No 10707, 30 April 1881. Stating that they will not raise any objection to the proposed payment of £11. 14. 7 last expenses of Mr Taylor, the Boards Solicitor

No 11470. 2nd May 1881. Pointing out that Collector Murphy has not made due progress in collection of rates and requesting the Board to call on him to use greater exertion, so that his collection may be closed in due time.

Ordered.— That the Clerk carry out the request of the Local Government Board

No. 11.668. 3rd May 1881. Pointing out that the facts given in the Clerks Letter of the 29th ult. are quite at variance with the information supplied in the communication of the 4th ult, and would show if accurate that the man was not removable. 1. The District is a small one—the amount of Rate being seldom more than £800.
2. It is altogether in the Relieving Officer's District and his duties bring him frequently through these Electoral Divisions: the Guardians therefore believe that it will not to any extent interfere with his duties as Relieving Officer.
3. The Guardians have the most thorough confidence in the ability and activity of Mr Keating and they believe him to be fully competent to discharge the duties of both offices.

The election of a Rate Collector to supply the place of Dake, for the Electoral Divisions of Bannow, Bridgetown, Duncormick, Haristown, Kilcowan, Killag, Kilmore, Newcastle and Tarnhaggard, was next proceeded with, when three candidates were proposed and seconded, viz. Messrs Kane, Sinnott and Furlong. The securities of each were considered good and on a poll being taken these voted for.

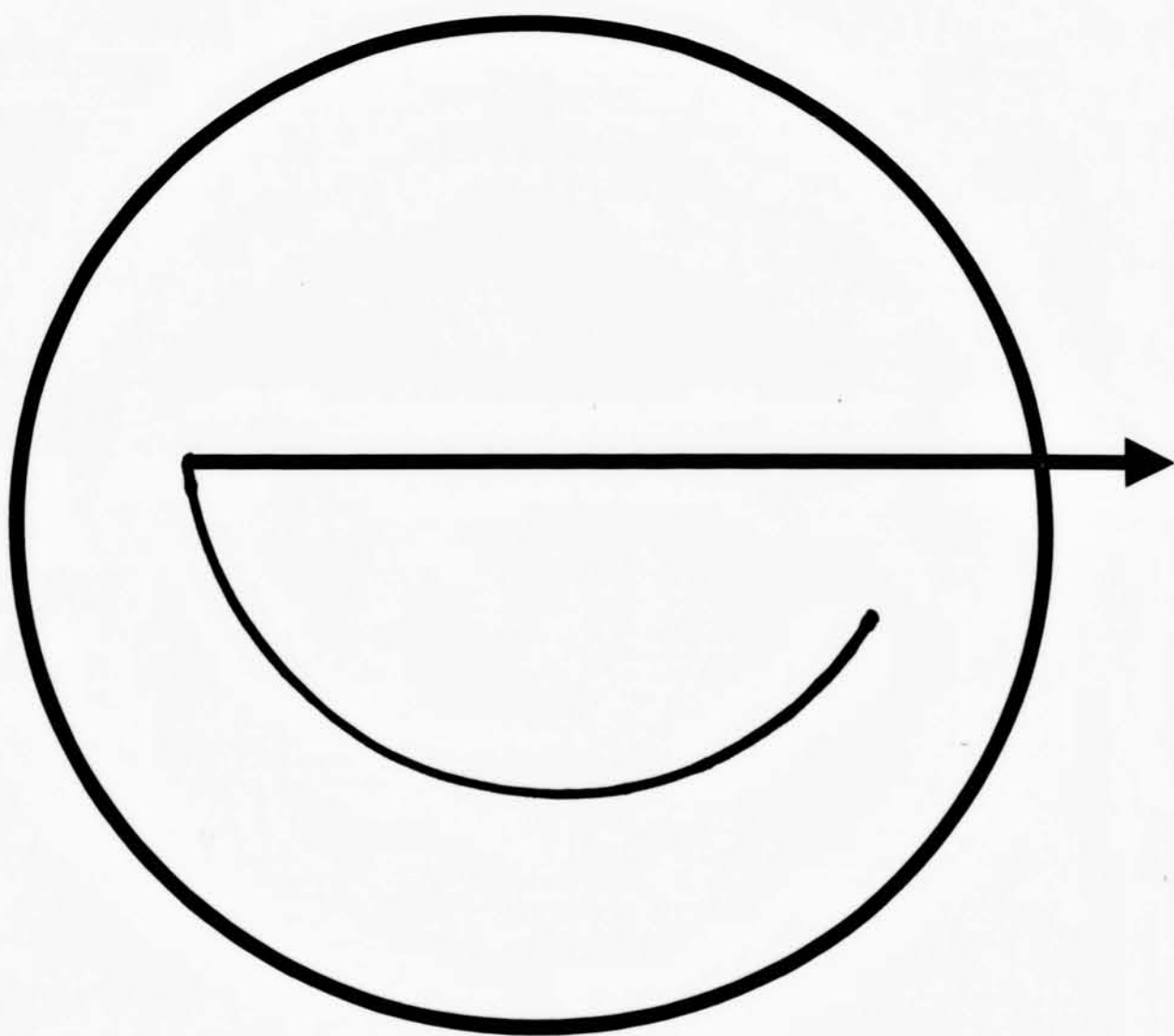
