating that he had remedied the defects in the supply of Gas to the Workhouse, &c. &c.

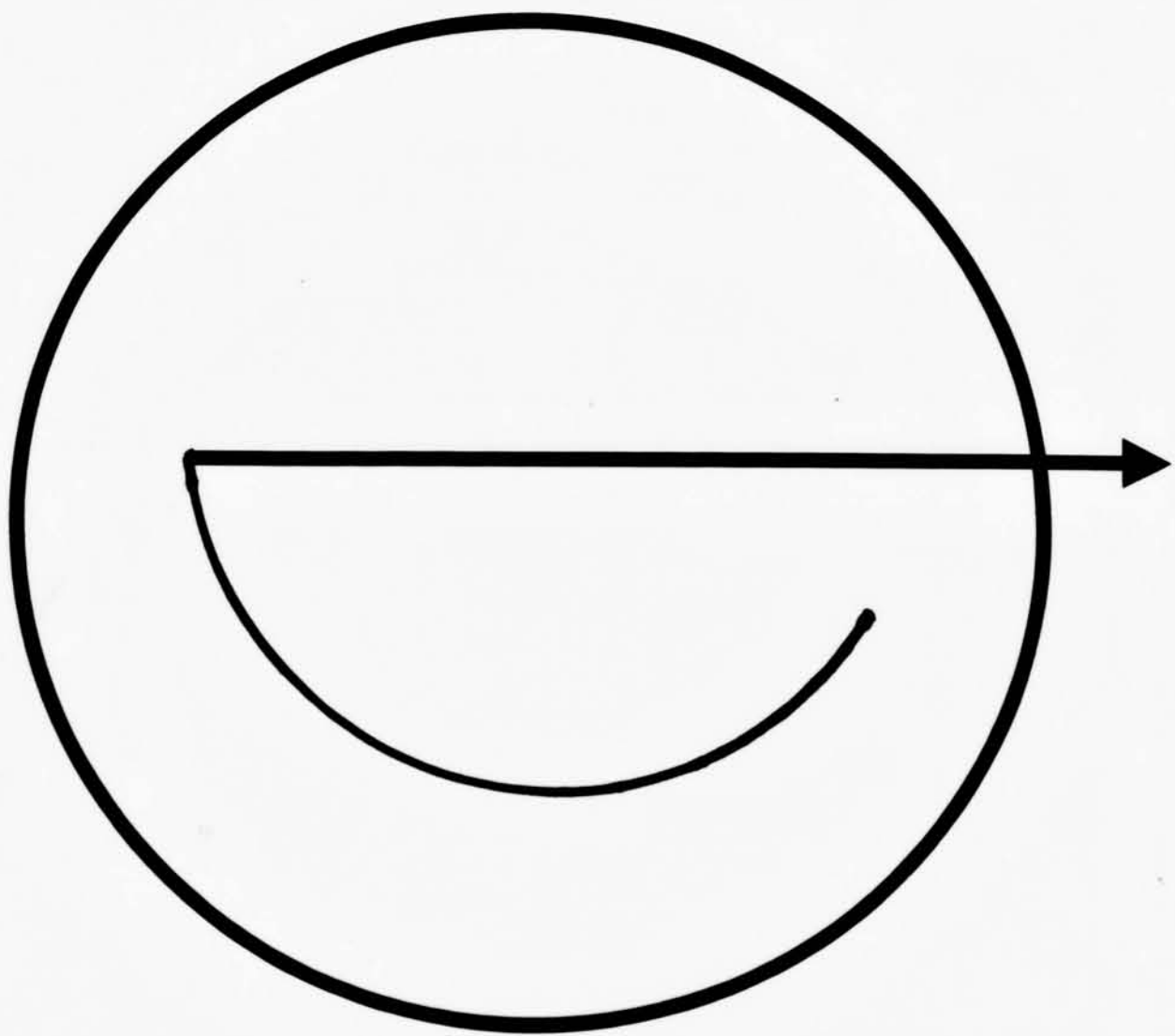
