Gentlemen. 

Sir, The L<sup>y</sup> Board for Ireland have to acquaint the Board of Guardians of Wexford Union that they have received a Report from their Vispector Mr. Hamilton, in which he states that when at the Workhouse recently, he observed that the duties of Clerk are discharged in a very unsatisfactory manner, that the Clerk's Office is kept in a very slovenly condition and that the Books are not duly posted, the Personal Ledger was not indexed, and some of the accounts were not entered in it; in the Union Ledger neither the Electoral Divisions nor the Poor's accounts have been written up, and the Treasurer's account is posted in what is described as a "Rough Ledger" a practice which as Mr Hamilton remarks is unauthorized, irregular, and objectionable.

Mr Hamilton also found that although some of the Poor Rate Collectors received their warrants on the 8<sup>th</sup> Nov. last, the Abstracts of Rate collected and lodged have not been written up, and he observes that the very negligent and unsatisfactory manner in which Mr. Hamilton discharges his duties may be to some extent attributable to habits of intemperance. Under these circumstances, and having regard to the repeated complaints which have been made against Mr. Hamilton, and the various cautions which he has received, the L<sup>y</sup> Board are of opinion that no further confidence should be placed in him, and that the Guardians should call upon him for his resignation, and proceed in the usual way to the appointment of his successor. Sir, The Local Government Board for Ireland desire to acquaint the Board of Guardians that they have received the Half Yearly Report of their Inspector Mr Hamilton relative to the Wexford Union the financial position of which cannot be so obvious be considered as satisfactory, there being still a balance against the Union at foot of Treasurer's account owing to the last rate having been struck below the estimated requirements.

As regards accommodation, Mr Hamilton states that in respect of size and internal arrangement, the Workhouse is adequate for its ordinary wants, but that the infirmary generally, and the aged and infirm men, and able-bodied women's departments in particular are at present quite as full as is desirable, a remark which he adds, may be applied to the entire establishment.

Mr Hamilton further states that the Ventilation can hardly be said to be perfect, especially as regards two of the dormitories for female inmates, which being too small he suggests be much improved by being provided with ventilators in the ceiling.

The Schools are described by Mr Hamilton as well managed and the literary and industrial progress of the children as satisfactory, but he points out that as there are now 48 boys in attendance the services of a

a temporary assistant teacher would be desirable in the event of a further increase.

There was on the occasion of Mr. Hamilton's inspection thirty-two lunatics and Idiots in the Workhouse, and he remarks that he would gladly see better accommodations for each of these classes; their yards especially being very much confined. The latter observation applies also to the yards of the Infirmary.

Mr. Hamilton informs the L.G. Board that until recently the B. Officers have not been in the habit of visiting the children at nurse and reporting on their condition regularly every month, and that reports now received from them are not sufficiently full, and the Board have to request that the Guardians will be good enough to call the attention of the B. Sir, The Lg. Board for Ireland has before them the Resolution of the Board of Guardians of the Wexford Union of 31st. Ultra, proposing that the salary of each paid Officer, Assistant, and Board of the Union be reduced 20 per cent per annum.

In reference thereto the Lg. Board desire to state that they have given the proposal due consideration and it appears to them that on the occurrence of any vacancy in an office it would be a legitimate question for the Guardians to consider whether the salary

of such Officers might not be properly be altered and resumed, but the Board think that when a person engages in the service of the Guardians at a certain salary and that the terms of his appointment are, that he shall be paid such a salary, it is not reasonable or just to refuse the rate of payment while he satisfactorily discharges the duties he undertook to perform. The Board fear however that this is the course the Guardians propose to adopt, and that in several instances they wish to reduce the salaries which are not by any ways exorbitant, to a lower rate than that at which those persons were elected.

With reference to other Officers whose salaries have been raised after many years of efficient service, the Board are of opinion that it would be unwise to deprive them of the advantages so gained while their duties remain unchanged, and that such a proceeding would tend to produce discontent and a feeling of insecurity in regard to their position which would have an injurious effect on the administration.




