"21st of June 1880.— I visited the Fever Hospital on the above date and found only two patients under treatment. I recommend that shoes of light description, stockings, 'wash bonnets' neck-kerchiefs & shawls be supplied.

I wish to draw the attention of the Guardians to the urgent necessity of the Officers exercising a careful supervision in seeing that the clothes which patients have brought with them on their admission to Hospital shall be disinfected and placed in the clothes store, until such times as the several Owners of the clothes shall have taken their discharge and that under no pretence whatever shall patients be allowed to make use of their clothes during the time of their being under Medical treatment.

I have taken stock of the clothing &c and have appended a list of those articles worn out and which I recommend the Guardians to condemn.

The sash of one of the back windows is falling to pieces; the iron bars of some of the windows are undone; there are some holes in the boarding of the wards; there is an aperture in the slating of the clothes store, and which appears to have been caused by a stone having fallen on the slates: these defects should be remedied.

The Matron applies for a hearthrug for her room. My attention was drawn to an offensive smell from the privies; these require repairs: a system of earth closets would prove more preferable in every respect than the existing arrangements.

The outside walls of the Hospital require colouring and as there are so few patients the present time would be most suitable to have the insidewalls lime-washed.

The wording of the sign-board over the entrance wicket should be altered.

Ordered. — That the several recommendations of Mr. Peacocke be carried out. That the Master buy a hearth-rug for the Matron of the Fever Hospital, and that he be requested to visit the system of earthclosets in town, with a view to having similar ones made for the Hospital.

I must say he has been a very good Officer heretofore. "The case of the porter did not properly come before the Committee as he has already been dismissed but the charges made against him were confirmed.

"The Laundress had resigned since last Board Day and the only case upon which it is necessary to report is that of the Head Nurse who had brought clothes into the Hospital for the purpose of washing them. She acknowledged having done so and upon examination it appeared they were those of her Grand Children, that the articles were very few in number and that no soap belonged to the House was used the transaction was very irregular but taking into consideration the long and faithful service

I had him removed immediately to the Fever Hospital sheds, had his clothes burned got the Lodgers Apartment fumigated and every necessary precaution taken to prevent the spreading of the disease.

I have shown a cooked sample of the early potatoes grown on the farm to the Medical Officer: he states they are full fit for food for the inmates and recommends their use for dinner thrice weekly. As to size quantity and quality I have never seen a better crop raised.

Sir, I beg to bring under your notice that I had a boy named James Armstrong aged 15 years removed from Workhouse to Fever Hospital Sheds, during the week suffering from small pox. I was informed by the Porter in the Workhouse that he lay in the lodge where Alick Joyce slept. I am Sir your obed. servant

Signed M. J. Sheridan.

Master's explanation:— I have to state the boy with two other inmates (the gateman and Porter's Assistant) and six Casuals slept in the Bath Room dormitory on the night that the Casual Alick Joyce slept there. When Joyce was removed to the Fever Hospital Sheds next day, the beds were emptied and washed his clothing burned and the dormitory bath-room and adjacent premises immediately stoved or fumigated and every necessary or precautionary measure taken as reported by me to your Board of the 24th Ult. The Gateman and the man who assists the Porter always sleep in this bath-room dormitory both for convenience sake and as a watch over the Casuals at night. The boy Armstrong who is 17 years old not 15 years as stated has been in and out of the Workhouse for some time: he has been very disobedient and unruly and was kept at stonebreaking in the bathroom yard. On the 28th Ult or ten days after the boy Joyce leaving, Armstrong took ill and was removed to the Workhouse hospital by the Medical Officer and on the following day (29th) was transferred to the sheds at the Fever Hospital suffering from small-pox. After he (Armstrong) leaving we had his bed removed, stoved and lime-washed the place and had it thoroughly purified again. Both boys—Joyce and Armstrong are now convalescent. John Irwin Master.

No. 27185 dated 14th Sept. 1880. Declining to sanction the appointment of Mr Jourdan as Schoolmaster, because he was obliged to resign the office of Schoolmaster of the Shillelagh Union for forging the name of the Chairman of that Union to a seed ticket.

"At the request of a considerable number of the Guardians of the Shillelagh Union I filled between three and four hundred seed tickets for parties who applied to me — this without any remuneration whatever. An applicant presented a form to the Clerk which had his name in the wrong place — it being where the bail's name should be. As it stood the Chairman signed it for a certain quantity of seeds. The Clerk afterwards refused to sign it until the requisite alteration was made. The applicant brought the form to me, and I having some blank tickets supplied to me by the Guardians I transcribed all that was on the old form to a new one, making no alteration whatever — save putting the applicant's name in the proper place and omitting the quantities fearing

these to be inserted by the guardians. I was so conscious of my innocence that I did not enter these quantities which makes it evident I did not want to hide the matter from them. In transcribing from the old to the new ticket I transcribed the chairman's name with the rest. This was the forgery. It is quite evident I had no fraudulent intentions when I did not put in the quantities. If I were at the time conscious of the illegality of the act I might have put them in along with the rest and by so doing it would probably have passed unnoticed. I am exceedingly sorry for the act but I have only to say it was quite unintentional. It is more than painful to me to have my character aspersed for the doing of an act in which I was conscious of no wrong. The Guardians of the Shillelagh Union evidently believed in my innocence for after the occurrence they gave me unanimously the testimonial which I submitted to your Board on the day of my appointment here. My character both before and since has been above reproach and I would respectfully ask the Board to lay the foregoing facts before the L. G. Board and to ask them to reconsider my case.

From Dr. Piers Med Officer of Wexford Dispensary District, reporting the existence of an epidemic of Scarlatina in the Wexford Urban Sanitary District:—

"Until recently I was kept in ignorance of its occurrence in consequence of an ~~unconquerable~~ unconquerable aversion which the lower classes have ~~to~~ to being removed to Hospital until they find that their lives are in imminent danger.

"As I remarked in a letter to the L.G. Board for Ireland a few months ago, it is utterly impossible to stamp out infectious diseases, unless the persons affected are compelled to go to an Hospital for that purpose in the commencement of their illness.

"In the present state of legislation, the persons to whom I allude cannot be compulsorily removed as they do not come under the 141st Section of the Public Health Act. A case of the description I allude to

came under my notice during the present week.

"It is very difficult to prevent uninfected persons from entering houses which contain a case of infectious disease, by which means chiefly the disease is spread amongst the lower classes.

"The present epidemic is a very virulent form of Scarlatina and is not confined to the lower classes. No death, however, from this cause has been reported to me, as come under my own observation. I am unable up to the present to trace the source of infection but have no doubt that some of the schools have propagated the disease which is not confined to any particular part of the district. I have had the houses where cases have occurred disinfected by the sanitary sub-officers, and have taken all possible precautions to prevent a further spread of the disease.

"The district has been very healthy during the past season very few cases of infectious disease having come under my notice.

The Guardians beg respectfully to ask the L.G. Board, if they can legally pay the pound age due to the Rate Collectors they not having completed their collection, but have in many instances returned Arrear Sheets amounting to a considerable sum of money - in all over £200

We wish to bring under the attention of the L.G. Board that the offence which Mr Jourdan has admittedly committed was not committed by him as a moral offence but was an inadvertent act and we therefore urgently solicit the L.G. Board not to use their dictum of refusal to his appointment as by so doing it would be the means of preventing him from ever again acting in his capacity of teacher to any public institution. We therefore ask the L.G. Board to sanction his appointment if not in its entirety, at least provisionally, so as to enable Mr. Jourdan by a life of honesty and integrity to win back the good opinion of the L.G. Board.
